SOUTH RENFREW.

The election of the conservative candidate, Mr. Ferguson, for South Renfrew by the small majority of about one hundred will, under the circumstances, give but little cause for congratulation in conservative ranks. South Renfrew, it is true, has for years been represented in parliament by a liberal, but the two great parties have been so evenly divided that the constituency has not been acknowledged positively liberal. In 1874, for instance, the liberal majority was but seventy; in 1875 it was but fifty-five; in 1880 it was but thirty-four; and in the last general election but sixty-six. In all of these contests there have been local influences introduced sufficiently strong to carry the independents with the liberals. In the contest of Tuesday last the government in addition to the powerful influences it has invariably exerted in the constituency in past elections agreed to give a handsome subsidy to a local line of railway such as needed in Renfrew, and thus won the solid independent vote. And in addition to this the liberal candidate, Mr. McIntrye, who was not a resident of the constituency, nor acquainted with its needs, and whose candidature was distasteful to a large number of the party because of his connection with the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, a concern which the majority of liberals view with disfavour and suspicion, and for any number of which it is beyond human possibility to secure their support. So obvious was Mr. McIntrye's candidature to a large number of the liberals that certain of their press withheld their support. Under these circumstances, it could not be expected that the liberals would win. The contest was no test of party strength. The conservatives, therefore, have little cause for congratulation.

Turning its usual course on such occasions the Tory sublimed press has been heralding the result as a grand victory. This will not surprise any one. The Tory party just now, as more than the Tories know, require, if it is to be held together, all the encouragement it can secure. From its own point of view, it is necessary that a great noise should be made over such results, and we don't know that any one will object to it. The people understand it. Chief among the noisy sublimed journals is the St. John Sun. To apply the Sun's own argument to itself, need before the amount of its subsidy was made public, the leader it shouts, the more it crows, when shouting and creaking are needed, the more subsidy it will receive. The Sun, therefore, in its need of some more public money. It is not surprising then that the Sun, to serve the interests of some persons who have influence with the government, should say that in this contest the question of commercial union was made an issue by the liberal party. Commercial union was not made an issue in the contest. In the first place neither of the two parties, as parties, have either approved of or opposed the scheme. The liberals, as a party, could, therefore, not make the question an issue in the election. And second, the liberal candidate, Mr. McIntrye, is as yet not favorable to commercial union with the United States. When will Tory papers learn to hold to facts?

A MOVE IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION.
 The city council in deciding last evening to renew its offer, made last winter, to secure the erection of the railway machine shops in Fredericton has pursued a course that meets with the hearty approval of our citizens. The offer was free land for the shops and the free use of water, if the principal machine shops were permanently located in Fredericton. If we understand the feeling of the council, it is also willing to grant the company or companies which may erect the works, exemption from taxation. That offer also our citizens will approve of.

This move of the council last evening was opportune. In the near future the question of choosing the site of permanent workshops must soon engage the attention of the railway companies. Fredericton, with the bridge completed, and the different lines centering here, will present advantages which the companies cannot overlook. Their attention must be directed to the place. If, therefore, in addition to the advantages of its location, the city is prepared to offer some substantial inducements, such as have been mentioned above, to secure the works, we have little doubt that they will be permanently located in

Fredericton. The council, however, must not let the matter rest with a mere offer. A committee should be appointed to interview the proper authorities, and to ascertain their views in this connection. Now is the time to move.

THE GLADSTONIAN VICTORY.

The election of Sir George Otto Trevelyan for the Bridgeton division of Glasgow will not surprise those who have watched the recent trend of public opinion in Britain with regard to the Irish question. While, however, liberals were confident of success in the struggle for the seat they did not anticipate so large a majority as that which Trevelyan received. Conservatives feared a liberal victory, but confidently expected a reduction in the Gladstonian majority. The great increase, however, in the Gladstonian vote has staggered the conservatives who feel that they are fast losing their hold upon the people of Britain, and that Gladstonianism is making rapid advances. Salisbury's supporters feel that the Bridgeton victory is the severest blow which the so-called unionists have received. Little wonder that they find that the result is significant. Just as they were to have their demands satisfied by the Salisbury government comes the blow which proves their weakness and which puts a stop to the concessions which Salisbury was about to grant them.

Trevelyan will greatly strengthen the Gladstonian cause. Though somewhat feeble, he would lend weight to any party. In the sphere of literature he is well known as that of politics and like Morley he has in both earned high distinction. The time, we feel, is not far distant when Morley he shall assist Gladstone in controlling the affairs of the nation.

THE LATEST RING.

Rings and monopolies seem to be the order of the day. The latest monopoly is in the hands of a ring in the United States who have determined to regulate the price of beef to suit themselves. Consumers are forced by the ring to pay the old prices for meat, notwithstanding that live cattle are sold for about half the price which they formerly brought. "Four years ago," says the Chicago Times, "prime beef sold in this market for from five to six cents a pound. This season only half this sum is realized for the same grade of animals. Still, while producers get only half as much for their fat cattle as they did four years ago, city and town customers pay as much for their steaks, roasts and fresh and salt beef as ever they did. The fall of beef on the farm, ranch and range has not affected the price of beef at the retail market or the restaurant." The railroad corporations are responsible for the high prices which now prevail. The ring has made with them a most shameful bargain, having received from the corporations the exclusive right of carrying meat. No competition is thus permitted, so that the money of the ring can buy cattle at as low a price which suits them and sell at almost any price they wish, to ask. It is to be hoped that some steps will be taken to put a stop to this monopoly and to expose the railway companies who are a party to it.

Since our reference to the Kent election last Thursday, Messrs LeBlanc and Phinney, the two conservative candidates, have practically formed a ticket, and are supported by Mr. P. A. Landry, the conservative M. P. for St. John. It is stated in that county, by Attorney General Blair, Mr. Seayre, liberal, is supported in his candidature by Mr. McIntrye, the liberal leader of the county. Mr. Johnston is running in opposition to the local government. Inasmuch as it is not possible for Messrs Seayre and Johnston to form a ticket, owing to their difference of opinion in local politics, it is now thought that Messrs LeBlanc and Phinney will be elected.

The ruins of St. Anthony's elevator at Minneapolis fell yesterday and killed 12 grain shovellers.

The steam barge John W. Garrett, 335 feet long, 76 feet wide, was launched at Wilmington, Del., Tuesday.

Canadian.
 John Lovitt, M. P. for Yarmouth has admitted bribery by agents and been unseated.

A fire started to clear a small piece of land near Essex Centre, Ont., has spread very rapidly and fears are entertained for the safety of the town.

Agathon Danamur, of Quebec, a Christian brother is under arrest for stealing \$800 from the treasury of the Christian brother's school.

The proprietors of the Montreal Star have been arrested at the instance of the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Co. on a charge of criminal libel.

Fire broke out in a grocery store on St. Hyppolite St., Montreal, on Tuesday, and, before it could be got under control, spread rapidly and destroyed several buildings near by, rendering 50 families homeless. Loss about \$100,000.

A great liberal picnic was held at Somerset, Que., on Tuesday, in honor of Laurier's appointment to the leadership of the party, and was attended by thousands of people, including prominent M. P.s from Ontario and other provinces.

The barbers of the city and county of St. John propose organizing an association.

Chas. Hogg, aged 16, fell from a gravel train at Sackville yesterday, the wheels of one of the cars passed over him. He died shortly afterwards.

Karl Ernst Ekstrain, aged 35, a pond man in the employ of A. Cushing & Co., St. John, fell between the logs in the pond along side of the mill yesterday afternoon and was drowned.

A boy from Stellarton was arrested at Moncton Tuesday night, under a telegraphic order from Stellarton. He said he was going to Boston to see his mother from whom he had been separated for ten years.

Yesterday as Dennis McCarthy, aged 80, was engaged with several other laborers in removing the boiler from an old tugboat, lying at Fish Market ship, St. John a long piece of piping used as a shear, broke and struck him a terrible blow on the head, splashing his brains over the ground alongside. The other laborers ran whenever they heard the crack, but the man of eighty was not quick to escape.
