BIRTH CONTROL VIEWS EXPRESSED BY RACE LEADERS

June Number of Medical Publication
Takes up Question as it Might Con-
cern Negroes.

NEW YORK—The June number of the Birth Control Review is devoted almost entirely to a series of articles by eminent Negro writers and sociologists on the subject of birth control. Although comparatively few people, white or black will admit an interest in birth control from a scientific viewpoint, it is an open secret that birth control is being practiced in various ways by thousands of women. Certainly the subject is of sufficient importance from the standpoint of study of the aims of the American health and economics to merit a Birth Control League.

The Negro Number of the Birth Control Review has among its most interesting contributions articles by W. E. B. DuBois, editor of the Crisis; Charles S. Johnson, Director of the Department of Social Science of Fisk University; George S. Schuyler, well-known columnist; D. M. O. Bousefield, chairman of the Public Health Committee of the National Medical Association of Negro Physicians; Elmer A. Carter, editor of Opportunity and other Negroes prominent in education and social welfare activities. Seen as Helpful.

Miss Stella Hanau, editor of the Review, in an interview expressed the hope that Negroes will develop an increasing interest in scientific contraceptive methods as a safe and sane substitute for the many practices now prevalent, which are a menace to health and marital happiness. Miss Hanau states that she hopes that "Negroes" will not feel that they are a class being singled out for concentrated effort by this organization. It is the opinion of numerous leaders of the movement that many Negro women who would welcome contraceptive information are being deprived of it because of lack of knowledge of the value of such information. It is our hope that by the dissemination of this information and the co-operation of Negro physicians and social workers the passing of proper legislation may be hastened so that those who need such information may receive it.

Neglect of Negro Market

WASHINGTON, June.—That the Negro Market is being carefully studied by the distributors of merchandise and space buyers is quite evident from two recent interviews in Editor and Publisher.

Advertisements which depict Negroes as comedians or which portray them as decaying menial or subservient positions arouse resentment in many of their race and have a definite tendency to be ineffective among colored buyers, according to Jas. A. Jackson, business specialist of the Department of Commerce.

Proves Prolific.

Mr. Jackson pointed out to advertisers that the Negro Market frequently is overlooked, consciously, by sales managers in search of new fields. If the Negro field is to be cultivated, however, Mr. Jackson said, advertisers should bear in mind a few facts which have been proved by actual surveys among urban Negroes of the South.

"The Negro responds to advertisements in much the same manner as his white brother," said Mr. Jackson, "though there are some things he does not like.

Definite tests made with Negroes both male and female, have shown adverse reaction to advertisements of this nature, though the intention was not to offend, but merely to amuse. For example, the Negro resents advertisements embodying ante-bellum ideas, such as the mammy working for her white mistress or old "Uncle Eben" being subservient to his master.

They do not like representations of Negroes performing menial tasks and they do not relish pictures which portray white persons in positions superior to Negroes. For example, if a doctor is shown administering to his patients they do not like to see a white doctor, however, kindly he may appear, attending colored patients. There are competent colored doctors and the Negro believes they should be given a break."

Just Be Natural.
"The best advice to manufacturers considering advertising in Negro newspapers is to "be natural." Address your colored customers in the same language you would use for white customers. Do not attempt to "talk down" to them and don't under any circumstances use "nigger talk" in advertisements.

"It has been found that advertisements of cosmetics, for instance, appeal to colored buyers if photographs of colored women are to be used.

Why shouldn't they be more interested if they believe a certain preparation is used by women of their own race than if they are merely told that some Hollywood star uses it?"

12 Held for Lynching

IRONTON, O. June 16— Twelve white men were placed in the jail at South Point, Ohio, near here without bond in connection with the finding of the body of Luke Murray Atlanta, Georgian chargeur, in the Ohio River Saturday.

Was Taken From Jail.
Murray was taken from the South Point jail Tuesday night by about 25 men after he had been jailed for threatening two white men with a knife. It then was presumed he had been frightened out of the town.

The 12 men under arrest deny knowledge of taking Murray from the South Point jail. Those held are Theodore Johnson, Taylor Napier, Willard Massie, former constable and his two sons, Garland and Milford, Ray Robinson, Ben and James Hall, Ralph and Lewis McKee, Clyde Elkins and William Johnson.

Murray came to South Point last week as chauffeur for Howard Davidson of Atlanta, who had come north to settle a family estate.

Good Year for Atlanta

Atlanta, Ga.—The Atlanta School of Social Work, local institution for the training of Negro social workers, is enjoying the best year of its history, according to Director Forrester B. Washington. In spite of the depression, there has been a twenty-five per cent increase in enrollment, which now numbers more than fifty. Nineteen states and twenty colleges are represented in the student body. The school, it is said, is fast outgrowing its quarters.

Two new courses have been added to the curriculum, "Social Work and the Law," which is taught by Mr. Edward M. Kahn, director of the Jewish Educational Alliance, and "Crime and the Negro," taught by Prof. W. R. Chivers, of Morehouse College.

Apparently the demand for Negro social workers is increasing with the result that the school has been remarkably successful in placing its graduates. These facts are naturally attracting a high type of student.







Musicians and friends and admirers of music throughout the Dominion of Canada will learn with keen satisfaction that the activities of the Canadian Bureau for the Advancement of Music have not been adversely affected by disturbed economic conditions. Rather is the reverse true. Competitors and their friends from this district will learn with pleasure that the Bureau has received more enquiries than ever before for the competitions at the Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto. Classes will be offered in the following:

Ladies choirs (three parts); ladies' choirs (four parts); men's choirs; vocal quartettes and duets; vocal solos, including a special class for choir boys only; violin; cello and viola solos; stringed instruments—trios and quartettes; piano solos and duets; cornet, trombone and Euphonium solos; brass quartettes; harmonica solos and bands; bagpipe competitions and Old Time Fiddlers competitions.

Atlanta, Ga., J Miss Florence M. Read, president of Spelman College, has just been notified that one of her alumnae, Miss Ida Louise Miller, has been for the second time awarded a year's scholarship in Mount Holyoke College, where she is now in school.

The award was made by the Racial Minority Scholarship Committee of the college, which administers a fund established there to provide an annual scholarship for some Negro girl of outstanding promise. This scholarship was awarded last year to Miss Miller, then a student in Spelman College, and has been renewed for a year in recognition of the fine record she has made so far at Mount Holyoke. It provides \$1,000 a year for board and tuition.

Miss Miller is an Atlanta girl and attended Booker Washington and Spelman high schools, before entering Spelman College. In college here she took highest rank in scholarship, was president of the freshman class, served on the student council and the staff of the college paper, and was prominent in dramatics.

New Head at Memphis

Memphis, Tenn.—Dr. Louis Levy, president of the Council of Social Agencies, has been elected chairman of the Memphis Interracial Committee and has entered upon his duties in that connection, according to an announcement by J. D. Burton, Interstate Interracial Secretary for Alabama and Tennessee. Dr. Levy's acceptance of the chairmanship augurs well for the work of the committee, in view of his wide contacts and rich experience in welfare work. Memphis with a large population of both races, is a strategic city in race relations, and one in which there is particular need for an active and effective agency for mutual understanding and adjustment.

The Memphis committee includes many representative and influential citizens, among them being representatives of the departments of health and schools, the juvenile court, the children's bureau, the Tuberculosis society, the civic clubs, and other social agencies.
