Have To Circumvent Discovery During 15,000 Annual Health Inspections.

CITY OFFICERS ALERT

Medical, Plumbing, Veterinary and Other Investigators Work Constantly.

The life of disease germs in the city of London has become a hard They have little time or opportunity to get in their nefarious work under ideal germ-developing conditions without being pestered by one or more members of the London Board of Health.

This fact is evidenced by the re ports of the visits made by the various officers of the health board during the past year. Figures compiled show that about 15,000 visits and inspec tions were made during the twelve months. On an actual estimate, the daily visits made by different officers. of the board works out about 46 for very working day.

As indicated by The London Advertiser of Jan. 25, it would appear that Harold Shillington of this city. charged with the misappropriation of approximately \$75,000 in stocks and securities from a local financial institution, is in the old country, and developments this morning indicate that he may at this moment be under arrest.

Despite the reticence of local police officials, it was admitted several days ago in a well-informed quarter that the missing Shillington, subsequent to his departure from the city, was traced to Toronto, from which point, it is said, after a brief stay, during which he is alleged to have disposed of a quantity of bonds, he proceeded direct to Bos-ton, U. S. A.

WASHINGTON D C. Jan. 25-The aid of President Harding has been enlisted by the arms delegates to bring Japan and China into agree-

ington negotiations for the first time, the president today urgot the Chinese to accept the latest com-promise offer and thus remove from the field of controversy a subject which has become a serious barrier to the progress of the whole confer-

Whether the move is to succeed appears to rest largely with Peking. The Japanese already have indicated informally their willingness to make the principal concession proposed, and the president approached the Chinese only after the Japanese ambassador had informed the state department that his government was ready to accept a tender of good offices.

Terms of Settlement.

The settlement plan sponsored by President Harding deals only with the return of the Tsing-Tao-Tsinan-Fu Railroad, substantially all other questions having been agreed upon the separate exchange between Under the Japanese and Chinese. the proposal Japan would abandon her proposition for a loan to China, and the latter would purchase the road with treasury notes, payable at option five to fifteen years hence. China would receive possession within five years, but would withdraw her opposition to retention of a Japanese traffic manager and chief accountant during the period of payment.

Although several days may be required to reach a final decision. immediate effect of the day's developments was to bring into relief the importance of Shantung in the general scheme of conference accomplishments. As the negotiations have been drawing to a close the eyes of the delegates have turned more frequently to the simmering feud over Kiao Chow, and it is privately admitted that it is not by accident the big issues of the conference stand halted just short of conclusion. It is an open secret that until Shantung is settled most of the commitments partially entered into here must remain indefinite.

OTTAWA, Jan. 25 .- (By Canadian Press).-Measures for the relief of unemployment and distress through out Canada, the necessary funds to be provided by governor-general's warrant, were approved by the federal government this evening.

The regulations cover the period to the end of the current fiscal year, March 31, and provide for federal assistance to municipalities undertaking civic works during the winter months; to municipalities on account of unemployment where work cannot be provided, and for the relief of dis-

tress in unorganized districts. A special feature of the regulations is that in the case of unemployed former members of the Canadian or British forces now in Canada, and who are discharged physically fit, the government will reimburse muncipal authorities to the extent of one half the disbursements made for unemployment relief, the provincial and municipal authorities to bear the remaining half.

Has Wide Range. In the case of public works undertaken by a municipality with a view to the relief of unemployment, the regulations provide that the municipality must bear the normal cos plus one-sixth of the extra cost. The government will pay one-half of the extra cost, and the province onethird.

"We have a large amount of land under lease at several places in On-Among them Lindsay, Marmora, Rice Lake, Port Colborne, Port Hope, Belleville," he said, "where we to the city, Cobourg and at Kerwood. We started at Kerwood because our mining engineer, W. J. Cowan, was satisfied that we could get results there at a shallower depth than any place else. In all we have some 7,000 acres leased. We started our operations near here in a small way last July, and since that time one farmer has received \$25,000 for his 50-acre farm. We found the work of drilling very little rock formation. On top there was at least 100 feet of ordinary earth, and after that some lime stone, and then the oil sand, in which we secured the results."

Mr. Oxley had a small bottle of crude oil in his pocket. When he put in the bottle in the first place the oil was very thick, but the heat since then has made it quite liquid. It has not been analyzed, but those who have seen it seem satisfied that it looks and smells like the real thing.

Will Have To Remove Hundreds of Signs From Government Highway.

WELL FIRM SUED OVER PATENT LEAVE CROSSINGS CLEAR ABOLISH BANNER-GIVING

Placed To Obscure Natural Beauties.

When the Ontario department of highways begins to enforce the regu-Mowat when the winter assizes open lations regarding all billboard advertising as they are now drafted, many signs along the government highways in the vicinity of London and especially on the recently opened Lambeth road will have to go.

The new restrictions agreed upon by the governnment and a deputation of representatives of billboard firms in Toronto Tuesday last, provide that all signs shall be placed at least 1,000 feet apart, and no signs shall be set within 300 feet of road intersections or railway crossings. One London firm may have to re

move 500 signs on government highways, it is said, if the regulation is pressed. Usually the sign erectors place signs of several firms on a good site when it is found, and they are now asking how they are to determine which signs will have to go, and which may stay under the 1,000 feet apart regulation.

According to the new regulations, signs shall not be erected at all in places where they are liable to obscure beautiful scenery.
