Sydney, June 11.—The Whitney Pier district of Sydney was hit this afternoon by the most disastrous fire which has occurred here since the great biaze of 1901. Some twenty buildings, including the Catholic church of the Holy Redeemer, Holy Redeemer convent, and the Glebe House, are burning the catholic church and the Great House and the State of the catholic church and the state

The homeless are being cared for by neighbors. The fire brigades of North Sydney and Sydney Mines were rushed to the scene as soon as the news of the fire was received, and gave valuable assistance. It was very fortunate that the strong wind which blew was from the west, as the fire, when it had swept the short space between the church buildings and the open country beyond Victoria road had nothing to feed on. With the wind in any other direction the loss would likely have been many times greater.
