THE SADDEST SPOT IN LONDON.

St. Peter's chapel, at the Tower of London, has probably more sad memories than any place in London. It was there that the head and body of the Duke of Monmouth were placed under the communion table after his execution in 1865. ST. JOHN STAR.

Somalliand, where a British force has met with defeat, losing many officers and men, is on the east coast of Africa, extending southward from the Gulf of Aden and westward to the Soudan. The Statesman's Year Book says:

"The Somali coast from Lahadu, west of Zeyla, to Bendar Ziyada, 49 degrees E, long., became a British protectorate in 1884, and is administered by a consul-general. The area is about 65,000 square miles. No trustworthy estimate can be formed of the population, which is Mohammedan and mostly nomadic. By an arrangement with Italy in 1894, the limits of the British protectorate were defined; but in 1897, by an arrangement with Abyssinia, a fresh boundary as required by the country was determined, and certain tracts were ceded to Abyssinia, thus reducing the area of the protectorate from 75,000 and Bulhar, 12,000. At these three ports there are British officers. The exports are chiefly skins and hides, ostrich feathers, grain, cattle and sheep. Transport is by camels and donkeys. On October 1st, 1898, the control of the government of India since its formation in 1884 was taken over by the British government."



Omaha Said to Be Selected for Finish Fight by Manufacturers.

The vessel has accommodations for 775 cabin passengers, 343 second cabin and 770 steerage. The crew numbers 600, all told. The vessel is fitted with every improvement known to the modern shipbuilder.

The Dominion Iron & Steel Co, will egin work on the construction of acilities for handling coal on Robert-

cogin work on the construction of facilities for handling coal on Robertson's wharf within a few days. D. C. Clark is the contractor for the new wharf and coal pocket to be built.

C. M. O'Dell, engineer for the company, is registered at the Royal, and in conversation with the Sun last night said that the company proposed to build a new wharf of 12 x12 birch and pine, and a trestle work of 18 feet in height, and on top of that a coal pocket 22 feet in height, 240 feet in length, 14 feet in breadth, and sufficiently large to hold 5,000 tons of coal. The pocket is to be a solid wooden structure, stayed with iron tie rods. There will be a steel travelling crane on top with an automatic grab for taking coal out of ships. In addition to that there will be a system of steel chutes set at intervals of five feet through the full length of the face of the pocket, with which to turn coal right into the hatches of ships or lighters moored alongside. In case of a big fire the coal could be turned into the water through the chutes. Underneath will be three roads for carts, which will be loaded from a separate system of chutes. The structure is to be supported on piles which will be driven through the cribs of the wharf as built.

LONG VOYAGE.

A BRITISH REVERSE.

Colonel Plunkett's Force in Somali-land, East Africa, Almost Annihil-ated by the Natives-Only Thirty-Seven Escaped-A Serious Outlook.

today received from Brigadier General Manning, in command of the British forces in Somaliland, a despatch dated twenty miles westward of Guladi, Somaliland, April 18, as follows:

"I regret to report that a fring column under the command of Colonel Cobbe, which left Galadi April 19, to reconnoint the road to Walwat, had a most serious check April 17. On the morning of April 17, Colonel Cobbe was Guraburra, forty miles westward of Caladi, and had decided to return to Galadi. Owing to the difficulty in finding the road to Walwat and the shortness of water, he was about to leave his scheme (protected camp), when firing was heard in the direction of asmall party, under the command of Capt. Oliver, which had been sent in a westerly direction to reconnoitre.

At 9.15 in the morning Col. Cobbe despatched Col. Plunkett with 160 men of the second battalion of the King's African Rifles. 48 men of the second Sikhaa and two maxim guns for the extrication of Capt. Oliver, if necessary. As a maiter of fact Capt. Oliver had not been engaged. Col. Plunkett on joining the detachment, continued to push on. At 11.45 Col. Cobbe heard a heavy fire in the direction taken by Col. Plunkett and about one in the afternoon a few fugitives coming in reported that Col. Plunkett had been defeated.

"The news has been fuly corroborated since and I have to report the total loss of Col. Plunkett's party, with the exception of 37 yaos, who have arrived here.

The latest information extracted from the fugitives is to the effect that Col. Plunkett pushed on after the enemy's force of mounted troops and the enemy's infantry, who attacked at close quarters.
