A canvass of the American Senate shows the futility of submitting any treaty to that body which provides for the free entrance of Canadian lumber. A prominent Senator says that 30 votes could be mustered against the ratification of a treaty on any provisions for free lumber alone, and that additional strength would be gathered to the opposition if the treaty looked to the free admittance of lead and nickel. It is necessary that two-thirds of the Senate vote in favor of the ratification of such a measure. It is apparent that enough of the 90 Senatorial votes cannot be obtained to pass such a treaty over the heads of the

In spite of this fact, however, the impression is growing that some sort of a treaty will be arranged before the commission finally breaks up. Wants State-Owned Cables Connecting All British Possessions

and Coaling Stations. and Coaling Stations.

London, Dec. 17.—The morning newspapers print a letter addressed to the Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, Secretary of State for the colonies, by Sir Sandford Fleming, Chancellor of Queen's University, Canada, and a leading expert in telegraph communication and the unification of time reckonfling throughout the world, advocating the adoption of a system of state owned cables connecting every British possession, and all Great Britain's naval coaling stations.

Sir Sandford Fleming proposes three sections of cables, in the Pacific, Indian and Atlantic Oceans, and estimates their cost at 60,000,000. The first step he suggests is a state owned Pacific cable. He contends that if his proposals were carried out, the cost of cabling would be enormously cheapened.
