### FURTHER PARTICULARS OF THE TERRIBLE TRAGEDY AT PROSPECT CAPE—ONLY 300 OUT OF 1,038 SAVED.

HALIFAX, N. S., April 2. One of the most terrible marine disasters that ever occurred in the West Indies, the Atlantic of the White Star Line, at 2 o'clock yesterday morning, on the Head, Prospect, 22 miles west of the city. She left Liverpool on the 20th March, New York. The Captain wished to put into Halifax for coal. She struck several times. Only one boat was launched when she sank, carrying the boat with her. Help at last came from the shore. Only three or four cabin passengers were saved, one Englishman and two or three Frenchmen. Only one lady passenger attempted to save herself, and she strove to death in the rigging and fell into the water. The purser was among the lost. Some of the passengers arrived in the city to-day, and give harrowing details of the calamity. The names of the officers or passengers saved are not known yet. The steamer is expected up at two o'clock. The Atlantic had 850 steamer and 30 saloon passengers. There were 2 births during the voyage. The crew numbered 142. Stowaways, 14. 300 were saved out of a total number of 1038.
