One boy is dead, two are perhaps fatally injured, and another badly hurt, as the result of the collapse of an elevator yesterday afternoon shortly after 4 o'clock, at Perrin's biscuit factory, on Dundas street west. The elevator fell six stories, or about 65 feet in all, and it is a miracle

that all were not killed. Earl Barrett, 364 Horton street, a young lad 16 years of age, lived but a few minutes after being taken out of the shaft. His body was removed to Logan's undertaking parlors to await the decision of the coroner. Samuel Govier, 9 Kensington avenue, and John R. Welspring, whose address the firm did not know, are in a serious condition at Victoria Hospital, while Alexander Russell, 363 Pall Mall street, is also badly hurt.

About 12 o'clock last night Inspector

Greer received an urgent call at the Hotel Nedford, where he is quartered, and at once hurried out into the driving rain to follow up the clue. He made a second expedition in a top buggy early this morning, and although he was as reticent as ever, when he returned for breakfast, something about his expression indicated that he had gained possession of some very important data in connection with the brutal crime. He spent most of the latter part of the morning in probing this latest lead, and the feeling of the local authorities is that some sensational evidence will be sprung tomor-

A Flat Denial. This morning's adjourned inquest, which once more attracted a packed court room, lasted not more than 15 minutes, only one witness, Hugh Maguire, being examined. Brinley, the shooting gallery proprietor, last night, the crown asked for a further adjournment in order to allow the detectives to produce the latest facts of which

All other state officers selected today were renominated except that the name of James M. Swift, of Fall River, was accepted for the attorneygeneralship, the present holder, Dana Malone, having declined to be a can-

THE IMPERIAL CONFERENCE. London, Oct. 6.-Evelyn Cecil, M. P. speaking at Aston, said he is very anxious to see the Imperial Conference develop. "First let the equality of the mother country and the domin ions be recognized with close imperial communications," he said. "Secondly let the nucleus of a Federal Government by the mother country and by the self-governing dominions over truly imperial affairs be formed by creating an efficient department in London with colonial representation as the connecting link between the periodical conferences.

TO ATTEND THE CORONATION. Melbourne, Oct. 6.—Premier Fisher and one or more ministers will attend the Imperial Conference. The invitation of the Imperial Government to send a delegation to the coronation has been accepted, and the delegation will comprise 11 Ministerialists, from the Opposition.

It is reported that the Government has informed the West Indies that it is unable to recommend any subsidy for a trans-Atlantic mail service.

San Francisco, Oct. 6. - George Fong, a member of the San Francisco organization of the Young Chinese Association, an alleged revolutionary body, was arrested today by secret service men just as he was about to shoot Prince Tsai Hsun, uncle of the Emperor of China. 





CANADA'S PEAT BOGS

One Close to Stratford Over 2,000

Ottawa, Oct. 6.-The results of a further examination into the peat resources of Canada, and particularly Ontario, made during the season of 1909-10, are contained in a report just issued by the mines branch of the department of mines. The bogs examined, their situation and extent are as

follows: Brunner bog, eight miles west of Stratford, Ont., 2,288 acres total area. Komoka bog, twelve miles from London, Ont., 900 acres.

Brockville bog, three miles from Brockville, Ont., 1,400 acres. Rondeau bog, on the shore of Lake Erie, six miles from Blenheim, 1,571

All this can be worked, the report believes, to a profit. A report is also made on the work done at the Government peat bog at Alfred, Ont., while the Dorchester, Ont., and Farnham, Que., peat plants are referred to favorably.


