The substance of the order is in the decree, which is as follows: "A decree in favor of the United States will accordingly be entered to the following effect: Adjudging that the stock of the Northern Pacific and Great Northern Railway Companies, now held by the Securities Company, was acquired, virtue of a combination among the pany from acquiring or attempting to acquire further stock of either of said companies; also enjoining it from voting such stock at any meeting of the stockholders of either of said railroad companies, or exercising or attempting virtue of its holding such stock: joining the Northern Pacific and Great Northern Companies, respectively, their officers, directors and agents, permitting such stock to be voted by the Northern Securities Company, or





The conscience of humanity has grown more sensitive to the claims of the needy and the helpless, and though the millennium is still far distant, nevertheless mankind is traveling upwards in-



London, April 9.-Perhaps the most significant fact in connection with the Balkan situation is that there has been no news of cardinal importance regarding it for some days. Reports of conflicts between Turkish troops and insurgents in Macedonia grow fewer daily, and the alleged success of the Sultan's pacificatory mission to the Albanians is practically the only new happening there. However, mailed reports show that the military party at Constantinople is greatly excited and is clamoring for war with Bulgaria. It is stated that the Minister of War has assured the Sultan that the army is ready, and that although the powers would prevent Turkey from acquiring Three Million Bushels Delayed by territory in the event of victory, which would be certain, the result of crushing Bulgaria would be the assurance of peace in the empire for years. The presentation of an ultimatum to Bulgaria seems to be regarded in Constantinople as being among the possibilities of the immediate future. 

Blessed the Rings.

Good Friday, some authorities say, was so named because of the good things which Christ gained for man through his crucifixion.

Others suggest that the name is a orruption of Goddes or God's Friday.

In Catholic England, Good Friday was the day on which the King blessed certain rings, a ceremony that was thought to endow them with a miraculous power of curing cramps. Hence they were called cramp rings.

"Creepings to the Crosse" was those days part of the observance of the solemn day.
