Many of the officials who have profited by this unighteous law, have asembled esates with acreages running into nillions. If these things are true the wonder is not that there should be an insurrection, but that it is not more general and active. Nor is there reason for surprise at the favorable opinion of Mexico expressed by Canadian capitalists, who have secured pubc franchise concessions, and have not hesitated to draw unfavorable comparisons between President Diaz and the premier of Ontario. Had the president given more concern to the rights and wellbeing of the common people his long ascendency would not have been closing in the gloom of civil war.—Toronto World.
