At one year old, the cavities in the front teeth begin to decrease, and he has four grinders on each side, one of the permanent and the remainder of the milk set. At two years old, he loses the first milk grinders above and below, and the front teeth have their cavities filled up just as horses of eight years old. At three years old, or two and a half, he casts his two front nippers, and in a short time after the two next fall. At four years old the grinders are six on each side (permanent set), and at about four and a half his nippers are permanent by the replacing of the remaining two corner teeth, which have dropped; the tushes then appear, and he is no longer a colt. At five years old, a horse has his tushes, and there is a black-colored cavity in the eentre of all his lower nippers. The corner ones are thinner. At six years old this black cavity is obliterated in the two front lower nippers. At seven, the cavities of the next two are filled up, and the tushes blunted; and at eight that of two of the corner teeth. The horse is now said to be aged. The cavities in the nippers of the upper jaw are not obliterated till the horse is about ten years old, after which time the tushes become round, and the nippers project and change their surface.

## RECIPES FOR DYEING CHEAP, BEAUTIFUL, AND DURABLE COLORS,

## And by a process so simple and expeditious that all may adopt it.

Failure in dyeing a good color is generally owing to two canses-Inattention to the in structions of the recipe, and the inferior quality of the dyeing materials employed.

In all cases be sure that the articles to be dyed are perfectly free from grease or soap, as the presence of the smallest portion of either will seriously affect the color.
Particular attention is invited to the "Extract of Logwood," as being so mueh saperior to the wood for producing a beautifal black; also to the "Madder" and "Madder Compound," for giving a pure red, which never changes by the action of the sun.

Black on Wool, BiLk, or Corron,-For every pound of eloth it will require one ounce of Extract of Logwood and half an ounce of Blue Vitriol. Prepare an fron kettle with a sufficient quantity of water to admitt the yarn or eloth to be worked in the dye without being crowded; bring the water to a scalding heat, then put in the yarn or cloth a fow minutes; when it is thoroaghly wet take it out and drain it. In the next place add the blue vitriol, and, when dissolved and the water skimmed atefally, put in the material to be colored, and let it remain half an hoor at a soalding heat, airing it oceasionally; then take it out and rinse it in soft water. The vitriol water may now be emptled into a separate vessel, and the extract of logwood, dissolved in a sufflelent quantity of water, brought to a scalding heat and skimmed; put in the cloth; keeping the dye at the same temperature, and let it remain half an hour, Airing it frequently; then take it out and drain it Add the vitriol water to the dye, and put it in again, and let it remain Hitteen minutes, airing as before. Cleanse it well.
Madder Red.-Take one ponnd of Madder for every two pounds of yarn or cloth; soak the madder in a brass or copper kettle one night in warm water, enough to cover the yarn you wish to color, Next morning put in two ounces of madder compound for every pound of madder you have soaked ; then wet your yarn or cloth in clean water and wring it out; afterwards put it in the dye. Now put the kettle on the fire, and bring it slowly to a sealding heat, which will take about half an hour; keep it at this heat about half an hour if a light red is wanted, and longer if a dark one, the color depending upon the time it remains in the dye. When the color is made, rinse the cloth immediately in cold water, and it will then be finished.
Scarlet Red.-Take soft water sufficient to cover the yarn or cloth you wish to color, bring it to a boiling heat in a copper or brass kettle, then add one ounce and a half of Cream of Tartar for every pound of cloth; now boll a minate or two, and then add two ounces of Powdered Lae and three ounces of Madder Compound (the lac and compound must be previously mixed in a glass or earthen bowl); boil five minutes, Now wet the yarn in warm water and wring it out, and put it in the dye; boil the whole nearly an hour; talke the cloth or yarn out, and rinse it in clean cold water.

## A splendid blue may be produced in an hour by the following process:

Blue--For each pound of wool or cloth take two and a-half ounces of Alum, and one onnce and a-half of Cresm of Tartar. Boil these together in a brass or copper kettle for about an hour ; now take sufficient warm water to cover the cloth or wool, and color it to the shade you wish with the liquid blue; put the whole into the copper pot and boil a short time, taking care to keep it stirred; remove the cloth and rinse it in clear cold water, and hang it up to dry.

A pale, yet handsome, pInk may be produced as follows: One pound wool or eloth, half pound good Red Wood, and a quarter pound Alum. Soak the wood all night in warm water, add the alem, and boil the cloth with these ingredients for about an hour; take it out and rinse in clean cold water,

## RECIPES FOR DYEING.

W:ARRANTEDGOODCOLORS.

Brown.-For each pound of wool take a quarter pound Alum and two ounces Cream Tartar, and boil for half an hour. Take a half pound Red Powder, quarter pound Fustic, and two ounces Logwood. Soak these a night in sufficient warm water to cover the wool. Take the wool out of the alum-water, and boil with the woods for about half an hour. If a dark brown is wanted, add about a tablespoonful of Copperas.

Yellow.-One pound wool or clota, three quarters of a pound Fustic, quarter pound Alum. Put all into an earthen vessel, and pour on sufflicient hot water to cover the wool, and keep it warm all night; give it haif an hour's boil in a brass kettle, and then rinse in cold water. A much deeper and richer yellow may be made by using Turmeric Powder instead of Fustic, and proceeding in the same manner.

Green.-Take one pound wool or cloth, one pound Fustic, quarter pound Alum; soak all night in warm water to obtain a good yellow. Now take out the wool or cloth and drain it; then add to the yellow water Liquid Blue to obtain the shade of green required-the more the deeper. Put the cloth into the liquor and boil about half an hour; rinse in cold water.
A deeper and much richer green may be obtained by using Turmeric instead of Fustio, and proceeding in the same manner.

To Dye a Fine Wine Color,-One pound wool, half pound Red Powder, one ounce of Madder Compound. Sosk the powdered wood in warm water all night; mix the madder componnd with about half a pint of water (in a glass), and add it to the rest. Binse the wool in warm water and put it into the dye; boil about half an hour ; take out the wool and rinse in cold water.
A color almost as fine may be had by using quarter pound Alum, and boiling in the same way.
A still rieher color, but one hardly so durable, may be made in the manner following:
One pound wool, three quarters of a pound Cudbear, and quarter pound Alum. Wet the wool and wring it, then boil for about half an hour in a brass kettle, and rinse in cold water.

To Dye a Salmon Color,-One pound wool, quarter pound Annatto, quarter pound Soap. Take water sufficient to cover the wool, in which dissolve the annatto and soap. Rinse the wool in warm water, put it into the annatto mixture, and boil about half an hour. The shade may be made lighter or doeper according to the quantity of annatto used.

Dove and siate Colors of all shades, are made by bolling, in an fron vessel, a teacupfal of Black Tea with a teaspoonfal of Copperas and sufficient water. Dilute this till you get the shade wanted.
