

> companies. The colonial office is empowered further to withhold diamonds from the a depreciation of prices. Contravention of the law involves imprisonment not exceeding the duration of the year, together with a fine up to \$25,000 and confiscation of the contraband stones. Further, it is officially notified that all mining concerns, with the exception of that which has passed into Cape Colonial hands, and two small groups, have formed themselves into a company which is being financed by a syndicate, including all the principal

German banks, with a capital of \$500,-000. Both the management and the shareholders, it is stipulated, must be German subjects. This amalgamation is said to involve 90 per cent of the diamondiferous area so far discovered. It is proposed by the Government to establish a diamond market in Berlin. Negotiations are proceeding with German polishers, and it will not be necessary to go outside Germany to have the stones ground, so that the whole trade can be retained in this coun-try. The debate in the Senate during the last week has developed the fact that the advocates of free lumber in the upper branch of Congress are strong enough to wield a strong influence on the lumber schedule, and probably to force a compromise on this important feature of the pending tariff The demand for free lumber is insistent, and it comes from some of the strongest of the protectionist Senators on the Republican side.

When Senator Piles, of Washington, which is the largest lumber-producing state in the Union, made his speech on the lumber schedule in the Senate last Monday, he was listened to attentively, especially by those western senators who are advocating either free lumber or a reduction of the duty on that product. 




