MADRID, July 15.—The minister of War, General Corrales, is quoted as declaring in an interview that he thought peace might be arranged on the following terms.

1.—The independence of the Philippines shall be proclaimed. 2.—A republic shall be established with a government designated by General Dwyer.

3.—The government will recognize the temporary intervention of the American and European commissioners designated for the purpose by Admiral Dewey.

4.—The American protectorate shall be recognized on such conditions as are arranged for Cuba. 5.—That the Philippine ports shall be opened free for the commerce of the world.

6.—The corrupt judicial system at present existing shall be reformed, entrusting as the commencement the administration of justice to competent European legal officials.

7.—There shall be a general religious toleration, and measures shall be accepted for the abolition and expulsion of the religious communities, which, with an iron hand, have hitherto demoralized the actual administration.

8.—Measures conducive to the working, development and prospects of the natural resources of the country shall be adopted. 9.—The development of the public wealth shall be facilitated, together with the opening of roads and railways.

10.—The existing obstacles to the forming of commercial enterprises and investment of foreign capital shall be suppressed. 11.—AT GENERAL WHEELER'S HEADQUARTERS, before Santiago de Cuba, July 15, via Kingston, Jamaica, July 16.

The preliminary basis of the capitulation of the Spanish forces in eastern Cuba was agreed to and signed under a picturesque cactus tree half way between the lines shortly after midnight.

New York, July 16.—A special to the Journal from Siboney gives the following terms of the Spanish capitulation.

The terms of the surrender are that the 20,000 infantry at Siboney and Siboney are to be returned back to the city.

American infantry patrol is to be posted in the roads surrounding the city and the country between the American aviators.

hospitals are to be given attention to any possible sick and wounded among the Spanish soldiers at Santiago.

The United States and Spain to agree to let the Cubans decide by a plebiscite whether they desire independence or autonomy under the suzerainty of Spain.

The government to agree to abide by the result of the plebiscite. In the event of the Cubans voting for independence, the United States to allow Spain six months in which to withdraw her army gradually.

Spain during the last two months between the hour of sunset and sunrise. The decision of the Cabinet to remove these mines now is one of the most signal manifestations of the supreme confidence of the Government in the future, and of the exemption of the United States ports from attacks at day-dramat meetings.

After thoroughly considering the subject, it has been decided by the engineers that the safest and quickest means of removing the mines is by exploding them, and orders to do this have been prepared for transmission to all of the batteries of the engineer officers.

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


