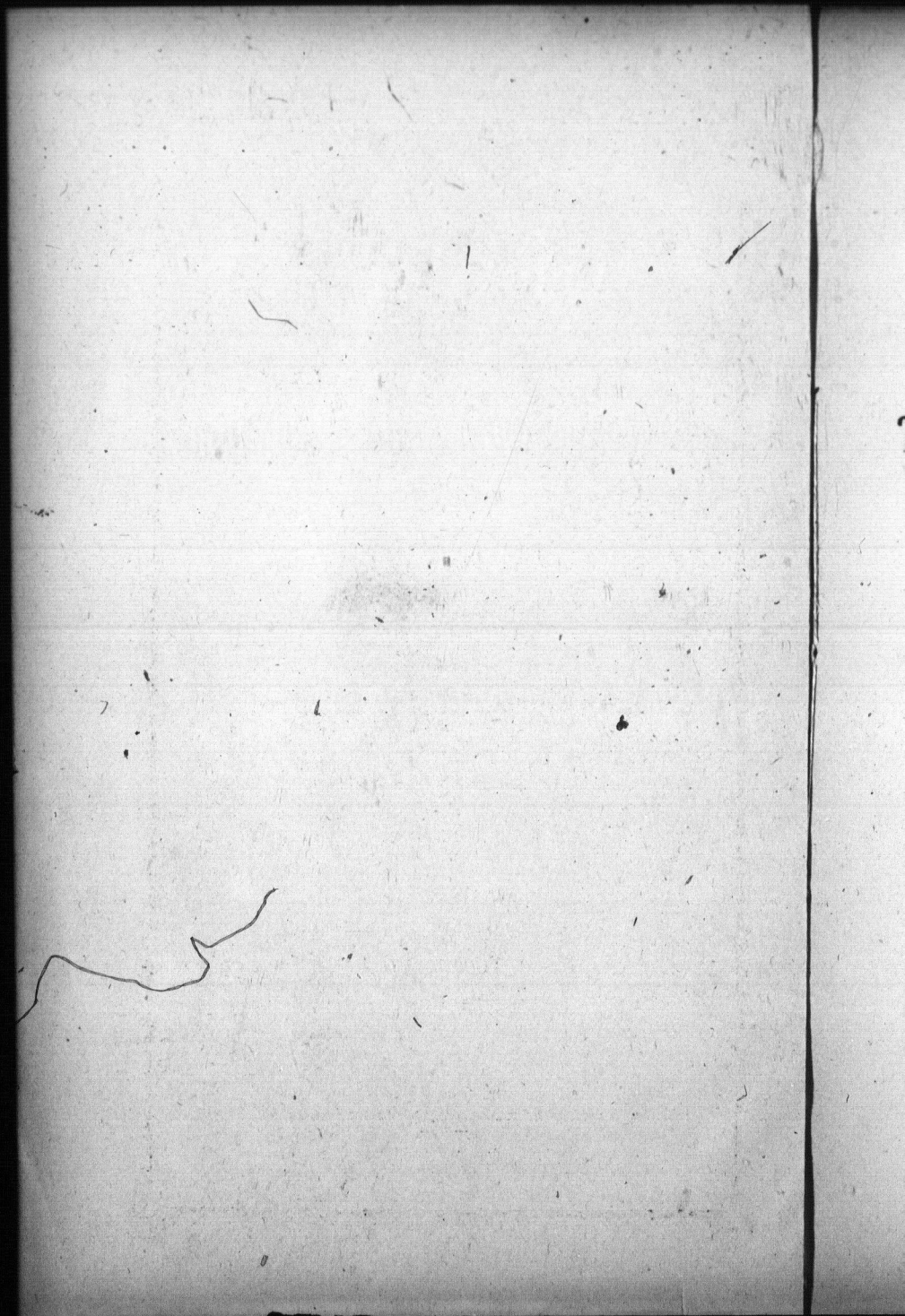

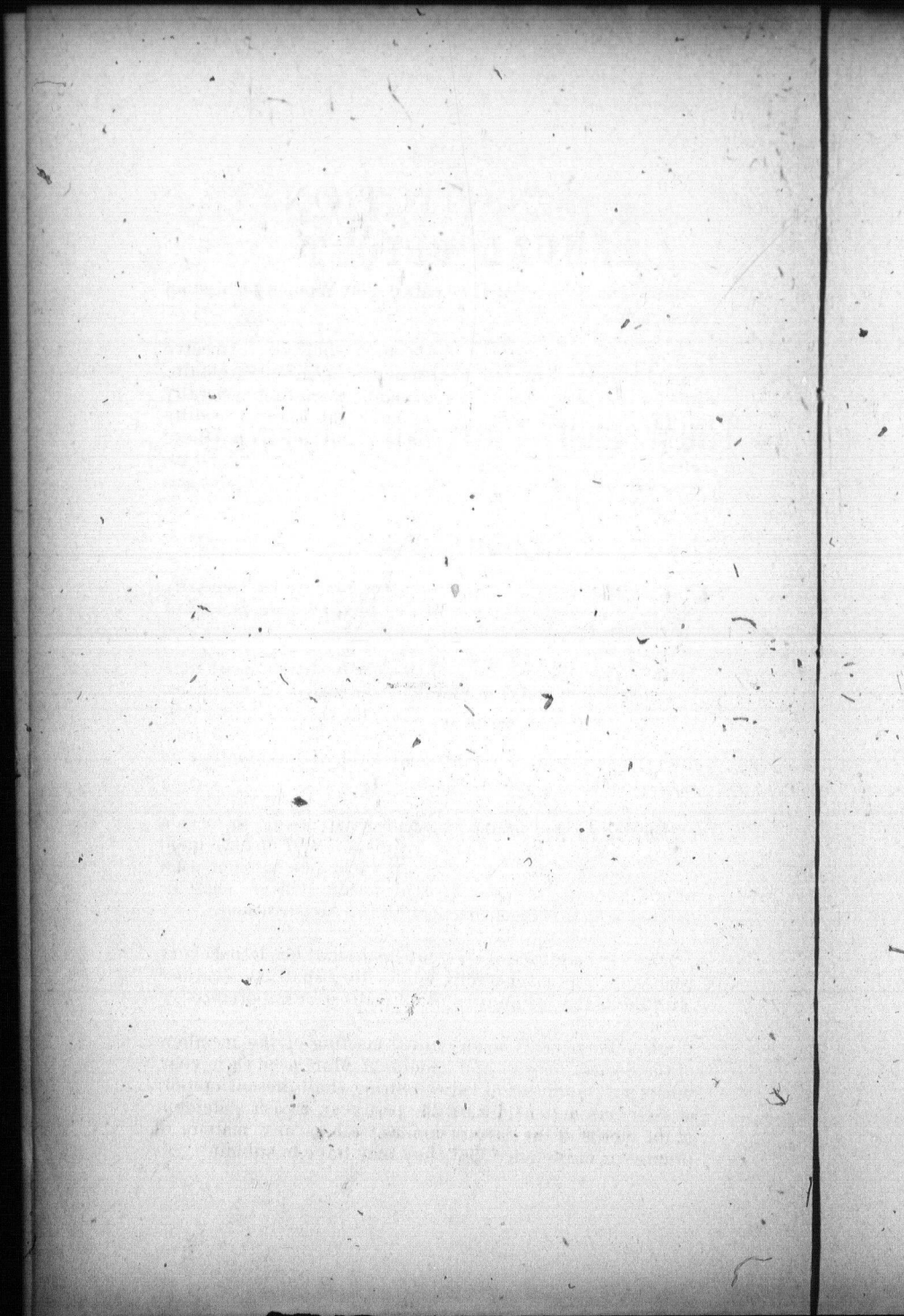

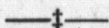

CONSTITUTION.



1st.—The Society shall be called The Women's Christian Association, of Quebec.

2nd.—The object of the Association shall be to receive young women, who come as strangers to the city; obtaining for them board and employment; attending generally to their temporal and moral welfare; providing a reading room, and library for young women, and premises where meetings of ladies connected with different benevolent institutions may be held, and for other benevolent purposes of a like nature.

3rd.—The Society shall be strictly undenominational.

4th.—Any person on payment of one dollar annually shall be a Member, and be entitled to vote at the annual or general Meeting.

5th.—The Officers of the Association shall consist of a President, four Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary, and an Assistant-Secretary. The Officers, with not less than thirty other ladies who shall be elected for that purpose at the annual meeting, shall form the Committee of Management of the Association.

6th.—The said committee shall have power to form a code of laws for the general regulation and management of the Association, and to fill up vacancies in their own numbers during the year, provided that nothing shall be enacted which is inconsistent with the constitution.

7th.—A committee of six gentlemen shall be elected every year at the annual meeting, whose duty shall be to advise with the ladies' committee in all matters of importance.

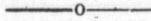
8th.—There shall be an annual meeting of the members of the Society held in the month of March in each year, when the committee of ladies retiring shall present a report of their transactions during the past year, a cash statement of the affairs of the Association, as well as any matters of interest or importance that they may have to submit.

9th.—The fiscal year of the Association shall close on the first of March.

10th.—The visits and religious instruction of the clergy of the city of all denominations shall be gladly welcomed by the Association.

11th.—All elections shall be made by ballot.

12th.—This Constitution shall not be amended, nor repealed, nor any addition made to it except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at the annual meeting.

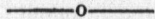


Committee of Management.

1st.—The Committee of Management shall meet on the first Tuesday in each month for the transaction of business; five shall form a quorum. At this meeting the ladies for duty during the month shall be appointed.

2nd.—The office-bearers of the Association, with four visiting ladies, shall form an acting Committee for the month, and shall meet every Tuesday, for the transaction of ordinary business. Three shall form a quorum.

3rd.—General meetings of the Association may be called by the President, at the request of not less than nine members thereof, and special meetings of the Committee of Management, may be called by the President at the request of not less than five of its members. Special meetings of the acting committee may be called by the President at her discretion.



Duties of Officers.

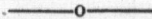
1st.—The duty of the President shall be to preside at all meetings; strictly preserve order; to appoint Committees, and to be arbitress in all debates.

2nd.—The first Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shall act in her stead; in the absence of both one of the other Vice-Presidents, in the absence of all these officers the Committee shall elect a President *pro tem*.

3rd.—The duty of the Treasurer shall be to receive subscriptions and donations, and make all payments authorized by the Committee, she shall keep a list of the inmates, and, when absent, send her book for inspection.

4th.—The duty of the Secretary shall be to take minutes of and record the names of the members of the Committee present at each meeting, to read the reports of the Committees and the minutes of the last meeting, and to prepare and read the annual report and correspondence.

5th.—The duty of the Assistant-Secretary shall be to notify all officers and members of the Committee of Management of their election, and members of sub-committees of their appointment, to answer all letters, and keep a list of members and their addresses.



Order of Business.

1st.—The meetings shall open and close with prayer.

2nd.—The meetings shall be called to order, after which no person to speak, except on the subject under discussion.

3rd.—Reading the minutes of last meeting.

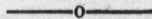
4th.—Recording the names of the members of Committee present.

5th.—Reading correspondence.

6th.—Reading reports of Committees.

7th.—Resolutions, Propositions, Debates.

8th.—Reading minutes of the present meeting.



Ladies on Duty.

1st.—The four ladies on duty for the month shall arrange amongst themselves the division of their duties.

2nd.—One or more of them shall visit the rooms daily; see that order and cleanliness exist throughout the establishment, take note of and report, for the information of the acting Committee, any matters of interest or importance in connection with the affairs of the Association to which their attention has been directed during the week.

Duties of the Matron.

1st.—The Matron will carry out all the rules of the establishment, and endeavor in every way to obey the orders of the ladies on duty.

2nd.—She will have prayers with the inmates every morning and evening.

3rd.—She will see that all meals are properly cooked and served, and promote in every way the health and comfort of the inmates.

4th.—She will examine the persons and boxes of inmates on first entering and on leaving, and superintend a thorough ablution.

5th.—She will be especially careful to see that no spirituous liquors are brought into the house, except by the order of the attending physician.

6th.—At the end of each month she will report to the ladies on duty any loss or breakage of the house property that may have occurred during the month.

The fifth Annual Meeting of this Association was held at the Rooms, Artillery Park, on Tuesday, 9th March, at 3 o'clock. The Chair was taken by W. C. Scott, Esq., and the meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. LeRoy Hooker, and Bible reading by the Rev. D. Marsh.

FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
Women's Christian Association.

— § —

In reviewing the work of the Women's Christian Association for the past year, our first thought is one of gratitude to Almighty God for the many tokens of His love and favor that He has bestowed on us. We have had many trials and difficulties, especially during the autumn, when the funds were all but exhausted and no provision made for the winter; but God's bountiful grace and mercy have supplied all our need, and we have realized that He is able to do above all that we can ask or think.

It is a matter of congratulation that the objects of this Association are being better understood and appreciated by the class for whom they were intended, and each succeeding year shows the increasing necessity for such an institution. The limits of a general report prevent us entering into details, but very interesting accounts might be given of the inmates, many of whom are bereft of home and kindred, and who find here a shelter where they receive sympathy and encouragement.

In order to dispel any misunderstanding that may still exist on the subject, we would again repeat that this Association is intended to assist respectable women of all classes, who are dependant on their own exertions for support. These include women of education and refinement, sewing girls and domestic servants of all grades, besides others of whose antecedents we know nothing beyond the written recommendation that every applicant for admission is required to produce. In dealing with characters and dispositions so varied, much care and tact are required, but under the superintendence of our good matron, Mrs. Cochrane, harmony and good feeling have prevailed, and the success of the Home is in a great measure due to her judicious management. The regulation charge

is 17 cents per day, but this varies according to the means of the inmates, and those who are unable to pay are required to assist in the house-work.

This year there have been 68 inmates, being an increase of 14 over last year, and there are now 27 in the building; 2 deaths have occurred in the lower rooms during the year.

Hospital and District Visiting continue to be carried on, and this branch of the Association calls earnestly for more workers. It is generally supposed that each Church provides for its own poor, but a number of families come under the notice of the Committee, either belonging to very poor parishes, or else not directly connected with any Church. These the Committee have endeavoured to assist, and in some instances they subscribe to pay the rent.

The flower mission was greatly extended last summer, and many sick and sorrowing ones were cheered and comforted by the little bouquets, each containing a pretty and appropriate text of Scripture. Flowers sent for this purpose to the Association rooms on Tuesday mornings, would be thankfully received.

The Committee desire to state, that although they have been compelled for various reasons to give up the Magdalen Asylum, yet they have not ceased their efforts to reclaim the lost, and some of the ladies are still engaged in this most trying and embarrassing of all Christian work. As a result of their labors, one who had been instrumental in leading others astray, has been induced to abandon her evil course, and is now living with respectable friends.

The annual entertainment to the poor took place last month, under Miss Latimer's able direction, and owing to the increased number of invited guests, it was found necessary to divide them, by having the adults first, and the children the next day. The preparations for the feast were most bountiful, and were much enjoyed by the company who numbered about 300, many who had never attended before being only too glad to accept the invitation. Addresses were given by clergymen of the different denominations, and the whole proceedings were marked by a decorum, scarcely to be expected in so mixed an assembly.

This institution was honored in July, by an informal visit from Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise, who manifested much interest in the work, and inscribed her name on the visitors book.

We regret that we were unable to send delegates to the International Conference, held in Cleveland in the month June, but special meetings were held here, and interesting and instructive papers read on the subjects that were discussed at the Conference. A report of our work was sent, and a message of greeting telegraphed from Titus 3-15.

The Committee greatly regret that their funds will not permit them to continue to carry on the Coffee Room as a branch of the Association.

The long delay in obtaining the Government grant, caused much inconvenience, and a great deal of time was spent in making money instead of being devoted to other and higher purposes; but the necessary expenses had to be paid, and the Committee greatly rejoice, that by God's blessing, their efforts have been successful, and they have been kept free from the oppressive thralldom of debt.

The Government grant was received last month, and is thankfully acknowledged; also, the services of T. H. Oliver, Esq., in obtaining the same, and giving much valuable information.

Two Sales of Work have been held this year; one at Easter, in the Morrin College, to the Trustees of which we tender our sincere thanks, and the other at Christmas in our own rooms. The Sewing Meetings are still continued, and a number of articles are now ready for sale.

A Harvest Festival, originated and successfully carried through by Miss Roberts, was held in September, and realized the sum of \$48.

Two Concerts have been held under Miss Chesley's management.

WEDNESDAY—Association Sewing Meeting.

THURSDAY—St. Peter's Church Sewing Meeting.

A Meeting is sometimes held in the evening for young women serving in shops, and others who are engaged during the day. The Committee are much indebted to the Clergymen who have kindly conducted the meetings on these occasions.

The first week in February being observed in other Associations as a week of prayer for young women, special meetings were held here.

The Committee are indebted to Drs. Marsden, Rowand and Parke for medical attendance ; to the Editor of the *Morning Chronicle* for a daily edition of his paper, for the insertion of frequent notices and numerous other favors ; to the Editors of " Faith and Works " for a monthly edition of their paper ; to a friend for a barrel of flour ; to Mr. Wallace for the use of a glass case and the loan of furniture, &c. ; to Mr. Stanley for a supply of stationery ; to Mr. McWilliam for contributions to the refreshment tables ; to Messrs. Norris and Hatch for the loan of crockery ; to Mr. Ruthman for a side of bacon ; to Mr. Corneil for painting advertisements ; to the friends who have sent parcels of books, clothing, vegetables, &c. ; and to all who assisted at the Festivals, Concerts and other entertainments.

The Association was unusually fortunate in receiving Christmas donations. The Lieut.-Governor sent a sheep and some codfish ; Mrs. Russell, of Levis, sent fowls, plum-pudding, &c. ; Mr. Delaney sent a round of beef and 2 tongues ; other friends sent turkeys, geese, plum-pudding, cakes, &c.

Several donations of money have been received, and will be found in the Treasurer's report.

All are thankfully acknowledged.

On the 31st of January, an official notice was received through James Gibb, Esq., that the Government intended to resume possession of the Artillery Park on the 1st of

May. This news caused much consternation, as the Building is admirably adapted to the needs of the Association, and the Committee have been at some expense in having the rooms papered, and making other improvements; while the exceedingly low state of their funds would prevent their renting a suitable house. An appeal was made to the Minister of Militia, and the advisory Committee very kindly got up a petition, signed by the Protestant clergy, the leading Merchants, and other prominent citizens. The Committee are awaiting the result of this before taking any further steps. Our best thanks are due to the gentlemen who interested themselves on our behalf, especially to John Thomson, Esq., to whose unwearied exertions and never-failing kindness we are deeply indebted. We cannot but regret the possibility of leaving the dear old home, which is associated with so many fond memories of pleasant companionship and spiritual blessing, and we feel that we are entering upon a new phase of existence; but we commit our way unto the Lord, trusting that the same Loving Hand which has led us safely through so many perplexities, will continue to guide and uphold us. We acknowledge that much that might have been accomplished has been left undone, and earnestly invite others to assist in furthering the interests of this Association. There are the poor, the sick and the sorrowing, to be visited and comforted, and a home to be provided for the stranger and the homeless. May we be not slothful in business, but fervent in spirit, striving to serve the Lord with all the talents He has given us.

At the close of another year the Committee submit to the public a statement of their proceedings.

Last Spring we found it advisable to move to a more capacious building, involving a considerable additional expense. We trusted from the premises being in a better situation, to have met with increased success. But our hopes in this respect have not been fully realized; to some extent attributable to the lesser means of the people generally, arising from the depression of trade. Neverthe-

less the Committee have ventured to continue their work for another year, relying upon the material aid of all the friends of Temperance. Without such liberal aid, they shall be obliged to discontinue the work at the end of the year. It rests with the Christian public of Quebec to decide. The Committee would express their obligations to the Women's Christian Association for their friendly co-operation, which we regret to say they will *now* reluctantly be unable to continue.

Our objects are to provide cheerful rooms for working men, with cheapest and best Temperance Refreshments, Books, Periodicals, Newspapers and Games, where an interest can be taken in their welfare and that of their families, in short a Working Men's Club, where everything shall be refining and elevating morally and spiritually.

In the Dining Room, meals and refreshments are served between 6 A.M., and 10 P.M., daily, (Sundays excepted.) Everything is of the best quality, well cooked and nicely served. The charges are very low, for instance, Dinner 10 to 20 cents, Soup 2 cents per plate, Coffee 3 cents per cup. 9,194 persons have been furnished with meals during the year. *No intoxicating beverages are sold or allowed on the premises under any circumstances whatever.*

The Rooms continue to be kindly furnished with Newspapers, etc. Two (2) Bagatelle Boards recently added prove a source of amusement to many visitors. A comfortable lodging-room has been provided for the accommodation of strangers. The Committee continue to hold Cottage Meetings semi-weekly, on Sundays and Thursdays, with an average attendance of about forty-five; as well as a Prayer Meeting the last Monday in every month, to which all are cordially welcome. In humble dependence upon the Divine blessing, the Committee have "cast their bread upon the waters" and look forward to the fulfilment of the Lord's own gracious promise, "that they shall find it after many days."

The Temperance Meetings on Tuesdays are well attended and have been productive of gratifying results. These meetings were originated and have been promoted by the men who frequent our Coffee Room. At first the attendance was very limited but it gradually increased and our Tem-

perance membership now numbers seventy-four. This organization, under God's blessing, promises to be a source of lasting benefit to many families. The Monthly Concerts in connection with the above have been much enjoyed and appreciated. Our thanks are due to the clergy and many kind friends who have aided us, and we are also specially grateful to Miss Chesley for an excellent Concert conducted by her.

We desire to thank Capt. Dutton, R.N., for an interesting lecture delivered on our behalf. Miss Latimer, for her kindness in collecting a sum sufficient to colour the outside of the building, as well as for her valuable help at all times so cheerfully given.

We acknowledge the kindness of friends, whose subscriptions enabled us to purchase a Bagatelle Board. Our thanks are due to the Rev. C. Hamilton for the use of a second board.

The Committee also desire to express their sincere thanks to the many friends who have kindly assisted at the entertainments and meetings. The untiring services of Miss Twedell, and the Misses Jarvis are worthy of *special mention*.

Our thanks are due to the publishers of the "Morning Chronicle," "Mercury," "L'Événement," and "L'Éclairer" for their continuous generosity in giving to the "Rooms" a copy of their publications, and to the other kind friends who occasionally send us newspapers, donations of books, etc.

The Committee would take this opportunity of stating that on application at the Rooms the services of working men and women may be obtained.

The Committee would express their *entire satisfaction* with the diligent attention of the Superintendent and his wife, and regret that the salary paid to the former is so small.
