Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

OTTAWA, April 10—The trade returns of the dominion for the past fiscal year indicate that the increase in Canada's trade with the United States has been considerably more than double the increase in trade with Great Britain. The trade with the other Britain the conservations has remained comparate to the conservations has remained comparate. ish possessions has remained compar atively about the same in volum while the trade with foreign countries other than the United States shows a

other than the United States shows a fair increase.

The figures for the last month of the fiscal year are not yet available but for eleven months ended Feb. 28th last the increase in imports from Great Britain over the corresponding period of 1905-6 was \$13,640,512, and in exports to Great Britain \$9,024,030, making a total increase in trade with Great Britain amounting to \$22,664,542.

During the same period the facrease in imports from the United States was \$31,654,696, and on exports \$18,309,336, making a total increase in trade with the republic of \$49,964,032.

Canada's total trade with the other British possessions increased during the eleven months by \$392,152 and with other foreign countries, other than the United States, the increase was \$4,727,707.

TEMPERANCE FEDERATION AGAIN ANSWERS PREMIER

Contradicting His Most Most Recent Statement Regarding the Much Discussed Memorial

It will be noted that our memorial is in two parts, the one making our formal complaint, the other asking for a Prohibitory Law at this session of the legislature. In urging the need of such a law a good many other instances of violations of the License Law were given, not only in St. John County, but in Kent and Restigouche, and the other counties where the License Law is in force, and it was to these, the very general complaints, that the Premier asked as he quotes: "Is the object of the meeting to make complaint if so we would like to have it formulated and put before us." Mr. Baskin's answer shows that our main purpose was to get a Prohibitory Law and also that considerable discussion had already taken place, for his answer says, "But these things will come in because it is common knowledge, and it was referred to before, that is why I spoke of it." The things Mr. Baskin referred to were far more pertinent to the queston, as to whether or not we made formal complaint other than those the Premier quotes, but would not have proven the Premier's contentions and so were not quoted. Let the Premier publish the whole report, we are content to let the report decide the question between us. Of the fifty and more representative temperance men forming the delegation, we do not believe one can be found to support the Premier's contention.

The Premier's reference to our charge

resolutions were unanimously passed and ordered to be forwarded to, the government:

1. It was resolved. That the executiove committee be directed to present the substance of Section 4 as a complaint against the license commissioners of St. John.

Section 4. Your executive in coperation with the other temperance workers have endeavored to secure the better enforcement of the existing lawerelating to the liquor traffic. Representations were made to the Liquor License Commissioners in St. John towards that end, but with only indifferent results. Ofters of aid and evidence were given, and statements of violation of the laws were made, with offers to prove them, but so far as your executive knows no action has been taken. Your committee is of the opinion that the government and the ordinary officials of the law should enforce all laws concerning the fliquor traffic as they carry out other laws.

2. It was resolved, That the executive be instructed to prepare a draft of a prohibition law similar to the P. E. Island act, and to present the same to the government requesting them to introduce such act into the legislature, and to have it made law at the next session of that body.

A copy of the Prince Edward Island act is appended to the communication. We are respectfully on behalf of the N. B. Temperance Federation, Signed by the president and secretary. 


