camages for libel brought by Mr. and Mrs. Zierenberg, of the St. James Home for Female Inebriates, against Mr. Henry Labouchere, the well-known Radical member of Parliament and proprietor of Truth, was decided this afternoon, the special jury returning a verdict for Mr. Labouchere, A rider was attached to the verdict declaring that the home should be under control of the Government.

On Dec. 8, 1892, an article appeared in Truth headed "Iz Zirenberg's a Home or a Jail?" and suggesting that it was really a laundry kept up for the benefit of Mr. and Mrs. Zirenberg, and that the inmates were forced to labor for them. The defense was that the words in substance were true in fact, and as regarded matters of opinion were in the nature of fair comment on a matter of public interest. The Zirenbergs shortly after began their action for damages. In opening the case Mr. Reid, Q.C., who appeared for Mr. Labouchere, stated that the charges made by his clients were true, and he gave a long history of the plaintiffs, no part of which redounded to their credit. Women, he said, who were not taken by torce into the "home," where, by force, violence, starvation, bullying and beating they were compelled to work fre the benefit of the plaintiffs. He cited one case where a woman activation a ball dress was taken to the "home" by three men and locked in. The plaintiffs claimed, of course, that there was no truth in Truth's story, and that in starting and maintaining the "home" they had, been actuated by the purest motives. Labouchere easily proved by overwhelming evidence that his charges against the "nome" were absolutely true in every particular.

An indian Loan of \$50,000,000.

An Indian Loan of \$50,000,000. London, Dec. 13 .- Replying to a ques ion asked in the House of Commons to tion asked in the House of Commons to-day by Sir John Lubbock, Mr. G. E. Rus-sell, Parliamentary Secretary of the India Office, said that the balances in the Indian treasury for the year ended with November were 15 240,000 tens of rupees, against year. Mr. Russell then moved the second reading of the bill providing for an Indian loan of £10,000,000. He stated that the Government must make certain pay-ments in gold in England. The pay-ments were usually met by the sale of drafts which were subsequently paid in ru-pees. The payments in England could not be met unless a certain amount of bills were sold. The closing of the Indian mint had been followed by a rise in England which explained the short sale of bills. During the current year there had been soid £897,000 in drafts against £6,202,000 dur-ing the previous year. The deficiency must be made up. The San Joaquin Crashed Into an Iceberg.

Then She Sailed 6,000 Miles Under Jury

A NICHT OF TERROR.

Rig-Thrilling Experiences. A New York dispatch says: Battered nd broken from collision with a monster and broken from collision with a monster iceberg, the ship San Joaquin, which runs between New York and Japan, reached port yesterday. The crew consists of sixteen men, of whom nine are Japs. There was on board also the captain's sister, Miss Larrahee of Roston.

The ship had just rounded Cape Horn on

The ship had just rounded Cape Horn on the evening of Sept. 8, when it met the dreaded terror of the seas. It was dark and the thermometer was dangerously near the point that to the mariner indicates the presence of icebergs. Second Mate Guthrie was on the lookout and Captain Larrabee was keeping watch himself amidships.

Suddenly there was a cry from the lookout "An iceberg." As the mate shouted he clambered down the ladder. A sailor standing beside jumped, and none too soon. There was a crunching of heavy timber, and it seemed as if the whole forward part of the ship was being ground to splinters.

"As I rushed on deck," said Mate Shields in describing the seene, "the top masts and yards and great blocks of ice came tumbling down to the deck, Shelving away out over us, higher than we could see, was a great mass of ice, while the red port light cast a lurid reflection on the face of the berg, and brought out plainly the mouths of great fissures and creases that seemed to threaten to swallow us.

"We should have been lost that was captalled."

"We should have been lost had we not struck her somewhat slanting. All hands were got to work clearing away the wreckage. The captain ran sit and there tound his sister manning the wheel. 'I guess we're lost this time,' he exclaimed, as he took the wheel, but he never lost his head. "Catching a breeze, we gradually drifted off, and when daybreak came we were form the head off, and when daybreak came we were going around the Horn for twenty years. It was at least eight miles long, and we judged about 1,500 feet high.

The bark Woosung offered assistance, but we did not need it. It took three weeks to fix up our jury rig, and under it it we have come 6,000 miles, sleeping only a day and night at Barbadoes."

If we could get the liquor traffic down to that, prohibition throughout the rest of the country would be a benefit."

TUNNEL TOWN MOVING. When the last census was taken Sarnia had a population of 6,693, while the people in Point Edward numbered 1,882. Thus the population of the municipality, in the event of amalgamation, will be 8,575, which, with the added G. T. R. shops employes, would insure the right of the town demand incorporation as a city.

Return of Exhibits from Chicago.
Canadian exhibitors at the World's Columbian Exposition are naturally anxious for the early return of their goods. Since the closing of the fair on Oct. 31, the Canadian staff has been at work preparing the goods for return. That process required waiting fer the return of the empty cases, which had been stored by the Exposition Company in a special warchouse, the packing of the goods under the supervision of the customs inspectors, and finally obtaining cars and loading the goods. This work, on account of the multitude of details, and the inadequacy of the customs service, has necessarily been slow. The enormous quantity of goods to be handled, and which it required several months to bring in, could not be got out in a week. Exhibitors must, therefore, exercise some patience. Up to Saturday last less than 100 cars of foreign exhibits have been shipped out of Jackson Park, and of this quantity Canada sent about one-fourth; so that the Canadian exhibits are being pushed forward at least as rapidly as those of any other country. It is hoped that all the Canadian goods will be shipped before Christmas. The efficial awards of the exposition will not be ready for delivery for some months yet, probably not until next June, when they will be given to the successful exhibitors without charge. 
