Cameron, Mrs. Kenrick and Mr. Frank Kenrick, who leave this week for England.

The young people of the St. Agatha's Guild propose to give an entertainment in the school-house on Friday evening, May 15th, in the form of a Concert and Operetta, under the direction of Miss Cayley and Miss Dye. It is hoped that the performance will be largely patronised, as very great pains have been taken and no small expense incurred in order to make it in every way worthy of the Guild. There will be a small charge for admittance, the proceeds to be devoted, after the expenses are paid, to the objects of the Guild.

The Glee Club still continues its weekly practices on Tuesday evenings under the direction of Mr. Phillips, and has fully justified its inception. At the same time it is felt that the music selected should have drawn to the practices more members of the congregation who are desirous of cultivating the art of singing. It is hoped that the next session, which will commence in October next, will begin its work with greatly increased numbers, men's voices specially are needed.

MOTHERS' MEETING.

The Mothers' Meeting under the superintendence of Mrs. Gosling brought their session to a close on Easter Tuesday. The session has been in every way a most successful one, both as regards largely increased numbers and the interest shown by the members in the proceedings. A feature of this year's work has been the establishment of a Crèche, which has been ably presided over by Miss Kirkpatrick. By this arrangement the mothers are able to give an undivided attention to the study of domestic economy and other subjects interesting to the maternal mind.

EASTER VESTRY MEETING.

The annual meeting of the Vestrymen took place on Easter Monday evening in the school-room—the Rector in the chair. The attendance was very small, only some twenty-one men being present. As will be seen by the accounts here appended, the annual statement of the churchwarden, Mr. H. L. M. Weller, was considered most satisfactory, and was, after some small discussion and explanation, unanimously

adopted. In spite of extensive repairs to the church fabric, of cleaning and repairing the organ and the abnormal price of fuel, the finances were found to be in good shape and the floating debt was still further reduced out of the ordinary revenue.

The Rector, in nominating Mr. Weller as his Warden, spoke in very high terms of the services which he had rendered the church during the past year. Only those closely connected with the working of the parish can form any idea of the amount of patient labour which Mr. Weller has put in, and he deserves indeed the very hearty thanks which was accorded him by the Vestry. As the two gentlemen who were nominated for the office of People's Warden declined to serve, this appointment was postponed to the adjourned Vestry meeting, on April 27th, when Mr. Richard Baines was elected. The Sidemen, with their Chairman, Mr. Huson Murray, K.C., were thanked and re-appointed. Votes of thanks were also passed to the choir and W. A. Messrs. Huson Murray, K.C., C. W. R. Biggar, K.C., and Mr. George Harman were appointed as delegates to the Synod.

EASTER SERVICES.

The congregation are deeply indebted to the young ladies who this year decorated the church with their usual good taste. Beautiful as the church is at all times, the varied array of Arum and Easter lilies made it still more fair and added in no small degree to the solemn joy of the Queen of Festivals. The choir had worked hard with Mr. Phillips in order to make the services of the church magnificent, and inspired both by the beauty of the music selected and by the unusually large congregations, carried out their part of the Festival in a spirit and manner worthy of high praise. Perhaps the feature of the day from a choral point of view was Westbury's Te Deum—a difficult piece of composition

but excellently well rendered—and Dr. Martin's Anthem, "As It Began to Dawn." Miss Maud Cowan's rendering of the solo, "Fear Not Ye," was a specially noted item and was highly appreciated. The Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis to Bunnett's setting and Myles Foster's beautiful anthem "Awake, Glad Heart," formed a very delightful evening's programme. Mr. Phillips' voluntaries consisted of the Halleluiah Chorus and selections from Beethoven. The whole day's services reflect the very highest credit upon both organist and choir.

At the Children's Service in the afternoon the Children's Lenten Offerings were presented, and it is pleasant to note a considerable increase in the amount offered over that of last year.
