WATER SITUATION HAS IMPROVED

Supply Adequate for All Present Needs—Fear for Winter's Supply.

The water famine, for the present at least, is over. The rain and snow of last week, although not as heavy as hoped for, yet provided enough water to make a considerable reserve, and pressure has gone back to normal.
With the coming of winter, however, the outlook for a supply from the natural sources is not very favorable and the Town Council is erecting a temporary dam on Walker Brook near the race track and will install the pump loaned by the Shives Co., which will be able to pump enough water direct to the mains or back to the reservoir to keep up a constant supply and pressure.
The Council is also looking around for a permanent supply which can be drawn upon in case of emergency.
There are three prospects before the council.
To install an electrically driven pump on Walker Brook.
To lay a main up Walker Brook to a level with the present town reservoir.
To tap Parker's Lake.
Each proposition has its advocates, but it is admitted by all that Parker lake is the most feasible one if the water can be secured at a reasonable rate.
The ownership of this lake is being gone into and the matter will be taken to Fredericton.
Not for over fifty years has there been such a shortage of water all along the railways.
Up the line farmers and others are in some places obliged to haul water as much as twenty miles, and the railway water tanks between Campbellton and Mont Joli are dry.

RESTIGOUCHE OVER THE TOP

Victory Loan Drive Here Has Whirlwind Finish—Amazing Figures.

Restigouche has again lived up to its war reputation of never falling down. The Victory Loan went over the top to the extent of \$141,000, which is certainly a remarkable showing for one of the smallest counties in the province.
At five o'clock the Shives Co.'s mill siren blew for several minutes joined in by the whistles of other mills, signifying that the drive was over and that it has exceeded the objective.

WILL INSTALL NEW SYSTEM

New Year Will See Business System Installed in Town Offices—Water Shortage

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Clerk's office His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. There were present Messrs. McKay, Campbell, Devereaux, Bissett, Jamieson, Matthews and Dickie.
The minutes of previous meetings were read and approved.
A communication from Jones & Scofield, re condition of Adam Street was read and referred to Public Property & Streets Committee with power to act.
W. J. McKay secretary of the Bricklayers, Plasters, and Masons Union wrote notifying the town that such a union existed, and that as the Town was building a fire station, it would be necessary to employ union men. The rate of pay was fixed at 80 cents per hour for a nine hour day. Letter filed.
The usual departmental accounts were passed.
Coun. McKay reported that there were a number of matters before the Assessment & Appeals Committee but as Coun. Dickie had been out of town for some time it had not been possible to have a meeting of the committee, but one was arranged for and a report would be ready for next meeting.
The account of the Revisors \$65.00 was referred back to the Finance Committee as it was thought that the jump from \$36.00 to \$65.00 was excessive.
His Worship stated that if the town was to install the proposed new system of accounting it should be undertaken at once so as to be ready for the beginning of the next fiscal year.
Coun. Dickie moved that Mr. Belzja of the firm of Belyea & McNeish, accountants, St. John be requested to come to Campbellton at the earliest possible date and confer with the Council as to what system he would introduce, and show Council what benefit would be derived from said system.—Carried.

WILL ARRIVE HOME IN DECEMBER

Private Allen Dickson Will Spend Christmas With His Parents.

The Honorable Charles Marcell, M. P. for Bonaventure County, has received a communication from the Minister of Militia and Defence informing him that Pte. Allen Andrew Dickson will reach Canada about the 15th of December. This will be good news for his family and all his friends.
AS GUARDIANS.
In the matter of Cluny Reid and John Chalmers Reid, infant children of the late James A. Reid, of Charlottetown, Dr. J. B. M. Baxter, on behalf of Hugh A. Carr, Campbellton, Wednesday morning presented a petition to Mr. Justice Grimmer at St. John for the appointment of George Chalmers and Isabella McCurdy, an uncle and grandmother of the children, as guardians of their persons and estate. An order was made referring the application to George G. Gilbert, K. C., Master of the Supreme Court, to report.

SUCCESSFUL FOUND DAY.
The Girls Guild in connection with the Hotel Dieu had a very successful found day on Tuesday. A large quantity of useful household goods was received as well as a substantial sum of money.
The members of the Girls' Guild, who were in charge of Found Day extend their sincere thanks to all those who so generously contributed.
On motion of Councillor Devereaux, Councillors McKay, Ingram and Matthews were appointed a Local Board in connection with the Government's Housing Scheme, this Board to have authority to issue orders on the town treasurer for payment of money under this Scheme when the applicants had executed a mortgage in favor of the town for the amount to be advanced them, the mortgage to be subject to the approval of the town solicitor.
Coun. Matthews of the Fire Protection Committee reported that the work of the new fire station was progressing satisfactorily, although there was some delay in getting brick and iron beams but these would arrive this week. Already \$6,000 had been expended. This included a large quantity of building material now on the lot.
The matter of providing funds for the work were discussed.
Coun. McKay moved that the Council be authorized to issue debentures for an amount not exceeding \$20,000 to run for thirty years and bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable half-yearly.—Carried.
Coun. Dickie made a report on the water situation. An improvement was shown and arrangements were being made to assure an adequate supply for the winter.
An estimate for the installation of a permanent electrically driven pump of a capacity of 600 gallons per minute was given at \$270. This was for a pump installed at Walker Brook near the race track.
Coun. McKay spoke strongly in favor of going after Parker lake water and said he was confident the town could get water from this source in a very short time and at very low cost.
Coun. Matthews moved that J. P. Swaine, architect be paid \$500.00 on account for preparing plans and specifications for Fire Station.—Carried.
On motion of Coun. Devereaux the electric light committee was authorized to extend light system on Duncan street to enable residents who own their houses wired to get light.
The Council then adjourned.

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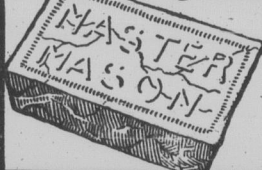

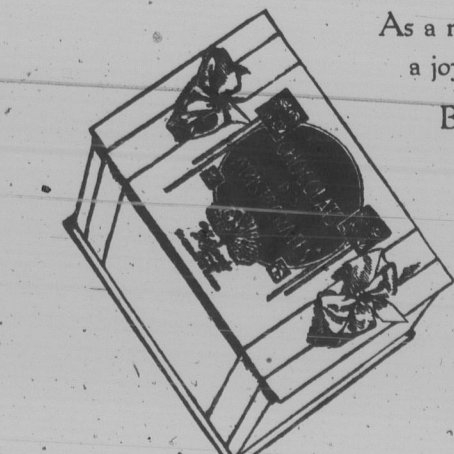

ELECTRIC POWER.

The recent announcement by Premier Foster that a bill would be introduced at the next session of the Legislature providing for development by the government of water power in New Brunswick, has caused widespread interest and much favorable comment throughout the province. Following the government's activity in connection with a complete survey of water power possibilities and the legislation adopted last year enabling the government to assist any private concern wishing to develop power, the legislation which the premier forecasts will be taken as further evidence of the government's good faith in carrying out a scheme for operating at 150,000 volts have demonstrated their practical ability "one of new business enterprise."

A hydro-electric expert explains that recent achievements are increasing the distance of economical transmission of electric energy. For several years after long distance transmission had been introduced, he says, of approximately 1,000 volts per mile it was found later that the distance allowed could be as much as two miles per 1,000 volts, which means that "lines operating at about 100,000 volts pressure have been transmitting energy over distances exceeding 200 miles. More recently, lines operating at 150,000 volts have demonstrated their practical ability in successful operations for years.

This expert explains that the advantages of long distance transmission are of particular interest to Canada, where much of our water power is found in large units, but he points out that some of the Canadian provinces the distances from small water powers are not great.

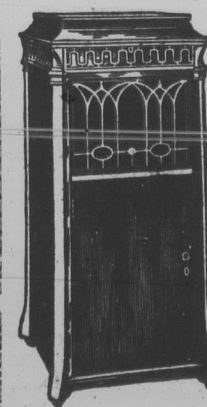

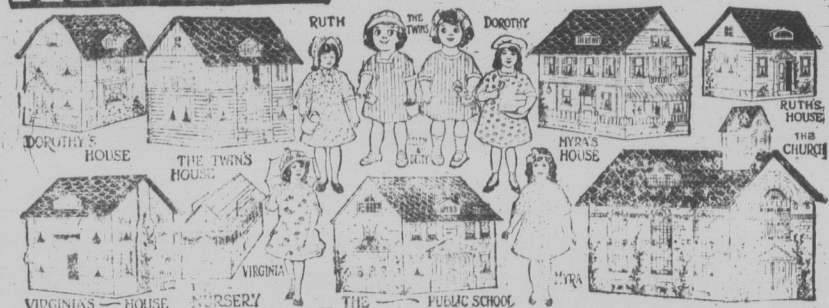

PLAYED JOKE ON THE HUNS

Six Indians Had Fun for Three Days Talking Over a Tapped Telephone Wire.

Because of the nature of the coun-

try over which American troops fought

in the Meuse-Argonne offensive, the

Germans found it easy at times to cut

in on our field telephone wires.

The commander of one brigade of

artillery was particularly annoyed by

enemy wire tappers in a heavily wood-

ed section of the Argonne. Code mes-

sages from artillery observers were

being intercepted by Boche listeners.

The commander knew, as all artil-

lery men know, that no code is im-

penetrable when experts get working on

it.

The artillery commander took up

with the colonel of one of the line reg-

iments the question of the Hun's wire-

tapping activities. And the colonel

hit upon an idea.

Two Indians, both of proud Sioux

lineage, members of one of his com-

panies, were assigned as telephone

operators. One was to go forward

with the artillery observer, the other

to remain at the brigade receiving end

of the wire which the artillery com-

mander was certain the Germans had

tapped somewhere along the line.

Now, when two Sioux Indians get

talking together in their own tongue,

what they say sounds very much like

code talk. Anyway, it raised hell

with the code experts of certain Ger-

man guard units.

The Sioux stuck on their jobs for

three days and nights. They and the

artillery commander and their own

colonel enjoyed the situation immen-

sely. If the Germans got any fuss out

of it they kept it to themselves.

OLD LONDON BELL FOUNDRIES

Relics of Many of Them Are Still to

Be Found Scattered Through

the British Capital.

In the days before clocks, to say

nothing of watches, were common the

bells of London occupied a much more

important position than they do to-

day. Precious depended on this bell

and that to call them very unwillingly

in the city. Relics of them are found

the foundries have been preserved, but

others, like the Whitechapel Bell

foundry, which has been charged with

restoring and rehanging the bells of

Westminster abbey for the peace re-

joicings, have continued to do business

through the centuries. The foundry

commenced business in 1570.

three or four times as great a pressure

as lead, while their weight is only one-

ninth as great, and they are water-

tight, insoluble and unaffected by

temperatures up to about 200 degrees

Centigrade. The tensile strength of

the material is 14,000 pounds per square

inch, nearly equaling that of the best

stamped, sawed-out and drilled, and as

an electric filament approaches por-

celaine in effectiveness.

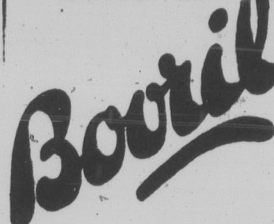

"A writer in the New York Times expects that, in view of the revelations made by a competent committee appointed by the secretary of the treasury to make a national investigation of the drug habit and the recent crisis respecting the prevalence of the use of drugs in New York that some measures of necessity must be taken to counteract the use of these narcotic stimulants."

"The effect of prohibition on those who now use alcoholic stimulants to excess is looked upon as important and the effect that prohibition has had on increasing the use of drugs thus far is a question debated with much heat and for lack of sufficient statistics it is an open one. Prohibition advocates demand figures from those who assert that this is the chief cause of the growth in drug victims. The answer given to this challenge is that the drug evil is such an insidious one, susceptible of secret dealings because of its concentrated forms of the drugs, that an army of government agents would be required to show what an extent the practice has spread in dry territory."

"The Toronto Globe, of April 19, 1919, sets forth the following: 'The New York police have opened war on the illicit drug vendors and gathered in hundreds of drug addicts to writing evidence from them. The prevalence of the drug habit in the city is said to be appalling. Similar stories come from London and other European centres of population.' Says an exchange: 'Despite free access of both sexes to the bars in the Motherland, women have recently resorted to the use of methylated spirits. Many cases have arisen where women have gone to the paint shops with the plea that the spirit was intended for mixing paint. Seven times stronger than the ordinary whiskey, and containing a number of ingredients considered sufficient to stop any desire to drink it, the Liverpool Licensing authority asserts that its use as a beverage is increasing. Its effect has been shown as terrible, a frantic state while under its influence gradually giving place to insanity.'"

"No country is exempt from the evil. It is one of the cries of the day. Interests that under prohibition the use of drugs will grow and spread, but New York, London and Liverpool are not dry towns. There is more warrant for saying that a taste for alcohol often breeds a craving for stronger stimulants, and that the dope fiend usually begins as a tippler. The growth of the scourge everywhere demands stricter laws."

"Dr. Ernest S. Bishop writing in the Medical Times for New York in May states that this drug evil existed for very many years before restriction legislation was adopted and to an extent far beyond general realization. He also states that a considerable majority of opiate addicts contracted their addiction disease purely through prolonged constant opiate medication, under conditions where they had nothing at all to do with the administration of the opiate and did not even know what they were getting must be recognized and accepted fact. That there is no class characteristic of narcotic addicts, but that the condition exists far more among the honest and self-supporting members of society than it does in the so-called underworld, is now a matter of easily corroborated record. The narcotic addict, is found in every walk of life, the laborer and the judge, the physician, the business man, the clerk, the laborer, no class or occupation is without its members suffering from narcotic addiction disease."

"The most urgent problem of the present situation is the one most sadly neglected in the past and only recently beginning to be appreciated. It is the problem of securing intelligent, competent and humane advice and treatment faced by the addict himself. War itself is always productive of narcotic addiction as one of its unfortunate medical concomitants. The Civil War left in its wake opiate addicts, results of the necessary emergency and other medication. That there are opiate addicts, resulting from the present world-war is known fact. Europe has its problem in this matter and we shall not escape ours."

The number who will be returned from the army can only be speculated upon, but it is undoubtedly much greater than will ever be made a matter of accurate statistics. There have been unknown and unrecognized opiate addicts in the army, just as there always have been in civil life. I have had occasion to the effect that some men went into the army already addicted, concealing their affliction from the examiners in the deliberate and desperate purpose and hope of being able to stop, or to reduce gradually their opiate administration under the circumstances and discipline of army life. Finding it impossible to do this, and fearing to reveal themselves to medical officers, or for some other reason, they continued their opiate administration throughout their service and will leave the army with their addiction unremoved."

"In the New York Times of May 8, 1919, the mayor of that city has asked for tighter drug laws setting forth that habit-forming drugs were being sold and distributed indiscriminately in violation of the law by unscrupulous manufacturers, dealers and physicians."

"In the New York Times of April 16 Dr. Copeland states 'that there has been a marked falling off in the number of drug addicts, only about five hundred men and women going there.' The doctor was inclined to ascribe the decrease to the fact that reputable physicians, who had previously furnished were now reassured, and were prescribing again in an effort to effect cures of the victims. Another reason for the decrease in the number of addicts was that the 'secret channels' of the traffic were resuming and that addicts were able to get their drugs without recourse to doctors."

"With this condition prevailing in the city of New York and the same apparently in other cities no reasonable man would want to declare that prohibition had caused that unfortunate condition. New York has not been until the first of July of this present year."

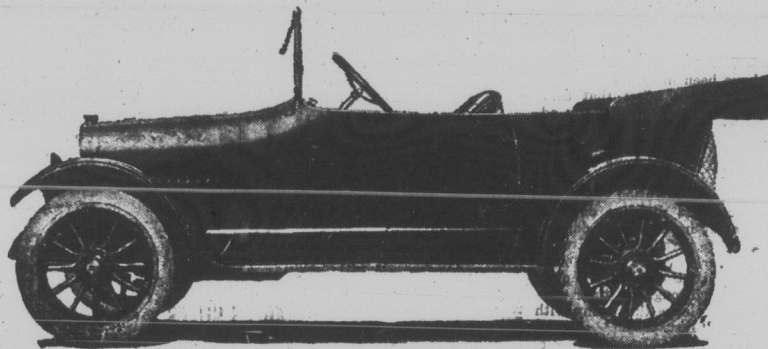

A NEW HULLLESS OAT.
(Experimental Farms Note.)
The introduction of a good, new variety of hullless oats by the Experimental Farms Branch has not perhaps attracted as much attention as it should. Free samples of this variety are now being distributed by the Dominion Cerealists at Ottawa. The stock on hand is not large, but as long as it lasts samples will be gladly sent to farmers in almost any district of Canada, as it is believed that this oat will be widely useful. The full name of the variety is Liberty, Ottawa 480. It is derived from a cross made in 1903 between the well-known variety Swedish Select, and a hullless oat from China. The new variety is decidedly superior to the old, Chinese sort. Threshing out free from hull, this type of oat furnishes a concentrated product of extremely high value which has only to be ground in order to make most excellent feed especially for young pigs and chickens. When carefully enough cleaned for use as human food, it makes meal of surprising fine quality. The Liberty oat has very good field characters.

RANCH BOUGHT BY PRINCE IS PROSPEROUS ONE
The Beddingfield Ranch, in High River District, of Alberta, is Great Territory.
—Winnipeg, Nov. 10—The Canadian ranch bought by the Prince of Wales includes about 1,600 acres, known as the Beddingfield Ranch. It was established in 1883, and is one of the most prosperous in the High River district of Alberta. The Prince has the option of an additional acreage which would enable him more than to double the present size of the ranch if he so desires.
The royal rancher intends to bring out thoroughbreds from the King's farm in England and devote his ranch principally to cattle and sheep. The entire province will benefit by the new strains thus introduced.
The ranch is already stocked with 150 head of cattle and 400 horses, mostly Clydesdales. It lies under the foothills of the Rockies where the cattle will graze.

400 RETURNED MEN ON N. B. FARMS.

Work of Settlement Boards Has Proved Highly Successful in This Province.

Four Hundred *****
St. John, N. B., Nov. 13.—The farming settlement board of the soldiers' re-establishment commission has already secured 400 farms in New Brunswick and placed returned men on them. The board has been busy with applications from soldiers wishing farms, and there are many of these yet to be considered.

Men who wish to take advantage of the loan conditions must show qualifications as farmers. Those lacking these essentials have been given courses in farming and so qualified. The object of the board has been to place the men on farms where they may be reasonably sure of making a success of the venture. Farms which are at present being operated by capable farmers are not taken over, excepting in the case of a son, wishing to buy from a father or where the people in possession are advanced in years and have no relatives of their own to carry on the farming. In practically every case, the settlement is called upon to invest ten per cent. of the cost of the farm and is then given twenty years in which to complete payment. Besides this, the board may advance enough money to purchase implements and stock. Where good farms without buildings are available, loans are made for the erection of the necessary structures. Loans, other than those for payment for the farms, are to be paid back in ten years. On all money advanced

CANADA'S AGRICULTURAL POSITION

The Hon. S. P. Talmie, Canada's new Minister of Agriculture, has summed up the outstanding facts of Canada's agricultural position in an article appearing in the November number of the Agricultural Gazette. He presents statistics showing the growth of Canada's financial burden during the past five years and points out means by which our national debt will be reduced. He says in part: "I am confident that this Dominion, through the development of its natural resources, will in time wipe out her debt. Forestry, fisheries, and mines all contribute their part to the revenue but by far the greatest returns will be derived from agriculture which industry we must continue to establish in permanency and increase in magnitude. One of the greatest responsibilities that falls on either the federal or provincial departments of agriculture is the conservation of the great wealth that lies in the virgin soil. Innumerable considerations are involved in this one problem, but the whole affair can be accomplished if we engage in mixed farming with live stock as a basis. This is the fundamental principle underlying success of agriculture."

SCHOONER LOST WAY IN STORM

Stranded Near Light-house at Pointe Des Monts and is Total Loss.

QUEBEC, Nov. 17.—The three masted schooner George S. Smith, while on her way up the gulf, lost her way in a snow storm and piled upon a reef about two miles off the light-house at Pointe Des Monts, north shore, and is a total loss. Early today the Etna, Rio Neigero went around about one mile north of Pointe Des Monts, but later floated Sunday afternoon about 2 p.m. A row boat was capsized in the wake of the C.P.O.C. Minnedosa near Sorel and one man was drowned.

TESTING SEEDS FOR FARMERS AND MERCHANTS

The Dominion Seed Branch with laboratories at Ottawa, Winnipeg and Calgary reported over 35,000 seed tests for the year ending June 30th. The growth of seed testing in Canada is indicated from the fact that only 5,775 samples were reported in 1909. The great bulk of the work in our seed laboratories is done between September and June when each laboratory may handle up to 200 samples per day. Only ten samples are tested free of charge for any farmer or seed merchant during the season. Over this number, the service is charged for at cost.

Official seed testing is the basis of Government seed control, which is older European countries is rated as a leading Government service to Agriculture. Any country without an efficient system of seed control soon becomes the dumping ground for inferior seeds from other countries, and low-grade homegrown seeds may be sold to unsuspecting farmers. Our system is frequently referred to in other countries as being the most practical and efficient. Its importance is now being better appreciated when it is recognized that imported seeds are not released from bond until they are approved at these seed laboratories, and when cereal grains, flax, corn, as well as clover and grass seeds, are marketed on the basis of fixed quality seed grade standards.

Johnson was caught by the machinery and thrown through an opening barely four inches high between two huge rollers. His entire body passed through this narrow opening coming out at the other end barely three inches thick. The body had been spread to a length of over twelve feet when it went through the four inch aperture between the rollers.

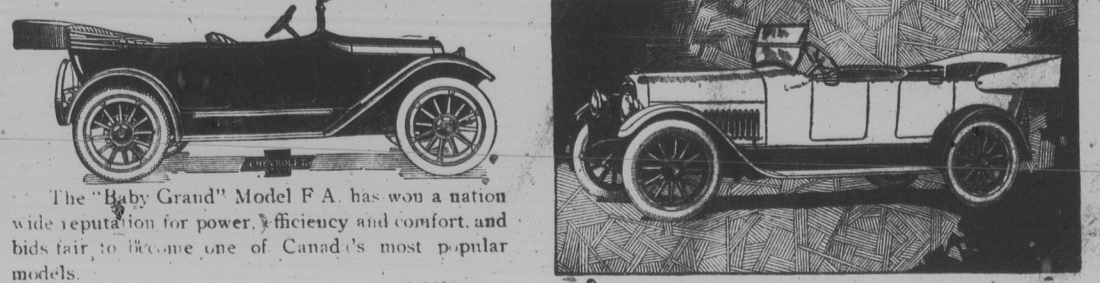
