

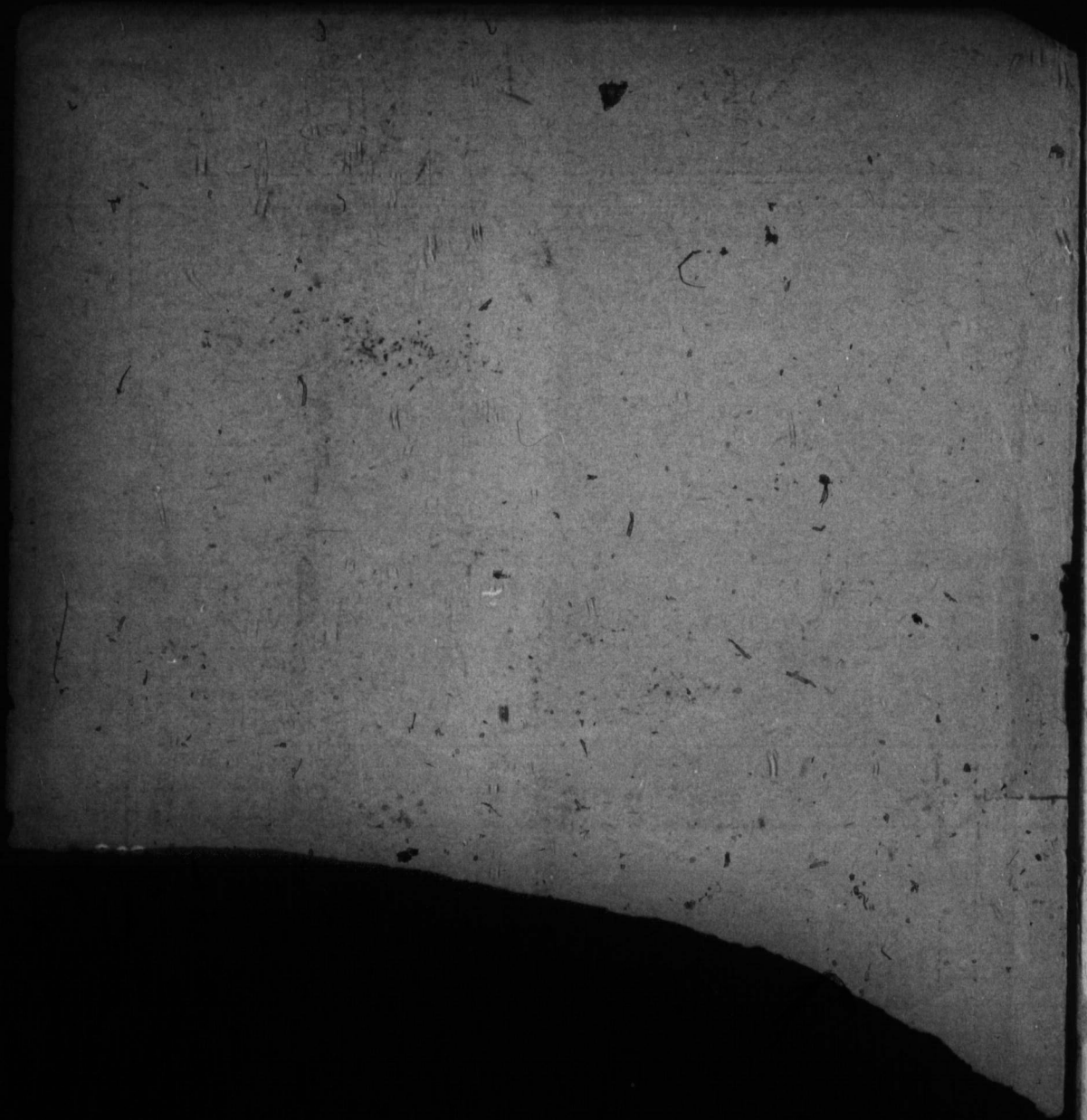

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ALBERT UNIVERSITY.

The City of Belleville is one of the most important and enterprising frontier cities between Toronto and Montreal. It is situated on the historic Bay of Quinte on the line of the Grand Trunk Railway, and is the southern terminus of the Grand Junction, and also of the Belleville and North Hastings Railway. Its advantages as a location for a seat of learning had long been noticed before any steps were taken to found one in its vicinity. Accordingly when the prosperity of Canada began to make the multiplication of facilities for higher education a necessity, the pleasant situation of Belleville and its prominence in the local history of the Bay of Quinte pointed it out as a proper site for a College. When, in 1854, the General Conference of the M. E. Church adopted a scheme, initiated at the Bay of Quinte Annual Conference in the preceding year, for the erection and maintenance of an Educational Institution, it was resolved to establish it at Belleville, and open it to all, without test or restriction. Having been incorporated in May 1857, (20 Vic. Cap. 184) it was opened in July of the same year under very favorable auspices and with a respectable staff of instructors. For seven years it continued to work without any change in its constitution, receiving meanwhile many

gratifying tokens of public appreciation. It was then felt necessary to affiliate it to a University, in order that its progress might keep pace with the growing interests of the Province. After a brief existence as an affiliated College, an act of Parliament was obtained (29 & 30 Vic. Cap. CXXXVI) by which the name of the Institution was changed to ALBERT COLLEGE, and limited University Powers thereto attached. By this act a Senate was created with power to make statutes for properly conferring Degrees in Arts. The first session of the Senate began on the first day of April, 1867, the Rev. Philander Smith, D. D., presiding, and was continued by adjournments until the fourth of July, when the first Curriculum was established. Under this statute (Cap. i in the Statute Book, now repealed) the Senate continued to grant Degrees and Honors until 1871, when it was made a body corporate, with the full powers and privileges of a University. Subsequently the present Course in Arts was established, and provision has also been made, so far as was deemed expedient, for the other Faculties. The Senate meets twice a year, viz : on the second Wednesday in May and September, and the duration of the session is limited by a statute of the University to thirteen weeks. The statutes of the Senate regulate the Examinations for Degrees, Scholarships, Prizes and Honors, the fees for Degrees and Examinations, the application of such fees, the regular and special meetings of the Senate, the appointment and removal of Examiners, the Subjects of Examination, and all matters for the interest and welfare of the University, not under the jurisdiction of the Board of Management.

Government.

The first section of the Act 20 Vic. Cap. CLXXXIV provides that "the undermentioned persons, viz. : Samuel Gilbert, Caleb Gilbert, Robert Bird, and Elias Vandewater, of Sidney, in the County of Hastings ; John Cummer, Waterdown, and John Rymal, of Ancaster, in the County of Wentworth ; Nathan Jacobs, of London, in the County of Middlesex ; Philip Carman, of Matilda County of Dundas ; John Campbell, of Brooklyn, County of Ontario ; Samuel Osborne, of Sophiasburg, County of Prince Edward ; and Peter Fisher, of Nelson, County of Halton, being the present Board of Trustees, and their associates and successors to be appointed as herein before provided, shall be and they are hereby constituted, and declared to be a body politic and corporate, by the name of 'Belleville Seminary,' and by that name shall have perpetual succession and a common seal." The same section enumerates the customary provisions for pleading and being impleaded in any court, for the tenure and transfer of real estate, for the investment of money and for the other corporate transactions. By the second section of the Act, power is given to the General Conference of the M. E. Church to set aside any individual member of the Board of Trustees and to fill any vacancy that may occur in the said Board, but by the same section clergymen are declared incapable of holding the office of Trustee. By the third section of the Act the Annual Conferences of the Church

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CARMAN

are empowered "to nominate and appoint suitable persons, "to the number of six, each Annual Conference to appoint "an equal number, so as to make in the whole the number "of six, who, in conjunction with a Bishop or General "Superintendent of the said Church, shall be associated "with the aforesaid Trustees or their successors, and with "them form a Joint Board to be called the Board of Man- "agement." The functions of the Board of Management are in the same section enumerated. They relate to the appointment, salaries and removal of professors, teachers and officers of the Institution, to the lecture fees, to the finances of the College generally, to the duration of terms, and to the manner in which the Institution shall be governed. The Act 29 and 30 Vic. Cap. CXXXVI makes no further modification of these provisions than to change the words "Belleville Seminary" to "ALBERT COLLEGE." The Board of Management meets annually in June, but special meetings may be held at any time by order of the Chairman of the Board on the requisition of two of the members.

Residence

Every Student, whether matriculated or not, must reside in Albert College, unless the desire of his parent or guardian to the contrary be communicated in writing to the President and approved by the Council. Students out of Residence are not permitted to have rooms in places not approved of by the Council.

Undergraduates are required to appear at lectures, prayers and meals in full academic costume.

The charge for board, including room rent and fuel is \$2.25 per week, payable in advance. Rooms are not rented for less than a half term. Every room is furnished with stove, table, stand, bureau, mirror, chairs, bedstead and mattresses. All other necessary articles students provide for themselves.

Students are not permitted to change rooms without the permission of the President. Tenants of rooms are responsible for damages and defacing done therein during their occupancy of them. For damages done upon public rooms and furniture, students are liable to assessment.

All students, including those not in Residence, are required to attend College Prayers, unless released from attendance at the desire of their parents or guardians, or exempted by the permission of the President, or relieved from strict attention for proper causes, by an order in Council. Every student must attend twice on Sunday, such church as his parents or guardians may prefer, subject to like exemption as College prayers.

Lectures.

Any student having entered his name for a Course of Lectures is not allowed to absent himself from any Lecture of the Course, except by permission of the Lecturer.

All fees are payable in advance, but when a student attends more than a half term, a charge for the time of attendance only may be made, in case of withdrawal on account of illness.

Sons of Ministers and certified Probationers for the Ministry in any denomination in Canada, are allowed a reduction of one-half the lecture fees in Arts and Theology, if in Residence or living at home.

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Examinations.

All Candidates for Examination are examined by means of written or printed questions, the answers to which must be prepared in presence of one of the Examiners. Any student who brings into the Examination Hall any notes or other assistance, or who, during the hour of Examination, gives or receives any hint or information touching anything upon the question paper, or who exposes his answers so as to be seen and read by any other Candidate, thereby annuls all Examinations that he may have passed during the then current Year, and excludes himself from any other Examinations of the Year. Examinations begin on the sixth Wednesday of Trinity Term. At these Examinations all Candidates may present themselves on giving three weeks notice in writing to the Registrar of the Senate, of the Faculty and Year in which they desire to be examined. All Undergraduates before taking their places in the Examination Hall, must deliver to the Registrar a certificate from each of the Professors whose lectures they may be required to attend, showing that they have received credit for attendance on seven-eighths of the Lectures delivered on the subjects in which they propose to be examined.

No Candidate will be admitted to any Examination who has been rejected by any legally constituted Examining body of this Dominion, within the three months next preceding the date of the commencement of such Examination; and any candidate not personally known to the Registrar will be required to sign a declaration to that effect.

All applications for Examination must be made according to a printed form, which may be had of the Registrar.

The preceding restrictions as to the attendance at

Lectures do not apply to cases in which the Senate has seen fit, for good and sufficient reasons, to grant a Dispensation to be absent from Lectures.

The Supplemental Examinations begin on the first Friday of Michaelmas Term. At these Examinations, any student who has failed to attend or pass the Annual Examination, or any part thereof, is required to present himself for Examination in the subjects in which he may have failed.

At least four week's notice must be given of the subjects in which the Supplemental Examination is sought, accompanied by a fine specified hereafter in the Table of Fees payable to the Senate.

All the Candidates whose names are returned by the Board of Examiners in the list of "Passed Candidates" are required to appear before the Senate and subscribe the Roll. They are duly admitted by the Chancellor of the University to the rank and privileges of Undergraduates, either at the Annual Convocation or on such other day as the Senate may direct.

COURSE FOR DEGREE.

Students in the first and second years of their Undergraduate Course are denominated Junior and Senior Freshmen; in the third and fourth years Junior and Senior Sophisters.

In order to obtain credit for any Term or Year, it is necessary for each student to attend seven-eighths of the Total number of Lectures delivered in each Department of the following Course during the Year, and to pass the Annual Examinations of his class, as specified in the section of the Calendar relating to Examinations. But in case any student should, by illness, or any other unavoidable cause, be prevented from presenting himself, or should fail to obtain credit for the requisite percentage of marks in any Department at the regular examination of his class, he is allowed to present himself at a Supplemental

Examination in the same subjects, at the commencement of the ensuing Term. A failure, however, to keep any Examination in the regular order is regarded as a Collegiate offence and punished by a fine. In order to rise from any class to the next above it, it is necessary for each student to have kept the Terms and passed all the Examinations of the lower class.

The Undergraduate Course at each Examination is divided into two parts; the one to be read by all students, the other by those who aspire to the higher Honors of their class.

The Lecturer may, however, excuse the attendance of any student from any Lecture for good and sufficient reasons ; but in no case can permission be granted to a student for absence from more than one-eighth of the total number of Lectures delivered, except by an express dispensation from the Senate, or in consequence of severe illness.

Any Undergraduate may elect to take either French and German, or Oriental Languages and Biblical Literature.

Any undergraduate who elects to take Oriental Lan-

guages and Biblical Literature in his Sophister years, will not be required to take any of the pass subjects in Classics prescribed for those years, except the translation from English into Latin Prose, and any Candidate for the Degree of B. A., who is not a Candidate for Honors in any Department, may take at his option either the Greek Texts prescribed for the Department of Classics, or the Greek Texts of the New Testament as prescribed for the Department of Oriental Languages and Biblical Literature.

Lectures are delivered on all the subjects specified in the several Departments for the Honor Course. These Lectures are open to all students without extra charge, and at-

attendance on them is not compulsory on any student who may be proceeding to his Degree by attending the Lectures and passing the Examinations in all the Departments prescribed in the Ordinary Course. But in case any student should select any Department of the Honor Course, his attendance at the Honor Lectures is regulated by the same rules and restrictions as those prescribed for attendance at the Ordinary Lectures.

Candidates for Honors in Mathematics, Classics, or Natural Science in the Senior Freshman Year may omit the French, and History of the Ordinary Course for the Year. Honor men in Modern Languages may omit Greek and Greek Prose. In the Department of Philosophy, they may omit Statics, Hydrostatics, and French; in Oriental Languages and Biblical Literature, they may omit Classics (except Greek Prose and Latin Prose), French, and Mathematics, (except Statics and Hydrostatics).

Candidates for Honors in Philosophy, or Oriental Languages and Biblical Literature must take the German of the Senior Freshman Year, either at the Senior Freshman or Junior Sophister Examination.

In the Junior Sophister Year the "Fixed Subjects" are English, Civil Polity, History, Ethnology, and Geology. A Candidate for Honors in any Department will be required to take the "Fixed Subjects" in addition to the Pass and Honor Work of such Department.

Candidates for Honors in any Department in the Senior Sophister Year are required to take only two other Departments; and a Candidate for Honors in a Department, who has obtained Honors in the same Department in the Senior Freshman Class, and who has, subsequently to such Senior Freshman Examination, kept all of the terms of his Junior Sophister Year by Lectures and Examination according to

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statute, and has thereafter, kept all the terms of his Senior Sophister Year by Lectures according to statute, and who, during the two years succeeding his Senior Freshman Examination, has not incurred the censure of the College Council, is not required to take any other Department in addition to that in which he is a Candidate for Honors if he has obtained First Class at the Previous Examination, or is required to take only one other Department in addition if he has obtained Second Class at the Previous Examination.

There are no supplemental Honor Examinations.

Students and Graduates in the other Faculties may enter the Faculty of Arts at such stage as may be proportionate to their acquirements, but no advanced entrance into the Faculty of Arts is permitted by which anything may be abated from the prescribed requirements except in the single case hereafter specified. The terms upon which a change of Faculty may be had can be obtained from the Registrar.

Students who have completed the twenty-fifth year of their age may enter at the Senior Freshman Examination by taking, in addition to the subjects prescribed for that Examination, the Mathematics of the Junior Freshman Year. Students admitted under this provision must keep six full terms before presenting themselves for the Final Examination for the degree of B. A.

Any Candidate who has completed the twenty-seventh year of his age may enter at the Senior Sophister Examination by taking the following subjects, viz. : The Mathematics and Natural Science of the Junior Freshman Year ; the Statics, Hydrostatics, Classics, Logic, Evidences, History, and Botany of the Senior Freshman Year ; the Optics, Dynamics, English, Civil Polity, History, and Geology of

the Junior Sophister Year ; the English, Hamilton, Stewart, and Meteorology of the Senior Sophister Year ; and *either* the French *or* Oriental Languages and Biblical Literature of the Freshman Years, *or* the German of the Senior Freshman and Senior Sophister Years.

Faculty of Theology.

During the Tenth Session of the Senate of the University, provision was made for the systematic Instruction and Examination of Students in the Faculty of Theology. Candidates for the Divinity Testimonium are not required to be examined in any subject in which they have previously passed an Examination in any other Faculty in this University.

A Bachelor in Arts who has taken First-class Honors in Oriental Languages at the Final Examination for B.A. will not be required to pass any Examination in any of the Oriental Languages required for the Divinity Testimonium.

The Lecture Fees to be paid by students in this Faculty are the same as in the Faculty of Arts. Sons of Ministers and students preparing themselves for the Ministry pay only half-fees. Students in the Faculty of Arts pay no extra fees for attendance on Lectures in the Faculty of Theology.

The fee to be paid on taking out the Divinity Testimonium is, in all cases, six dollars.

Faculty of Law.

Candidates for the Degree of Bachelor in Laws are required to Matriculate into the Faculty and to pass Examinations in all the subjects specified in the Course.

The subjects for Matriculation are the same as for the Junior Freshman Class in Arts.

The fee for Matriculation is five dollars.

Students in the Faculty of Law are not required to be examined in any subject in which they have previously passed an Examination in any other Faculty in the University.

Barristers-at-Law and Junior Sophisters in Arts may enter this Faculty at the SECOND YEAR.

The Examinations are Annual, and are regulated by the same rules as the Annual Examinations in the Faculty of Arts.

The Fee for any Examination in the Law Course is ten dollars.

Honor Course.

Candidates desirous of obtaining Honors at the Final

Examination for the Degree of LL. B., are examined in the subjects specified in the HONOR COURSE, in addition to those prescribed for the FOURTH YEAR. Candidates who succeed in answering sixty five per cent. of the total number of questions proposed at this Examination are awarded First Class Honors in Law, and are presented with Honor Certificates at the Annual Convocation. Those who answer fifty per cent. are placed in the Second Rank.

No Additional Fee is required for the Honor Examination and Certificate.

Any Barrister at-Law of this realm of seven years' standing, or any Bachelor of Arts, of this University, who is also a Barrister at-Law, may proceed directly to the Degree of LL. B. by passing an Examination in any ten of the Subjects specified in the SPECIAL COURSE; and any Master of Arts of this University of seven years' standing may proceed to the Degree of LL. B. by passing an Examination in any fifteen of the Subjects so specified.

The Fee for Special Examination in Law is ten dollars.

Application for any Examination in the Faculty of Law must be made to the Registrar of the University not less than twenty-two days previous to the day appointed in the Calendar for the commencement of the Examinations in Law. Applications must in all cases be accompanied with the prescribed fee.

The Degrees in the Faculty of Law are conferred at the Annual Convocation of the Senate, immediately after the conferring of the Degrees in Arts.

Faculty of Music.

The regular mode of proceeding to the Degree of Mus. Bac. is to pass the Examination for Matriculation in Arts and the two Examinations hereinafter prescribed, but Candidates for Matriculation in Music may substitute for the Greek required at Matriculation in Arts an Examination in French and Italian Grammar and the translation of French and Italian into English.

The first Examination in the Faculty, called the PREVIOUS EXAMINATION, comprises merely Harmony and Counterpoint in not more than four parts: The text books are Ouseley's "Treatise on Harmony" and Ouseley's "Treatise on Counterpoint, Canon, and Fugue." Before the Candidate can be admitted to this Examination, he must file with the Registrar of the University, satisfactory evidence that he has been, for at least three years, engaged in the study and practice of Music.

The second Examination, called the FINAL EXAMINATION, comprises :—

- 1 Harmony, (Ouseley).
- 2 Counterpoint in not more than five parts, (Ouseley).
- 3 Canon, Imitation, &c., (Ouseley).
- 4 Fugue, (Ouseley).
- 5 Form in Composition, (Ouseley).
- 6 Instrumentation, (Kastner).
- 7 History of Music. (Mullah's Lectures).
- 8 A Critical knowledge of the full score of Beethoven's SEPTUOR or Handel's SAUR.

Every Candidate, before presenting himself for the Final Examination, shall deposit with the Registrar of the University satisfactory evidence of his having been engaged for at least five years in the study and practice of Music.

At least three months before presenting himself for the Final Examination, the Candidate must deposit with the Registrar of the University an Exercise composed by himself which must be, (a) a vocal composition either secular or sacred, (b) containing pure five part harmony, (c) and good fugal counterpoint, (d) with an accompaniment for piano or organ, (e) and of such length as would occupy not less than twenty minutes in performance.

A candidate for the degree of Mus. Bac. who has completed the twenty-fifth year of his age may proceed to the Degree by taking both the PREVIOUS EXAMINATION and the FINAL EXAMINATION at one Examination, together with a Paper on the outlines of the work required for Matriculation. Candidates entering the Faculty under the provisions of this regulation must deposit the Exercise required before taking the Final Examination, and satisfactory proof of having been engaged for at least ten years in the study and practice of Music.

The Examinations for the Bachelor's Degree will be conducted partly *viva voce* and partly *per scripta*.

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A Candidate for the Degree of Doctor in Music must be a Bachelor in Music, and at least three months before presenting himself for Examination for the Degree of Doctor in Music, must deposit with the Registrar an exercise of his own composition which must be : (a) a vocal composition, either secular or sacred, (b) containing real six-part or eight-part harmony, (c) with good fugal counterpoint, (d) in good style as a work of art, (e) with accompaniments for a full orchestra, (f) and in length of performance at least forty minutes. The candidate must, at the same time, satisfy the Senate that he has been engaged for at least twelve years in the study and practice of Music.

The Subjects of Examination for the Degree of Mus. Doc. shall be :—

- 1 Harmony. (The more abstruse part).
- 2 Eight part counterpoint.
- 3 Canon, Imitation, &c., in eight parts.
- 4 Fugue.
- 5 Form in Composition.
- 6 Instrumentation.
- 7 History of Music.
- 8 Acoustics as far as relates to the Theory of Harmony.
- 9 A Critical knowledge of the standard works of one of the great composers. (The name of the composer must be submitted by the candidate and approved by the Senate before the candidate presents himself for the Examination).

The Examination for the Degree of Mus. Doc. shall be exclusively *per scripta*. The fee for Matriculation is five dollars, for the Previous or for the Final Examination ten dollars, for the Degree of Mus. Bac. fifteen dollars, for the Degree of Mus. Doc. forty dollars. Expenses incurred in procuring a competent professional opinion on the merit of an Exercise must be paid by the Candidate. All exercises for Mus. Doc. must be publicly performed at the expense of the Candidate unless the Senate, by resolution, shall determine to dispense, in exceptional cases, with the public performance.

Faculty of Engineering.

The Senate of the University during its Twelfth Session provided for the Instruction and Examination of students in Engineering, and adopted a Curriculum of studies, since amended, on the successful completion of which duly qualified Candidates will be admitted to the Degree of Civil Engineer, (C. E).

Candidates are required to pass Examinations in the subjects prescribed for Matriculation, and for the First, Second, and Third years in the Faculty, as exhibited in the following Course :—

Department of Agriculture.

The County Council of the County of Hastings, in 1869, set apart a sum for the payment of a Professor of Mining and Agriculture, and in Trinity Term, 1859, the present Hastings Professor of Mining and Agriculture entered upon his duties.

During the Twelfth Session of the Senate, provision was made for the systematic instruction of students in the several branches of education relating to Agricultural Economy, and the Lectures of the several Professors in Albert College were made available for this purpose and thrown open to the students in the Department. The Course of Lectures embraces examination and analysis of soils and fertilizing agents, and the general principles of the nature and improvement of soils. in addition to the other subjects auxiliary to a suitable course in theoretical and practical Agriculture.

Diplomas in agriculture will be awarded to all duly qualified Candidates who shall have passed satisfactory Examinations in the subjects prescribed in the following Course.

The fee for the Diploma is six dollars.

The Diplomas are awarded at the Annual Convocation

and are presented immediately after the Admission of Matriculants.

Prizes

The University Senate offers annually, for competition, a number of prizes varying in value from \$5 to \$35. Several persons have manifested their interest in the Institution by making provisions for the encouragement of competition in certain subjects or Departments, and the Senate has by Statute undertaken to make provisions for such Departments or classes as may be benefitted by such stimulus. Friends of the University offering prizes for competition are requested to name the subjects and year in which they would prefer the competition to be made.

THE SILLS PRIZE, founded by John Escuit Sills, Esq., is awarded annually for the best English Prose Thesis on some subject relating to the History of Canada. This prize is permanent, and the whole of the yearly interest of the founder's donation is awarded at each Convocation.

THE SENATE PRIZES.—A certain sum, taken out of the fees payable to the Registrar, is set apart annually by the Senate during its May Session, to be expended in prizes

Medals, Bursaries and Scholarships.

There are no funded Scholarships in the gift of the College, but several donations have been placed at the disposal of the University, to be conferred on students for general proficiency, or on such as may be specially nominated by the donors,

On a special recommendation by the Board of Examin-

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ers, a Gold Medal will be given to the Undergraduate, who, at the Final Examination for the Degree of B. A. shall be placed first in the first-class in Honors in any Department prescribed for that Examination, and to the next in rank, in the first-class in Honors a Silver Medal will be given on a similar recommendation. No Gold Medal will be awarded to a Candidate for the Degree of B. A. who has not taken First Honors in the same Department at the Senior Freshman Examination, nor will a Gold Medal be awarded to a Candidate whose answers shall fall below eighty-five per cent. of the total marks allotted to the Department, or who has made less than an average of fifty per cent. in the pass work in each year of the Under-graduate Course.

THE HARRY NICHOL GOLD MEDAL is the highest prize in the gift of the University. It was established in memory of the late Harry W. E. Nichol by his brother Dr. Thomas Nichol of Montreal. It is awarded to the candidate for B.A. who, having fulfilled all the requirements for a Gold Medal in any Department, and having obtained the requisite special recommendation, shall have obtained the highest average per-centage in his answers at the Final Examination.

Honors.

Candidates for Honors in any Department who succeed in answering sixty-five per cent. of the total number of questions proposed in the Department at the Ordinary and Honor Examination are ranked as First Class Honormen, and are presented with First Class Honor Certificates at the Annual Convocation. Candidates who succeed in answering fifty per cent. are placed in the Second Class in Honors.

Degrees.

Candidates for the Degree of BACHELOR OF ARTS are required to keep all the Terms and pass all the Examinations prescribed in the Faculty of Arts, and to prepare and file with the Registrar a suitable Thesis on some subject connected with one of the Departments in the Faculty. The Thesis must be delivered in presence of the Senate at the open Annual Convocation. The fee is eight dollars.

Candidates for the Degree of MASTER OF ARTS must be Bachelors of Arts of one year's standing, and must file with the Registrar a suitable Thesis on some subject connected with one of the Departments in the Faculty of Arts. The candidate must be prepared, if called upon, to deliver this Thesis in presence of the Senate at the Annual Convocation. The fee is ten dollars.

Candidates for the Degree of BACHELOR IN LAWS must have Matriculated into the Faculty of Law, and passed the Examination in all the Subjects prescribed in the COURSE; or must be Barristers-at-Law of seven years' standing, and have passed an Examination in twelve of the subjects specified in the SPECIAL COURSE; or must be Barristers-at-Law who have taken the Degree of Bachelor of Arts in this University, and have passed an Examination in twelve of the subjects specified in the SPECIAL COURSE; or must be Masters of Arts of this University, and have passed an Examination in any Sixteen of the subjects specified in the SPECIAL COURSE. The fee is fifteen dollars.

Candidates for the Degree of DOCTOR IN LAWS must be

either Bachelors of Arts or Masters of Arts, and must file with the Registrar an approved Thesis on some subject of the Department of the Faculty of Arts, and pay ten dollars.

Candidates for the Degree of MASTER OF ARTS must have Matriculated into the Faculty of Arts, and passed the Examination in all the Subjects prescribed in the Faculty of Arts, and must file with the Registrar a suitable Thesis on some subject connected with one of the Departments in the Faculty of Arts. The Thesis must be delivered in presence of the Senate at the open Annual Convocation. The fee is ten dollars.

Candidates for the Degree of BACHELOR IN LAWS must have Matriculated into the Faculty of Law, and passed the Examination in all the Subjects prescribed in the COURSE; or must be Barristers-at-Law of seven years' standing, and have passed an Examination in twelve of the subjects specified in the SPECIAL COURSE; or must be Barristers-at-Law who have taken the Degree of Bachelor of Arts in this University, and have passed an Examination in twelve of the subjects specified in the SPECIAL COURSE; or must be Masters of Arts of this University, and have passed an Examination in any Sixteen of the subjects specified in the SPECIAL COURSE. The fee is fifteen dollars.

Candidates for the Degree of DOCTOR IN LAWS must be Barristers-at-Law of seven years' standing, and have passed an Examination in twelve of the subjects specified in the SPECIAL COURSE; or must be Masters of Arts of this University, and have passed an Examination in any Sixteen of the subjects specified in the SPECIAL COURSE. The fee is fifteen dollars.

Candidates for the Degree of DOCTOR IN LAWS must be Barristers-at-Law of seven years' standing, and have passed an Examination in twelve of the subjects specified in the SPECIAL COURSE; or must be Masters of Arts of this University, and have passed an Examination in any Sixteen of the subjects specified in the SPECIAL COURSE. The fee is fifteen dollars.

either BACHELORS IN LAW of ten years' standing, or Masters of Arts of ten years' standing, who have also taken the Degree of Bachelor in Laws, and must file with the Registrar an approved Thesis on some subject connected with one of the Departments in the Faculty of Law. The fee is forty dollars.

Candidates for the Degree of BACHELOR IN MUSIC must have Matriculated in the Faculty of Arts, and passed all the Examinations, and performed all the Exercises prescribed in the Faculty of Music, and have spent five years in the practice of Music. The fee is fifteen dollars.

Candidates for the Degree of DOCTOR IN MUSIC must be Bachelors in Music; and must at an Examination have satisfied the Examiners in Music of their skill in Instrumentation, in the Theory and Practice of Music, and in the other subjects connected with Music specified by the Statute, and must each have composed, to the approval of the Senate, and have engrossed and filed with the Registrar, and have publicly performed at such time and place as the Senate may direct, a piece of vocal music of which a portion must be in six or eight real parts with an accompaniment for a full orchestra; and must have spent twelve years in the study and practice of Music. The fee is forty dollars.

Candidates for the degree of BACHELOR IN DIVINITY must be Masters in Arts admitted to the Ministry; and must have completed a Divinity Course, and taken out or registered a Divinity Testimonium. The fee is fifteen dollars.

Candidates for the Degree of DOCTOR IN DIVINITY must be in good standing in the Ministry; must have taken the Degree of Bachelor of Divinity; must be Masters of Arts of ten years' standing; and must have filed with the Registrar an approved Thesis on some subject connected with

one of the Departments in the Faculty of Theology. The fee is forty dollars.

Candidates for the Degree of CIVIL ENGINEER are required to pass the Examinations for Matriculation, and for the First, Second and Third Years in the Faculty of Engineering as prescribed in the ENGINEERING COURSE. The fee is eight dollars.

Graduates of other Universities may be admitted *ad eundem gradum* into this University. The fee is one and a half times the amount specified for each Degree.

All applications for admission to Degrees must be made to the Registrar at least two weeks previous to the date of the Annual Convocation, and must in all cases be accompanied by the fee chargeable for the Degree.

The Degrees are conferred by the Chancellor of the University at the open Annual Convocation, at which candidates are required to present themselves furnished with the hood suitable to their Degree.

Anniversaries.

No lectures are delivered on the 15th of February, the Anniversary of the passing of the Act by which the University obtained its full powers and privileges. On that day the Undergraduates assemble in the College Chapel at 2 P. M., and after a prescribed religious service, the Acts of Incorporation are read by the senior Undergraduate present, a sermon is preached by one of the University Preachers, and a short oration upon the state of the University is then delivered by some one appointed for that purpose. In the evening the Annual Exhibition of the Historical Society is held, comprising essays, music, orations, colloquies and discussions.

On the Sunday next before Convocation, a sermon is delivered before the University by one of the University Preachers, and addressed chiefly to the Bachelors proceeding at the ensuing Commencement. The Annual public meeting of Convocation is held on the last Wednesday of Trinity Term, in which public acknowledgement is made of all Prizes, Honors, Distinctions and Degrees obtained during the year. No degree can be conferred at any other time except by a special Grace of the Senate in cases where a Candidate has been prevented by events beyond his control from appearing in Convocation.

The Museum.

The Museum has been gradually increasing in importance for the last ten years, and now comprises over 2000 Botanical specimens of North American Species contributed by Professor Macoun.

The Mineralogical Department has been augmented by contributions from the Geological Survey, and by purchases from Mr. Taggart of Montreal, and now contains 1000 specimens of economic and other minerals, arranged and mounted upon blocks of polished wood, also 200 specimens of French Rocks obtained by Mr. Taggart from the French Government.

The Geological Department has been enlarged by the purchase of a cabinet of Geological casts of the most noted fossils of the European and American Museums.

To these may be added the Canadian Archæological contributions by the Rev. Thos Webster, D. D., and others, besides many articles of interest and instruction to students.

The Murchison Society of Belleville has lately united with the College Authorities in the effort to enlarge and otherwise improve the Museum. Rooms in addition to those already in use have been set apart and are fitting up to receive contributions from members of the Murchison Society and from friends of the College. It is greatly desired that any having specimens will contribute them to the Museum and thus help to increase its value and interest.

I The Alumni Society.

The Alumni Society was organized at a mass meeting of

ex-students, held at Albert College, on the third of July 1867. As the University had then been but recently organized, many of the former students desired that the qualifications for membership should be extended so as to include as many of them as possible. Accordingly, all students who have left the College in good standing on the books, and who have since qualified as Ministers, Barristers, Physicians or Engineers, are eligible for membership. The Society meets annually on the Monday preceding Convocation, and a member delivers a lecture.

Objects and Advantages.

The College Grammar School is designed to prepare students for the Faculties of the University, as well as to meet the wants of those who desire a partial or elective course of study. For the latter purpose, students in the Grammar School are permitted to attend the lectures delivered to the Undergraduates of Albert College. The facilities thus placed within the reach of students, together with the moderate charges for board and tuition, render the Grammar School one of the cheapest and most efficient in the Dominion. An ample opportunity is thus afforded to those preparing for the Examination of the Board of Provincial Surveyors, the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, the Law Society of Ontario, and the literary and scientific portions of the various Theological Examinations, of which advantages many have availed themselves with marked success. Arrangements have been made to meet the wants of Candidates for the Examination of the Ontario College of Pharmacy, and of the Education Department.

Regulations and Government.

Students of the Grammar School are under the immediate supervision of the authorities of Albert College, and the regulations given in the Calendar in the section on RESIDENCE apply also to them as far as relates to conduct, attendance at prayers and Church, and order and occupancy of Rooms. Each student is also entered in one of the classes in Elocution and Composition, and is required to deliver an Essay

or a Declamation in public at the Exhibition held at close of Term.

Written Monthly and Terminal Examinations are held, and each student is furnished with a full report of his standing.

Memoranda of the student's conduct or progress will be furnished to parents on application to the Rector of the Grammar School.
