THE CITY OF TORONTO BILL DISCUSSED BY THE LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

What Was Done at the Parliament Buildings Yesterday—Measure Relating to the Building of Beer Lanes and Streams—Division of the House Result in the Government Being Sustained—Work in a Committee.

Yesterday's session of the Ontario Legislature was a long and rather important one. The House did not adjourn until long after midnight, and among the measures under consideration were the bill respecting the city of Toronto, and that for the preventing of deer killing in water.

When the House went into committee on the Attorney-General's bill to levy a provincial tax of \$50 per day on travelling shows, circuses and other exhibitions, Mr. Whitney objected to the wording of the measure. The bill, he said, was intended to restrict the freedom of circuses and like organizations, on the ground that a bad class of rogues and confidence men always went in their trail, and yet the Attorney-General was going to allow these shows full swing at industrial exhibitions throughout the country.

Attorney-General's two bills proposed respectively for the appointment and payment of high constables and for the better protection of certain classes of workmen passed the committee stage, as did also those for the better protection of certain classes of workmen and for the better protection of certain classes of workmen.

Toronto Registry Offices. In committee of the whole on Mr. Gibson's bill respecting the Registry Act, Mr. Howland moved that sections 11 and 12 of the bill be struck out.

Section 11 provides that the registrar of East and West Toronto shall pay to the Treasurer of the city of Toronto of their net income each year respectively over the sum of \$1500 the following percentages: (a) On the excess over \$1500, not exceeding \$3000, 30 per cent. thereof; (b) On the excess over \$3000, not exceeding \$6000, 20 per cent. thereof; (c) On the excess over \$6000, 10 per cent. thereof.

Section 12 provides that of the net income of other registrars there shall be paid to the said registrar the following percentages: (a) On the excess over \$1500, not exceeding \$3000, 10 per cent. thereof; (b) On the excess over \$3000, not exceeding \$6000, 20 per cent. thereof; (c) On the excess over \$6000, 30 per cent. thereof.

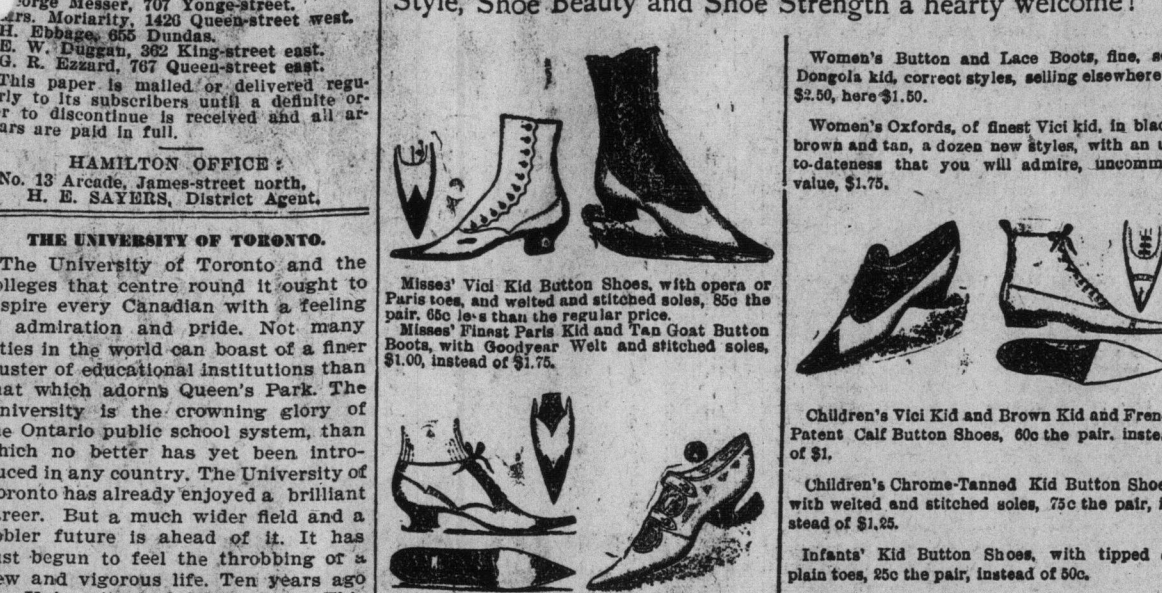

Problems of Many Litigants Yesterday's Decisions on Points of Law and Appeals at Osgoode Hall.

A peculiar alimony case was heard in the Nourthy Court yesterday. Joseph Strain in 1892 got a judgment by which she was to receive \$100 a month from her husband's earnings. She later signed a deed of separation and waived her right to money for her support. Report of her agreement, she was to have the deed and quit claim set aside on the ground that she had no power to compromise the judgment. The Street reserved judgment.

J. H. Stephenson and Chas. Murray yesterday asked for an injunction to restrain ex-Alt. Miles Vokes from acting as president of the Toronto Athletic Club. They claim that in the distribution of stock consequent on increase of capital, Vokes got more than his fair proportion of shares. ALONG THE WATER FRONT.

The Toronto Ferry Company's Fleet—An Island Service on Friday.

Mr. W. A. Esson, manager of the Toronto Ferry Company, has returned from the island, whether he went to inspect the company's fleet and to make the repairs of damages caused by the storm on Sunday last. The total damage, it is thought, will not exceed \$500, although this cannot be made certain until the fleet is raised and examined. At present that boat is at the bottom of the river.

Should the company's wharf at the Island be of any use on Friday, there will be two ferries running between that point and Yonge street wharf. Capt. Pitts will bring the Island Queen and J. L. McEduard to the harbor tomorrow, and they will be placed in commission immediately.

Commodore Robt. Williams will again have charge of the fleet, which is composed of the following vessels, in addition to those named above: Mayflower, Capt. Moulton; Primrose, Capt. Tafford; Shamrock, Capt. Livingston; Thistle, Capt. Jennings; Lullaby, Capt. Hinton; Kathleen, Capt. Martin.

The work of refitting the electric and water plants at the island will proceed next week. The bar will open on May 1, and the hotel a few days later. The company's new ticket office and wharf on the west side of the Yonge street wharf are nearly ready for occupation. Tickets will be collected at Yonge street this season.

Around the Wharves.

The steamer Lakeside is expected in the harbor to-day. She will at once begin her daily service between this wharf and St. Catharines.

The new boat of the Niagara Navigation Company has not been officially named, and will not be until before the launch.

One effect of the recent floods was to raise the height of the water in the bay to a noticeable degree. It is said by steamboat men that if the law is general in the lake regions it will have the effect of causing higher water during the coming season, a consummation, by the way, most devoutly wished for by lake sailors. Those who believe in the seven years theory look for higher water this season, saying that the water of the lakes has been falling for exactly seven years.
