First Seed Grain Show of West York Farmers' Institute and Etobicoke Agricultural Society.

EXHIBITS ARE SMALL IN NUMBER

But Some Valuable Discussion Took Place—Events in and About the Junction.

The West York Farmers' Institute and Etobicoke Agricultural Society held their first amalgamated seed grain show yesterday at the Village of Thistleton. There was a large gathering of farmers present; but, as most of them had made arrangements to purchase of their spring grain, there were not as many exhibits as there are likely to be another year.

The nature of the show was somewhat of a novelty to the farmers of West York, and next year a greater interest will no doubt be taken in it. In addition to the respective good qualities of the variety of grain exhibited and advocated at the meeting by the exhibitor, there is the advantage in the seed grain show: it induces farmers to keep their fields clean from noxious weeds, and has a tendency to make them grow only the best variety of grains, for nothing shows up worse as a seed show than grain that is scattered seeds of weeds. R. W. Beamish showed red Colorado spring wheat, R. Wood and J. Gardhouse showed goose wheat, E. C. Pearson had with him a good sample of Manchuria barley. He claimed for it that it was the best to yield of any he had tested. He had 40 bushels to the acre. Mr. Pearson also showed Lidonia oats, which ran 45 bushels to the acre, and for the variety he claimed that it was not subject to smut. J. Johnson, from four bushels of this variety, got 200 bushels. It was thought that for all round purposes no oats were better than the American Banner. Mr. Wood has a hybrid variety of wheat which he has not yet named. It is a cross between the red Clawson and Dawson's Golden Chaff. He considers it the best fall wheat grown, and it goes 45 bushels to the acre. Colin Cameron had an exhibit of Immensity barley and black Jersey oats. William C. Gamb showed Early One potatoes, and J. Barker had samples of the Pearl of Savoy. Other potatoes grown in the neighborhood are Empire State, which is said to be the best for heavy soils, the only medium early, and American Beauty. J. Kellam occupied the chair, and the discussion on the different grains and potatoes was very interesting.
