The speeches of Hon. Mr. Lemieux and Mr. Henri Bourassa today were brilliant efforts, which kindled the enthusiasm of the Government supporters. The Solicitor-General presented an able argument upon the legal aspects of the case, and quoted Hon. Mr. Gladstone and Lord Salisbury as advocates of a separate school system. Mr. Bourassa made a powerful and eloquent appeal to English-speaking Canadians to open the Northwest to French-Canadians, and to trust them as the oldest Canadians, and a force which would resist American absorption and the adoption of foreign ideals, and prove a bulwark of the British constitution. 



The city council this year seems anxious to pay its way, without leav-

the present council that this is due to the fact that in the beginning of the year, before undertaking to prepare its estimates, it rushed into a number of needless expenses. Now, there were only three items of expense incurred before the estimates were considered: Market house repairs, about \$3,700; city hall improvements, about \$2,000; a grant of \$1,000 for the semi-centennial.

With regard to the market house. either to repair it or pull it down.
