PERE MARQUETTE FAVORS PRICE APPLICATION

For Lease of Port Stanley Lots for Elevator Purposes-Freight Agent Youngs Says the Development of the Freight Business Will Greatly Increase Value of Lease of L. and P. S. R.

That the Pere Marquette Railway considers the granting of the application of Mr. N. R. Price for a 99-year lease of certain lots owned by the city of London at Port Stanley, for elevator privileges, as being very important to the extension of the business of the London and Port Stanley Railway, is evidenced by the statement made to The Advertiser by Freight Agent R. W. Youngs, of the Pere Marquette.

"There can be no question that when the renewal of the lease of the Port Stanley Railroad to the Pere Marquette, or to any other road, comes up for consideration, as it must in a very few years, the amount of freight known to be carried annually will have a great influence on the negotiations," said Mr. Youngs.

DEVELOP PORT STANLEY.

"If the London and Port Stanley board can show that a large amount of freight has been carried, the lease will be more valuable than if it were shown that practically no freight were carried over the road. "If the freight business is increased during the next few years, the lease

will certainly increase in value "The object of the city, I take it, is to develop Port Stanley.

"That was the original intention, as it would mean a great deal of business for the city of London.

"It would give London a water route.

"The elevator company handled 750,000 bushels of wheat last year, all of which was carried by the Pere Marquette.

"It was distributed from Essex to Ayr.

"Out of this, of course, the Pere Marquette, the lessees of the London and Port Stanley Railroad, made considerable money, and the city got its percentage. You see the point.

FREIGHT AN INDUCEMENT. "If the capacity of the elevator were increased to twice or three times its present capacity, the amount of freight carried would be much greater, and would be worth while for a railway going after.

"I know very well that Mr. Price has been offered inducements by other roads to locate at other points. "There was no wheat brought to Port Stanley until Mr. Price and his

company located there.

OTHER LINES INTERESTED.

"Some of the larger railway lines do not want Port Stanley developed, as it would eventually give them serious competition with a water line, and that would not be to their advantage.

"Last year 136 cars of water freight were brought to Port Stanley, direct from ocean steamers, on account of the cheap rates. That could be increased a great deal. THE COAL BUSINESS.

"I think the request of Mr. Price would mean a great deal for the city," said Mr. Youngs.

Whether the Pere Marquette would seek for a renewal of the lease when the present agreement expired could not be learned from Mr.

At a recent meeting with Pere Marquette officials it was hinted that the Pere Marquette might ask for a renewal of the lease, but the terms would be somewhat different from those now in force.

The company, it is understood, is anxious to get rid of all responsibility for the hill at the Port, as it is always a source of trouble. It is possible that the city, when the new lease is negotiated, will have to look effter Fraser Heights itself.

Mr. Youngs would not commit himself on the subject at all.

LOOKING INTO IT.

"We are just looking into the matter," said Mayor Stevely in reference to the request of Mr. Price for the lease of the lots at Port Stanley. "If it is not in the interests of the city to grant the lease, we will not grant it. That's all. We must be careful not to do anything that will prejudice the new lease when it has to be made four years from now."



Clause 2 provides that in all townships already opened for sale, the minister may, at the request of any purchaser Every person will some day have to or any person claiming under such answer for what he could have done. purchaser, declare such purchaser entitled to the mines and minerals thereafter found, if the same are the property of the crown and not staked out, recorded, leased or granted under the mines act. All sales of agricultural land under this act hereafter made in such townships shall include the mines

and minerals therein. Clause 3 provides that all reservaissued, where such is the property of the crown and not granted under the mines act, are rescinded, and all minerals pass to the owners of the land.



The insurance in force on the company's books at the close of the year, after deducting all reinsurances, aggregated \$11,140,203 28, under 70,698 policles, an increase of 4,673 policies, for insurance of \$763.789 91 for the year.

The company's assets, consisting mainly of first mortgages on real estateand other high-class securities, amount to \$2,366,929 04, an increase of \$266,-534 77 over the previous year. The interest and other payments falling dueduring the year were well met, and no losses were incurred in this connec-

The liabilities of the company under outstanding policies, and in all other respects, have been provided for in the most ample manner, the whole amounting to \$2,240,517 37. The surplus on policyholders' account, exclusiveof subscribed but uncalled capital, is \$126,411 67; and after deducting paid-up capital, the net surplus over all liabilities and capital is \$76,411 67.

The reserve on "Industrial" business has, as usual, been computed on a net premium basis with interest at 4 per cent for policies issued previous to 1st January, 1900, and at 3 per cent for policies issued since that date. The total reserve liabilities on the above basis amount to \$2,174,445 00, after deducting the reserve on policies re-insured in other companies.




