vince shall have the guardianship of males until 21 years of age, and of females until 21, unless sooner married, and the institution may transfer such guardianship rights to any persons willing to receive the children. A pen-alty of \$40 is provided for any person who induces such child to leave the employ of persons with whom the in-stitution has placed him, and provision is made for the institution securing possession of the child placed under undesirable conditions.—The bill was agreed to.
