Buildings inspected by the building inspector and declared in a fit condition for repairs are: Presbyterian church, Y. M. C. A. building, Baptist church, Victoria school, library, Land Titles building, the Masonic Temple and the Massey Harris building.

A memorial service for the victims of Sunday's disaster will be held in the near future, although no definite plans have been completed.

LONDON PRESS EULGIZES PREMIER BORDEN ON EVE OF HIS ARRIVAL IN ENGLAND

Mail Calls Him "Leader of Britain's New Working Partner"—Imperial Navy Predicted by Standard

Real Reinforcement of Empire's Sea Strength Will be Outcome of Conference with Admiralty Says London Times—Joint Council of War to Control Fighting Force of Five Nations, Suggested.

London, July 3.—Although the Right Hon. R. L. Borden does not arrive here until tomorrow at the earliest, he is already being made the hero of the hour in the London press.

The Times heads off with the dignified assurance that if London owes it to Mr. Borden to make a great effort to meet him, it is equally ready to bear tribute to the cause he has maintained and the position he has won.

The Ministerial Daily News and Leader presents Mr. Borden to its readers as one who comes to the Mother Country with an unblemished professional and political record in Canada and with a well deserved reputation as a sincere servant of the state.

England's Working Partner. The Daily Mail hails Mr. Borden as a man who looks like leaving a great name in the history of the British Empire as the leader of England's new working partner.

PLANS FOR THE RAILWAYS TO PAY FOR THE IMMIGRANTS

Commission of Ten Per Cent. Goes to Shipping Companies.

Y., July 3.—All railway lines which participate in maintaining the joint ticket agency at Ellis Island, share equally in the business of transporting immigrants to their destination, and in all instances where tickets cost more than \$2.50, the railways pay a 10 per cent. commission to the steamship lines.

For more than 30 years railways have been paying commissions to steamship lines, varying from 5 per cent. to 30 per cent., during days of destructive competition.

FLYNN IS CONFIDENT OF VICTORY

That Las Vegas, N. M., July 3.—A few more that enthusiastic arrived last night and today to witness the Johnson-Flynn battle tomorrow, but the main body of spectators will arrive tonight when several trains are due.

The flight fans found little to amuse them. It was quiet at the camps. Both men did a little light work to keep in trim and devoted their time to writing before the flight.

There has been little change in the betting, 2 to 1 being offered on Johnson to win, with few takers. The Flynn supporters make an offer of \$300 to \$400 and do not appear anxious to get the money down at less than 3 to 1. One of the freak bets is \$50 to \$50 that Johnson will knock out Flynn before the fourth round.

A commentary on these bets is written on the board. "A man on his knees is considered down and a strike wins the fight." As the round, betting the 11th appears to be favored as the termination of the fight, probably because the 11th round at 2:10 if necessary without weakening himself. Flynn expects to fight at about 1:30 pounds. He has said he would weigh from 125 to 135 and probably would try for the happy medium.

Despite the unkind look of the betting board, Flynn is confident he can surprise the champion. He makes no particular prediction as to the round in which he expects to fight to end, contenting himself with the declaration: "I am going to win. Get down on that."

Flynn was not in evidence today, his quarters being located six miles away. Many of the Colorado men's supporters were aboard the special train which got in today from Denver, Pueblo and other Colorado points.

Johnson went off across the country on a long motor trip. He whirled into town at the end of his ride and was on view for some time to the admiring groups on the hotel porch. The champion looked gigantic as he moved among men of ordinary stature.

IMPERIAL PREFERENCE VS. TAFT'S RECIPROCITY.

Having gradually admitted that the West Indian Reciprocity Agreement is "something on account," the Telegraph goes on to laudate the weakness of the Dominion Government's attitude in that "while it has gone to considerable trouble to arrange for a more free exchange of goods with the West Indies, it has set its face against improved trade relations with the United States." It should not be necessary to remind even the Telegraph at this late date the purpose which President Taft's scheme for improved trade relations between Canada and the United States, was designed to accomplish. He made it perfectly clear in his public speeches that the trade Agreement with Canada was to destroy for all time the "imperial commercial band reaching from England around the world to England again." Referring to Reciprocity he said: "We must take it NOW or give it up for ever." If Canada were tied up in a Reciprocity Trade Agreement with the United States which, as Mr. Taft has so candidly admitted, would ultimately transfer all her bank credits and everything else to Chicago and New York, and make her "an adjunct" of the United States, Imperial Preference, of which this arrangement with the West Indies will form a part, would be obviously impossible.

No better argument in support of President Taft's opinion that mutual Preference within the Empire would be a danger and a menace to the trade of the United States, is needed than the information in a despatch published in yesterday's Times. But 3 days have elapsed since the text of the Agreement with the West Indies was made public and the Times announces in large headlines "Try to Block Trade Pact." "New York Produce Exchange and Millers Try Intimidation in West Indies." The despatch is as follows:

Toronto, July 3.—A despatch from Port of Spain, Trinidad says that "throughout the West India Islands and in British Guiana the flour and produce 'merchants in the United States have been doing everything possible to prejudice the West Indians against the proposed Reciprocity Pact with the Dominion of Canada. Bluff after bluff has been made with but poor result and as a last resort, the New York Produce Exchange and United States milling interests have sent down a representative, a barrister named John Foster Dulles, to see how far intimidation will go in the islands. Mr. Dulles has been introduced to principal merchants of the different islands by the United States consuls there, and thus apparent weight has been lent to any statements he has made. This representative of the New York Produce Exchange has been threatening retaliation on the part of the United States right and left, varying the articles on which the United States will discriminate according to the chief industry of the particular colony he was visiting."

Why are the flour and produce merchants and the milling interests in the United States resorting to intimidation and threats of retaliation against the West Indies? What are they afraid of? They realize that by this measure of mutual preference between Canada and the Islands they will lose the West Indian market. Canada will secure the trade that has hitherto been getting money in their pockets. The Times' despatch supplies the Telegraph with two facts which it may well ponder over. It shows the advantage, which even its enemies admit, of mutual preference within the Empire and that no mutual trade preference within the Empire would have been possible if equal concessions had been given to the United States.

GENERAL ELECTION RESULTS.

During the recent Provincial campaign the Telegraph and Times constantly harped on the string that New Brunswick was a Liberal Province and claimed that the Hazen and Flemming Governments only held power by the grace of the Liberal party. It was pointed out by The Standard at the time that while the Hazen Government had enjoyed the support of a large number of Liberals, and that the indications were that his Liberal support was increasing, the strength of the Liberal party in Federal politics was on the decline and had been for some years; and that at the present time it was weaker than it had been since it became a factor in the politics of this Province.

It was shown that there were open ruptures in many counties, and over the whole Province there was general dissatisfaction with the Liberal leadership. While the party was in power at Ottawa the rank and file did not openly revolt, but from the hour following the defeat of the Laurier Administration it was evident to all who had given attention to the political situation in New Brunswick that the majority in the Liberal party would no longer submit to the machine in control, but would demand new leaders, failing which they would desert the party.

The results in the last Provincial General Elections showed very clearly that The Standard had not overdrawn the present condition of the Liberal party in New Brunswick. Notwithstanding the hysterical appeals of the Telegraph and Times, organs of the Liberal machine in St. John, independent Liberal electors refused to be either coaxed or dragged into supporting Mr. Pugsley's candidature, and administered a stinging rebuke to the machine, such as has never been known in the political history of this Province.

In the Federal General Elections of 1908 the total vote cast was 75,061, of which the Liberal candidates received 40,716 and the Conservatives 34,345, showing a Liberal majority of 5,771. In the General Elections of 1911 the total vote cast was 79,074, or 3,413 more than in 1908. The Liberal candidates secured of this vote 40,194, or 222 less than in 1908. The Conservative candidates secured 38,880 votes, or 3,995 more than in 1908. In other words they received all of the increase in the vote and captured 522 from the Liberals as well; and at the same time reduced the majority of the Liberals in three years from 5,771 to 1,314, a gain of 4,457 votes. As Mr. Michael had 1889 majority in Madawaska County since it will be seen that the other counties in the Province were quite close and that the boasted strength of the Liberals throughout the Province was largely mythical. What it did not do was to claim that Provincial Elections are on purely party lines in this Province. In some counties 1912 was, in others they are not. In the last

Provincial Election the Liberal machine represented the old Government of the Province, which Mr. Hazen defeated in 1908. For the last ten years they had given the Province the worst Government it ever had. The country had been needlessly plunged into debt and its credit exploited for the purpose of enriching a few political friends. In 1908 the people recognized that it was time for a change, and they turned the Government out. In the intervening years they enjoyed good government—the best the Province ever had and there was no desire for a change. Indeed the people were so unanimous on this question that only one county voted against the Government, and because of purely local issues another county elected two Independents—four in a House of 48. There has never been such unanimous support ever given a Government as that received by Mr. Fleming on his first appeal to the people.

When Mr. Hazen appealed to the people in 1908 he had arrayed against him a Government in power and the whole strength of the Federal Government led by Mr. Pugsley, then Minister of Public Works. Yet he carried 15 of the 16 constituencies in the Province. Mr. Robinson, his opponent, carried only three and one constituency elected independent members. The total vote cast in 1908 was 61,488, of which the Hazen candidates received 32,769 against 28,728 for the candidates of the Robinson Government. Mr. Hazen had, therefore, a majority of 4,032 of the popular vote.

There were ten candidates for three seats in Gloucester in that year. Three Independents were elected. The highest of these received 2,341 votes. Another candidate who was defeated received 330 votes. This increased the total popular vote to 64,212.

In the election of 1912 the total vote cast for straight Government and Opposition candidates was 64,149, of which supporters of Mr. Fleming received 29,965 and of Mr. Copp 24,484, giving Mr. Fleming a majority of 15,181, or 1,149 greater than Mr. Hazen received in 1908.

There were no Copp candidates in Northumberland County where two Independents were elected. The number of votes given the highest of these was 2,102, which makes the total popular vote cast 66,301.

THE SENATE.

The Toronto News has been studying out means by which the Borden Government may overcome the veto of the Senate. When existing vacancies are filled there will be still only twenty-eight Conservatives to fifty-nine Liberals in the Chamber. Nine additional Senatorships are due the West, and if these are filled with Conservatives there will still be a Liberal majority of sixteen in the House of ninety-six members. The News suggests that the power to appoint six extra Senators which the constitution allows to the Government in case of deadlock should be evoked.

The Vancouver News-Advertiser expresses the opinion that this expedient will probably not be found necessary. If the Opposition majority is reduced to sixteen by appointments to available seats, and a further normal change of five or six a year is made, the problem will not last long. There will not be many Senate vetoes next session. Before the present Parliamentary term is ended the Conservatives will control the Senate.

In that event Mr. Borden may, perhaps, be able to carry out a scheme of Senate reform, as is demanded by his platform. It is not certain, because Mr. Borden's friends in the Senate will be quite independent, and those who have been Senators longer than Mr. Borden has been Premier may have their own ideas of Senate reform. We know that Sir Wilfrid put in a non possumus plea to explain his failure to give effect to his Senate reform platform.

ELEVEN THOUSAND SKELETONS (London Chronicle).

The necessary removal of 1,000 crypt under the parish church at Rothwell, Northamptonshire, revives the question of the origin of these bones. Rothwell was once an important place, but never important enough to own so many skeletons. Moreover a large proportion of them bear the marks of wounds, but the theory that they originated in some battle is negatived by the fact that many of them are those of women. Moreover no battle has been fought near there except the battle of Naseby, and less than a thousand men were killed in that fight. Even the ancient battles between the Danes and the Saxons were all recorded, and there is no story of such a battle as this.

The crypt itself is of unknown age and the mystery is further increased by the fact that the bones were first discovered, nearly 200 years ago, they were carefully arranged in layers with the skulls on top, then the legs, and then the coffins. They have now been removed and placed on selves—a sight well worth seeing by the curious tourist.

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The News in Guarantee Seen as Short Meter First Necessity of Trans-Persian Line LOCAL.

Interesting Letter from Merchant Familiar with Territory to be Traversed—Proposed Route Unsatisfactory... London, July 3.—An interesting contribution to the Trans-Persian railway question is provided by a letter to the press written by H. F. B. Lynch, senior partner of a firm of eastern merchants, and a man who has travelled extensively in the countries of the middle east, for scientific, political and commercial purposes. Mr. Lynch was responsible for the inauguration of a new river service under the British flag on the Karun river, and for the survey and opening of a new route, 270 miles long, to Persia.

St. John people accustomed to an equitable summer climate and cool refreshing sea breezes would be mightily put out if the temperature climbed up to near a hundred in the shade.
