Such an institution as the St. Paul's Alms House of Industry, is doing a work for the community which it may be humbly believed, will prove its value the longer it pursues its way. It is one that is necessarily unobtrusive, and that probably is most effectually progressing when its records are least eventful. There can be no doubt that if its aim bé accomplished, it will have an appreciable influence upon the class it aims to benefit. That aim is the reception within its walls of girls who are either orphans or whose circumstances are such that they would grow up untrained and exposed to the worst influences of a city life. To take such to train them in industrial habits, and to seek to instil into them the knowledge and principles of the Christian Faith, must be accounted a beneficent work, worthy the support and encouragement of the Christian public. Your committee are happy to feel that this work, under the blessing of God, is being done. Miss Brymer continues to prove herself earnest and efficient in her work as the Governess of the children, having their best interest at heart, and bringing to her work a true missionary spirit. In Miss Lawson, their new matron, they have one animated by the same spirit, so that you may have confidence in feeling that the children are being watched over and trained for their future eareer, in the "nurture and admonition of the Lord."

During the past year, nine have left the Institution, having been placed out in satisfactory positions, and four have been admitted. There are at present 15 in the Home, a namber that-will be doubtless speedily increased. Your committee would gladly treble the number, if the public would provide the means. Such an institution, with such an object in view, with so careful a superyision on the part of the Ladies' Committee, who give so much of their time and devote so true interest to the supervision of the work, is worthy of every confidence and support. Your Committee trust the latter may be so increased as to enable them to fill the building with inmates.

The usual careful supervision on the part of the Ladies' Coramittee, and visitation by the Chaplain, have been observed, and your Committee are happy to be able to say that the sanitary state of the house, as well as the health of the children, is all that could be desired. The Committee invite the publicto visit the Institution, where they will be always heartily welcomed,

The sincere thanks the Committee, are offered to B. H. Collins, Esq., for his kind and generous donation of $\$ 240$, and to those kind friends, who, from time to time, have sent contributions in kind to the Institution.

Commending it to the prayers of their Christian friends, and to the support of all in the city interested in the moral and Christian training of those who would otherwise grow up uncared for and neglected, the Committee respectfully reader their report.
