

STATEMENT BY THE SESSION.

4

The Session feel constrained to bless the Lord for His manifold mercies bestowed upon our congregation and the abundance of His goodness, both in temporal and spiritual things, granted to us in the year 1883. Notwithstanding the great difficulties which attend any honest attempt to form a correct estimate of spiritual results, they are convinced that God has blessed our efforts for His glory in the conversion of some and the comfort and edification of many.

The diets of public worship, especially at the morning service, have been largely attended during the year. The weekly Prayer Meeting—taken as the pulse of the Church's life—has indicated increased interest in spiritual vitality and power. The Sunday School and Bible Classes have not been without manifestations of the Master's presence and blessing. The Woman's Foreign Mission Society, although not as well patronized as the great end it has in view deserves, has done good work. The Young Men's Sabbath Morning Fellowship Meeting has, amid some discouragements, kept the even tenor of its way; while our noble and devoted band of lady collectors have, amid much self-sacrifice, gone bravely on in their important work.

The Session note, with great satisfaction, that the commendable and successful effort made by the Board of Managers to liquidate the too-long standing debt on the Church property has in no way restricted the outflow of our people's liberality towards the great schemes of the Church. There is, notwithstanding, a small advance beyond last year's contributions thereto. From this state of matters we are furnished with another proof (if more were needed), that special efforts for a worthy cause in no way injure the ordinary liberality. The natural result of Christian liberality is increased desire to give more and increased means wherewith to do it.

While there is cause for rejoicing and congratulation, there is also some cause for regret and affectionate warning. Among these, the Session regret to observe indications of a tendency, in some instances, to attend public worship but once, on the Lord's Day-a symptom, in the majority of cases, wherever it obtains, of spiritual decline. The neglect of so many parents to bring their younger sons and daughters to the sanctuary is another cause of regret which is hereby affectionately commended to the serious consideration of our Christian households. One more subject of regret must be noticed-the conspicuous absence of so many names of householders and heads of families, as well as of young men and women, earning their own living, from the printed list in the annual report of contributors to the great schemes of the Church. To remove this source of painful regret the Session commend to the favorable consideration of every member and adherent, old and young, of St. Andrew's the following schemes :---

1. Home Mission.—This field is now large and is enlarging every year. It calls for increased contributions.

2. The Augmentation Fund.—To aid weak congregations who are liberally struggling to help themselves so as to secure a minimum stipend of \$750 and manse to their pastors.

3. Foreign Missions.—The field is the world. The world is open to the gospel. More missionaries are volunteering for work among the heathen than the Committee have means to send.

4. French Evangelization.—A great work; has borne already much fruit and promises much more.

5. Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund.—Deserving of aid by every member of our congregation.

6. Widows' and Orphans' Fund.—Their natural protectors called away. This is a touching inheritance Christ has left to His people.

7. Colleges.—Until the endowments proposed are accomplished these will require and 'receive generous support from all who, sensible of the peculiar wants of the age, appreciate a thoroughly educated ministry.

These schemes require for the year 1884 at least \$150,000. Let every person in connection with St. Andrew's do the best he or she can to make these great schemes prosperous.

1st. In presenting the Annual Report for 1883, the Board of Managers desire to express their gratitude to the Giver of all good for the continued blessings enjoyed by our congregation during the year, for the improved health of Mr. and Mrs. Murray, and for the prosperity which has been granted to the department of Church work, under the care of the Board.

2nd. During the past year God, in His all-wise Providence, has removed suddenly from among us kind, influential, and old-tried friends, and liberal supporters of our congregation in the persons of Messrs. Alexander Purdom, George M. Gunn and Warren Rock, reminding us all of "the uncertainty of human life," and that "we know not what a day or an hour may bring forth." The mourning widows and families of the deceased have the deepest sympathies of the Board and congregation in their bereavement.

3rd. In June last the Annual Meeting of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada was held in our church for the first time, and many of the Commissioners in attendance expressed their gratitude for the excellent accommodation and comfort they enjoyed while discharging their duties in St. Andrew's Church. They were delighted with the appearance of the church and grounds, and with the attention and kindness they had received from the citizens of London during their stay among us, and passed a vote to the same effect before the close of the Assembly.

4th. At the last Annual Meeting a resolution was passed recommending the Board to adopt some scheme for the liquidation of the Church Debt. After full consideration the Board decided to raise the required amount by subscription, to be paid in two years, by quarterly instalments. The Board have now much pleasure in reporting to the congregation that the large debt, which for some years has been felt as a heavy burden on the congregation, is now in a fair way to be paid off. The amount subscribed already amounts to \$8010.00, and \$2797.50 has been paid to the Treasurer on account. Consequently, one-fourth of the Church Debt, as reported in last year's statement, is already paid. A large number in the congregation have not yet subscribed to this fund, and the Board desire that the congregation generally should subscribe what they are able towards the accomplishment of this object. It is not the desire of the Board to ask any who are not able to assist, but they think all who have the prosperity of the congregation at heart should cheerfully pay what they can afford, as the Lord hath prospered them; and would urge on their successors in office not to relax their efforts until the object which for so many years has been greatly desired by the congregation is obtained, and St. Andrew's Church is free from debt; and they trust that in future no heavy expenses will be incurred until the amount required to complete the same is provided for.

5th. The Board, during the year while they were endeavoring to raise sufficient funds to pay off the Church Debt, found that several special, pressing applications were made to the congregation for assistance for other objects, and though under other circumstances they would gladly have assisted these laudable schemes, they felt that they could not successfully grapple with the Church Debt and also heartily assist these objects. They therefore decided in the interests of the congregation that their special energies should be devoted to the liquidation of the Church Debt, and are gratified with the result, which, if followed up, will be successful. 6th and fo financi bursen a state the 10 names Fund, ary. sented to the will be

The Secretary-Treasurer's books have been audited and found correct, showing the congregation to be in a good financial condition. A full statement of the receipts and disbursements for the past year will be found annexed, and also a statement of the financial position of the congregation on the 10th day of January, 1884, also a statement with the names of the subscribers to the liquidation of the Church Debt Fund, and the amount paid by each to the 10th day of January. The Board hope that before next year's report is presented, in January, 1885, that many more names will be added to the subscription list, and that nearly all the Church Debt will be paid off.

7th. The Board of Managers, on behalf of the congregation, desire to thank the members of the choir for their regular attendance and valuable services.

8th. The members of the Board of Managers whose term of office now expires are—John Ferguson, J. G. McIntosh, J. W. Jones, Robert Allan, C. McCallum and J. McSween, all of whom are eligible for re-election.

REPORT OF THE BOARD & TRUSTEES

1st. The Board of Trustees for St. Andrew's Church Property deeply lament that it is their painful duty to report the death, on the 20th March, 1883, of Mr. George M. Gunn, after a short illness of four days' duration. Mr. Gunn held the position of Trustee for St. Andrew's Church Property since 1859, and was connected with our congregation ever since its organization. He was always ready with his means, his influence, and his services to assist in all matters that he considered would be likely to promote the interests of St. Andrew's congregation. Mrs. Gunn and her family have the heartfelt sympathy of the Board of Trustees and congregation of St. Andrew's Church in their bereavement.

2nd. The Board have also to report the resignation of Mr. John Ross, another Trustee, who has held the position since 1868. Mr. Ross was long connected with our congregation, and for a number of years was an active working member of the Board of Managers, zealous in promoting the welfare of the Church. The Board greatly regrets his retirement, owing to removal from the city. He is now residing in Moose Jaw, N.W.T., and therefore felt it his duty to resign, in order that some one residing among us might be appointed in his place.

3rd. As the duty of filling up vacancies on the Board of Trustees devolves on the surviving Trustees, the four remaining Trustees have unanimously appointed Mr. John Elliott and Mr. John Ferguson to fill the vacancies on the Board, caused by the lamented death of Mr. George M. Gunn and the resignation of Mr. John Ross.

SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT

FOR 1883.

MEMBERSHIP.

The school, as regards members and attendance, has not made any advance during the past year, although our meetings have been pleasant and profitable. Two of the Senior Classes, owing to the long absence of the regular Teacher in one case and the want of a suitable Teacher for the other, were almost lost to the school for long periods, but now they are again in good form. It has been gratifying to Teachers, Superintendent and Pastor to find that four, at least, of our young people—still remaining in connection with the school were enrolled as members of the Church upon a profession of their Faith.

TEACHERS.

There have been some changes during the year in the Teaching Staff, and at times help was very much required, but I am proud to report a full complement of Teachers at present.

TEACHERS' MEETINGS.

Owing to the Pastor taking up the "International" Lessons as topics for exposition at the Wednesday evening meetings, there have only been a few meetings of Teachers for necessary business.

VISITING SCHOLARS.

Its faithful performance would tend very much to secure a larger and more regular attendance of the scholars, and enlist the co-operation of parents to a much greater extent. The attention of Teachers is respectfully called to this important duty.

***QUARTERLY REVIEWS.**

In September a mass meeting of all the Presbyterian schools was held in St. Andrew's Church, and addressed by Mr. and Mrs. Morton, Missionaries from Trinidad. With that exception the other quarterly meetings for review of lesson studies were made "Union" meetings—the Pastor's Bible Class and a few members of the congregation, together with the choir of the Church, having attended with the school for general exercises, which were much enjoyed.

BIBLE CLASSES.

There is a large attendance upon the Pastor's Bible Class, which is conducted independently of the school, and a number of our senior scholars have joined this department. It would, however, be better to have the scholars properly promoted and introduced instead of being allowed to transfer themselves. Some provision should be made for conducting a Boy's Senior Bible Class. The want of a suitable room alone stands in the way.

SPECIAL MONTHLY COLLECTIONS.

These have been continued during the year, and the surplus over ordinary contributions for Missions will be applied to special objects, such as "St. Andrew's Cot" at the "Home," and India scholarships.

LIBRARY AND PAPERS.

The books were thoroughly repaired and large additions made to Libraries early in the year. New catalogues— "Senior" and "Junior"—were printed, and instead of reserving a large Library for the Senior Bible Class and Teachers, these books were made available to all the senior scholars. The Libraries now contain 572 volumes, and are largely used by all the scholars. Mr. Thomas B. Maddocks having at the new year removed to Detroit, it will be necessary to appoint another Librarian to assist Mr. Hunter. The "Canadian Band of Hope," distributed to the Infant Class scholars, has given excellent satisfaction. The "Sunday School Times," supplied to the Teachers, is much appreciated. organ as a 8 offi

BAND OF HOPE.

This Society, in connection with the school, was reorganized last September, under the direction of Mr. Maddocks, as a Military Corps. The army is fully officered, and musters 8 officers and 100 members.

COLLECTIONS.

The ordinary collections in the school for Missions have been \$136.9 - \$10.39 more than last year. In addition to this there were \$26.26 taken up at the mass meeting in September, and paid over to Mr. Morton for Trinidad Mission, and also \$5 from a special collection for the Boys' Home.
