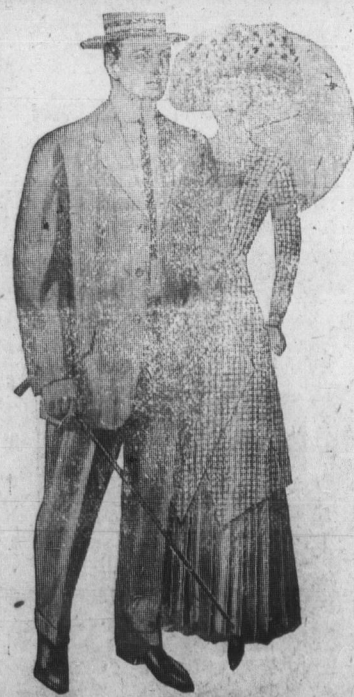

## TOWN COUNCIL MET LAST THURSDAY

Council in Committee Discuss Change of to Building of Churches

A meeting of the council was held on Thursday evening. His Worship Mayor McDonald presiding.

Councillors present, Alexander Mowat, Miller and Pinault. Minutes of previous meetings read and confirmed. Communication received from the Shives Lumber Co., Ltd., accepting the offer of the town for the new power station. Communication placed on file.

Communication received from F. M. Anderson regarding the rent of the houses on Matheson's flats now called Andersonville which was referred to Public Charities committee.

Communication received from the Building Inspector enclosing application of the Presbyterian church for a building, which was laid on the table.

Petitions received from S. McNaughton and George Main for trucking licenses were referred to Police and License committee.

Councillor Pinault reported that arrangements had been made for the clearing out of the old Minto basement. Councillor Miller from the finance committee submitted a report recommending

McLennan Foundry and Machine Co. Ltd., be granted a flat rate of tax of \$100 per annum for a period of 15 years. Report received and adopted.

Messrs. J. P. Jardine and D. J. Bruce were heard before the council relative to the application for a building permit after which the council resolved itself into a committee to discuss the question.

Councillor Lunan then entered the meeting and Councillors McKenzie, White and Moores.

In the discussion which was taken part by all the councillors the matter was dealt with fully and a copy of the plans was laid on the table. As the change was felt to be rather drastic it was resolved to ask the Board of Fire Underwriters whether insurance rates would be affected by the such buildings going up in wood. The clerk was instructed to wire Mr. Clinch and to report when his reply was received.

Councillor Lunan moved the appointment of J. S. Benson as auditor of School accounts (which was seconded by Councillor Miller) and carried.

Communication from Joseph Duncan re the storing of oil, etc., at his premises, and from Currie that he was arranging to have his oil stored outside the town limits.

Regarding Mr. Duncan's communication it was referred to the Fire Protection Committee with power to act.

Communication received from Bates & Flood offering \$1.10 per yard for the stone at Gerrard Street for the new I. C. R. Station buildings.

Communication from Mr. J. W. Morton regarding the putting up of the new Power House suggesting placing the building further east. Referred to Electric Light committee.

Councillor Pinault asked regarding the report published in the Graphic as to the lack of the Fire Protection in Ward III. This brought out quite a discussion on the merits of our system and Councillor White in reply stated that all the matters brought up were receiving attention; Councillor White spoke in favor of the article in question, and also recommended that the salary of Wm. Noble be raised to \$55 per month. Carried. It was also agreed to install a telephone in the engine room of the Shives Lumber Co. for fire purposes. Councillor Pinault asked regarding the pipes lying in the Tobique Road and Councillor Alexander said that arrangements had been made for gathering them together. Councillor White brought in a report regarding the planing mill for George Sanson. After discussion in which the rent of the planing mill was heard before the council it was arranged to ask Mr. Clinch what effect this mill would have on the insurance rates. Council then adjourned.

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## DEATH OF MR. NEIL SHAW

Well-Known Resident of Dalhousie Junction Passes Away.

By the death of Mr. Neil Shaw of Dalhousie Junction, last Friday, the County has lost one of its well-known and highly esteemed inhabitants. Respected and loved by all for his many acts of kindness and sympathy, his demise is mourned by a large circle of sorrowing friends. Mr. Shaw was born in Dalhousie Junction on November 1st, 1834, and is survived by one brother, Alexander H. Shaw, living on the homestead. As a loving father he is mourned by his family of five daughters and two sons. Mr. Shaw was ever an active helper in church work and was for many years an elder in St. John's Presbyterian Church, Dalhousie.

Rev. Mr. Kirk conducted the funeral service at the homestead on Monday and the remains were followed to the church yard at Dalhousie by a large number of mourners. The sympathy and kindly feeling of the whole community is extended to the sorrowing family and friends, in the loss of one who did ever prove himself a man of humble spirit and upright integrity.

## PEACE RESTORED IN MEXICAN REPUBLIC

After Six Months Fighting Dictator Diaz Agrees to Resign and Allow Reforms to be Put into Effect

Juarez, Mexico, May 22.—The official representatives of the Mexican government and the revolutionists at 10 o'clock last night signed a peace agreement. Provisional President Francisco I. Madero, Jr., leader of the Revolution, was one of the signers. The agreement practically accords the concession by the Government of those demands which started on November 20th the last armed revolution in Mexico. President

Diaz and Vice-President Corral will resign, and the government is to concentrate its attention on reforms.

Railways and telegraphs are to be repaired at once. It is provided that troops will be disbanded proportionately as each state is restored to tranquility. This will ensure the carrying out of the conditions in the various states. The next election will be free. The Revolution has completely triumphed.

## NATIVE OF CROSS POINT DIED AT OGONTO, WIS.

Mrs. Wm. Johnston of 501 McDonald street, died at 2.45 o'clock Wednesday morning following an operation for cancer. The funeral will be held from St. Mark's church tomorrow forenoon at 10 o'clock. Mr. Campbell will conduct the services. Deceased was 59 years of age and was born at Cross Point, Cal., and came to Oconto about thirty years ago. Her husband has been in the employ of the Oconto Company for many years. She is survived by nine daughters and one son, Stanley. The daughters are the Misses Henrietta, Edith, Shirley, Edith and Dorothy and Mrs. J. McDowell of Marinette, Mrs. Chas. Johnston of Menominee and Mrs. Walter Nelson of Republic, but recently married. The first named, Miss Henrietta, is in charge of the Oconto hospital. Mrs. Johnston was an estimable lady, highly respected and much esteemed by all who knew her, and her death has occasioned genuine regret throughout the community.—Oconto Eastern Press.

## CHURCH UNION

London, Ont., May 20.—(Canadian Press)—By an unanimous vote the London District Methodist meeting yesterday adopted a resolution favoring the church union basis. The non-temere decree was condemned.

Harrison, Ont., May 20.—By a vote of 10 to 8 the annual meeting of the Palmerston Methodist District meeting held here defeated a resolution approving the basis of church-union. Many laymen did not vote.

Montreal, May 18.—The Northern District Meeting voted for union, 19 to 12. The Southern District referred the matter to the annual conference.

## DEATH AND DISASTER FROM AN AIRSHIP

France's Minister of War Killed and Premier Monis  
Badly Injured on Sunday

Paris, May 21.—Aviator Train, one of those about to start to-day in the Airship race from Paris to Madrid, lost control of his machine while taking a preliminary flight over the starting place in a wind blowing thirty miles an hour, and dashed into a group of members of the cabinet who were present to witness the start of the race. Neither Mr. Train nor his passenger was hurt.

Henri Maurice Berteaux, Minister of War, was hurled ten feet and killed.

The injured are: Antoine Emmanuel Ernest Monis, premier and minister of interior; Antoine Murphy, son of the premier; and Henri Deutchi de la Meurthe, the aged patron of aeronautic, automobilism and other sports.

A large number of persons of note had narrow escapes from injury. The accident occurred on the aviation field at Issy Les Moline, and was witnessed by 200,000 persons.

The Premier was very badly hurt; the others but slightly.

### ANOTHER TRANSCONTINENTAL

The Canadian Northern Railway Co. (whose stock is largely owned by MacKenzie and Mann) have let contracts for their line from Ottawa to Toronto. Their line already extends from Port Arthur to the Rocky Mountains and is being fast built through British Columbia between the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Canadian Pacific railways. Another link connects Ottawa and Quebec. And the Dominion Parliament has agreed to guarantee the bonds required to build the missing link from Port Arthur to Ottawa. Then with the Intercolonial, there will be a third Transcontinental. Truly Canada is growing with marvellous rapidity.

### PARLIAMENT ADJOURNED

Parliament adjourned on the 20th instant, and will take a recess of about two months. The Reciprocity agreement is held over till July. But it is not killed in the United States Senate by the efforts of United States farmers (who seem to think that Canada is getting the better of the bargain) it will most probably go into effect before the end of this year, as the majority of Canadians both inside and outside of parliament appear to be in favor of it.

That woman suffrage was gaining ground in Great Britain is shown by the fact that in the House of Commons on Friday a bill for woman's enfranchisement received 255 votes out of 343. The bill, which was introduced by a Liberal member, would enfranchise a million women.

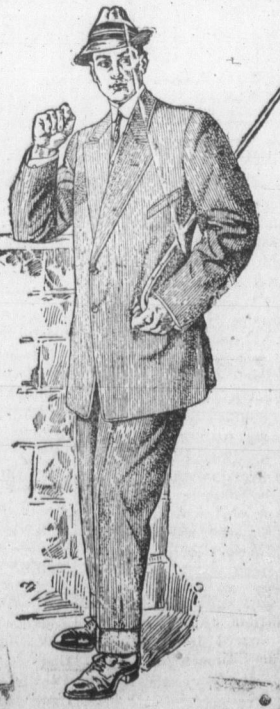

## ST. JOHN VALLEY RAILWAY BILL PASSES.

Government Willing to Run St. John Valley Railway. —The Line Must Connect The Transcontinental With St. John.

Ottawa, Ont., May 19.—The senate this morning passed the St. John Valley Railway bill as sent by the Commons without amendment. It authorizes the Intercolonial to lease and operate the line as soon as it is built.

N. B. TELEPHONE CO., CLEARS OVER \$70,000 IN PART YEAR

The N. B. Telephone Co., held their annual meeting in Fredericton on the 18th. Mayor Pedoin of Newcastle attended. At the close of the year ended April 30, 1908, the company had 7,536 phones in use in the province, while at the close of the present fiscal year, ended March 31, 1911, a period embracing one month less than three years, the number of instruments in use in the province was 9,974, an increase in the aggregate of 2,438 phones, or an increase of upward of 800 phones each year.

The gross revenue of the company has been correspondingly satisfactory. It has grown during the same period from \$226,225.51 to the sum of \$305,124.77 for the year just ended. The net earnings were \$76,885.50. Two dividends totalling \$70,557.60 were paid.

### Detroit's Great Record

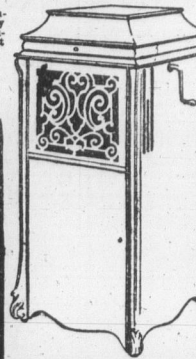

CIVIC AFFAIRS

You may fool some of the people all the time, you may fool all the people part of the time, but you can't fool all the people all the time. Our city fathers are showing a lamentable amount of lethargy and apathy at the present time towards the many openings there are for strong action, that would tend to the best interests of a community which we trust will rise to a high plane in the provinces and be looked up to with pride by all the inhabitants of New Brunswick. We have shown an example of determination and perseverance in the rebuilding of our town, an example which might well be copied by other cities in Canada, and because of this and owing to the fact that the eyes of many are upon us, we say, "Awake! awake!"

Many and varied are the problems which engross the attention of our civic rulers, for which we are all willing to make allowances, but the conditions which now obtain in Campbellton are most pernicious in their influence against the best interests of our growing town, and the ratepayers now desire these conditions rectified by a little more action and less talk, deeds and not resolutions only, enforcement of By-Laws and less reference to them. We seem to have looked in vain for the council to make a move towards the upholding of its own laws, and although it is perfectly true that any ratepayer can take action against any person infringing the By-Laws, we can only ask where does the Council stand in this matter? If we as ratepayers are to see to the enforcing of these legal enactments which govern the town, there is no necessity for us to place the reins of government in the hands of the Council for those who pay the taxes are entitled to the town. And we are paying for it. What answer can the Council give us regarding the promised legislation affecting the taxation of real estate? Before beginning our buildings we were promised that this exemption was going through the House at Fredericton, and only the land would be taxed. Under this promise many of us have built and are building large and costly places and if these are to be assessed for taxation purposes it means that the assessable value of the town is being raised by dishonest methods. What the public want to know is, was this legislation dropped? If so, why has there been no report given regarding it? Why are we kept in the dark regarding this and many other things? It is only right that the public should have the entire confidence of its rulers, and no good ever comes of trying to play hide-and-seek with promises given to the people.

Another point is that with great acclamation the Council greeted an injunction clause to be tacked on to the By-Laws giving power to restrain any person from building in defiance of the By-Laws. This has also proved a fizzle for before any injunctions can be granted, the town will require to go to Sir John to get the necessary papers, and all the shacks in Campbellton could be built before a writ of restraint could be issued. Still another point: Some time ago petitions were presented from two Churches asking permission to build in wood. The By-Laws make no allowance for exempting any building and the Council have no power to grant exemption, yet nothing has been done with these petitions and in the meantime the churches are going on with preparations for building without permit or authority of any kind.

These things may be embarrassing in a slight degree but we have every confidence that the Council is quite able to remedy these matters once they are brought to their notice. Many more points could be raised but we believe everything will yet be cleared up, and we can only say to the Council, gentlemen you have all the backing you want. Go ahead.

McLeod New Mills, who was Moderator of Session for about two years, with an address and a purse of \$50 in gold, as a token of the congregation's appreciation of his services. After the congregation was dismissed a reception was held in St. Luke's hall, where the newly inducted minister was welcomed by the people.

GREAT PAGEANT OF THE EMPIRE

The Most Wonderful Spectacle Ever Witnessed on the Streets of Old London.

An annex to the main entrance to Westminster Abbey is in course of erection. In the seating arrangements the plan is the same as that which was adopted at King Edward's Coronation in 1902. There will therefore be no fixed seats, but the nave of the Abbey will be furnished with new chairs of Chippendale pattern upholstered in silk. These the users of them will be given the opportunity of purchasing as mementoes. The Earl Marshall's Office has been besieged with applications for permission to be present from all sorts and conditions of people. Peers and Peersesses have a prescriptive right to attend, but even these will be excluded if they have not asked for and received permission to attend.

The Earl Marshall has received applications for permission to be present from over 200 peers and Peersesses who had no legal claim to be present at the ceremony in 1902. There are no fewer than 25 new Earls and Countesses, and the remainder is made up of Peers and Peersesses who have succeeded to the family title, and of those who have had new Peerages conferred upon them.

It is the desire of his Majesty that the overseas dominions should take a prominent and distinguished part in the great State pageant, and at the present time the question is being considered whether some special act in the consistory ceremony cannot be entrusted to the representatives of Canada, Australia, South Africa and New Zealand. Every one of the countries mentioned, as well as India, the Cape Colony, and practically every portion of the Empire, will be more adequately represented both in Westminster Abbey and in the royal procession through the streets of London than has ever been the case before. The officers of the Home District Command, who have been made responsible for the military arrangements, are making provision for the accommodation of some 5,000 soldiers, representing every part of the King's dominions abroad. Five hundred officers and men are going from India, 600 from Canada, over 300 from Australia and other parts of the Southern Hemisphere, while such places as Mexico, Uganda, Borneo, Hong Kong and other far-away outposts of the Empire will be represented. It is to be the greatest pageant of Empire yet seen in London. The navy, the home army and the Territorials are also to be represented by the biggest force ever concentrated in the Metropolis, and for their accommodation the Royal Parks will be covered with military camps. In addition to carrying out the internal arrangements at the Abbey, the officers will be the task before it of erecting stands along the line of route of the Coronation procession between Buckingham Palace and Parliament square.

CONCERT HALLS HONORED  
An unprecedented feature of the Coronation year will be the introduction of concert hall performances by Royal command. Male Royalties have visited London music halls privately, but the hall-mark of Royal patronage has never yet been bestowed upon the vaudeville stage.

In response to a petition signed by leading vaudeville managers the King and Queen will be invited to perform when they visit Edinburgh after the Coronation ceremonies. It is stated that their engagements preclude a similar act on their part so far as London is concerned.

A Coronation Outfit.  
Coronation year is to be made the occasion for a great effort on the part of the Incorporated Hairdressers' Guild of Great Britain to create a purely British fashion in costume. With this object an exhibition is shortly to be held in London which will have the support of hairdressers and every branch of the trade in all parts of England and Scotland. There will be an exhibition of designs, and the one selected by a committee of experts will be recommended to the whole trade for adoption as the recognized fashionable pattern. The Court hairdressers are said to have taken up the idea with enthusiasm, and if the project proves to be as successful as its promoters anticipate, Parisian and Viennese domination will go by the board. The new culture is to be distinctly British.

Asquith's Residence.  
The private residence of Prime Minister Asquith, at 29 Cavendish square, coveted by reason of its splendid reception rooms, ornate staircase and walls painted by Sir John Thornhill two centuries ago, has been secured for the Coronation by Lady Curzon.

ROYAL COURTS BEGIN IN MAY

King George Will Probably Beat the Record as the World's Champion Hunter

This will be a busy year for King George V. Indeed, so vast a programme has been arranged for him that he will easily beat the record as the world's champion hunter.

Even at present the King is, of course, extremely busy, but the most arduous programme of great State functions, which will mark Coronation year, does not open until one year and a day after the death of his late Majesty King Edward VII.

On May 22nd, the anniversary of King Edward's death, the Royal family and a large assemblage of royal relatives will meet at St. George's Chapel, Windsor, for a solemn memorial service. Then, honor to the great dead having been duly done, the curtains will roll back next day upon a season of pageantry unsurpassed in this country's history.

The first of the Majesty's Courts will be held on May 27th. Between that date and June 22nd there will be four such opportunities for some thousands of the nobles and most distinguished men and women in the land to make their bow before the King and Queen Mary.

To the first Court, on May 27th, between 800 and 1,000 will be invited. Shortly before 10 p.m. on that occasion, carriages and electric broughams will carry the route to Buckingham Palace. Each vehicle will bear some exquisite gown worn by a distinguished soldier, sailor, diplomatist, or politician, clad in brilliant uniform and picturesque court dress. Punctually at the appointed hour, the King and Queen will occupy their twin thrones, each on a raised dais, while behind them royal relatives and great

Court functionaries will group themselves. Then the world-famous ceremony will begin. A good impression, to that brilliant picture no artist's brush can ever do justice. Though many fair women will be present none will compare with the gracious Queen herself, radiant and brilliant in priceless old lace, and ablaze with diamonds and orders.

For the lucky guests the occasion will be one of pure pleasure. After passing the throne they are free to move themselves and enjoy the repeat, served in the great banquet hall, and plates of gold, which is one of the features of the Royal entertainment. For them the actual coronation is a distant memory. Their nerves are wound up to the highest pitch in the anxiety to make a good impression, a very brief one. A sweet smile of recognition from the Queen, the same from the King, and it is over.

But for the King and Queen the four Courts will be desperately fatiguing to each guest is separately announced to the King and Queen, that each must be graciously acknowledged by the same kindly way, and that the strain of this is kept up hour after hour. Supper is served at 11 p.m. and the distinguished guests take exactly half a minute in each case, so that 150 guests passed the throne each hour. In the case the King would take several weary hours to get through his formal duties.

However, the presentations may be expedited. It is to be hoped that the ceremony to take less than a number of hours. But, however tired they grow, their Majesties must still continue to look as fresh, and smile as serenely as the light upon their first and most distinguished of their guests.

Most people would want a day in bed to nurse their aches after such a reception, but the King has no time for that. He will be up as early as usual on the day following each of his Courts, and transact important State business.

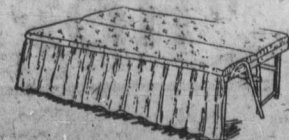

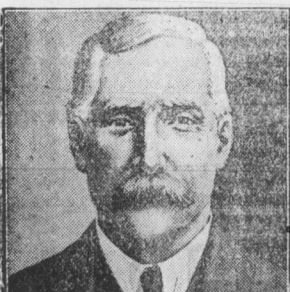

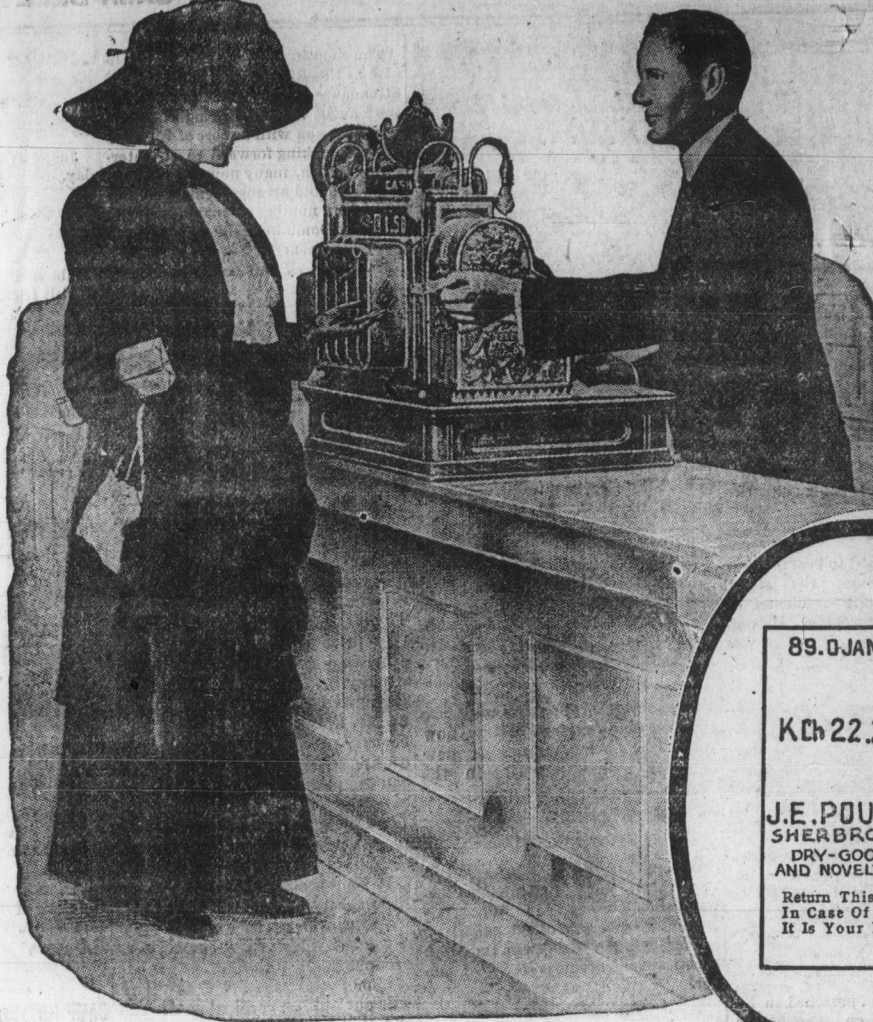

FOREST FIRES

Forest Fires the last few days did great damage in various parts of the province. On Friday night the Presbyterian church at Nerepis was burned to the ground, the only thing saved being the organ. The building, which is near the settlement, caught from sparks flying from the burning house. Capt. Anderson's house was burned at McKiel's Lake, Kings Co. Fire approached within three miles of Westfield. Mechanic's Settlement, Kings Co., was saved with difficulty. Fires have been raging at Goshen, Mechanic's Settlement, Portage River and Millstream, in Kings county, and at Baltimore along the line of the branch railway in Albert county. The fires in the vicinity of Moncton were got under control as the result of the strenuous fight made on Friday and Saturday. Fire, which is supposed to have caught from an engine on the north-bound Maritime express, destroyed two houses at Red Pine, thirty miles from Newcastle, on the Intercolonial, Thursday morning. A house belonging to F. W. Summer, Moncton, vacated only a few days ago, was burned to the ground, while Peter Young lost his house, but saved most of his furniture. A large force of men gathered, and only their vigorous efforts prevented further destruction. Chief Warden Doyle of the North Shore has had his hands full fighting fires in his districts. The rains of Sunday and Monday, however, stamped out many of the fires in all directions.

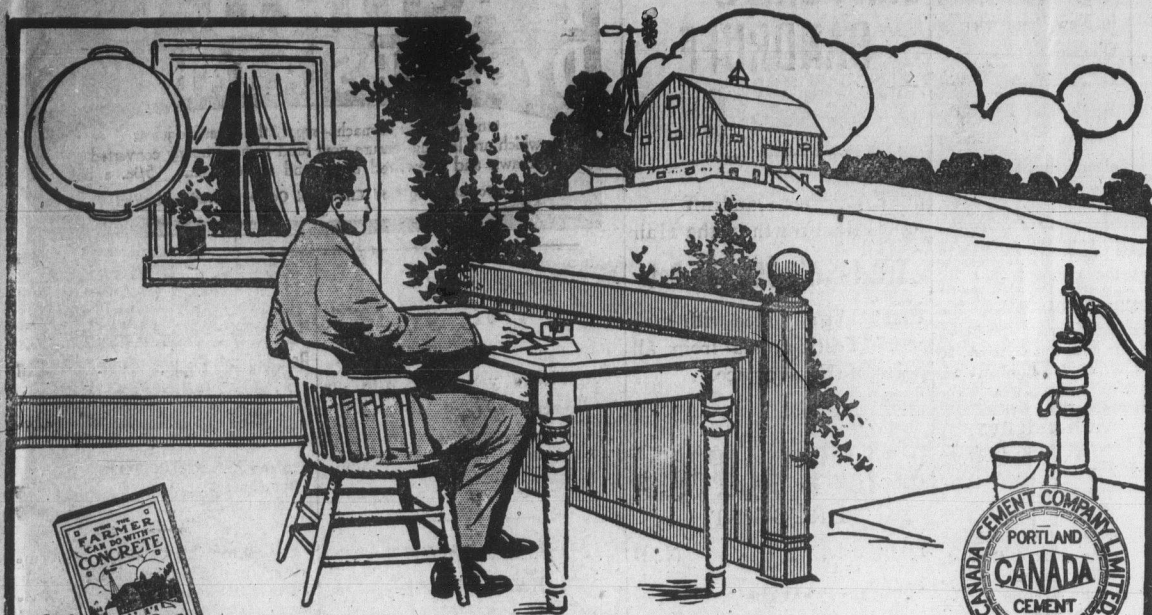

## WHY MEXICO REBELLED

Dark, indeed, is the social condition of Mexico if there is any substance behind the indictment brought by John Kenneth Turner against President Diaz and his system of government. In his recently issued book "Barbarous Mexico," he asserts that tens of thousands of working people of all ages, colors and degrees of intelligence have been and are being habitually sold into bondage worse than that attending negro slavery. In order to get at the facts from the inside, Mr. Turner posed as a man of wealth, desirous of acquiring a plantation, and in that capacity managers and officials revealed to him the profitable side of the trade. He quotes the general manager of one-third of the tobacco lands of Valle Nacional as saying, "By the sixth or seventh month they begin to die off like flies at the first winter frost, and after that they're not worth keeping. The cheapest thing to do is to let them die; there are plenty more where they came from." Many other equally startling assertions are made by Mr. Turner involving governors of states, mayors of cities and the central government itself.

Mexican slavery has developed from the contract labor system. Its victims are held under pretence of debt, and once in debt the balance in the company's books is always against the slave. While the poverty of the common people is great and growing, the wealth of the favored few is increasing. Blame for this, Mr. Turner lays on President Diaz, whose policy it has been to hand out vast concessions to capitalists and political friends. The cabinet, the state governors and administrators of counties have all taken advantage of the land registration law fathered by Diaz, to oust the common people from the land that had been in the possession of their forebears for generations. "That law," he says, "permitted any person to go out and claim any lands to which the possessor could not prove a recorded title. Since up to time the land law was enacted it was not the custom to record titles, this meant all the lands of Mexico." Many of the officials who have profited by this unrighteous law, have assembled estates with acreages running into millions. If these things are true the wonder is not that there should be an insurrection, but that it is not more general and active. Nor is there reason for surprise at the favorable opinion of Mexico expressed by Canadian capitalists, who have secured public franchise concessions, and have not hesitated to draw unfavorable comparisons between President Diaz and the premier of Ontario. Had the president given more concern to the rights and well-being of the common people his long ascendancy would not have been closing in the gloom of civil war.—Toronto World.
