COLLINS TO BE HANGED APRIL 25TH

No Investigation Yet Ordered into Rumors of Previous Foul Play in New Ireland.

Hopewell Cape, Jan. 24.—Thos. Collins, charged with having, on or about Aug. 19th, 1906, murdered Miss Mary Ann MacAulay, cousin and housekeeper of Rev. Father MacAulay, at New Ireland, Albert Co., was today convicted by the jury, and sentenced Judge Gregory to be hanged on April 25th next. The trial had lasted ten days. Hon. H. A. McKeown and Jas. Sherren defending the prisoner.

Mr. McKeown made a strong plea for the prisoner, showing that the priest's house had been robbed some time before while occupants were absent; that there were rumors of a pedlar having disappeared in the village shortly before, certain villagers' names being associated with the disappearance; and that the bloodstained axe had been hidden where found long after Collins had left the house; but on the other side, Collin's conflicting stories, and his failure to say anything in his own defence, as well as the Judge's strong charge against him, rendered the defence's position open to serious objections; and the verdict, after two and a half hours' deliberation, was "Guilty."

Kent and Northumberland Temperance Delegates Meet at Harcourt.

OVER 500 MEMBERS.

Encouraging Reports Received—Branch of N. B. Temperance Federation Formed for Kent Co.

The fifth session of Kent-Northumberland District Division Sons of Temperance, met in the Temperance Hall in Harcourt on the 23rd January, 1907. District Worthy Patriarch Thomas A. Clarke of Newcastle in the chair. Besides the chairman, there were present, Grand Scribe Rev. C. W. Hamilton Sackville; District Scribe H. H. Stuart, Newcastle; Revs. R. H. Staver and J. B. Champion and other visiting members of Harcourt and Grandville Divisions, and the following delegates:—Harcourt Division, No. 438—Stipendiary Magistrate, L. J. Wathen, Stephen M. Dunn, Melvin B. Dunn, Ernest E. Buckerfield, Hazen Wylie, and the Misses Flora A. Powell, Marion Wathen, Jessie P. Dunn, Mary Keswick, and Lela E. Ingram. Grandville, No. 440—Mrs. Geo. A. Jonah. Newcastle, No. 45—Mrs. Henry Ingram.

The following officers were appointed pro tem:—D. Cond. M. B. Dunn; D. Chap. Rev. C. W. Hamilton; D. P. W. P. S. M. Dunn; D. Sentinel, E. E. Buckerfield.

Minutes of last session (August 8, 1906) were read and approved. Dist. Scribe's account for \$1.75 for postage, etc., was received and on motion of L. J. Wathen, adopted.

Dist. Scribe read his report on the state of the order. Eight Divisions had reported officially for the quarter ending Dec. 31st, 1906; and the Grand Scribe, who had lately visited the three non-reporting Divisions—Silver Stream Division, Black Brook, Nelson, No. 99, Derby; and Maple Leaf, No. 434, Tabusintac—reported these latter as active, prosperous and increasing in membership. The total membership in the two counties was about as follows:—

Total in both Counties 550 During last quarter, the division at Chatham had been re-organized after being dormant several terms. Rosefield, No. 280, MacLaughlin Road, Kent Co., had ceased to meet. The Order, as a whole, was steadily increasing in numbers and influence.

Harcourt Parish, as a result of the movement started by its divisions last year, was steadily moving along the road to prohibition. When two-thirds of the ratepayers had unsuccessfully appealed to the Liquor License commission to relieve them of licensed places, a petition had been presented to the County Council demanding the setting apart of a day on which to hold a vote on question of license. Of the 238 ratepayers, 80, or more than the required fourth, had signed. But the Council rejected the demand on some technicalities. An appeal had been carried to members of the Provincial government, and the Premier had promised that if the Harcourt ratepayers were determined to have no license and were prepared to enforce the law in case no license were granted, the government would give them a special act debarring licensed places

ODD FELLOWS ENTERTAIN GUESTS.

A Very Enjoyable "At Home" in their Lodge Room Friday Night.

The I. O. O. F. Hall was well filled Friday evening by a representative gathering of ladies and gentlemen, among whom were a number from Chatham. Mr. J. L. Stewart occupied the chair. Rev. H. C. Rice and Messrs. B. P. Steeves, Fred. Henderson and L. B. McMurdo sang "Three Fishers." Miss Bessie Crocker sang "Love Me and the World is Mine," and as an encore, rendered, "Ah, tis a Dream." Miss Edith MacLean sang, "The Message of a Rose," and when enquired, "Never." All the music was excellent. The chairman gave a speech in good form, and then Grand Master Dr. Smith L. Walker, of Truro, gave a forty-minute address, in which he held the undivided attention of his audience to the close. He strongly favored the schemes lately proposed in the Order, of a Home for the aged, an orphanage, and above all, a sanitarium for consumptives. He declared that with proper care consumption would in ten years be as scarce as leprosy, and in twenty years, extinct. Another point emphasized was that crime and disease are the natural outcome of poverty. He would lessen poverty by the technical education of our young people.

from the parish. Temperance sentiment was increasing in Clairville, Ford's Mills, Rexton and other places in Kent Co., and all over the province feeling was growing in favor of provincial prohibition.

The report of District Treasurer H. B. Anslow was read, showing receipts during 1906, of \$2460 and expenditure of the same. On motion, The D. W. P. appointed Mrs. H. Ingram, Mrs. G. A. Jonah and Mr. L. J. Wathen a committee on Finance and audit and also on State of the Order.

The Grand Scribe gave a report of his late movements as S. of T., organizer, and then explained the aim and objects of the N. B. Temperance Federation, at the organization of the Kings Co. branch of which he had lately assisted. As a result of his address and the general discussion which followed, it was, on motion of Miss Marion Wathen and S. M. Dunn, unanimously resolved to organize a Kent County branch of the N. B. T. F., election of officers, etc., to be deferred to the evening meeting. The Committee, above referred to, reported the financial statements correct and submitted following report on the State of the Order:—

"In looking over the reports of the various divisions, we feel we have every reason for encouragement. In all lines of the work interest is increasing. Membership is increasing, although we hope to have a larger increase in the coming quarter. We are pleased to see Chatham have such a good report as for some time, that division was dormant. We heartily congratulate the people of Harcourt on the success they have attained in their efforts to suppress the liquor licenses in Kent Co., for, while the City Council of Kent gave seen fit in their wisdom to ignore the petition, we feel that the council did not act in the best interests of the people of Harcourt or carry out the spirit of the Liquor License Act. However, we hope further steps will be taken by the ratepayers to secure the special law promised by Premier Tweedie. We heartily commend Rev. Mr. Staver for what he has done in regard to this petition; and we also commend Mr. H. H. Stuart for what work he has done."

CONVENTION IN MARCH

The seventh annual meeting of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Consumption and other forms of Tuberculosis will be held in Ottawa on the 13th and 14th of March next. A public meeting of the members of the association and of the citizens generally, at which His Excellency will preside, will be held in the Assembly Hall of the Normal school there on Wednesday evening, March 13th, at which Dr. Sheard, the chairman of the Ontario Provincial Board of Health, will deliver a lecture upon "Home Treatment of Consumption."

David Burke, a native of this county, brother of the late Richard Burke of Douglassdown, died in Stillwater, Minnesota, on the 20th inst., at the residence of his son-in-law, John Rowland. Deceased married Miss Bridget Kelly of Redbank in 1858, and about five years later removed to the west. Mrs. Burke died ten years ago. Coun. Perry moved that the Sec-treas. hand over the defaulters lists, except the default list for 1906, Parish of Rogersville, to Michael Savoy, J. P., for collection. Carried.

On motion of Coun. Perry the following resolution was passed. Resolved that the Sec-Treas. take the necessary steps to collect the amount due county from Rogersville Collector, and to issue a warrant against the collector for not obeying the order of the council.

On motion of Coun. Underhill the list of Parish officers for Blackville, as agreed to by the Councilors, was passed.

Coun. Connors moved that as 1904-05 telephone bill had not been paid, that the motion that it be not passed be reconsidered and the bill be passed. Carried.

On motion of Coun. Sweeney the account of David McLean \$1.50 for polling booths, passed.

Coun. Underhill stated that in the parish of Blackville there was a piece of land deeded to the Justices of the Peace in trust for school and church purposes. This land had never been fenced or used for any purpose, and now several persons wished to buy lots of it. Could this be sold and could a clear title be obtained?

The sec-treas. read deed and explained that the Council would be obliged to go to the legislature to enact special legislation to empower the sale of the land and the disposal of the proceeds.

After some further discussion Coun. Connors moved that when the school districts in the parish of Blackville interested give the Municipality a guarantee to pay all expenses in connection therewith, the Warden be authorized to have a bill prepared to go before the legislature to enable the Council to sell the land and deal with the proceeds of the sale. Carried.

Coun. Ryan moved the following resolution: That the districts for

Dist. No. 3, will extend up the from the parish of Newcastle line to the lower line to James Walsh's land.

Dist. No. 2, will extend up from the lower line of James Walsh's land to the mouth of the Big Sevegle.

Coun. Maltby from Committee on Petitions reported that the committee would recommend that the three leases be consolidated in a new lease.

Coun. Connors said that this could not be done without giving a new lease and according to law a lease could not be granted otherwise than by putting up at Public auction.

Coun. MacLachlan moved that the prayer of the committee be not granted. Carried.

Coun. Maltby from Com. on Petitions recommended that the prayer of Mr. George W. Mersereau's petition for rebate of taxes be not granted. This report was received and adopted.

Coun. MacLachlan moved a reconsideration of the By-law relating to the running at large of cattle in Middle District, Newcastle. Carried.

Coun. MacLachlan stated that there was some misunderstanding in regard to the by-law and therefore to set the matter right he would move that the by-law prohibiting the going at large of cattle in Lower Newcastle be repealed and the following adopted in place thereof: "Be it ordained that no cattle, sheep, horse, mare gelding, ram, ridgling, cow, ox or goat shall be allowed or suffered to go at large or graze at any season of the year on the front highway in the middle district Newcastle parish between the Route road (so-called) and the west side of the Bathurst or Ferry road (so-called)—Carried.

special committee of three be appointed to report at the next January session of this council the cost of erecting a suitable public building with adequate equipment, where it may be housed the court room, the council chamber, and all the County public offices. It shall be the duty of the said Committee to make a recommendation as to the site and property, design of the building, to procure and submit estimates of costs of its erection, both in brick and in stone, also estimates of vault construction heating apparatus, plumbing, electric lighting and furnishing. The committee shall ascertain the fair market value of the various county properties at the disposal of the county at the town of Newcastle with estimates of the amounts they would realize at public sale. Also that the sum of \$50 chargeable to the contingent Fund be appropriated for the expense of the committee. Coun. MacLachlan stated that the court house had long been an eye sore and a disgrace to the progressive county of Northumberland. The people were prosperous and progressive and in order to be abreast of the times a new building should be erected. In order to be patriotic we must have something to be proud of. We were proud of the great Northwest, it was a great country. Years ago our boys and girls went to the U. S. and were proud of that country and its institutions, but that is changing, we could be just as proud of the east. There were a number of properties in Newcastle which if put up at public sale would realize enough to equip the building. He was not extravagant in his ideas and thought a building costing from \$30,000 to \$40,000 would meet the needs for years to come and not be out of the way. In putting the resolution the Warden said he quite agreed with Coun. MacLachlan. The only public building we had was the jail. The present court house was certainly a disgrace to this county. The public property in Newcastle could be disposed of at a good figure which would assist in the building, and then it could be bonded for thirty or forty years which would only require a small sinking fund which would not be a great burden on the taxpayers. The resolution was adopted. Coun. Clark moved that the Councillors and constables be paid Carried. Coun. Anderson, MacLachlan and Maltby were appointed the committee to get estimates of cost of new court house. Coun. MacLachlan moved that the Sec-treas. notify the Government of all Superintendents of roads who have neglected to report to the council. Carried. KINGSTON.

The fire, resulting from the earthquake shock of the 14th, completed with the sinking of the wharves and buildings of the waterfront, has completed the destruction of the fair city of Kingston, Jamaica, which, by the census of 1901, had 46,000 inhabitants. Some thousands people were killed, thousands injured, and everybody's home destroyed. Relief measures are now being taken to cope with the situation, thanks to the generous response to the call for help.

Offer of assistance was not, however, cordially received. Shortly after the disaster, Rear Admiral Davis of the U. S. A. landed armed men who made themselves very useful in helping to patrol the streets, clearing the debris, raising rafts, attending the wounded, etc. But, the Yankee marines landed without consulting Government or Swettenham; and as it is against international custom for armed foreigners to come into a country uninvited, the governor politely requested his visitors to withdraw which they quickly did. Great indignation was, for a time, expressed against his action, but sober second thought recognizes that, though a trifle hasty, the governor acted within his rights. The Yankee commander in his laudable desire to help having considerably overstepped the bounds of propriety. The incident will no make trouble, as both governments wisely refuse to take any official notice of the affair.

LOCAL OPTION IN ONTARIO.

Complete returns of the Local Option contest in Ontario show that Local Option was sustained in 7 municipalities, and repealed in only 11. It was carried by the necessary three-fifths majority in 41 more, 47 received between 50 and 60 per cent of the votes (not enough to carry) in 46 municipalities, and was lost in 13. The final result shows that Local Option received a majority in 94 municipalities, and less than a majority in only 14 of the 108 in which the question was brought before the people. Evidently local Prohibition is rapidly growing in favor in Ontario. At the present rate of progress by far the greater part of the province will in a very few years be free from bar-drinking.

WHAT NEXT?

By means of an apparatus similar to that used for wireless telegraphy, Professor Slaby of Berlin has solved the question of talking by wireless telephone. He first succeeded in talking between two buildings in Berlin three miles apart. Then, this month, his experiments have been completely successful between Berlin and Nauzen a distance of twenty-five miles. Increasing the distance will be only a matter of time.

It is said that pictures and writing have been successfully transmitted over wires; and the flying machine seems to be an accomplished fact. The next on the program of human progress is, logically, the perfection of telepathy—the complete demonstration of man's ability to send his thoughts to persons at a distance without the aid of any physical machinery at all. This power is undoubtedly possessed by some few individuals, and possibly lies within the reach of all. We have long since ceased to be surprised at any discovery or invention.

The Edmonton, Alberta, Teachers' Agency is advertising for first class teachers (women as well as men, for sex is not mentioned) at \$50 per month. In a late issue of the Victoria, B. C., Colonist, three applications for teachers appeared, offering \$50, \$60 and \$75 a month respectively, mentioning neither class nor sex, the only stipulation being that the applicants for the last position must have had Normal training. A second-class lady teacher of Kent county, whose last salary in N. B. was \$248 from all sources with board at \$78 a year, went to Manitoba, where she immediately secured the same kind of a school at a salary of \$300 a year, board costing \$144. Her net salary in Manitoba was \$156 more a year, or just double what it was here. Her sister, also second-class, stepped into another miscellaneous country school at \$320 a year.

Is it any wonder that our N. B. teachers go west or leave the profession? Though their work is second to none in value, what pecuniary inducements are offered to make them continue it here?

Prince Edward Island has much trouble every winter because of the interruption of Communications with the mainland. Sometimes the island is isolated for days, often for weeks, at a time. A tunnel across the narrowest part of the strait would be the cheapest and best way of ending this difficulty.



BANK OF NOVA SCOTIA.

Net Profits for 1906 were \$653,516, 23.89 per cent of Capital.

The Bank of Nova Scotia has issued its seventy-fifth annual report. In this there are some interesting facts. This bank has an absolutely independent audit at the head office. Naturally those at the head of the bank are pleased with results, for the net profits, after providing for losses, are \$653,516.59. The net profits of the bank for the year were 23.89 per cent of the capital, being the highest in the history of the bank. \$100,000 was written off the bank premises bank fund and \$200,000 transferred to reserve. The reserve was also increased \$84,000 by premium on the 5,000 shares of new stock issued during the year, thus making a total addition to reserve fund during 1906 of \$1,050,000. The reserve now stands at \$5,250,000, being 175 per cent of the bank's capital. During the year also the paid-up capital of the bank was increased by \$500,000, and now stands at \$3,000,000, making a total resources between capital and reserve of \$8,250,000.


The deposits, with interest accrued, amount to over twenty-five million dollars. In regard to the management much credit is due to Mr. H. C. McLeod, the general manager and his staff who have worked most assiduously with the result that the past year so far as earnings and deposits are concerned, was the best in the history of the bank. Those who contemplate making deposits would do well to bear in mind that the strength and standard of this institution is such as to make it quite trustworthy because of the securities involved.

**HON. A. G. BLAIR
DIED LAST WEEK.**

**Former Minister of Railways was
a Victim of Heart Failure.**

Hon. A. G. Blair died very suddenly of heart failure on Friday evening, 25th inst., at the residence of his sisters-in-law, the Misses Thompson, in Fredericton. He passed away at 5.50 o'clock, while reclining on a couch, chatting to Miss Mary Thompson. He collapsed in the middle of a sentence, and in less than five minutes was dead.



Mr. Blair had come to Fredericton the previous day on business in connection with the merger of the New Brunswick and Central Telephone Companies. Friday morning he complained of suffering from intestinal grippe, and at one o'clock, not feeling well enough to go out in the afternoon, had made an appointment to meet Mr. J. H. Barry that evening at the Misses Thompson's. He conversed over the telephone during the afternoon and inspected legal documents. A few minutes before his death, Miss Thompson came in and while talking with her he gasped, "I'm in pain," and spoke no more.

The funeral took place at Ottawa, Monday afternoon, the remains being laid in the vault at Beechwood cemetery. Rev. Dr. Herridge delivered the funeral sermon. The members of the cabinet, members of the house of commons and senate were all present. Although his family asked that no flowers be sent, there were a number of wreaths ordered by those distant from Ottawa, among them being handsome pieces from St. John's city and from Fredericton board of Trade.

Hon. Andrew George Blair, K. C., ex-M. P., P. C., was born in Fredericton, N. B., of Scotch parents, on the 7th of March, 1844. He received his education in the College School at Fredericton, and was called to the bar in 1866. He entered the New Brunswick Assembly as member for York County in 1878, and was chosen opposition leader the following year. In 1883 he became premier of the province, and continued that position until 1896, when he entered the Dominion Cabinet. He was Minister of Railways and Canals until 1903, when he resigned, and in 1904 he accepted the position of chairman of the New Railway Commission of Canada, retaining the latter position during the same year.

The executive of the New Brunswick Temperance Federation have approached the government in reference to the action taken at their recent annual meeting in regard to prohibition. The temperance people have been informed that the government will listen to their case at a meeting to be held during the first week in February.

The executive will wait on the members of the government in accordance with the decision reached at the last meeting of that body. It was then decided that the government be petitioned to pass a provincial prohibitory law at the next session of the Legislature, which will be held next month. The Federation is desirous of having a law similar to that now in force in Prince Edward Island, and will submit this act to the government. They want prohibition pure and simple and will do all they can to urge the government to make such a law. Until this subject comes up at the next meeting of the Legislature there are matters pertaining to the liquor traffic in St. John toward which the temperance body is directing attention. It is charged by the N. B. T. F. that the amendment made at the last session regarding the sending of liquor into Scott Act counties is being openly violated, while in other respects those having the handling of the traffic in St. John in their charge are negligent in their duty.

At the end of December last, there were County branches of the N. B. T. F. in St. John, York and Restigouche. Three more have been organized, this month, in Kings, Charlotte and Kent.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST.

Homestead Regulations.
 Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 & 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1.) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2.) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person, residing with the father or mother.

(3.) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

S. W. MILLER'S REPLY.
 TO THE EDITOR OF THE ADVOCATE,
 SIR—
 Again I ask your permission to
 occupy a small space in your valued
 paper, to reply to the letter that ap-
 peared in your issue of July 23rd inst,
 signed Allan Ritchie and F. J.
 Desmond.
 It is not my intention, or to say the
 least my desire, to tire the public with
 a long reply to the above mentioned
 letter, for to my mind, and I feel con-
 fident the public will agree with me,
 its contents do not warrant very much
 as it is far from establishing any
 justification on their part, in expect-
 ing or asking the citizens of this town,
 to pay them each \$20 when in their
 own words, they admit their bill was
 only \$8.60.
 But listen to the generosity of these
 gentlemen, as stated in their letter:
 "Our contention is that he is entitled
 to legitimate expenses, for Sunday and
 Monday, and this we had agreed to
 allow him from our share." I would
 ask what kind of a family compact
 were they contemplating to turn our
 Town Council into!
 "Their share,"—what should be
 their share, only their legitimate ex-
 penses! and a bill of these has not, for
 some reason or other best known to
 themselves, been rendered the town.
 They were both present with other
 members of the council, just previous
 to the assembling of our first council
 meeting after our return from Freder-
 icton, when I stated that the amount
 of my account was \$35. They did not
 then state that their account was \$20
 nor did they have any comment on
 mine, but the only remark made about
 mine at the time, was by a member of
 a former delegation who stated in
 their presence, that the bill was a
 small one. Why did these gentlemen,
 who since have developed new ideas
 about the matter, not speak then? No,
 they waited till the dying days of a
 new council, who were ignorant of the
 facts, and induced them to pass a resolu-
 tion verifying their contention. Mark
 you, neither of these gentlemen were
 a mover or seconder of the motion,
 and as soon as this is done one of
 them rushes to the Town office, and
 secures his cheque for \$20, before it
 was possible for either the council, or
 the public to become familiar with the
 facts.
 Mr. Editor, I will not take up
 much of your valued space, to refute
 their so-called facts, for they are not
 essential to the point, for in my mind,
 the only question is, as above stated,
 namely, a justification of their action,
 but for the benefit of the public in the
 future, I will call their attention to
 two or three statements contained in
 their letter, which read as follows:—
 First, that "the Bill passed at the
 morning sitting, and here Mr. Miller's
 task ended, and further stay in
 Fredericton was not necessary." This
 is either because of ignorance,
 prejudice, or with the intention of
 misleading the public. The facts are,
 that the bill was not touched by the
 Municipality committee until late
 Monday forenoon, at which committee
 meeting I was present. When they
 were through with it, it then went to
 the committee of the whole house,
 which did not meet till late Monday
 afternoon. If we were to recognize
 the authors of the letter as authorities
 on parliamentary procedure, we must
 conclude, that at this stage all bills
 are endorsed, and become law, which
 is not correct, for after our bill had
 passed the latter committee, like all
 other bills it had to be read and
 discussed when the House is in session,
 and this is the vital stage of all bills
 that are being passed by any Legis-
 lature. In this case it was not done
 until Monday night, when it got its
 second reading, and yet they claim
 further stay in Fredericton after
 Monday noon was unnecessary.

THE ANTI-CIGARETTE CAMPAIGN.

Our Dominion President, Mrs. S. R. Wright, has received the results of the voting papers sent to the Anti-Cigarette Campaign, with favorable replies. All of the Provinces voted yea, with the exception of Quebec. The legislation we are now asking for is that the Provinces may be empowered to deal with the question instead of giving it Dominion scope. We are assured by prominent lawyers that the goal will be reached much earlier than asking for so wide a berth. Efforts are being made to secure not only a mover and second for the bill, but also a strong committee that will be responsible for the success of the movement in the house of Commons.

It is hoped that every Local Union in the Dominion will at once communicate with their representatives at Ottawa, asking that they will not only vote favorably but also use their influence with their colleagues to secure the desired legislation. Where practicable, it has been found that personal interviews by strong deputations of voters from the various constituencies have met with more favorable results than by correspondence.
