The blinds of public houses and of many private houses and shops are drawn in the West End of the city. The afternoon papers all appeared with mourning borders.

Up to noon no official bulletin of the death of the Duke had been issued at Sandringham Hall, but soon after 10 the blinds of the house were drawn and the flag on the church was placed at its. A train in motion raises these levers, both in front and behind it, so that a train approaching it in hind it, so that a train approaching it in either direction has the brakes applied by means of the lever striking the metallic means of the lever striking the metallic arm of the locomotive and the train is brought to a standstill without any action on the part of the engineer.

Ottawa, Jan. 14.—Yesterday the preliminary hearing of the charge of wifemurder against Leonec Labelle was resumed. John Fiannigan, brother of the deceased, Katie Labelle, proved she was in good health at 10 p.m. on Dec. 27, but at 2 a.m. next day she was dead. When he saw her the night before her death she was in bed, and showed him where she had been burned across the breast with carbolic acid. Next morning he saw her lying dead in bed with only a sheet over her, and her lips appeared to have been burned. Labelle had been drinking the Saturday provious. He thought Labelle and his wife had lived happily together.

Nurse McCormick, whom Labelle called early on the morning of the death, said she found deceased dead in bed without a sheet under her and naked. She was lying on her back. There were marks on the arms and behind the ears. Her right foot was under her left knee and the left hand under her back, on which she was lying. Mrs. Flannigan, mother of deceased, gave prisoner a bad name for his treatment of his wife, and said prisoner told her in her death. Her daughter often complained of Labelle's treatment; he was never a good son-in-law. Mrs. Rose Lemieux, sister of deceased, gave evidence as to the finding of clothing much torn and smelling of carbolic acid, from which poison deceased died. On the Saturday previous to the death, prisoner tried to smother witness, and ordered her out of the house. When she left he was dragging his wife about and abusing her. The case is adjourned till Saturday. abusing h

At a recent auction sale of farm stock, where everything offered sold for full value except the horses, the above question was a except the horses, the above question was a common one, and while the query was the means of bringing out all kinds of answers — some foreteiling a change for the better in values, while others could see nothing but dark prospects ahead—all agreed on one thing, and that was that the younger men present had seen horses as low once before, that the older men had seen them as low twice, and that within three years after each of these times horses touched the highest mark in values that they had ever witnessed.

In the general discussion all kinds of reasons why horses will or will not again reach paying values were given; the usual talk of the great changes in the street car system and the change in tha mode of handling timber in the woods was indulged in, and many other reasons were given why horses could never be needed in such large numbers again. These reasons seemed to be positive and could be understood, while the claims of those with more confidence that horses had been low and unsaleable before and that they quickly revived and reached highly remunerative values and they would do so again, seemed to be a prophecy, and no sound logical and mathematical reason could be given why it must be so.

The people in America seem to be always ready to rush, but the great trouble is they must all rush one way. We have now seen all breeds of cattle boomed to the highest notch; we have seen each breed of sheep take a great run, and now we see the Haakhney breed of horses finishing the list in the horse department by having a year in which they head the list for admiration and interest, but they are certainly unlucky in having their time when horses are low.

He was the greatgreat-grandson of George III.; his fiance is his second consin, once removed, and is great-granddaughter of George III., being, therefore, in the generation ahead of him. She is the daughter of Princess Mary of She is the daughter of Princess Mary of Cambridge, younger sister of the Duke of Cambridge, and Francis, Prince and Duke of Teck, the only son of Duke Alexander of Wurtemberg by his morganatic marriage with Countess Claudine Rhedey. She was born in Kensington Palace, placed at the disposal of her parents by the Queen, on May 26, 1867. Her family is comparatively poor, and her title is simply "Her Serene Highness." The match was regarded as a ove affair and therefore far more accept able to the people than some of the arrangements entered into by the royal

From the first the engagement was looked apon with favor not only by the royal which specially interests itself in the doings of royalty. The bereaved Princess is represented to be a most amiable woman, living nent, and taking an interest in those moing in humbler spheres around her. Much sympathy will undoubtedly be extended to her as well as to the parents of the dead Prince. The change from the prepar ations for "one of the grandest wedding eremonies that has occurred in England or many years," to the sombre funeral ar angements is a marked one. It should impress on us all the evanescent characte fearthly pomp and circumstance, Verily, man proposes, but God disposes.

Side by side with the cabled news of the death of the Queen's eldest grandson, Prince Albert Victor, comes the news of the passing away of a "Prince of the Church"-Henry Edward Manning, the distinguished chief of the Roman Cataolic body in England-at the ripe old age of 83. For some days Cardinal Manning has been reported sick, and when it was found that he suffered from a complication of troubles, including bronchitis and in flammation of the lungs, it was felt that at his great age there was little hope recovery. He passed peacefully away this

orning. Cardinal Manning was born at Totteridge. Hertfordshire, July 15, 1808. He was edu cated as a member of the Auglican Church at Harrow and Balliol College, Oxford, graduated in 1830, and was chosen fellow of Merton College and one of the select preachers in the University. In 1834 he was appointed rector of Lavington and Graffham, in Sussex, and in 1840 Archdeacon of Chichester. In 1842 he published hi first work on the "Unity of the Church, which classed him among the Puseyites the extremely high church branch of the Anglican communion. Two volumes of amblished respectively in 184 also published three series of "Sermons preached before the University of Ox-ford" (1844, 1848 and 1859). The deceased prelate was a man power, and he wielded an immense influence for good not only in the communion to which he allied himself in later life, but among the people generally. His latest exhibition of that influence was shown in the stand which he took for the overworked dockyard men in the great strike two years ago. His eminent ability is onceded even by those who have held tha he erred when he left the Anglican community, but no one has ever suggested that he was not thoroughly conscientious in the step which he then took. His death is a distinct loss to the Roman Catholic Church.

THE SUCCESSION.

By the death of Prince Albert Victor, without issue, the succession to the British throne, on the deaths of Queen Victoria and the Prince of Wales, falls to Prince George, who was born June 3, 1865, and is unma ried. He is a lieutenant in the imperial navy, and commands the Thrush, on the American station. He is a rollicking, good-natured fellow, as sailor apt to be, and has always been regarded as the more popular of the two. A good story is told of him in connection with a visit to Jamaica during the tour around the world by the Princes. A ball was given in their honor at Kingston. Prince George was devoting his attention to some pretty girls present, leaving the official dowagers to his elder brother. At last Prince Albert Victor rebuked him. It wasn't proper, he said, to behave so; he should maintain the credit of the family, and dance with the older ladies, etc., whereat Prince George retorted, "Oh, you go into a corner and sing 'God save your grandmother,'" and went on dancing with the pretty girls.

"Let them read my address," replied the mayor, "and they will have little difficulty in understanding my position. It is true I do not go into the trade question at great length, but I am convinced that my views on the subject of our trade relations will meet with general approval in the riding."

"I hear it argued that you favor reciprocity in natural products only."

"That is a great mistake," said Mr. Tayior. "While I wil! judge every measure that comes up on its merits, I may tell you that I do not favor reciprocity in natural products only. That is not enough, and the farmer knows it. We must have the duty taken off binding twine, and I will vote for that, no matter who moves for it. There should be no duty on barbed wire; I will vote that it be taken off. I think we can get such a reciprocity treaty with the States as will give us a profitable market for many of our products, and enable us to buy some things more cheaply than is the case under a restricted trade policy, and we can get it all without injury to our connection with Great Britain."

He had had some experience among his neighbors in doctoring eattle, but had never seen any horns cut off while cattle were alive. In his opinion the cutting off of horns as these had been done would cause very great pain. In dressing at least 50 broken horns he had found that the cows suffered very acute pain and that the injured parts were extremely sensitive.

Q.—How long would the pain confinue?

A.—It would continue until the horn was healed, and the better it was treated the sconer it would heal. If left without treatment it would heal, but slowly, and quicker in warm weather than in cold. November, the time when these cows were dehorned, would be a pretty cold month. I consider cutting the horns oft such cows as these as extreme cruelty. I cannot conceive of any necessity in cutting the horns off ordinary, domestic milch cows. Sawing the consolidated part off prevents cows from goring or butting. I have frequently sawed 2 or 2½ inches off. I would not dehorn my cows or allow it to be done even if it would improve them in health, improve their milk and make them more docile. 
