No Universal Suffrage for Belgium.

BRUSSELS, April 11.—The Chamber of Deputies, by a vote of 115 to 26, rejected the motion of Deputy Jansen in favor of universal suffrage. In consequence of the rejection of universal suffrage by the Chamber of Deputies, the general council of the Labor party will at once order a general strike. One thousand Socialists paraded the streets this evening shouting for universal suffrage. All the coal miners in the Borinage and the Frameries and Dour pits have quit work.

The Recent Earthquakes.

VIENNA, April 11. - Servia suffered most from yesterday's earthquakes, but the loss of life appears small. Two villages in the of life appears small. Two villages in the Province of Svilapinac were destroyed. The chief judge was killed at Jagodina by his house collapsing. It is believed that these earthquakes are a continuation of the recent earthquake in Asia Minor, which was meagerly reported, whereby the town of Mallattia, with 3,000 houses, was destroyed and 130 persons perished.

Japan Makes a Grab.

MADRID, April 11 .- Much excitement

MADRID, April 11.—Much excitement has been caused here by a dispatch to the effect that Japan has seliced the Pelew Islands, a group of islands in the North Pacific claimed to belong to Spain, 450 miles east of the Philipphe Islands, at the western extremity of Careline archinelago. These islands are claimed by the Spaniards by right of discovery. The Governor of the Philippine Islands has sent a cable dispatch asking for reinforcements, whether with the object of attacking the Japanese or not is not stated. The Pelew Islands have about 10,000 inhabitants and are very fertile. Their situation between the Philippine and Caroline Islands—both Spanish colonies—is regarded as a sign that Japan intends to encroach on Spanish possessions in the Pacific. The affair may lead to grave difficulties between the two powers.

advance of them. Comparatively few of the men who were in the ream at the time of the explosion reached the landling.

At the entrance of the shaft a rescuing party was formed by the pit surveyor. The party got as far as the landing at the seam where the fire started, but was driven back almost immediately by the dense smoke issuing from the seam. The surveyor took his men back to the surface. After a half hour's fest they went down again and forced their way ten yards into the workings. They found four dead bodies, which they brought back with them. Attempts to go further into the workings were vain, as the woodwork was burning and large masses of ruins were falling incressantly from the roof. One of the rescue party who ventured too far was killed.

The men who saved themselves immediately after the live broke out were too much confused and frightened to observe the positions of their fellow-workmen. They are unable to give any clear account of the distribution of the miners, and the

work of rescue must therefore proceed under all difficulties of uncertainty.

Not only scores of miners' families at the mouth of the pit, but also the miners who were saved and the men of the other shifts, there are numerous volunteers to undertake the work of rescue as seen as it becomes possible. At present the flames and smoke would render any such undertaking vain. Hand grenades, barrels of water and pipes attached to fire engines on the surface are being used to extinguish the flames in the mine.

In two sections of the flames has been followed in each case, however, by the accumulation of gas, and explosions may follow shortly. Another attempt to enter the seam in which the fire started has proved

resultiess.

Although the rescue party saw six dead bodies, they were prevented by smoke and heat from reaching them. Where the fire had been extinguished they were also unable to make any progress, as they could not remain in the foul atmosphere.

The number of men still in the mine cannot be ascertained, although it is known to be above 50. There is a little hope that some men found refuge at such a distance from the burning sections, that they are still alive.

At midnight the fire was again burning in all sections of the mine near the shaft. The service pipe, which was used to pour water into the mine, has burst. The difficulties in the way of quenching the fire have increased greatly, and the rescue of the men below is regarded as hopeless.

London, April 12.—The latest news is to the effect that the fire in the mine was virtually extinguished at about 10 o'clock to-day. The fumes of gas were, however, still so noxious as to drive out those who undertook to explore the mine in search of the dead and for the rescue of those who might be still alive. Further search will be necessary to ascertain the full extent of the calamity.

COMPARE TARIFFS. A Terrible Cyclone!

Causes Death and Destruction in the Western States.

Towns Wiped Out and Farm Houses Leveled.

Great Loss of Life Reported - Three-Fourths of the Houses in Page City Destroyed-Hail Damages the Fruit,

HIAWATHA, Kas., April 12.—The report has reached here that Willis and Powhatan, small towns south of here of about 500 inhabitants each, were totally destroyed by a cyclone last evening. The air here is filled with dust, almost as dense as a cloud. Hail did great damage to fruit.

St. LOUIS, Mo., April 12.—In the cyclone at Page City William Walker and his two children were caught in the wreck of their home and instantly killed. Three-fourths of the houses in the town are destroyed and many persons were injured. Reports from the neighboring towns of Mayview and Higginsville report great damage. In this city the flying stones broke skylights.

INDEFENDENCE, Kan., April 12.—Southwestern Kansas and part of Montgomery county were visited by a terrible cyclone last evening, which left a path of death and destruction. The little town of Parker, ten miles south of here, got the worst of it. Of the business houses around the public square few were left standing. Every residence in the town was damaged more or less and half of them were completely destroyed. It is known that several persons were killed and large numbers injured. The deadily wind swept on to the northeast, leveling farm houses, barns and fences.

HIAWATHA, Kan., April 12.—During the storm yesterday Owen Patten, of Robinson, was struck by lightning and killed.

OHIO'S MARVELOUS MOUND

Being Carted Away to Level the

The Burial Place of Giant Men and Coloseal Animals-Interesting Relies Unearthed,

Toledo, Ohio, April 11.— Wide interest is manifest in the demolition of the tamous mound in Walnut Grove, near Martin's Ferry, this State. The work of removal has been in progress for two weeks, and at least two more will be required. The earth is used for street filling. Human skeletons, skulls, bones, elk antlers, paleolithic utensils and implements, arrowheads, spearheads, pale gray flints, cup stones, agricultural implements, grante hammer stones, perforated stones, etc., have been found. Some of the relios are entirely different from any described in history. Most of them are found near the bottom.

Some of the skulls are twice the size of the ordinary skulls of the present day. Under one skull were 32 darts, all very fine specimens, and pointing in one direction. The major part of the stones found are different from any in the Ohlo Valley; some are beautiful specimens. Several skin sorapers were found and a number of monsterion points. The elk antiers found measure 7½ feet across and 6½ inches in diameter at the base. Some of the human bones are in a good state of preservation, while others crumbled into dust when removed.

The mound is 29 feet high and 117 feet in diameter. Over two skeletons found was a thin stratum of red clay, looking as if it had been burned and carefully covered over with the dirt to keep off the water.

The articles of personal use must have been exposed to an intense heat—only clay or stone could resist it. There is, however, at present one objection to the factory system as practiced here; that is, the whole of the milk taken from the cows is sent from the farms to a central factory where the cream is skimmed off. The skimmed milk is then either earted back to the farm—a troublesome and expensive thing to despecially where the roads are difficult and the distance long—or where the trouble and expense of doing this is prohibitive, it is sold at the rate of one-fourth and sometimes as low as one-eighth of a penny pergallon, to pig-fattening businesses, located at or near the factory. We understand that you have in your country a different modus operandi, which obviates the carriage of the milk to the factory, and the cream is separated at the farms and then taken to the factory, where a sample of it is tested as to its value by an approved process, the whole of the skimmed milk being left at the farm Accordingly, I would ask you if you would be good enough to let us have detailed in-

TO FIGHT CHOLERA.

Dr. Albert Roleur, of the Paris Academy if Medicine, a distinguished medical expert, recently visited and made a thorough inspection of the city of Marseilles, France, where cholera has been alleged to prevail to an alarming extent. The doctor gives the reassuring information that though there are cases of cholera at Marseilles, up to the present time there has been no epidemic in the real sense of the word. Dr. Roleur considers that there is more danger of & serious outbreak of cholers towards the beginning of the summer than at the present time. There can be no doubt of that, though in past years when cholera was epidemic in Great Britain and in France it got a start as early as Febru-

ary, and continued with greater or less violence until after midsummer. Because this plague breaks out in Europe every now and again, it must not be supevery now and again, it must not be sup-posed that it has its origin in that division of the globe. The disease has been at-tributed to an Asiatic source. Indeed, every recurring epidemic, whether modertely mild or very severe, can be traced to India, China or some far eastern land. What is known beyond a doubt is that after every reappearance of the scourge in Western Europe it is liable to break out at intervals, and to cross the Atlantic to America. An effort is now to be made to restrict its field of operations by whatsoever means can be placed at the disposal of civilized nations by medical science. It has been asserted, and we believe with a moderate degree of truth, that the chief distributing agency of the cholera germ, if not, indeed, its source, is the Mahommedan pilgrim from the far east. Many thousands of devout followers of the prophet annually travel long distances prophet at Mecca. In the overwhelming majority of instances, these religious de votees pay no attention to sanitary laws. They herd together like cattle when taking passage by sea; on land, they drive along with them such live stock as are needed for sustenance on the plains and in the cities at which they tarry by the way; and they leave the remains of the animals on the plains to fester in the intense heat, and to corrupt the atmosphere for miles around. Need we wonder that with such flagrant disregard for the elementary laws of health the plague that is said to always linger on the shores of the Ganges is carried across the continent, and finally, by the agency of traveling merchants or merchandize imported into Turkey, Russia, France and

Are we fully prepared? Each Government, municipality and citizen has a duty to perform before the question can be answered.

THE PRODUCTION OF GOOD MILK. As a rule the ordinary farm herd of dairy cattle does not suffer from excessive feed ing or too good care. Usually the trouble lies in the other direction. No dairyman or farmer needs to be stimulated to ill feed his cows. Good feeding is the only sort o feeding that pays. Drawing his conclusion from certain experiments in which increas-ing the grain in a ration-fed **cow** was not followed by an increased fat percentage (though the volume of milk was, and con sequently the total butter product) an "agriculturist" writer in a contemporary rushes to the extreme of saying that it does not matter whit you feed a cow, the milk will be no richer. The idea that brewery wash and distillery swill would promote a large flow of sour milk is all wrong, so he proclaims, as the result of the latest "scientific" inquiry. Verily the cow is a miracle-worker that can convert these slushy foods into rich wholesome milk containing a fair proportion of solids. That grain may be wasted in feeding there is no doubt but such teaching as the above is not only erroneous but most pernicious. In one of the tests to which this writer alludes, we understand, as a matter of fact, that the cows were under good care feeding before the experiments and feeding before the experiments with heavier grain rations began, so that the animals were probably up to their normal limit, which only continued development would improve. The test in development would improve. The tees in question only covered a limited period of time, so that no general conclusions of value could be drawn from it. The freshest information on this line, however, indiinformation on this line, however, indi-cates that the fat percentage can be promptly increased by feeding. The Ver-mont Experimental Station found that in testing the by-products of corn for feeding, richer milk (increased fat percentage) was produced in fourteen cases out of seventeen, and the total butter products as well. Fermers and dairymen will, there-fore, go on feeding well, knowing that they will get better returns and improve their will get better returns and improve their cows at the same time, notwithstanding the teaching of this "scientific" apostle of brewery and distillery slops.

Fatal Accident to an Aged Inmate of the Elgin House of Industry.



WOODMEN OF CANADA.

The Formation of a Head Camp Completed.

Bylaws Passed, Ritual Adopted and Officers Elected-London Made the Headquarters.

Composition of the World in Ontario met in convention here on Monday, Sovereign Consul Commander Root, of Omaha, being also in attendance. The report of the legislative committee appointed last November to secure incorporation was presented and adopted. It recommended the formation of a head camp with headquarters in this city. A constitution and bylaws were then adopted, subject to the approval of the commissioner for insurance at Ottawa. Besides the officers and delegates to the Head Camp the thirteen incorporators of the order were named as life members of the Head Camp, the compensation of members being \$2 per day and 5 cents per mile one way. The rate for insurance adopted by the Supreme Camp were amended to form a basis in Canada, the capitation tax remaining the same. The Sovereign Camp rivulas were adopted for use also in Canadian camps, and 30 cents per member per year will be paid to the Sovereign Camp for the Sovereign Visitor, the organ of the order. The Head Camp indorsed the claim of the Sovereign Camp for nearly \$1,000, advanced to secure incorporation, and will repay the same as soon as the cash is available. A special assessment of \$1 per member for dues was ordered to be paid for the quarter ending on June 30 next, to provide funds for printing and other necessary expenses. The executive committee was empowered to fix the salaries of the Head Camp officers, and was instructed also to obtain legal advice as to the power of the Head Camp to re-insure Canadian members in the Sovereign Camp, which in turn would pay all death claims in Canada until the membership here reaches 3,500, when this proposed arrangement shall cease.
