Trinity University.

TRINITY University was constituted by a Royal Charter, bearing date 15th July, 1852, and was thereby endowed with all such powers of conferring degrees in the various Faculties as are enjoyed by the Universities of Great Britain.

The fundamental object of the University is to supply to the people of the Province an academic education of the highest kind, in which secular instruction should not be dissociated from religious teaching. The University is under the control of the Church of England, but open to all who desire to avail themselves of its advantages.

GOVERNMENT OF THE UNIVERSITY.

By the Provisions of the Royal Charter, the government of the University is vested in the Corporation, which body, by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Canada (15 Vic. ch. 32), is composed of: 1. The Bishops of the five dioceses into which the original Diocese of Toronto has been divided; 2. The Trustees (three in number); 3. The Council.

The Council is made up of the following classes of members:

EX-OFFICIO MEMBERS.

The Chancellor and Ex-Chancellors of the University, the Provost and Professors in Arts and Divinity in Trinity College.

MEMBERS NOMINATED

By the Bishops of Toronto, Huron, Ontario, and Niagara, four members each, representing their respective dioceses.

By each Medical, Musical, or Theological College affiliated to the University, one member.

MEMBERS ELECTED.

By the Graduates in Arts and Divinity who are members of Convocation (see below), eight members, to hold office for four years, two retiring annually.

By the Graduates in Law who are members of Convocation, two members, to hold office for two years, one retiring annually.

By the Graduates in Medicine who are members of Convocation, two members, to hold office for two years, one retiring annually.

By the Associate Members of Convocation (see below), two members, to hold office for two years, one retiring annually.

By the whole Corporation, seven members, elected for life.

PRIVILEGES OF CONVOCATION.

By the provisions of the Royal Charter, and in accordance with the practice of the English Universities, the Convocation of the University consists of (in addition to the Chancellor, the Provost, and Professors of Trinity College), all Graduates in Divinity, Law, or Medicine, and all Graduates in Arts of the standing of M.A., who from the time of their admission to these degrees have paid annually the sum of five dollars towards the funds of the University.

All degrees must be passed by Convocation before they can be granted by the University, and the Supplicats for each degree must have been previously approved by a Committee of Convocation called the Caput.

Convocation has also been placed by the Corporation in the position of a Standing Committee of that body, so that its members are in this way enabled, through their representatives, to formally lay their resolutions before the governing body of the University. Convocation is represented by fourteen members on the Corporation. (See above.)

An annual meeting for the transaction of business is held every year in the October Term. The annual meetings for granting degrees are held: for Degrees in Medicine, in April; and in the other Faculties of Arts, Divinity, Law, and Music, in June.

ASSOCIATE MEMBERS OF CONVOCATION.

Graduates not qualified as above to become members of Convocation, and other friends of the University, may become Associate Members of Convocation by the same annual payment of five dollars. All candidates for associate membership must be approved by the Executive Committee of Convocation.

Associates have the right of speaking, but not of voting, at meetings of Convocation. They also elect annually a member of the Corporation. (See above.)

Local Associations of Convocation have been formed in the chief centres of Ontario. Members and Associates have equal privileges in the government of the Local Associations. Each Local Association elects one member to represent it upon the Executive Committee of Convocation.

There are at present about 500 members and associates of Convocation.

The Chancellor of the University is elected for a period of five years by the members of Convocation in good standing.

The Vice-Chancellor of the University is the Provost of Trinity College.

The Caput consists of the Vice-Chancellor and four members of Convocation, to be elected by Convocation at the annual June meeting for conferring degrees.

The Degrees of the University are open to all persons without any religious test, except in the case of Degrees in Divinity, candidates for which degrees are required to subscribe to a declaration of membership in the Church of England, and to the three Articles of the XXXVIth Canon.

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Amongst these the Venerable A. N. Bethune, D.D., Archdeacon of York, afterwards Bishop of Toronto; the Rev. William McMurray, D.D., D.C.L., Rector of Niagara, and afterwards Archdeacon of Niagara; the Rev. T. B. Fuller, D.D., afterwards Bishop of Niagara; and the Rev. Saltern Givins, are worthy of special and grateful mention.

In addition to the offerings of Canadian Churchmen, amounting to over \$100,000, most liberal assistance, exceeding \$50,000, was obtained from England, including the following donations:

The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, £2,000 and seven and a-half acres of land in the City of Toronto.

The Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, £3,000.
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1853.—Dr. Burnside, \$24,000.

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1866.—Enoch Turner, Esq., Toronto, \$8,000.

1871.—Thomas Clark Street, Esq., \$4,000.

1876.—Family of the late James Henderson, Esq., \$5,000.

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In this sum is included a donation of \$10,000 from the Henderson family, specially appropriated to the erection of the College Chapel; a sum of £5,000, promised by an anonymous donor, a member of the University of Oxford, towards the Endowment of a Chair in Divinity and a Chair in Science; and a grant of £3,000 from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, which required a further sum of £6,000 to be raised to meet it as follows:—

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£1,000 for an additional building to accommodate twenty Students, on condition that £1,500 more was raised.

£500 to endow a Lectureship in History, on condition that £1,500 more was raised.

These grants have now been paid. The new building was opened in Michaelmas Term 1890, and Fellowships in Theology, Classics, and Natural Science as well as the Lectureship in History have been founded, the last by the aid of Convocation having been raised to a Professorship.

In 1890 the Rev. Algernon Boys, Professor of Classics, left his estate of the value of \$6,400 to the Corporation subject to the payment of four per cent. per annum during the lives of certain relatives.

The following Benefactions have been made specially appropriated to Scholarships or Exhibitions:

1852.—Two Scholarships of \$160 each, founded by the first Duke of Wellington.

1853.—Two Scholarships of \$160 each, founded in memory of the late Dr. Burnside.

1860.—Two Scholarships of \$140 and \$100 respectively, founded by the late William Dickson, Esq., of Galt.

1862.—The Pettit Scholarship in Theology, of \$90 per annum, left by W. T. Pettit, Esq.

1866.—The Cooper Exhibitions, being the interest on \$4,000 left by C. W. Cooper, Esq., of Mount Pleasant.

- 1889.—The Talbot Exhibitions in Divinity, being the interest on \$4,000 left by J. Talbot, Esq., of Cartwright.
- 1890.—The Palmer Exhibition in Divinity, being the interest on a debenture of \$1,000 issued by the Chapter of S. Alban's Cathedral, given in memory of the late Ven. Archdeacon Palmer, M.A., D.C.L., by his widow.
- 1891.—The Wilson Exhibition, being the interest on \$2,000, left by the late Ven. J. Wilson, M.A., Archdeacon of Peterborough; the order to be a member of the Divinity Class, preparing for Holy Orders, and accepted for service by the Bishop of Toronto in his diocese.

Subscribers of \$1,000 and upwards to the Supplemental Endowment Fund are entitled to nominate, during their lifetime, one Student, in Arts or Divinity, to an Exhibition of \$50 per annum for three years.

Subscribers of \$750, \$500, \$250, are entitled to nominate three Students, two Students, one Student, respectively, to a three years' Exhibition of \$50 per annum, tenable in Arts or Divinity.

By means of the Annual payments of Members and Associates of Convocation, grants have been made towards augmenting the stipends of the Professor of History, the Lecturer on Modern Languages, and the Fellow in Natural Science.

Urgent Wants.

The sum of \$70,000, is still urgently required to provide for the outstanding expense on the additional building, and for improvements needed in the present building, also to provide Professorial Chairs, instead of Lectureships, in the Departments of Physical Sciences, Natural Science, and Modern Languages.

A Chair in English and English Literature is also much needed.

Fees for Tuition and Board.

Although residence within the College buildings for Students in Arts and Divinity, is not in all cases compulsory, it is strongly recommended. The common Collegiate life, after the pattern of the English Universities, is in itself a training of great importance. A new residence containing fifty-eight rooms was entered in 1889-90, the accommodation previously existing being found altogether inadequate.

Students in Arts are ordinarily required to reside in College, but those whose parents live in Toronto are exempted from such residence, and the same privilege is granted by the Executive Committee in other cases on sufficient cause being shewn. See page 78, last paragraph.

The Tuition Fees are \$65 per annum.

The charge for board of Resident Students in Arts is \$130 per annum, and for Students in Divinity, \$100 per annum.

These fees are payable for Art Students in three instalments, and for Divinity Students in two instalments, terminally, in advance, and on payment being made during the first fortnight of term, a discount of 10 per cent. is allowed. The rent of College rooms varies from \$5 to \$17 per term.

The Steward's account for fuel and extras averages \$15 per annum. Students have to provide their own bedding, carpets, etc.; the heavy furniture being supplied by the College. They will also require a cap and gown and a surplice for use in Chapel.

The rooms in College will be assigned to Resident Students on the first day of Michaelmas Term, beginning at 9 a.m. Letters received by the Dean after September 10th will be taken into consideration; but it is recommended that Students should be present on October 10th, to look after their own interests.

Matriculation.

I. ARTS.

The examination in July will be that conducted by the Education Department for the Universities. The Pass Examination will be held at Trinity College, Toronto, and at the various Collegiate Institutes and High Schools of the Province, beginning on July 4th. The Honour papers will be set at Trinity College, and at certain of the more important Collegiate Institutes selected by the Education Department, beginning on July 13th. Candidates for this Examination, if they propose to write at a High School or Collegiate Institute, must notify the Inspector and pay him the fee before May 24th, and should at the same time send notice to the University Registrar on a form which will be supplied on application. Candidates proposing to write at Trinity College must send the required notice to the Registrar by May 24th, accompanied by a certificate of good character and the fee. A second Examination will begin at Trinity College on October 2nd. Notice for this Examination must be sent to the Registrar by September 10th, on a form which will be supplied on application, together with the fee. Candidates who failed partially in July and desire to complete the examination in October and who did not write at Trinity

College, must send a *certified* copy of the marks obtained in the July Examination. In all cases the fee is \$5, except when not more than two departments are taken, in which case the fee is \$2. The Candidate for Matriculation must have entered on his sixteenth year.

The following Scholarships for general proficiency are offered for Competition at the July Matriculation Examination :

The Bishop Strachan Scholarship of \$200.

The First Dickson Scholarship of \$140.

The Second Dickson Scholarship of \$100.

The Corporation has also provided that four Bursaries shall be open every year, tenable from year to year, for a period not exceeding three years, of the value of \$62 per annum. Any Student who shall have passed the Matriculation Examination, and shall have satisfied the Corporation that he cannot, without the aid thus afforded, avail himself of the advantage of a University Education, shall be eligible for a Bursary, provided that he is not the holder of a Scholarship or Exhibition. *Ceteris paribus* the sons of Clergymen will be preferred.

(a) By passing the Matriculation Examination in Arts or Medicine of Trinity University, or of some other recognized University.

(b) By passing the Matriculation Examination accepted by the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario or Quebec, or the Primary Examinations of the Law Society of Upper Canada.

(c) By passing an Examination recognized as equivalent to any of the above.

FACULTY OF ARTS.

Proceedings in Arts.

BACHELOR OF ARTS.

All Candidates for this Degree must be Matriculated Students of Trinity University, and have kept nine terms. They will be required by the University to pass the Primary, Previous, and Final Examinations.

In order that a Student may keep a term he must attend seventy-five per cent. of the Lectures delivered in the term by each Professor or Lecturer whose Lectures he is required to take; and, if resident in College, attend sixty per cent., and if living in lodgings, fifty per cent. of the Chapels of the term.

The keeping of terms may, however, be dispensed with in individual cases, in which application to that effect shall have been made to the Executive Committee, and the grounds assigned by the applicant unanimously approved by the Committee. In such cases the applicant must not be less than twenty-five years of age, and will be required to pass the Matriculation Examination, the Primary, the Previous, and the Final Examinations, at intervals of not less than those which are prescribed in case of Resident Students, and to pay for each Examination which he undergoes in addition to the fees for Matriculation and Degree, the sum of \$5. The permission to proceed to a Degree in this manner by Examinations only, must be given by the Corporation before the Candidate presents himself for the Matriculation Examination.

Students attending lectures in Trinity College will not be allowed to present themselves at the Primary, Previous, or Final Examination, unless they have passed the Christmas College Examination, held at the end of the Michaelmas Term, or the Supplemental Examination, held at the end of the Lent Term, of the First, Second, or Third Year respectively. The marks obtained in this Examination by Candidates in the First and Second Years, are also reckoned in the awarding of Scholarships in June.

Students attending any Divinity School in connection with the Church of England, will be admitted to the Degree of B.A., on condition of passing the usual Examinations, viz., the Matriculation, the Primary, the Previous, and Final Examinations, at the accustomed times, the Candidate producing on each occasion the necessary certificate from the authorities of his Divinity School, viz., at the Matriculation Examination, that he has been admitted as a Student of the School, and at the Primary, Previous, and Final Examinations, that he has kept at least the requisite number of terms, and that he is in good standing. Students who do not reside for so long a period as three years may be admitted to the Degree of B.A., on condition of keeping at Trinity College the rest of the terms required, and of passing the necessary Examinations. Or they may make, severally, applications to the Executive Committee to be allowed to avail themselves of the Statute under which Candidates are admitted to the Degree of B.A., by Examination only.

Students-at-law of Osgoode Hall, or Students of any Medical College, may be admitted to the Degree of B.A., if, during their Course of Law or Medicine respectively, they have kept three terms in Trinity College, and have passed the Matriculation, the Primary, Previous, and Final Examinations for the Degree of B.A.

Undergraduates of other Universities may, at the discretion of the Provost, be admitted *ad eundem statum*, up to the end of the Second Year, provided they have kept their terms by attending Lectures and passing Examinations.

In order that a Candidate may pass in the Matriculation Examination, he must obtain twenty-five per cent. of the marks assigned to each paper, and forty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination he is required to take.

In the other pass Examinations for the Degree of B.A., the Candidate must obtain twenty-five per cent. of the marks assigned to each paper, and thirty-three per cent. of the marks assigned to each department.

The same privilege shall be allowed in the same circumstances, in the succeeding July Examination, to candidates who have presented themselves for the first time in October, or taken the complete examination in October.

A candidate for Matriculation who has failed in the July Examination for Second Class Teachers' certificates, but reckoning the subjects in which he has satisfied the Departmental Examiners, does not require more than three departments to complete the Matriculation Examination, may be allowed to take these subjects at the succeeding October Examination.

BIOLOGY.

1. ELEMENTS OF BOTANY :—

The examination will test whether the candidate has practically studied representatives of the flowering plants of the locality in which the preparatory school is situated, and representatives of the chief subdivisions of cryptogams, such as a fern, a lycopod, a horse-tail, a liver-wort, a moss, a lichen, a mushroom, and a chara.

A knowledge of structure is required, such as can be obtained with the use of the compound microscope. Attention will be given in the examination to drawing and description of parts of plants supplied, and to the classification of these. Comparison of different organs, morphology of root, stem, leaves, and hair, parts of the flower, reproduction of flowering plants, pollination, fertilization, and the nature of fruit and seeds.

2. ELEMENTS OF ZOOLOGY :—

Practical study of the subject as defined in *The High School Zoology*, but limited by the author's syllabus of work.

Candidates who obtain sixty-six per cent. of the total marks for pass and honours in any department will be placed in the first class in the department, and those who obtain fifty per cent. in the second class.

Candidates may write for Honours in any number of departments, but may only count the marks for Scholarships as provided below.

The following are the marks assigned to the various subjects in awarding the General Proficiency Scholarships at the July Matriculation Examination:—Pass Subjects: Mathematics, 200; for each of the subjects Divinity, Latin, Greek, English, History and Geography, French, German, Physics, Chemistry, 100. Honour Subjects: Mathematics, 300; for each of the subjects Divinity, Latin, Greek, English, History and Geography, French, German, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, 150.

Candidates for General Proficiency Scholarships are required to write at Trinity College in the July Examinations both in Pass and Honours and will be allowed to count in addition to their pass marks in the departments of Latin, Greek, Mathematics, English, and History and Geography, the marks obtained in the honours of not more than three departments, provided that the total honour marks assigned to the selected honour departments shall not exceed 600. When Greek is not taken the alternative pass subjects will count 50 each in awarding the Scholarships. Candidates must obtain a first-class in at least one department.

In cases where Greek is not taken, St. Mark's Gospel in English and Cutts' *Turning Points of General Church History* may be substituted for St. Mark's Gospel in Greek.

The names of Students who pass this Examination will be arranged in three classes, in alphabetical order; the first class consisting of those who shall have obtained at least sixty per cent. of the total marks of the examination; the second of those who shall have obtained forty-five per cent.; the third of those who have satisfied the Examiners, but have obtained less than forty-five per cent.

Honour Courses have been established in the following Departments: (1) Classics, (2) Mathematics, (3) Theology, (4) Mental and Moral Science, (5) Physical and Natural

Science, (6) Modern Languages, (7) Modern History. A Student who declares for any one of these courses will, during his second year, be exempted from lectures and examinations in all other departments except the pass subjects in Divinity, on condition that he has obtained a First Class in the Primary Examination, and has passed a satisfactory examination at the end of his first year for Honours in Classics, Mathematics, Modern Languages or History and Literature in the prescribed Honour work in these departments, or for Honours in Theology in the Hebrew of the First Year. Candidates for Honours in Theology will, however, be required to take the pass subjects of the Second Year in Mental Philosophy, and of the Third Year in Ethics, but will not be required to take the pass subjects in Divinity in the Second and Third Years.

A candidate for Honours who fails in only one department of the Primary Examination, but obtains sixty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination shall, on completing the Examination, be entitled to the exemptions of the previous paragraph, except that in addition to the pass subjects in Divinity, he shall be required to take the subjects of the department in which he has failed, and should he fail in Divinity he shall be required to take the department in which he stood next lowest in the Primary Examination.

A candidate for Honours who has obtained a Second Class in the Primary Examination, and has satisfied the other conditions of the preceding paragraph, will, during his second year, be exempted from Lectures and Examinations in all other departments except Divinity, one of the two Classics, or Physical and Natural Science, one of the two Mathematics, or Mental and Moral Philosophy, and one of the four, French, German, Hebrew, or History and Literature.

The names of the Students who pass this examination will be arranged in the same manner as in the case of the Primary Examination.

A candidate for Honours who, having obtained a First Class in the Primary Examination, has therefore been entitled to claim exemption from certain lectures during his second year and from part of the Previous Examination, may claim similar exemptions from lectures during his third year and in the Final Examination, provided that he has passed a satisfactory examination in his Honour subjects at the end of his second year, and the required part of the Previous Examination.

A candidate for Honours who has not obtained a First Class in the Primary Examination shall be entitled to the exemptions allowed in the previous paragraph, provided he shall have obtained sixty per cent. of the marks of the Previous Examination which he is required to take, not reckoning marks obtained at the Supplemental Examination, and passed a satisfactory examination in his Honour subjects at the end of his second year. If he fails to obtain sixty per cent. of marks as above, he shall not be allowed any exemptions but shall be allowed to select for Classics any one of the special departments except that which forms the Pass departments of his Honour course.

In 1894 these subjects are to be substituted for the Acts of the Apostles in Greek only.

The names of Students who pass this Examination will be arranged in the same manner as in the case of the Primary Examination.

SUPPLEMENTAL EXAMINATIONS.

Those Students who shall have been rejected at the Regular Examination of their own year, or who shall have been absent for such Examination, may present themselves, with the consent of the Vice-Chancellor, at a Supplemental Examination which will be held early in October, and those who then fail to pass will be required to attend the same Examination in the succeeding year.

Students who have failed at their Annual Regular Examination in not more than three departments, or their equivalent may be permitted, if the Examiners think fit, to present themselves for Examination in those departments only, at the following Supplemental Examination.

Students proposing to attend the Supplemental Examination are required to pay a fee of \$5 if one department only is taken, and \$10 if more than one are taken, which fee,

together with a notice of his intention to present himself for Examination, the candidate must present to the Registrar, on or before September 10th.

HONOUR EXAMINATION AT B.A.

Candidates may take the Degree of B.A. with Honours in the following departments: (I.) Classics; (II.) Mathematics; (III.) Theology; (IV.) Mental and Moral Philosophy; (V.) Physical and Natural Science; (VI.) Modern Languages and Literature; and (VII.) Modern History. The result of these Examinations will be published in the College Hall, in three classes; the order of merit in each department being determined by the number of marks obtained in this Examination, together with those obtained in that department in the Pass Examination in the case of Classics or Mathematics.

The Examiners in Classics or Mathematics may, at their discretion, add a Fourth Honorary Class to their Honour List, consisting of those who, not being Candidates for Honours, have highly distinguished themselves in the Classical or Mathematical part of the Pass Examination respectively.

Candidates for Honours who shall have claimed exemption from any part of the Final Examination though they have failed to obtain a class in Honours, may be granted the Degree of B.A. on the recommendation of the Examiners.

Candidates who have taken part of the Final Honour work in June, and are required to complete their examination in October, must send notice of their intention to come up for examination not later than September 10th, specifying when necessary the options selected.

GENERAL REGULATIONS AS TO SCHOLARSHIPS.

A Student shall not be awarded a Scholarship in any department unless he shall have obtained at least two-thirds of the marks assigned to that department in the June and Christmas Examinations together, and shall have passed in all the other subjects in which he is required to present himself for Examination both at Christmas and in the University Examination in June.

During the second or third year, two Scholarships may be held by the same student, provided they are not the two Burnside or the two Wellington Scholarships ; but should these two Scholarships be awarded to any student, he shall hold one and receive from the other \$50 of the emolument thereof.

The Scholarships, Exhibitions, and Bursaries, are held during good behaviour, with the further condition in the case of Scholarships, that the holders thereof shall attend Honour Lectures, and satisfy the Professors in such Lectures.

MASTER OF ARTS.

The Candidate for this Degree must be a Bachelor of Arts of one year's standing. He must send to the Registrar notice of his intention of proceeding to the degree, together with the fee at least three days before the Convocation.

St. Hilda's College is an Arts College for Women in affiliation with Trinity University.

Instruction is given in the subjects of the Curriculum for the Degree of B.A., by Professors and Lecturers appointed by the Council. Students of this College have the privilege of attending the Honour Lectures of Trinity College without further charge.

The Fees are for Resident Students, including Board and Tuition, \$83.33 per term, with an entrance Fee of \$12 to cover expenses of Bedding, Furniture, etc.

For Non-Resident Students, \$20 per term.

Occasional Students are admitted at the discretion of the Lady Principal to take partial courses in one or more subjects.

FACULTY OF DIVINITY.

Proceedings in Divinity.

DIVINITY CLASS.

The course of work in the Divinity Class comprises both theoretical and practical work, such as the composition and preaching of Sermons, reading the Liturgy, Sunday School work, Mission work, etc.

Special importance is attached to the building up of the devotional life. Short services of Instruction, Meditation, or Intercession are held daily in the College chapel.

The following persons may be admitted to the Divinity Class provided they have obtained the approval of the College Committee:—

(1) Graduates in Arts of Trinity University or of other Universities in which Classics form a part of the course required for the B.A. degree.

(2) Undergraduates of Trinity University and of such other Universities aforesaid, being of the full age of twenty-one years, who have attended the Lectures of the Arts Course for one year, and have passed the Examination at the end of the first year of such course.

Graduates of Universities other than Trinity University, must pass an Examination in all Divinity subjects required in the Final Examination for the Degree of B.A. in Trinity University, and Undergraduates of such Universities in those required in the Primary Examination in Trinity University.

Before his admission such Student must subscribe to the Thirty-nine Articles.

The period of study will be three years; and no certificate in the Theological Department can be granted within this time except as provided below; and unless the Student has attended Chapels and Lectures as required by the Statutes. All members of the Divinity Class are required to reside in College, a portion of which is set aside for their exclusive use.

A Graduate in Theological Honours (who has not previously taken Honours in some other Arts department) will not be granted his Letters Testimonial for Holy Orders, until he shall have passed at an Examination of the Divinity Class in the year's work of the Class in Doctrine, Apologetics, Pastoral Theology, and Homiletics, having attended three Terms' Lectures in those subjects after having completed the Theological Honour Course. A Graduate in Honours in some other Arts department who is a Candidate for Theological Honours, may attend these Lectures and pass this Examination *during* his Theological Honour Course.

The standard in the Divinity Class Examinations for students matriculating in October, 1892, and subsequently, will be : for Honours, seventy-five per cent. ; for First-Class, seventy per cent. ; for Second-Class, sixty per cent. ; and for Passing, forty-five per cent. of the whole marks of the examination, and thirty-three per cent. of the marks of each paper.

Members of the Divinity Class will be required to take such Pastoral work as may from time to time be assigned to them by the Provost.

LICENTIATE IN SACRED THEOLOGY.

The Candidate for this Degree must have kept nine complete terms. He must (1) have passed the Primary Examination for the Degree of B.A., and two June Examinations of the Divinity Class; or (2) have obtained Honours in Theology, and have passed at a June Examination of the Divinity Class in the year's work of the Class in Doctrine Apologetics, Pastoral Theology, and Homiletics, having attended at least three terms' Lectures in these subjects.

PRIZES IN THE DIVINITY CLASS.

A Prize of \$20 for General Proficiency; a Prize of \$20 for Greek Testament, a Prize of \$12, given by the Rev. W. B. Carey, M.A., and two Prizes of the respective value of \$8 and \$4 for reading the Lessons in Chapel, selected passages of Standard Authors, portions of the Liturgy, and a Sermon; a Prize of \$10, given by the Rev. W. E. Cooper, M.A., B.D., for an Examination in some selected work on Apologetics; Prizes of \$10 each—(1) for Hebrew and Old Testament, both Hebrew Papers of the June Examination having to be taken; and (2) for Ecclesiastical History, Pastoral, Apologetic, and Dogmatic Theology, are awarded at the June Examination; a Prize of \$20 for the composition of a Sermon.

HAMILTON MEMORIAL PRIZE.

The family of the late Mrs. John Hamilton, of Hawkesbury have founded, in her memory, an annual Prize of \$30, under the following regulations:

I. The Prize, to be called the HAMILTON MEMORIAL PRIZE, is to be awarded according to the result of the following papers:—

(a) A paper or papers on a selected book or selected books illustrative of Scripture History, Antiquities, and Interpretation.

(b) The papers set in the June Examination of the Divinity Class on the selected Old Testament subjects in English read in Lecture.

(c) A paper on general Scripture History to be set in the June Examination of the Divinity Class.

II. All Students belonging to the Divinity Class, as well as all others who have passed through their Theological Course, and have not attained three years' standing from B.A., shall be eligible as Candidates.

III. The Examination in the selected book or books shall take place at the end of the Lent Term in each year, and the marks obtained shall be added to the marks of the June Examination.

IV. The Examiners shall be empowered to withhold the Prize if no Candidate is found worthy.

JUBILEE SCHOLARSHIPS.

These two Scholarships were founded by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, from the Jubilee Fund of the year 1851, of the annual value of \$160, tenable for two years. One of these Scholarships is awarded yearly to the most deserving Bachelor of the year, who has obtained at least second class Honours in Classics or Mathematics. On admission to the Scholarship, a declaration must be signed by the holder that it is his purpose to complete the Divinity Course of two years in Trinity College, and to present himself as a Candidate for Holy Orders, and should he fail to do so, he will be held bound to refund to the College such proceeds of the Scholarship as he shall have received.

Candidates for Honours in Theology who have previously graduated with Honours in some other department, will be

allowed to compete for the Sermon Prize, the Hamilton Memorial Prize, the Cooper Prize for Apologetics, and the Reading Prizes, in both years of their course in Theological Honours, but those who have not previously graduated with Honours will be allowed to compete only in the year following their graduation.

DEGREES IN DIVINITY.

Candidates for these Degrees resident in the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada, other than Candidates for the Degree. *Jure Dignitatis* will, for the future, be required to proceed in accordance with the Canon on Divinity Degrees passed by the Provincial Synod of Canada in 1889. For copies of these regulations application should be made to the Provost.

The following regulations apply to Candidates *residing outside the Ecclesiastical Province*.

BACHELOR OF DIVINITY.

The Candidate for this Degree must be a Graduate in Arts of the University of three years' standing, or in the case of a Graduate admitted "*ad eundem statum*" of at least three years' standing from his first Degree. The requirement that the Candidate shall be a Graduate in Arts may, however, be dispensed with by the Corporation, on special application having been made to them, in the case of clergymen who have been in Priests' orders for at least six years, but such Candidate shall be required to pass the Matriculation Examination of Trinity University.

Except in the case hereinafter provided for, the Candidate must pass two examinations, to be called the First and Second Examination for the Degree of B.D.

Graduates who have completed the two years' Divinity Course in Trinity College, and have passed the two June Examinations of the Divinity Class, obtaining at least a Second Class in each Examination, shall be exempted from the First Examination for the Degree of B.D.

The Examinations in Divinity will begin on October 2nd and Candidates for any Examination must send notice to the Provost not later than April 1st, specifying, where necessary, the part of the Examination for which they intend to present themselves.

FIRST EXAMINATION FOR THE DEGREE OF B. D.

The subjects for this Examination shall be as follows :—

- (1) Selected portions from the Historical, Poetical and Prophetical parts of the Old Testament. (Questions in Hebrew will be set, but are not obligatory for the Degree.)
- (2) A selected Gospel and Epistle or Epistles from the New Testament in Greek.
- (3) One selected Greek, and one selected Latin, Ecclesiastical Writing.
- (4) The Outlines of the History :
 - (a) Of the Christian Church to A. D. 451.
 - (b) Of the English Church.
- (5) A selected work on Dogmatic Theology.
- (6) A selected work on Apologetic Theology.
- (7) A selected work on Christian Ethics.
- (8) A selected work on Pastoral Theology.

The selected works for the year 1893 are :—

- (1) Exodus and Numbers ; Psalms, Bk. I ; Isaiah, Chaps. xl. -xlvi.
- (2) The Gospel according to St. Mark ; the Epistle to the Romans.
- (3) The Apostolic Constitutions, Bk. vii., and the $\Delta\iota\delta\alpha\chi\eta$. Irenaeus, Bk. V.
- (5) Martensen's Christian Dogmatics.
- (6) Christlieb's Modern Doubt and Christian Belief.

SECOND EXAMINATION FOR THE DEGREE OF B. D.

The Candidate may select for Examination *one* of the five following groups of subjects :—

The Hebrew Scriptures, with special reference to selected Books ; also selected Books from the Septuagint Version.
The History and Development of the Kingdom of God during the Old Testament period, with special regard to its relation to the Christian Ministry and Sacraments.

II. NEW TESTAMENT :

The New Testament in Greek, with special reference to selected Books.
The History and Constitution of the Christian Church during the Apostolic period.
The History of the Canon of the New Testament, and of its text ; its Inspiration and Contents.

III. PATRISTICS AND ECCLESIASTICAL HISTORY :

The History and Constitution of the Christian Church during the Apostolic period, and to the death of Leo the Great, with selected Christian writings of this period.
The History of the English Church, special regard being had to the history and doctrinal position of the various bodies which have separated from her.

IV. LITURGIES AND DOGMATIC THEOLOGY :

The Ancient Liturgies and their relation to the various Eucharistic Offices of the Anglican Church.
The Creeds and Illustrative Documents.
The History of some selected Doctrine.

V. APOLOGETICS :

Positive Grounds of Faith, embracing the several lines of thought by which the mind is led :
(a) To the conviction of the Existence of God.
(b) To the conviction of the Truth of Christianity.
Selected Ancient Christian Apologies.
Relation of Christianity to the Philosophical and Ethical Systems.

The selected works of the various groups of the above schedule, and forming part of the work thereby required for the years 1893-6, are the same as those for 1891-2, for which see Calendar for 1889, pp. 57, 58, to be obtained by application to the Registrar.

DOCTOR OF DIVINITY.

The Candidate for this Degree must be a Bachelor of Divinity of three years' standing.

EXAMINATION FOR THE DEGREE OF D.D.

The Candidate may select for Examination *one* of the five following groups of subjects, and will be required to write a Thesis on the corresponding subject specified below :

I. OLD TESTAMENT :

The Old Testament in Hebrew and Chaldee.

For Thesis : Some selected subject connected with the relation of the Old Testament Scriptures to contemporary Ethnic Faiths, or with the authenticity, doctrinal position, or other kindred question of selected portions of the Old Testament.

II. NEW TESTAMENT :

The New Testament in Greek.

Patristic and other Schools of interpretation, with selected commentaries.

For Thesis : The authenticity, doctrinal position, or other kindred question of selected books or portions of the New Testament.

III. PATRISTICS AND ECCLESIASTICAL HISTORY :

Selected Patristic Writings.

Selected Historical Periods from Ancient, Mediaeval, and Post-Reformation Ecclesiastical History, with selected writings of the period.

For Thesis : Some selected Historical Subject.

IV. LITURGIES AND DOGMATIC THEOLOGY :

The Book of Common Prayer in relation to its original sources.

The History of Doctrine in the '16th century, with special reference to the Doctrinal Position of the English Church.

For Thesis : Some selected Doctrinal Subject.

V. APOLOGETICS :

(a) The Bearing upon the Christian Revelation of recent investigation in the various Physical Sciences and in History.

(b) The relation of Christianity to the various non-Christian Faiths.



The selected works for the various groups for the years 1893-6, are the same as those for 1891-2, for which see Calendar for 1889, pp. 60-62.

In order that a Candidate may pass in any Examination for B.D. or D.D., he must obtain thirty-three per cent. of the marks assigned to each paper, and fifty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination.

Candidates for the Degrees of B.D. or D.D. are required to preach a Sermon before the University.

Any Graduate of the University holding the office of Bishop or Dean of the Church of England, is eligible for the Degree of Doctor of Divinity, *jure dignitatis*, upon payment of the accustomed fees for that Degree.



FACULTY OF LAW.

Proceedings in Law.

BACHELOR OF CIVIL LAW.

The Candidate for this Degree must be a matriculated Student of Trinity University, but if he be a Student-at-Law who has been matriculated by the Law Society of Upper Canada he shall be admitted to Matriculation in the University without further examination.

The Candidate must be of the standing of three years from the date of Matriculation, and of the full age of twenty-three years, but the latter condition may be dispensed with in the case of Students-at-Law of Osgoode Hall who have kept three complete Terms in Arts, and passed the Primary Examination.

The Candidate will be required to pass three Examinations, separated by intervals, of not less than a year, to be called the First, Second, and Final Examinations in Law. If, however, the Candidate produces a certificate of his having been called to the Degree of Barrister-at-Law by any Law Society in Her Majesty's Dominions, and be a Graduate in Arts of Trinity University, or of any recognized University the first two examinations may be dispensed with, and the Degree of B.C.L. may be conferred after the Candidate has passed the Final Examination only.

The Examinations in Law will begin in 1893 as follows : the First and Final on June 14th, and the Second on June 17th. Candidates for any examination are required to give notice to the Registrar by June 1st, on a form which will be furnished on application.

N. B.—In 1894 the following changes will be made in the text books. In the second examination Walker's Political Economy (Advanced Course) will be substituted for Fawcett's Political Economy. In the Final Examination the Institutes of Gaius, and Rules of Ulpian (edited by Muirhead, Edin.) will be substituted for Tomkins' and Jencikens' Roman Law, and Clement on the Canadian Constitution for Doutre and Cartwright's Cases under Constitutional Law and History.

In order that a Candidate may pass in any of the three Examination he must obtain thirty-three per cent. of the marks assigned to each paper, and fifty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination. Candidates who satisfy the Examiners will be arranged in three classes in order of merit, the standard for the 1st and 2nd class respectively being seventy and sixty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination.

Candidates who fail in the First or Second Examination, may, at the discretion of the Examiners, be allowed to take a supplemental Examination in the following June, *together with* the subsequent Examination, those who fail in obtaining fifty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination being required to take the whole Examination, those who obtain

fifty per cent. of the total, but fail in particular papers, being required to take only those papers in which they have failed.

MEDALS IN LAW.

A Gold and a Silver Medal are annually awarded upon the special recommendation of the Examiners, to the Candidates who obtain the first and second places respectively in the first class at the Final Examination for the Degree of B.C.L.

DOCTOR OF CIVIL LAW.

The Candidate for this Degree must be a Bachelor of Civil Law of five years' standing complete.

He must compose a Thesis on some legal subject to be appointed from time to time, and send it in to the Registrar on or before May 15th, together with the fee of \$5 for its Examination.



FACULTY OF MEDICINE.

Proceedings in Medicine.

DOCTOR OF MEDICINE, AND MASTER OF SURGERY.

The Candidate for a Degree in Medicine must have matriculated in that Faculty or in Arts (see p. 37).

The Medical *Matriculation Examination will be held twice in the year in Trinity Medical College, beginning on the second Friday in March and October respectively.

The subjects for this Examination for 1893-4 are:—

- (1) Writing and Dictation.
- (2) English Language, including Grammar and Composition.
- (3) Arithmetic.
- (4) Algebra, including Simple Equations.
- (5) Euclid, Books I., II., III., with easy deductions.
- (6) Latin.
Grammar.
Caesar, *Bellum Gallicum*, Bks. I., II., or Bks. V. VI.; or Cicero *de Lege Manilia*; or Virgil, *Aeneid*, Bk. II.
Translation of easy passages from unspecified Latin authors;
- (7) One of the following divisions, to be selected by the Candidate:
 - (a) Scripture History; and St. Matthew's Gospel, ch. i.-x. incl., in Greek.
 - (b) Greek: Xenophon's *Anabasis*, Bk. I.
 - (c) French: Voltaire's *Charles XII.*, VI.-VIII.
 - (d) German: Schiller's *Thirty Years' War*, Bk. I.
 - (e) Natural Philosophy, including Mechanics, Hydrostatics, and Pneumatics. (Balfour Stewart's *Lessons in Elementary Physics* is recommended).
 - (f) Logic.

Notice must be sent to the Registrar of Trinity University together with the examination fee of \$5 at least one week before the examination, on a form which will be supplied on application.

The Candidate for Degrees in Medicine or Surgery must be of the full age of twenty-one years.

He must furnish certificates of having attended four Winter Sessions at some Medical College recognized by the University, except he be a Graduate in Arts or Science, when attendance at three Winter Sessions will be accepted.

* This Examination will not qualify candidates to practise Medicine in Ontario.

Before admission to the Primary Examination in Medicine, he must have attended in some recognized Medical College the following courses of Lectures:—

Two courses of six months each on

Descriptive Anatomy.
 Practical Anatomy.
 General Chemistry.
 Materia Medica and Therapeutics.
 Physiology.
 Histology.

And one course of three months on

Botany.
 Practical Chemistry, including Toxicology.

Before admission to the Final Examination, he must further have attended two courses of Lectures of six months each in some recognized Medical College on

Theory and Practice of Medicine, including Medical Pathology.
 Principles and Practice of Surgery, including Surgical Pathology.
 Midwifery and Diseases of Women and Children.
 Clinical Medicine.
 Clinical Surgery

And two courses of three months each on

Medical Jurisprudence.

And one course of three months each on

Applied Anatomy.
 Sanitary Science.
 Practical Pathology.

He must have attended for at least *eighteen* months the practice of some general Hospital and, during two sessions, Clinical Lectures on Medicine and Surgery.

He must have attended for at least six months the practice of a Lying-in-Hospital, or must give satisfactory evidence of having otherwise enjoyed equivalent advantages of gaining obstetrical knowledge, with a certificate of attendance upon at least six cases of labour.

He must have passed two University Examinations, called the Primary and the Final Examinations in Medicine.

Before admission to the Primary Examination, he must produce a certificate that he has passed the First Year's Examination in some recognized Medical College.

PRIMARY EXAMINATION IN MEDICINE.

This Examination may be passed at the end of the Second Year. The subjects are: Anatomy, Descriptive and Surgical, including Practical Anatomy; Physiology, including Histology, Chemical Physics, and General Chemistry, Practical Chemistry, Materia Medica and Therapeutics, Toxicology and Botany, unless it has been passed at the First Year's College Examination.

The Primary Examination of other recognized Universities, or that of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, Quebec, or Manitoba, will be accepted in lieu of the University Primary Examination, provided that the Candidate shall in all cases pay the full fee for the Degree, but if any of the subjects of the Primary Examination do not form part of the Examination allowed, the Candidate shall be required to take such subjects together with his Final Examination.

Graduates of any recognized University, will not be required to take such subjects of the Primary Examination as they have already passed in their University Examinations.

FINAL EXAMINATION IN MEDICINE.

This Examination shall take place at the end of the Fourth Year. The subjects are: Theory and Practice of Medicine, including Medical Pathology; Principles and Practice of Surgery, including Surgical Pathology; Clinical Medicine, Clinical Surgery, Midwifery, and Diseases of Women and Children, Medical Jurisprudence, Sanitary Science.

In 1895 instead of one paper on Midwifery and Diseases of Women and Children, there will be two papers, one on Midwifery, the other on Gynecology and Diseases of Children.

In order that a Candidate may pass in either of these Examinations he must obtain thirty-three per cent. of the marks assigned to each paper, and fifty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination. Candidates who satisfy the Examiners will be arranged in three classes in order of merit; the standard for the first and second class respectively being seventy and sixty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination.

Candidates who do not pass in at least three of the subjects of Examination in the Examinations of the Faculty of Medicine, obtaining thirty-three per cent. of the marks of each paper, and fifty per cent. of the total marks of these subjects, shall be deemed to have failed altogether in the Examination. Candidates who pass in three subjects at least, obtaining the requisite single and total marks as above, may be allowed to take the remaining subjects at the next following and subsequent Examinations, provided that a Candidate shall not be given credit for any portion of the Examination unless he shall have obtained at least thirty-three per cent. of each paper and fifty per cent. of the total marks of such part of the Examination.

Candidates in the First Class of the Final or the Primary Examination in Medicine shall be awarded Certificates of Honour, provided they obtain at least seventy-five per cent. of the marks of the Examination.

The Primary and Final Examinations may be taken together at the end of the Fourth Year.

Supplemental Examinations will be held beginning for Final Candidates on June 8th, and for Primary Candidates on October 2nd.



Proceedings in Music.

BACHELOR OF MUSIC.

The Candidate for this Degree must transmit to the Registrar, before Matriculation, the Matriculation Fee and the following papers :

(i.) A certificate of character in the following or some equivalent form :

"I, ——— hereby certify that I have known A. B. for the last ——— years, and I believe him to be of good moral character."

(ii.) Satisfactory evidence of attainments in the form either (1) of a certificate of some public Examining Body, or (2) of a testimonial from the Headmaster of his School, or from a Master of Arts of some recognized University, to the effect that he has received a good general education.

(iii.) A certificate that he has employed five years in the study and practice of Music.

N. B.—In the case of Graduates of some recognized University, Clergymen in Priest's Orders, or Barristers, (ii.) and (iii.) will not be required.

The Candidate will be required to pass three Examinations separated by intervals of not less than one year, to be called the First, Second and Final Examinations in Music, and before admission to the Final Examination he must compose an Exercise, containing five part harmony as well as fugal treatment, with an accompaniment for the organ, piano, or string band, sufficiently long to occupy twenty minutes in performance, and this Exercise must be approved by the Examiners.

Candidates who present satisfactory evidence of having passed an examination in Harmony equivalent to the First Examination in Music may be allowed to take the First and Second Examination on consecutive days.

Students of the Toronto Conservatory of Music who have passed the First and Second Examinations for the Diploma of the Conservatory will be exempted from the First Exami-

nation in Music, and Students holding the Diploma of the Conservatory will be exempted from the First and Second Examinations in Music, the Fee of the Second Examination when exemption from the First is granted being \$10, and for the Final Examination when exemption from the First and Second is granted being \$15.

The Examinations will begin in each year as follows : The First and Final on the Wednesday after Easter-day, and the Second Examination on the Thursday after Easter-day ; and the exercises for Degrees and notice for Examination must be sent to the Registrar by February 1st, on a form which will be supplied on application.

MEDALS IN MUSIC.

A Gold and a Silver Medal are awarded annually on the special recommendation of the Examiners to the Candidates who are first and second respectively in the Final Examination for the degree of Mus. Bac., regard being had also to the Exercise.

A Gold Medal, given by an anonymous donor, is awarded to the Candidate examined in Canada who attains the first place among such Candidates in the Second Examination for Mus. Bac., provided that the Candidate is placed in the First class.

DOCTOR OF MUSIC.

The Candidate for this degree must produce a testimonial of his having studied in this faculty for the space of three years subsequent to admission to the Degree of Mus. Bac.

He must compose an Exercise containing harmony and fugal counterpoint both in eight parts with orchestral accompaniments, sufficiently long to occupy forty minutes in performance, and this Exercise must be approved by the Examiners. He may also be required to pass an Examination in the higher branches of the Science of Music, and also work a paper on the form and scoring of a given work and containing one or more questions respecting his own work.

Candidates must transmit with their Exercise for the Final Examination for the Degree of Mus. Bac., or for the Degree of Mus. Doc., the following statutory declaration :

Proceedings in Dentistry.

DOCTOR OF DENTAL SURGERY.

A candidate for this degree must have passed the Matriculation Examination in Arts or Dentistry of this or some other recognized University, or the non-professional examination for a first, second, or third class teacher's certificate, or an examination accepted by the University as equivalent to the above.

The Matriculation Examination in Dentistry will be held twice in the year in Trinity Medical College, beginning on the second Friday in March and October respectively.

The subjects of this examination in 1893 will be :

- (1) Writing and Dictation.
- (2) English Language, including Grammar and Composition.
- (3) Arithmetic.
- (4) Algebra.
- (5) Euclid, Books I, II. and III. with easy deductions.
- (6) Latin.

Grammar.

Cesar, *Bellum Gallicum*, Bks. I, II., or Bks. V, VI. ; or Cicero de *Lege Manilia* ; or Virgil, *Aeneid*, Bk. II.

Notice must be sent to the Registrar of Trinity University together with the examination fee of \$5 at least one week before the examination, on a form which will be supplied on application.

The candidate must be of the full age of twenty-one years, and must furnish a satisfactory certificate of good conduct.

He must produce certificates of having attended lectures in some Dental College recognized by the University for not less than two winter sessions, and of having spent twenty-four months in addition in the office of a legally qualified

Dental Surgeon. He must pass two University Examinations called the Primary and Final Examination in Dentistry.

Before admission to the Primary Examination he must have attended in some recognized Dental College the following lectures.

One course of five months on each of the following subjects :

Special Dental and Practical Anatomy.

Chemistry.

Materia Medica.

Physiology, including Histology.

Dental Laboratory Practice.

Operative Dentistry.

Medicine and Surgery, as applied to Dentistry.

Before admission to the Final Examination he must have attended the following additional lectures :

One course of five months on each of the following subjects :

Clinical Dentistry.

Prosthetic Dentistry.

And one course of three months in Laboratory Practice in Crown and Bridge work, and in the construction of regulating devices, instruments, and appliances for Clinical Dentistry.

PRIMARY EXAMINATION IN DENTISTRY.

This Examination will be held at the end of the First Year. The subjects are: Anatomy, Special, Dental, and Practical ; Primary work in Physiology, Histology, Chemistry, and Materia Medica.

The Primary Examination of other recognized Universities or that of the Royal College of Dental Surgeons will be accepted in lieu of the University Primary Examination, provided that the Candidate shall in all cases pay the full fee for the Degree, but if any of the subjects

of the Primary Examination do not form part of the Examination allowed, the Candidate shall be required to take such subjects together with his Final Examination.

Graduates in Arts of any recognized University, shall not be required to take such subjects of the Primary Examination as they have already passed in their University Examinations.

FINAL EXAMINATION IN DENTISTRY.

This Examination will be held at the end of the Final Year. The subjects are :

Operative Dentistry, Oral and Dental Pathology, Dental Anatomy, Dental Therapeutics, Prosthetic Dentistry, Physiology, Histology, Chemistry, and Materia Medica.

Students will be required to produce satisfactory evidence of proficiency in Practical Dentistry. The certificate of the Royal College of Dental Surgeons will be accepted.

The Primary and Final Examination may be taken together at the end of the Final Year.

The Primary and Final Examinations in 1893 will begin on March 13th.

Notice must be sent to the Registrar on a form which will be furnished, together with the fee for registration, examination, and degree, by March 1st.

Admission to *Ad Eundem* Degrees.

Ad eundem degrees in Divinity, Arts, Law, or Music, are granted to Graduates of Oxford; Cambridge; Trinity College, Dublin; Durham; King's College, Windsor, Nova Scotia; the late King's College, Fredericton, New Brunswick; Bishop's College, Lennoxville, Quebec; or the late King's College, Toronto; on their paying the admission fee, and making the declarations required.

Graduates in Medicine of the Universities of Oxford; Cambridge; Trinity College, Dublin; London; Edinburgh; and Glasgow, are admitted *ad eundem statum* in the University on paying the admission fee, and making the declarations required.

Clergymen of the Church of England, resident within the Dominion of Canada, being graduates in Arts of three years' standing of any chartered University in Her Majesty's Dominions shall be admissible to *ad eundem* degrees as soon as they shall have complied with the conditions requisite for the Degree of Bachelor of Divinity, or of Bachelor of Music.

The professors of Trinity Medical College and of the Woman's Medical College, Toronto, are in all cases admissible to *ad eundem* degrees.

Application for *ad eundem* degrees not provided for in the foregoing regulations are considered by the Executive Committee.

M.A. : Black silk, lined with crimson velvet or silk.
Mus.B. : Black silk, lined with violet silk.

C.M. : Brown silk, lined with light blue silk.
M.D. : Scarlet cloth, lined with light blue silk.
M.D., C.M. : Scarlet cloth, lined with light blue silk, faced with brown silk two inches wide.
B.C.L. : Black silk, lined with French gray silk.
D.C.L. : Scarlet cloth, lined with French gray silk.
Lic.Th. : Black stuff, edged with dark blue silk four inches wide.
B.D. : Black silk, lined with black silk.
D.D. : Scarlet cloth, lined with black silk.

The shape of the Hood shall be in all cases the same as that in use in the University of Cambridge.

The full dress Doctor's gown in each Faculty shall be of scarlet cloth, lined in the same way as the hood, and of the shape worn in the University of Cambridge. The cap shall be of black velvet.

If a candidate for any examination fails to send the notice and pay the fee by the date prescribed in the Calendar, the Registrar may at his discretion accept the notice, but he shall in all cases require the payment of an additional fee of two dollars.

The annual payments made by Bachelor of Arts to Convocation will be credited in payment of the fee for M.A.

The fee for the Degree of M.D., C.M., shall be paid by the candidate as follows: \$10 before presenting himself for the Primary Examination, and \$14 before presenting himself for the Final Examination. Candidates rejected at either examination shall be entitled to have the fee returned to them, less \$5. Candidates conditioned may present themselves subsequently for Examination in March without payment of any fee, but must pay a fee of \$5 if they take the Supplemental Examination in June or October.

For admission *ad eundem gradum* the Candidate shall pay the fee for the degree to which he is admitted as specified in the foregoing table of fees.

Candidates in the Matriculation Examination taking one or two departments only will be required to pay \$2. Candidates taking the Supplemental Arts Examination in October will be required to pay \$5 if they take one department only, and \$10 if they take more departments than one. Candidates conditioned in the B.C.L. Examination will be required to pay a fee of \$2 if they take one paper only, \$3 if they take two or three papers, and \$5 if they take more papers than three.

The University Library contains 10,000 volumes, 600 of which were a gift from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge. Valuable additions have, from time to time, been made to the library by the following donors: The Government of the State of New York, the University of Oxford, the University of Cambridge, Trinity College, Dublin, the Smithsonian Institute, Columbia College, the First Bishop of Toronto, General Sir Henry Lefroy, the widow of the late Rev. W. Ripley, the late Rev. E. B. Pusey, D.D., the Rev. J. E. Mayor (late Librarian of the University of Cambridge), the late Rev. John Smithurst, the Rev. C. J. S. Bethune (from the library of the Second Bishop of Toronto), the late Rev. Prof. Boys, the Royal Irish Academy, the associates of the late Rev. Dr. Bray, and others.

The Library is open during Term fixed hours, when the Librarian will issue books to Graduates and Undergraduates.

All books must be returned to the Library on or before each of the four days: March 24th, June 24th, September 30th, and December 24th.

A fine of twenty-five cents for every folio or quarto volume, and of fifteen cents for every volume of a smaller size, not so returned, must be paid; the fine to be repeated fortnightly until the volume is returned.

Books marked as first-class books must be returned within a fortnight from the time they are taken out of the Library. A fine of twenty-five cents must be paid for every first-class book not so returned, the fine to be repeated weekly. Books on the curriculum of any Faculty are included in the first-class books, but the Librarian may extend the time for such books to four weeks.

Graduates of the University who do not reside in Toronto can have books sent to them on application to the Librarian. They will be required to pay the carriage both ways, and will be subject to the ordinary rules with regard to the dates for returning books and the payments of fines.


