LONDON HOTEL RATES TO SOAR

Bookings Months Ahead for Coronation of King GREAT CITY CROWDED

Question of Hotel Men is 'Not How to Fill Up, But Whom Shall We Take In'—No Bubonic Plague in English Capital

(Canadian Press) London, Feb. 20.—With the hotels already booked months ahead, the stir of preparation for the coronation on June 22 has already begun to make itself felt.

As one of the best known hotel managers points out the principal events of the coming season—namely, the coronation and the international horse show will take place in the same week, when London will be crowded to the utmost extent.

It is not a question of how to fill the hotels but whom shall we take in, he said. Rates will be considerably higher than in an ordinary year, but figures are not obtainable at the moment, owing to the 'wait-and-see' policy universally adopted.

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PARIS RIOT CAUSED BY HAREM SKIRT

Models Wearing New Costume Are Mobbed by Crowd—Trousers Skirt Will Never be Popular in Decaration

Paris, Feb. 20.—The trousers skirt has made its appearance in Paris and, after being exhibited at the opening of the racing season, caused a riot in the Place de l'Opera, two undulating girls who were wearing the new costumes being roughly treated, jeered at, and mobbed to such an extent that police had to rescue them.

At the race track two "versions" of the skirt, named by two Parisian firms, which are deadly rivals, represented a "pantaloen skirt," pure and simple, consisting of baggy trousers with a panel cloth between them, and a variation in which the trousers were draped by an over skirt.

The "pantaloen skirt," carried out in blue satin, was worn by a pretty girl, who sauntered the entire length of the paddock, her hands behind her, holding back a long blue cloth wrap so as to show the baggy blue satin trousers fastened at the ankles.

The crowd in the paddock was agog with excitement when this apparition came into view, but the comments were universally unfavorable. The women declared the costume "frivolous" or "horrible," while the men said it was "droit" all agreed that it was highly unbecoming.

RECIPROcity
Shows Canada's Good Bargain—Knox Denounces Annexation Talk as Silly

Ottawa, Feb. 19.—That Canada has secured a good bargain in the reciprocity agreement with the United States and that it will stimulate rather than check the investment of British capital in this country, is the opinion of A. M. Grenfell, secretary of the Canadian agency of one of the leading Canadian bond issues houses in London, which reached here today.

In a cable message which reached here today, Mr. Grenfell is quoted as giving the following interview to a representative of the press:

"The future prosperity of Canada must be largely based on the soundness of its agricultural industry and the enhanced value of western farm lands that will result from reciprocity will mean greater security to English investors. The free and larger markets which reciprocity will open for the farmers of the west will cause greater demands for the products of the factories of the east."

"Canadian statesmen have taken advantage of the situation. It appears to me that they have secured splendid terms for Canada in exchange for giving Americans what Americans could have taken for themselves at any time by simply lowering their tariff wall without asking permission from Canada."

LAUNCHING OF ANOTHER GOULD TO WED SOON

THE THUNDERER
New Battleship for Britain Bears Name Famous in Empire's Naval Warfare—She is Fifth

The Thunderer, the first vessel of the dreadnought type to be built in the Thames, has just found a place in the largest battleship fleet.

The main dimensions of the Thunderer are: Overall length 284 feet, beam 32 feet 6 inches, draught 27 feet 6 inches and displacement when completed, 22,680 tons. Her main armament will consist of five pairs of 15.5 inch guns of 45 caliber, which will all be placed on the center line of the vessel. The two forward turrets firing right ahead, and the aftermost right astern. In each case the second turret is being placed in such a manner as to fire over the top of the turret in front of it. The fifth turret will be placed amidships, between the two forward turrets.

The secondary armament will consist of 24 4-inch guns, and three torpedo tubes of the 18-inch type will also be fitted. The shaft horsepower of the turbine engines will be 27,000 giving a speed of 27 knots on trial.

The Thunderer will be introduced to society nearly three years ago and soon afterward went to Paris with her mother and her stepfather, Hubert Vos, where they spent a year. It was while in Paris that she met Mr. Gould and the mutual attachment began there.

No definite plans have been made for the wedding beyond selecting the date and the place. Mr. Gould and his bride will go to Europe soon after their marriage, and will, while in London, visit Lord and Lady Desborough.

PYTHIANS AT DIVINE SERVICE IN CENTENARY CHURCH ON SUNDAY

Standing room was at a premium in Centenary church yesterday afternoon when the Knights of Pythias observed the 40th anniversary of their order by attending Divine worship. The members of the order completely filled the lower portion of the church, and many were compelled to stand during the entire service. Rev. Geo. Bamberg, Kenneth Bonnell and Edwin Bonnell sang Saviour of the World, Gaud, while F. McKean gave a solo, The Heavenly Promise, Hayley.

The service throughout was very impressive. Rev. Mr. Marr based his discourse on the words: Ye Are My Friends if Ye Do What I Have Commanded You. The preacher first pointed out the gradations of the relationship that existed between Christ and his disciples before he called them friends. The word friend, if rightly understood, meant more than brother. David had brothers and yet Jonathan loved him more truly than any of them. The order of the Knights of Pythias had its rise in the philosophy of Pythagoras, who lived many centuries before the birth of Christ. Both Damon and Pythias were disciples of that philosopher who taught that the highest duty of man was to speak the truth and confer benefits on another.

McAvity, point, Tully, center, Parker and Money on the wings. The talk of a new hockey rink or arena is again revived with the proposition for a professional team for St. John next year. It has been felt by those behind the hockey venture that a new rink would be a large scheme to tackle in the opening professional season but they say that under present conditions there is not sufficient space for a paying crowd. Now the suggestion is made that the roof of the Queen's rink be raised and a gallery put in. This, it is figured, would make room for at least another thousand people and would allow dressing rooms, etc. on stairs. The complaint of lossness of the present rink, for hockey purposes, would also be removed.

THIEVES IN CHINESE LAUNDRY

Sunday Evening Break is Made in Paradise Row
THEY STEAL \$28

Entrance Forced Between Six and Nine O'Clock, and Till is Torn From its Place—Makes Talk About Leniency Shown Criminals

At an hour last evening when there were many people passing in the streets and when there was every danger of being seen or heard, a bold robbery was committed in Paradise row, when the Chinese laundry conducted by Sing Lee was broken into and about \$28, representing the earnings of the proprietor for the week, taken from the till. This is looked upon by many as another instance of the fact that there is a great deal to be learned from these criminals by the courts in dealing with cases of this kind, as it is but one of a chain of robberies which have been reported in the city during the past few weeks. The Chinese had gone out a little after 6 o'clock and when they returned about 9 they found that the store had been entered by the rear door, the cash drawer in the front part of the shop torn from its place beneath the counter, and its contents taken. The thief or thieves managed to get into the place by breaking a pane of glass in the back door slipping in an arm, and after hitting a latch on the inside, the rest was easy. Although there were many packages of linen and clothing of different sorts belonging to citizens, in the store, these were not touched.

NOW WANT STREET CARS TO RUN ON THE MARSH ROAD

Petition Received by County Officials—Decision on Company's Request Not Yet Reached

A meeting of the highway board of the parish of Simouds, the warden of the county and the county secretary, was held last week to consider the application of the St. John Railway Company for permission to extend their rails from Kane's corner to the center and out the Bed Head road. While the matter was gone into at some length no decision was reached and another meeting will probably be held this week to further consider the project.

Some of the members of the highway board thought the railway ought to extend their tracks out the Marsh road and a petition from the residents of that district was presented asking that this be remembered, the railway asked permission to run a line out the Marsh road but there was strong opposition at that time from the horsemen who claimed that the road should be kept as a speedway, and in consequence the matter was allowed to drop.

NORTH END WHARF DISPUTE IN COURT

Third Arbitrator to be Appointed by Judge McLeod—Chancery Tomorrow

Return of the summons in the matter of the appointing of a third arbitrator in the matter of the disputed wharf property claimed by D. J. Purdy and Capt. J. E. Porter, came before Mr. Justice McLeod, W. A. Ewing, K. C., acting for Mr. Purdy, applied for a summons calling upon Mr. Porter to show cause why his honor should not appoint a third arbitrator. His honor granted the application and the appointment will probably be made next Thursday.

The February sitting of the supreme court in chancery will open tomorrow morning in the chancery court room, Mr. Justice McLeod presiding. Outside of the common motions which may be entered there are only two cases on the docket, viz: Attorney-general vs. the St. John Lumber Company. Lodge vs. Calhoun. In this case M. G. Teed, K. C. appears for the plaintiff and F. R. Taylor for the defendant.

L. G. CROSBY WINS CASE IN NOVA SCOTIA

The full bench of the supreme court of Nova Scotia decided an interesting case on Saturday. This was an appeal brought by the Yarmouth street Railway and Yarmouth Electric Co. from the judgment of Judge Lawrence, granting an injunction, and awarding \$300 damages against those companies. The action was brought by L. G. Crosby who owns a mill further up the Yarmouth river than the Yarmouth company's dam. He alleged that the dam forced the level of the water up at his property, so that it interfered with the mill. The court refused the damages to \$150, but continued the injunction.

DEBATE YESTERDAY

The debate yesterday afternoon in St. Peter's Y. M. A. rooms, Douglas avenue, as to whether or not St. John should have a commission form of government was won by the party opposing this plan. The party was led by Frank Burley, who was assisted by John Rooney and F. Colter, while Philip J. McIlwain led the affirmative, with John Howard and F. McIlwain as colleagues. J. F. Owens was judge. Mr. Owens on Sunday next will lecture before the members of the "Canadian Celebrities."

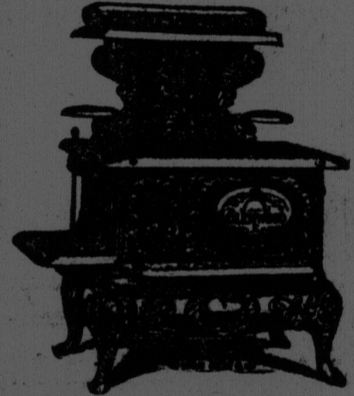

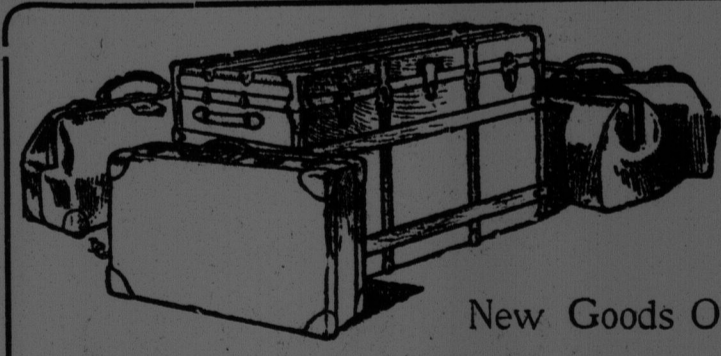
