governor so described them in his memoradum. Waiving the objection to the bills, that though general in form they are special in their application, and are intended to grant a right of appeal to Albert T. Patrick to obtain a review of an order, if such order be made, denying his pending motion for a new trial on newly discovered evidence, I disapprove them for the reason that they introduce a new procedure to our criminal law, and tend to defer indefinitely the termination of

a capital case. Rice, of whose murder Patrick is accused, died on September 23, 1900, nearly six years ago. The law's delays in this case seem to me little less than scandalous. In cases of extreme

[From the Vancouver (B.C.) World.] It was at 2:30 p.m. on the 11th of July, 1897, that Herr Andree with Drs. Waiving the objection to the bills that though general in form they are special in their application, and are intended to grant a right of appeal to Albert T. Patrick to obtain a review of an order, if such order be made, denying his pending motion for a new trial on newly discovered evidence, I disapprove them for the reason that they introduce a new procedure to our criminal law, and tend to defer indefinitely the termination of

capital case. Rice, of whose murder Patrick is accused, died on September 23, 1900. nearly six years ago. The law's delays in this case seem to me little less than scandalous. In cases of extreme






