ALARMING INTELLIGENCE!
THE STANDARD OF REBELLION
UNFURLED IN THE PEACEFUL
CITY OF KINGSTON!
We have certain information given us that
an organized rebellion is in progress, headed
by many influential ladies of this city, who are
summoning their energies and exercising their
powers of persuasion in waging war against
the prevailing fashions of the day.

A circular has been addressed by General
Peel, the Secretary of War, to the Queen's
Lieutenants of Counties, sanctioning the for-
mation of Volunteer Rifle corps. The Lon-
don Times is delighted that this appeal to
the patriotic spirit of the country, has been
made, and says that though the measure is not
an alarm one, and does not imply that the
shores of England are immediately threaten-
ed, yet it will serve to show Continental
Europe that having chosen to throw itself
into the hazards of a deadly contest at least
the combatants—victors or vanquished, dis-
tinctly or allies—shall feel that their
more prudent course will be to respect her
shores.

The subject of emigration to these colonies is occupying a considerable share of the attention of the press at present.

From returns recently made there appears to be a decrease of emigration to Canada during the last three years, which is exciting the attention of the metropolitan and Provincial journals.

There appears to be a prospect of bringing into use for domestic purposes, the oils which are found so plentifully in the township of Enniskillen.

The murders, Oter and Moore, were executed on Tuesday at Bradford, in the presence of many thousand spectators.

A correspondent writing from Belleville, says:—At present we have delightful growing weather; the crops never looked better.

It will probably be seen that the present system which regulates the disposal of our public lands requires revision, so that we may be able to offer to the British laborer a home-stead, on quite as favorable terms in every respect as he could obtain it in the United States.

John Henry Byers was executed at Meriville on Tuesday, the 31st ult., for the murder of Mr. Phillips, of Wainfleet.

The Leeds (England) Times says that Sir E. W. Head, the present Governor General of Canada, is to be raised to the Peerage of the United Kingdom.

We would respectfully suggest that Col. Playfair should be raised to some dignified position. It would be no more than right to confer some mark of distinction upon the gallant Colonel, in consideration of his valuable services.

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ARRIVAL OF THE INDIAN. QUEBEC, June 6, 9.30 p.m. The steamer Indian has arrived here with 23 passengers.

The London Times, speaking of the affairs of Mexico, gives a decided opinion that British sympathies are due to the party which secured the friendship of the United States.

The Cunard Company had sold four of their screw steamers to the Spanish Government and they are to be replaced by vessels of a greater power and size.

The Vienna Correspondent of the Times says it was credibly reported that Prussia would soon place six corps d'armee on the Lower Line and two on her Eastern Frontier.

A Constantinian letter asserts positively that general insurrectionary movements were being organized throughout all the Sclavonic provinces of Turkey.

Protection of Game.
NOTICE is hereby given that a CLUB, com-
posed of persons resident in this and adjoining
Townships, having for its object the protection of
the Game of Deer, and the prevention of the
same being slaughtered at improper seasons of the year, offer
a REWARD of FIVE DOLLARS for information
that will lead to the conviction and punishment of
parties acting contrary to the Statute in this behalf
made and twentieth Victoria, Cap. ninety-four, which
enacts as follows:—
I. No Deer, Moose, Elk, Reindeer, or Caribbo,
shall be hunted, taken or killed, between the first of
February and the first of August in any year.
II. No Wild Turkey, Grouse, Partridge or Pheasant,
shall be hunted, taken or killed, between the first of
March and the first of September in any year.
III. No Quail shall be hunted, taken or killed, be-
tween the first of March and the first of October in
any year.
IV. No Woodcock shall be hunted, taken or killed,
between the first of March and the first of July in
any year.
V. No Wild Swan, Goose, or Duck of the kinds
known as the Mallard, Grey Duck, Black Duck,
Wood Duck, or any of the kinds of Ducks known as
Teal, shall be hunted between the month of April
and the first of August in any year.
VI. No Wild Turkey, Grouse, Partridge, or Pheasant,
Quail, or Woodcock, shall be trapped or taken
by means of traps, nets, snares, or other means
of taking such birds other than by shooting, at any
time whatever, nor shall any trap, net, or snare be
made, executed or set, either wholly or in part for
the purpose of such trapping or taking.
VII. No person shall have in possession any of the
aforesaid birds beforeforesaid, within the periods
above prohibited, without lawful excuse, the
proof whereof to be on the party charged.
VIII. Any offence against any provision of this
Act shall be punished, on conviction before a Justice
of the Peace, by a fine not exceeding five pounds nor
less than five shillings in the discretion of such Jus-
tice, or by a term of imprisonment, by imprisonment
for a term not exceeding one month; or one
half of such fine to go to the Municipality, and half to
the person who has given information.
