EXPLOSION OF A BOILER TO T

Killed One Man at Staples and Injured Eight.

His Scalds, Ran Cold Water in the Boller While a Repair Was Being Made to a Draw Rope—The Stave Factory Is a Mass of Ruins-Provi-

Comber, May 22.—A boiler in one of the mills of the Nelbergall Stave and Lumber Co. at Staples exploded at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon and killed Raiph Welsh, an elderly man, who leaves a wife and three grown-up chil-

There were eight men injured-Rob-

leaves a wife and three grown-up children.

There were eight men injured—Robert Fisher, engineer, whose wife died a few weeks ago; Robert Reilly, wife and family; Oliver Chevalier, wife and family; Joseph Doe, wife and family; Joseph Doe, wife and family; James Bailey, John Kelly and George St. Pierre.

Those who are injured will recover, with the exception, perhaps, of Engineer Fisher, who is badly scalded. Fisher had closed down the engine to permit of some slight repairs being made to one of the draw ropes. It is said he carried a heavy, pressure of steam on the bolier, and that the safety valve was performing its functions. In order to reduce the pressure he had blown out a pertion of the het water and started the injectors. Those accustomed to sollers state that in all probability for much cold water was injected. There were but two persons in the engine room at the time of the accident, the engineer and Welsh, who sat on a little stool smoking his pipe. He was struck on the head by a piece of the flying boiler.

Escaps Was Miraculeus.

That more deaths did not result from the accident is miraculous, as the big structure is a mass of ruins, and an iron brace from the dome of the helier was carried fully one hundred redaway, striking the xoes of the Nelbergall general store, two stories high, cutting a large liels in the same and finally landing on the ground. A large square piece of timber was carried on a similar distance and landes in the back yard of a boarding house only a few feet from a boy, who was splitting wood. THE GOVERNMENT'S POSITION.

The intervention of the Ontario Government, preventing the passing of the Radial Railway Bill by the committee, is an important event in the history of the Province, It means that the Government recog-mizes its responsibility for all important legislation, and will take its stand and use its power in accordance with that responsibility. If this course is steadily maintained it will put an end to a great and growing abuse, the shifting of responsibility to committees, and the disposal of questions of public importance without the safeguards provided by our system of government. The Ministry and Legislature are the natural guardians of the municipalities, ought not to allow them to be coerced, and ought at least to discourage them from making improvident bar-gains. If municipalities are disposed to act unjustly or unreasonably, the Provincial supervision and control again supply the remedy.

Another announcement made by the Premier was that he intended to discourage 'the practice of bringing in important legislation at the close of the session, when there is so time for proper consideration. For all legislation affecting the pub-lic interest there should be the safeguards that are provided by our system of government—the publicity, the discussion at the various stages of the bill, the responsibility of the Government, Too much legislation has been smuggled through without these checks. If legislation creating wested interests is to be regarded as sacred, it must be deliberate legislation enacted with full knowledge and recognition of its consequences.

It is extraordinary that when the Government took this sound position. one that must commend itself to every citizen of Ontario, it met with so little encouragement on the committee; that it was opposed by a solid Liberal vote, and that the Liberals with the aid of Dr. Nesbitt very nearly succeeded in passing the bill. Out of nine votes cast against the bill, four were those of Ministers. While this is a gratifying evidence of the earnest and resolute attitude of the Government, it is surprising that it should have been necessary. It might have been supposed that the action of the Government would have been received by the committee with the same satisfaction as undoubted-ly prevails throughout the country. -Toronto News.

TROUSSEAU TRIFLES.

Dainty Things In Ribbon and Lace For a Bride's Boudoir. Almost every woman who is preparpretty, dainty things she is going to have in her little "home of homes," and a few suggestions may be of service and prove a saving of precious time and energy.

Waist Hanger.—Get a plain wooden coat hanger and wind some white mus-lin over and over until the frame is covered, then baste on some cotton batting tightly, but uniformly, and use a small amount of sachet powder. Cover the handle of the hanger with narrow satin ribbon, and then take moire ribbon twice the length of the hanger for each side and shirr so that a little ruffle is formed at either edge, leaving the opening through which to draw the coat hanger at the center of one side, then pull your frame through and reg-ulate the gatherings. Add bows where the handle is joined to the frame.

Sachet.-Cut the cotton batting for this in a heart shape and cut the moire about half an inch larger. Baste the cotion down to one side of the sachet and sprinkle sachet powder profusely between the layers of cotton. Turn the edge over and baste down. Shirr the narrow satin ribbon at the edge and at the other edge full on narrow valenciennes lace; sew to edge of the sachet and then slip stitch the upper part to the under part. Add a bow. One of these sachets or smaller ones of similar shape may be made for each drawer of the dresser and chiffonier. Corset Bag.—If the corset happens to

be of the girdle or short hipped type the five inch moire ribbon may be used; otherwise a wider ribbon would be better. Embroider the wreath and sew the edges of two strips about twenty inches long together. Allow about four

inches of the ribbon at the top for turning back. Line with sheer linen and sew on a satin ribbon of pink of a width wider than the ribbon used for the drawing strings. Chiffon may be added if desired.

by the Attorney-General.

The fence has been destroyed several times. Now the Attorney-General asks an injunction compelling Sir Edmund to remove the fence.

It is contended that the roads lead-ing to the Druidical temple are high-ways, and the public, therefore, had the right to use them, as they had used the right to use them, as they had used them without inferruption until 1901.

Sir Edmund Antrobus' defence is that the approach roads were simply private ways, and were the property of the lord of the manor. They could not be described as highways, because they only led to the ancient temple, and nowhere else.



The only entrance to the interior of the castle is by the drawbridge which still hangs over the ancient most, now partly filled in. Up a winding stair in the great tower is reached on the second floor "King Duncan's room," where are shown the King's suits, of mail, and where formerly was kept the very bed on which the blow was said to have been dealt by the treacherous hand of Macbeth. The walls of the tower are no less than nine fest in thickness. With is conical turrets and high-pitched roof, the keep is a typical example of Scottish feudal architecture. As regards the association with King Duncan and Macbeth, we may take it or leave it, as we are inclined to be aceptical or otherwise. At any rate, most people agree with the monarch's view according to Shakespeare.

In latter days another famous personage linked his name with the antique walls of Cawdor. On the roof above the entrance staircase is shown a secret chamber wherein lay hidden after Culioden the notorious Lord Lovatt, who afterwards ended on the scaffold his adventurous and profligate career.

Another reputed scene of Duncan's murder is the Castle of Glamis, the abode of what is perhaps the most renowned of modern mysteries. Everyone is acquainted with the fact of some strange secret known to the owner of the castle and one or two others, and the legend affords matter for much idle speculation among those fond of dabbling in occultism. Ottawa,/May 23.—Parliament received yesterday the first report of the National Transcontinental Railway.
Commission. It covers the period from the inception of the commission to March 31 las. In order to cover the first-year the commission was voted \$500,000. They have paid out \$440,466. and incurred further liability of \$175.-760.50, so that on the first year's operations they have exceeded their grant by \$116,221. F. B. Wade, chairman explains that the expenditure is necessary and took the responsibility. For the current year they ask \$1,233,500 for the expenses of the commission, and suggest a further vote of \$3,000,000 be made, so as to be available in case it is deemed desirable to begin letting the contract during the present twelve months.

For the purpose of survey, the commission made five divisions between Moncton and Winnipeg: division A from Moncton to the Quebec boundary; Division B from there to Clear Lake; Division C from there to the Ontarte-Quebec boundary; Division D from there to the 84th meridian, west lengitude; Division E from there to Lake Nepigon, and Division F from there to Winnipeg.

The surveys show that the difficulties building through New Brunswick were exaggerated and that a road can be built with a maximum grade for east-bound traffice 6 per cent, and for west-bound traffice 6 per cent, and for west-bound traffice 6 per cent, and for west-bound traffice 6 per cent. Suppose the L C, R, were to run ten freight trains daily for 313 days of the year, the cost of carriage would be \$3,018,711; for the Transcentinental \$1,783,518, or a saving of \$1,237,132.

FIFTY MILES OF FIGHTING.

Big Armies Are Engaged, Battle Be ginning Fronzy Night — Hand to Hand Conflict Has Developed.

Chanchun, Manchuria, May 23.—The armies are engaged on a battle line from forty-five to fifty miles wide, extending from the northeasterly bank of the Liao River west of the railway to Hailungchen, on the old Chinese road, to the Yalu River. The main divisions probably are not more than fifteen miles apart, but since Friday night the advance columns have been continuously in conflict, with varying results. On the left of Gen. Linevitch's centre the second Siberian army corps has repulsed the Japanese advance on Chungkuchen, and at the last report was holding the left bank of one of the tributaries of the Liao River.

St. Petersburg, May 23.—Gen. Linevitch, in a despatch from the front dated May \$1, announces that twe Russian detachments occupied the valleys of the Kazk, and Khanda Rivegs westward of Nanshentsi, on the Mandarin road, after dislodging forces of Japanese cavalry and infantry. The despatch from Tadlub also drove back the Japanese advanced cavalry sutposts. Gen. Linevitch also reported fighting near Shahotse May 18, but did not give the result. He said a Russian detachment cast of the raliroad approached the Village of Shahotse and was attacked by a considerable force of Japanese from the ceal mines south of that place. nent yesterday: "In the direction of Changtu en May 20, a force of the enemy made a detour to the eastern height at Santachou, and from the vicinity of a coal mine ten miles seat of Changtu, commenced a bombardment. Subsequently another Russian force advanced from the eastern side of the village, but they were repulsed. Another mixed force of the enemy entered Erhshihlipse, where they set fire to the village and retreated. A bedy of the enemy's cavalry, dismounted, attacked Tangshed on the morning of May 26. After two hours the enemy retreated in disorder, abandoning 300 men killed and wounded."
