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COLONIAL.

QUEBEC, Oct. 10.—Arrived at the port of Quebec on the 29th September 1831.—Vessels, 856; Tonnage, 223,103; Emigrants, 47,708.

The above number of emigrants include the whole of the Exchange Books. It is certain that the Captains giving their returns to the Harbour Masters, have not included a number of children.

While on the subject of Emigrants we have within these few days, been enabled to form an accurate idea of the extent of the impositions practised, in too many instances, on these unfortunate people.

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COMPARATIVE BIRTHS ON IMPORTS IN BRITISH NORTH AMERICAN PROVINCES AND THE UNITED STATES.

The following article is taken from a late number of the Philadelphia Banner of the Constitution.

Unusual and excessive taxation, one of the blessings of a free Government!

It was formerly contended in favor of a free and constitutional Government of defined and limited powers—as ours was once supposed to be—that equal and moderate taxation was among the advantages which, under ordinary circumstances, every one might count upon enjoying.

Such was the condition of this nation during our late war, and still more so during the revolutionary struggle—one of the principal objects of which was to exonerate ourselves from unequal, unjust and burdensome taxation.

In such an emergency, with a vast national debt, limited revenue and a heavy expenditure, every citizen was called upon to give up the luxuries, and many of the comforts of life, that the Commonwealth and the nation should not fail in the contests they were engaged in, for want of pecuniary support.

But we are now almost free of debt—have been blessed with a course of abundant years, beyond every former example, and have a revenue of twelve to fifteen millions more than our current expenses, and yet our taxes are the people of this free country, who, with one quarter of our present population, rose, as one man, against the power of the most powerful nation on earth, and for what? Because they could not endure an unjust taxation of even three cents per pound on tea?

But the men who did this, have gone down to their graves, and as we much fear, without leaving to their descendants that spirit of liberty and patriotism which served to bear a burden, however light, when imposed by the hands of justice—on the many, for the benefit of the few—on the poor and powerless, for the benefit of the rich and powerful.

We have said that our system of taxation was more burdensome than that imposed on any civilized nation in the old world. The subjects of the King of Great Britain, it must be admitted, are as heavily taxed as any nation within the pale of civilization. Let us, then, compare the tax, as imposed on the agriculturist and laboring classes in this country, for the benefit of a few thousand "wealthy capitalists," with the taxes imposed on the subjects of William the Fourth residing in Canada, Nova Scotia, &c. and the reader will see if our position is not abundantly sustained.

The September English Mail brought London dates to the 11th of that month; but the papers are principally occupied with accounts of the Coronation of the KING and QUEEN. We have given in preceding columns as full a history of that celebration as our limits would admit.—There is nothing new respecting the Reform Bill.

FOREIGN AFFAIRS.—We have given in this paper three Polish Documents, which we are quite certain will be read with pleasure by every friend of that gallant but injured people; they are—The Address of General SKARYNEKI to the soldiers, on relinquishing the command of the Army, which is every way worthy of that brave warrior.—The "Order of the Day" of General DUBINSKI, on assuming the command of the Army;—and the "Manifesto of the Polish Government against Prussia," complaining of the shameful partiality, if not actual partisanship, which the latter Government has shown towards the gigantic enemy of Poland, throughout the vast and unending struggle; and which cannot fail to attach unusual disgrace to both Russia and Prussia.—disgrace to the former, that she should require assistance from any other country in her contest with a people so inferior in numbers; and disgrace to the latter for being thus deceitfully engaged in securing an overgrown Power, thereby aiding in the crushing of a weak but valiant nation.—The affairs of BELGIUM remain in an unsettled state. It is hinted that LEOPOLD is getting tired of being a King; and that he even thinks of abdicating! but this we cannot yet believe.—From GREECE there are reports of an unpleasant nature; the whole of ROMANIA is represented as being ready to break out in a formidable insurrection against the Government, which is prevented by nothing but the poverty of the people.—Portugal has also been again threatened with Revolution; an insurrection occurred among the Soldiers in Lisbon on the 21st August, but after the loss of two or three hundred lives, the tumult was quelled. It seems probable that Don Miguel will find considerable trouble in retaining the diadem on his head in that distracted country. For most assuredly prisons, chains, and the galleys, will not always prove effectual in rendering men submissive to the will of a tyrant.

ACCIDENT.—On Saturday last, a boat with ballast, coming from the Breakwater to the upper part of the Harbor, rowed by two seamen, filled and sunk off Pettigall's Wharf. The rope which was attached to the bow of the boat, unfortunately got entangled round the leg of one of the men, named THOMAS McEACHERN, aged 24 years, a native of Campbelltown, Scotland, by which he was taken down with the boat, and

drowned.—The other saved himself by swimming to the shore. The body of McEACHERN was shortly afterwards picked up, but life was extinct.

Agreeably to advertisement, the annual Meeting of the New-Brunswick Auxiliary Bible Society, was held in the Messone Hall on Wednesday evening last, the President, JOHN M. WILSON, Esquire, in the Chair. The attendance on the occasion was unusually numerous and respectable. From the Report, which was read by the Secretary, it appears that the Society is in an improving condition. The number of subscribers is rapidly increasing, the desire for the Scriptures is greater, and the general interests of the Institution are becoming more popular. It was pleasing to learn, that in consequence of the investigation made by the Committee into the Biblical wants of the poor, 80 bibles and 24 Testaments have been distributed during the past year, among that class of the community.

After the Report was read, the following Resolutions were successively moved and adopted.—

1st.—Moved by the Rev. Mr. Naylor, and seconded by Wm. Taylor, Esquire, President of the Fredericton Bible Association.

That the Report now read be received and printed under the direction of the Committee.

2nd.—Moved by the Rev. I. W. D. Gray, and seconded by Neville Parker, Esquire.—

That the thanks of this Meeting be given to the President, Office Bearer, and Collectors of the Ladies' Bible Association, for their untiring and successful exertions in favor of Bible circulation;—and to the Branches of Grand Lake and St. Stephen's for their continued attachment to the Auxiliary.

3rd.—Moved by the Rev. Mr. Desjarais, and seconded by Mr. James—

That the following Gentlemen compose the Committee for the ensuing year:—

- Messrs. Zebulon Easty, John Owens, Nathan S. Demill, Hugh Allen, Messrs. G. T. Ray, Amos M. Kenzie, James Holman, Henry Hennigar, John Wishart, Stephen Simmet, and Robert Salter.

4th.—Moved by Mr. Wm. Ewing, and seconded by Mr. Demill—

That the existing regulation appointing the Annual Meeting to take place on the last Wednesday of October be rescinded, and that a Regulation be substituted appointing the Annual Meeting to take place on some day in Christmas week, that will appear to the Committee most agreeable.

The collection taken up at the close of the Meeting amounted to 48 lbs.

We are much gratified in looking over the names of those who moved and seconded the resolutions, and find that Gentlemen from every Protestant denomination in the City. This circumstance augurs well for the Institution, and it may be considered as the earnest of a more extended liberality of sentiment, and perhaps as the pioneer of the complete extinction of those feelings of personal animosity, which too frequently arise on account of differences of opinion and profession.—

FIRST SNOW.—Nelson's Gazette of the 12th October, says:—"The Weather continues unprecedently wet. Rain has fallen almost unintermittently since Saturday night, and last night enough of snow and hail fell to cover much of the country in the vicinity of the town."

Look well to your Cabbage.—A family in Philadelphia, named Dungee, were lately poisoned, it is thought from eating of cabbage in which had been secreted a poisonous worm sometimes found in the cabbage plant.—Mrs. Dungee died the following day, and Mr. Fenner, a respectable merchant of Philadelphia, who boarded in the family, died on the second day, and three others of the family were dangerously ill.—A cat and a dog that ate from the dish in which some of the cabbage had been placed, also took sick.

The following ludicrous statement from the Boston Transcript, should operate as another caution:—

SAKERS AND CARBAGES.—One of our subscribers has sent to our office a snake measuring fifteen inches. It was discovered suddenly coiled up in a cabbage which his domestic was preparing for the table. In dividing the cabbage with a knife, she accidentally cut off its head, and he, to save his head, precipitately put his quarters and took to the open plain of the kitchen floor, where he was soon dispatched after the manner of the women folk, with a blow from the broom.

He is a formidable looking chap for his size, but hardly fat enough to have made a rich grave, even if it had been his fate to have boiled to death in the cauldron. Drawn butter is considered we believe, much more delicate than older sauce, although some Indian epicures prefer the latter.—Boston Transcript.

NEW-BRUNSWICK COMPANY.—A Gentleman, who has just arrived from Britain, states that the New-Brunswick Company has been most successful in their undertakings. They have obtained a Charter from Government, and a gentleman of the name of Bingley has been appointed Agent, who was to proceed to St. John, in the brig Norma, chartered by the Company. Mr. McGregor, the author of a work entitled "Sketches of British North America," has also been appointed Secretary to the Company.—Miramichi Gazette.

Newfoundland.—A Public Meeting was held at St. John's, N. E. on the 4th inst. and a string of resolutions adopted, preparatory to the transmission of a further Petition to Parliament, for the grant of a local Legislature to the Island. Similar movements are making at the outposts. In the Petition from Carleton, it is stated, that the population of that place is 2,500—their exports of fish, oil, &c. amounts to £100,000 sterling. They own 92 registered vessels, measuring 6,487 tons, engaged in the Seal and Cod fisheries; the town has doubled in wealth and population during 20 years—and yet the people have no power to make a single municipal regulation for the protection of their fisheries and trade, or for the preservation of their property from fire! One of the speakers, at this meeting, in referring to the rapid advancement of this Province under a Legislative system, observed, that "Nova Scotia was yearly sending to Newfoundland, men whose ambition it was to legislate for the Island." His Excellency Sir Thomas Cochrane sailed for England, on the 5th inst. in the Forte.—Newscotian.

BERMUDA, Sept. 27.—Arr. on Wednesday H. M. S. Falcon, from Jamaica and St. Jago de Cuba. She brings intelligence of the Yellow Fever having made its appearance on board H. M. Sloop Sparrowhawk, which carried off Mr. Matthew George Sparrowhawk, M. P. Huddleston, master's assistant, and five or six seamen; not an officer or man on board escaped more or less from its virulence. The Sparrowhawk, after recruiting the healths of her crew, sailed from Port Royal for Barbados with Government specie to the amount of £50,000.

A special session of the Colonial Parliament was held on Thursday last; convened in consequence of a Memorial from the Inhabitants to his Excellency Sir Hilgrove Turner, to consider the best means to aid

our suffering fellow colonists of Barbados. The sum of One Thousand Pounds has been given for this humane purpose; an act which reflects great credit on the charitable disposition of our Legislature, in the present state of the finances of our little colony.—The Governor of Martinique, with a feeling highly creditable, dispatched a corvette to Barbados with the object of assistance.—At Grenada, the Legislature had voted £1000, and the private subscriptions on the 29th Aug. amounted to £746.—At Trinidad, the Council had given £1000, and the Citizens £1000 also, and private subscriptions on the 27th Aug. amounted to £1819 at the head of this list stands the name of Lady Smith for £100. With the money raised at Trinidad two vessels had been despatched with supplies to the scene of devastation and misery.—We feel confident that the other Islands in the West Indies, which have escaped a participation in this overwhelming calamity, will be prompt and liberal in their help.—Bermuda, Royal Gazette.

OCTOBER 11.—Barbados.—Previous to the 3d Sept. six vessels had arrived at this island, laden with provisions for the relief of the suffering inhabitants. Brig Beaver, from Trinidad, with flour, bread, rice, meal and peas; brigantines Eight Sons, Berlicce, plantains, flour, beef, &c.; Mary-Aon, Berlicce, 3576 bunches plantains; sch' Agnes, Trinidad, provisions; sch' John, Demerara, plantains and sloop Antelope, Dominica, coffee and yams. It is proposed by the Editor of the St. Vincent Gazette, that the money raised at Trinidad for the relief of the sufferers by the hurricane at Barbados and St. Vincent, should be respectfully declined in favour of the distressed in Barbados.—Ib.

BERMUDA, Oct. 4.—The Rev. Mr. Gibbons, A. M. of St. John's College, Cambridge, has been appointed President of the Devonshire College, and may be expected here in a fortnight.

The usual grant of £4,000 for the Civil Establishment of these Islands, has been made by the Imperial Parliament; as well as the sum of £105,000 for the Convict Establishments at home and in the Bermudas.

Extract of a letter dated Trinidad, September 11.—Vessels are daily leaving us, disappointed in procuring either molasses or freights at any rates. Sugars are nearly all shipped, and the few remaining on hand have been disposed of, at an advance of 1 1/2 cts. per lb. on brown and 1 ct. on white. The Governor of Guadeloupe has decreed that "three thousand barrels of Indian corn meal from America, may be received into the Colony; the rest shall be divided as follows:—500 to Point-a-Petres, 700 to Basses, 700 to Marie Galante, 500 to Mocha, 500 to St. Martin. This flour shall be subject to a duty of two francs a barrel; a similar duty by the hectolitre being laid on all foreign Indian corn, unground."—Am. prep.

the "free trade" convention are in session in Philadelphia,
to devise ways and means to prostrate our industry,
England is actually draining us of the precious metals
to pay for what! ENGLISH LABOR!—Nothing is
further from our wishes than to turn croakers, but we
venture to predict that the result of our new im-
portations will be much felt among our trading brethren,
who, if we mistake not, will ere long find a scarcity
of money, from the cartloads from the discounts
at the banks, which must necessarily follow the ship-
ments of specie that are taking place.—If we now im-
port more than we can pay for with the "free trade"
advocates tell us what we shall do should their coun-
sels prevail—our manufactures be suspended, our mecha-
nics thrown out of employ, and the country be drained
of specie to pay our rivals for what we are now to do
most advantage producing from our own industry?—

LONDON IN THE SEVENTEENTH CENTURY.—
London was quite unlike the great metropolis which
we now inhabit. Its extent was confined to what
is now termed "the city," then surrounded by a wall,
built, as it is supposed, about the age of Constantine,
and of which a few fragments are existing. All
around was open country. Towards the north-east a
deep marsh—the name is yet preserved in Moorfields—
extended to the foot of the Roman ramparts. On
the western side of the city, and at the distance of
nearly two miles, the branches of a small river which
fell into the Thames, formed an Island, so overgrown
with thickets and brushwood, that the Saxons called it
"Thorney," or the "Isle of Thorns." The river
surrounding Thorney crept sullenly along the plashy
soil; and the spot was so wild and desolate, that it is
described as a fearful and terrible place, which no one
could approach after nightfall without great danger.
In this Island there had been an ancient Roman tem-
ple, consecrated to Apollo. And Schert, perhaps, on
account of the situation, which Thorney afforded, re-
solved to build a church on the site, and he dedicated
the Fabric to St. Peter the Apostle. This church is
now Westminster Abbey; the busy city of West-
minster is old Thorney Island, that seat of desolation,
and the bones of Sæbert yet rest in the structure
which he founded. Another great church was built
by Sæbert, in the city of London, upon the ruins of
the heathen temple of Diana. This church is now
St. Paul's Cathedral; and Mellitus being appointed
the first Bishop by Ethelbert and Sæbert, he success-
fully has continued to the present day.
