In accordance with the above appointment, the Committee

Your Committee regret that the pressure of other duties prevented them from giving that attention to the work which it required. The quarterly examinations were attended, however, by one or more of your Committee, and it gives them pleasure to bear their united testimony to the impartiality and thoroughness with which the recitations were conducted.

The result of the examinations indicate on the part of the Professors a conscientious discharge of their duties combined with an earnest purpose to awaken literary enthusiasm, and on the part of the students generally an intelligent appreciation of their efforts.

The studies of the College were arranged during the past year as nearly as possible in agreement with the new Curriculum which will henceforth be strictly observed.

The Rhetorical Department together with Intellectual Philosophy formed a somewhat burdensome addition to Professor deMill's duties, one hundred and four Essays were written by the students under his direction.

It has not been usual to require Essays from the Freshman Class, but as it seemed desirable that the students should be exercised in English Composition during their whole course, the Freshmen were directed, while studying history with Dr. Cramp, to prepare papers, amounting to the number of thirty.

In the Theological Department, Lectures were read daily, on Theology or Ecclesiastical History. The Course of weekly Lectures on Ministerial and Pastoral Duties, commenced in the second term of the preceding year was concluded, and another course, on Baptism, was begun, which will be continued

next term. Instruction was given in Hebrew, and Exegetical Exercises on the Greek Testament were attended to once a week.

The Candidates for the Ministry, both in the College and the Academy, were frequently engaged in preaching during the year. Two hundred and twenty sermons were delivered, and many families visited. In accordance with the invitation of this Board, at the suggestion of the Associated Alumni, Dr. Pryor arrived in this Province on the 26th of April last, and is expected to commence his duties in the Metaphysical and Rhetorical departments on the first of September next. Your Board feel satisfied that this appointment will be hailed with joy, and the return of Dr. Pryor so long and so closely identified with our educational movements will be considered an auspicious omen.

The Treasurer has performed, on behalf of the College since the last Convention, a most ardnous and useful series of labors. Every note has been carefully examined and classified. Applications have been made and arrangements entered into for the satisfactory settlement of a large portion of them and four thousand dollars of Principal have been paid in and safely invested.

While, however, this indispensable work demanded the continued attention of the Treasurer, it was also deemed necessary that the effort for increasing the Endowment should still be continued.

In this work your Board have been favored with the valuable services of the Rev. A. D. Thompson.

Sometime in December last he commenced his labors in Horton and Cornwallis, and in a very few weeks had the pleasure of reporting nearly four thousand dollars of principal subscribed to the permanent fund. Since then, although his labours have of necessity been intermitted, yet he has met with a gratifying degree of success.

Your Board cannot report quite so favorably of the appeal to the Churches as last year, yet the results of that appeal have been by no means discouraging. Wherever the pastors of Churches have interested themselves and presented the matter suitably and forciby before their people, a warm re-

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sponse has been given. It will be necessary to continue, from year to year, this application, until the Endowment is secured. Your Board would therefore impress upon the Churches the necessity of making provision for this as for other benevolent denominational efforts. We cannot feel too strongly that the College is the Churches' property,—sustained by their prayers and sympathies, kept up by their free-heart d offerings, it will fourish;—deserted by them, it would need no prophet to predict its downfall.

But we will not anticipate such a result. Let the coming year be one of faith and trust, of prayer and work, that at its close we may be enabled to look back and say "What hath God wrought!"

In accordance with the provisions of the Act of Incorporation six members of the Board of Governors retire from with joy, and the entified with our street Convention may think proper. Their names will be innounced at the proper time.

After stirring speeches upon the subject of Foreign Missions, by Brethren Rev. A. D. Thompson, Rev. G. Armstrong, Dr. Pryor, S. Selden, Rev. W. G. Parker, Rev. J. Davis, Joseph Shaw, and Dr. Cramp, these Reports were unanimously adopted.

Foreign Missions.

REPORT OF THE FOREIGN MISSIONARY BOARD.

As the Board had given an express and written pledge to Rev. R. E. Burpe, before he went to India, that in the event of his leaving a widow and orphans, they should be provided for agreeably to the usages of the American Baptist Missionary Union, in accordance with a Resolution passed at the last meeting of Convention, your Secretary has ascertained, by correspondence, "the usages" of the Union with reference to the allowance made to the widow and children of their deceased missionaries when returned.

The Rule communicated by Rev. Dr. Warren, the Corresponding Secretary, (which it is not necessary to copy in full,) says. "A suitable allowance shall be made for their personal support. . . A widow without children is allowed \$150." Dr. Warren remarks, that as "the allowance for all children is \$81.81 per annum, a widow with three children would be entitled to \$395.43 per annum." But he states that the Executive Committee has "power to reduce from the maximum at their discretion." He adds, "You observe 'a suitable allowance shall be made; and what that is the Executive Committee must judge. . . . They look at the age and capacity of the widow, the ability of her family, friends, &c.,

Your Board, therefore, with these facts before them, and with the knowledge that our late Brother Burpe's eldest son was 16 years old in April last, have deemed it incumbent on them to reduce the allowance to Sister Burpe and her children proportionally, namely, from \$200 to \$175 for the current year. They recommend that \$140 be allowed for the year to come. This sum will, of course, be farther diminished, in proportion as the other children respectively attain to the age

of sixteen years.

It appears that on the breaking out of the disastrous war in the States, a Circular was issued by the Executive Committee of the Union, and sent to their Missionaries, apprizing them of the liability that they might be obliged to make provision for their own support. It seems, also, that the remittance for Bro. Crawley's support did not reach him at the usual time; nor did any intelligence of its being forwarded. Under these circumstances, as his removal must have left the native preachers employed by you without a superintendent, and consequently their labors must have ceased, he deemed it pecessary to sustain himself for a time from funds transmitted or their support. Of this he immediately apprized your board; and appealed to the Churches and people in these rovinces for assistance, to enable him to pursue his work, and continue to instruct and superintend the native assistants under his care.

It was hence naturally inferred, that an amicable arrangenint, satisfactory to all concerned, might be made, by which ur esteemed brother Crawley would become our missionary. our Secretary was instructed by the Board to correspond ith those interested, in relation to this matter. By this orrespondence, however, information was elicited, that the nion had made provision for Rev. A. R. R. Crawley's suport, and desired to retain him still in their service.

The circumstances narrated above, occasioned a temporary uspension of the direct labors of the native preachers in our employment. After a short interval, however, they ere again employed and supported as formerly. Indeed, 10. C. states that these devoted men of God, continued to our in His cause, as much as possible, while they were reliving no salary. Your Board have, therefore, instructed

him to remunerate them for the time so spent. In a letter dated May 16th, 1862, he says, "I was not obliged to use any of the money from Nova Scotia, &c., because very soon after writing you that I had dismissed the native preachers, the re-assuring letter from the Rooms in Boston was received; and as soon as possible I engaged them. The native preachers' fund, therefore, has remained untouched. Of course, as all anxiety about my personal support has ceased, all the money received shall be devoted to such purposes only as the donors indicate."

Whatever donations may have been given in answer to the special appeal made on behalf of Brother Crawley, will now be appropriated, unless otherwise directed by the givers, to

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the support of native laborers.

It is highly cheering to learn, that these faithful and zealous servants of Christ are now laboring with an encouraging measure of success, and with brightening prospects of increased usefulness. With reference to present indications our beloved brother writes, May 1st, "I have had three visitors in this morning, who strike me as being more earnest in the spirit of their inquiries than the generality of those who come to see me."

It is highly gratifying to perceive, that, hard as times unquestionably now are, the funds contributed for the Foreign Mission are increasing. A considerable amount has been received from New Brunswick. The receipts from the Western Central and Eastern Associations of Nova Scotia are in advance of those of the year preceding. While the contributions of different individuals and bedies of people, presented in the Treasurer's Report, demand acknowledgement, the zealous and successful efforts of our esteemed brother, Kev. John Davis, in Charlottetown and adjacent parts of Prince Edward Island, with the liberality of the people, deserve especial notice and commendation. May this worthy example be imitated by many! Your Board have also much pleasure in recording the fact, that the Baptist Church of Truro have undertaken the support of a Burman preacher; and has made a remittance of \$50.

This increase of funds enables your Board, that had with great reluctance reduced the appropriation last year, to raise it again this season with real gratification, to \$600, for the support of native preachers in Burmah. Of this sum \$200

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were remitted last winter, and \$400 in July. By this means Brother Crawley will have it in his power to employ an increased number of laborers, who are anxious to enter the Lord's vineyard there.

The contributions received for our Foreign Mission encourage the hope, that we may soon be able to send a Missionary from these provinces to Burmah, or some other foreign field. On learning that Bro. Crawley would still be supported by the Union, your Secretary published a statement of this fact, with a call for some suitable man to engage in this work. As yet there has been no response. It is to be hoped there may be soon.

There is, however, ample room for the enlargement of our useful efforts, by the employment of zealous and efficient missionaries already on the ground, acquainted with the language of the people, and desirous to devote themselves to the work of preaching Christ, under circumstances in which not less than six of them can be supported by the same amount that would be required to sustain one missionary sent from this country.

This Report can not be consistently closed without a grateful recognition of the Divine blessing very speedily attending the Female School lately commenced in Burmah. Brother Crawley writes to your Secretary from Henthada, May 1st, 1862, "I will add a line to let you know, what I am sure you and all interested in our recently established School will be glad to learn, namely, that the blessing of God seems already to rest upon it. Three of the young girls have expressed a wish to be baptized; and their conduct and manner lead us to believe that they have actually experienced a change of heart. What can be more encouraging to us than to see the seal, as it were, of the Divine favor thus resting upon our undertaking? Who can calculate the blessing of these children thus early in life being led to the Saviour?" Under date of May 16th, he adds, "The three girls alluded to in my last were baptized last Sabbath. There are four more candidates, who will probably be received next Sunday. We feel that we have great reason to thank God, and take courage."

Bro. Crawley urgently requests immediate assistance toward this promising department of labor; or which must be relinquished, if it be not sustained by us. Your Board sincerely hope that the worthy example of the Baptist Church of

Amherst in contributing \$20 for this important object, will be imitated by many individuals and churches. So disastrous would be the suspension of the School under existing circumstances, that your Board beg to recommend the making of an immediate appropriation for it, and the adoption of measures to ensure its continuance.

"Let us not be weary in well-doing; for in due season we shall reap, if we fair t not."

Ministerial Education.

The Committee on Ministerial Education submitted the fcllowing Report, which was adopted.

REPORT OF NOVA SCOTIA BOARD FOR 1861-2.

The amount of funds placed at our disposal since the last Convention, - - £39 7 0
Amount expended, - - - 28 5 3

Balance in the Treasurer's hands, - - 11 1 9

The number of young men who have received aid during the past year is 10. On December 30, 1861, five received £5 each, and two received £4 each. On February 6, 1862, two others received £4 each. On June 4, 1862, nine of the foregoing received £2 5s. each.

In reference to a Resolution passed at a meeting of various educational Boards, held in the library of Acadia College in June, 1861, we have to report that the extract from the Will of the late W. S. DeWolff, Esq., has been submitted to the Hon. J. W. Johnston, and his opinion thereon received, of which the following is a copy:

"A resolution has been handed me requesting my opinion 'As to the expediency of appropriating any portion of the DeWolff bequest to the salary of the Theological Professor of Acadia College.'

"Expediency," I presume, means legality, as in the latter. aspect alone the question would be submitted to me.

I have examined the clause in Mr. DeWolf's will, and my opinion is that by the sound construction of the direction, that half the yearly interest shall be appropriated for and towards the education, at the said College, of destitute young men of good character and standing," this fund should be appropriated directly in aid of the education of specific young men of the character and circumstances indicated, not indirectly and in aid of all the students. And I am of the opinion that an appropriation towards the salary of the Theological Professor was not in contemplation by the Testator, and would not be conformable with the bequest."

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This Board, will, therefore, from this date draw upon the Governors of Acadia College for the sum of £30 per annum.

It having been proposed to this Board to unite with the other benevolent organizations of our denomination in Nova Scotia in the employing of an agent for 3 or 6 months, we deem it desirable to accede to such a proposition, and recommend the adoption of that course as soon as the preliminary arrangements with other Boards are concluded.

At a meeting of the Ministerial Education Board, held

June 4, 1862, the following resolution was passed:

Rev. W. H. Humphrey, the late Secretary, now removed from the province on account of ill health, and pray that the means used may be attended with the Divine blessing, that his health may be restored so that the valuable services of our brother may be long spared to the Church of Christ and the world."

In presenting the above report we would beg to state that another year's experience in dispensing the funds entrusted to this Board has deepened our conviction of the importance of the object sought to be attained by its formation, the immense benefits conferred on our denomination by the accomplishment of that object, and therefore the desirableness of our churches appreciating it more highly and contributing to it more liberally. The number of young men who have applied for aid, the high character and satisfactory progress of those to whom it has been given, the fact that without it some of the most promising of the students at our institutions would not be able to continue there, are things which compel us to feel grateful to Almighty God for what it has been the privilege of this Board to accomplish, and to desire for it such an increase of

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We feel assured that all that is needed to induce our Churches to promptly and generously furnish such an enlargement of our finances, is a due consideration of the claims Minister:al Education has on their christian liberality.

We appeal for aid, to the intelligent friends of Acadia College, on the ground that the disbursement of the ministerial education funds, more than anything else will tend to render that institution valued, popular and beloved, by supplying it with students of the right kind, studious and godly young men, chosen and recommended to us by the Churches themselves, on account of their distinguishing piety and gifts. We appeal for aid to every Baptist who desires to see our denomination doing great things for God, by the proclamation and defense of the truth, for the work on behalf of which it is solicited, is, the seeking out and keeping on of young men whom churches and pastors confidently believe are called of God to labour for Him. We appeal for aid to all who can sympathise with youth thirsting for knowledge and struggling with insurmountable hindrances, for it is to such and only such that assistance is given. We appeal for aid to those who love to see the evidences of their liberality not having been in vain, for in what more satisfactory way could these results be seen then in that in which the op rations of this Board are adapted to present them, of pious, thoroughly educated men filling highly useful and important and influential positions. We appeal for aid to our churches, who wish to see a spiritual, sound and intelligent ministry occupying their pulpits, for the very object for which this organisation exists is to provide for these pulpits men whose only passport to them has been their special fitness for them.

Brethren, we ask you to reflect on these things, and then in the fear of God and love of the Saviour's cause decide what you ought to do for the increase of the funds devoted to Ministerial Education.

ACADIA COLLEGE.—TREASURER'S REPORT.

TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF ACADIA COLLEGE AT THEIR ANNUAL MEETING, AT MONCTON, N. B.

Not being able to meet you in person, I deem it my duty to place before you some information respecting the financial position of the Institution you are chosen to watch over. In assuming the office of Treasurer to your body in August last it was with a sincere desire of aiding the finances of the College, by arranging the accounts, and collecting as much of the outstanding Interest and Principal as could be possibly gathered together, the former to meet Current Expenses of the Institution, the latter for investment in respectable sized sums to be a foundation for permanen' support. The duty has been much more arduous than I anticipated, as working without a collecting agent in the eld, it develved upon your treasurer to act in various caracities and not only to take care of funds paid in, attend to the collection of rents, repairs of buildings and a general supervision of the Property of Wolfville, but finding several handred Notes-of-hand scattered over three Provinces it took much time and labour to classify and arrange them, and a large amount of correspondence in trying to collect, where it was practicable, and where not, to ascertain the character of the same. In this latter pursuit I have written no less than 450 letters, besides preparing and forwarding 100 Circulars to our Churches, many of which were accompanied with letters personally written. The result of my year's labour will be partially seen by the accounts accompanying this report; during the last twelve months, from the sums gathered in, £1000 have been invested in three Mortgages, the interest of which is payable half yearly. In investing I am aided by one of the best business men at your Board, and we make it a practice to have some legal practitioner search titles and prepare the papers, and ascertain other particulars in reference to safe and profitable security.

I have been able to pay all the current expenses of the year; your Board will therefore be able to meet the Convention free of debt. But to do this I have had to use about £100 received for rents; which should have been expended on the buildings, fences, &c., which are now needing extensive repairs, much of which cannot be longer delayed.

The Interest received on outstanding notes was greater than

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I anticipated, owing to getting in arrearages, some time starding, this must not be overlooked in providing for the incoming year, as I fear less will be realized from this source the next year. By the valuable assistance of Rev. A. D. Thompson who has travelled in aid of the *Endowment* a good part of the year, and by unsolicited Contributions, about \$5000 have been added to that fund independent of all expenses for agency.—Where this has not been paid in money it has been secured by Notes-of-hand, all of which I consider of the best description, and which will doubtless be paid as they mature.

I regret to state that your second appeal to our Churches did not meet with the hearty response you had a right to expect when considering the manner your former application was received. We required £250 to bring us through the financial year, knowing that all to whom application was made would not be likely to reply favourably, it was necessary to apportion £300 among the Churches, but we have received of this sum a little less than one hall. The amount asked of each Church was so small that we feel with a very slight effort in every instance it could be raised. The list published of the contributing churches will show that those which declined or neglected aiding in this matter are many of them among those best able to contribute. The interence then is that indifference and not inability is the true cause.

I would advise that the most effectual method be adopted by your Board to urge forward and complete the Endowment either by a vigorous agency or otherwise. It is my firm belief from mature consideration that our College must be based on a permanent and solid foundation by Endowment or it must be given up, as annual appeals to our Churches for deficiency of income are uncertain and not to be relied upon.

I would suggest that a stringent resolution be passed by your Board, making it imperative on all those owing Notes some time over due, to pay them up within a definite time, say six or twelve months, and not leave it to be pursued by your Treasurer so as to become a personal matter.

An impression prevails pretty generally, that the principal of the notes may be paid or remain unpaid at the convenience of the parties owing. This is an error I have tried to overcome, as it must be seen by every reflecting person acquainted with business, that no true or correct estimate of the value of our Notes can be depended upon till they are paid in, the in-

terest on notes is very seldom punctually met, and the change

in persons' circumstances causes losses continually.

I would suggest to your Board the propriety of passing a resolution authorising the rents to be reserved as a fund to meet repairs and incidental expences only; and not be taken to meet the salaries of the Professors. But in doing this you will have to make fuller provision for meeting your engagements with the Professors who ought to have their quarterly payments made punctually.

The Interest on the Mortgages may be relied on punctually, say £150, the Interest on the Notes will not likely be all collected; we may estimate it at £150 more, making Investments £300. You can judge of the certain income towards your engagements and should make arrangements to raise that part which is not certain.

Our Real Estate is unencumbered and is valuable for educational purposes, but should not be looked to for income, for the reasons before stated. In reviewing the past we have great cause for thankfulness, we have hitherto kept out of debt and our permanent resources are increasing. We have much to encourage as regards the future, but mere speeches and resolutions of your body or the Convention will not avail to meet our present circumstances and future requirements.— Our churches are expected to act, let each man-each church member—build the wall against his own house. In conclusion I would add that in assuming the cuty of Treasurer I never contemplated holding the office permanently -nor could it be reasonably expected that I should devote the time and attention necessary to manage successfully the financial affairs of the College, except on the occasion of an emergency, I would therefore ask your Board to seek some competent person to fill the office I hold, and as soon as it can be done, relieve me of the duty of financial agent.

Eight new Churches have been constituted:—at Graywood, Pine Grove, Brookfield (Colchester Co.) Cornwallis (the fifth of that name), Goshen (Guysborough Co), New Harbour, and Litchfield, Lower Granville, in Nova Scotia; and at Millstream, Studholme, Kings Co. N. B. Five new meeting houses have been opened:—In Nova Scotia, at New Germany, Granville Ferry, and Indian Harbour; In New Brunswick, at Harvey and the Parish of Kars, Springfield.

The religious aspect of the Denomination, your Committee feel compelled to state, is still of a comparatively unfavourable character. The gloom that hung over us last year is not yet dispelled. Our progress is at present but slow. Zion does not prosper and prevail as in former days. How is it to be accounted for?

Is it because the distinguishing truths of the gospel are held with less firmness, and taught less clearly and fully? Is it

because there is a lack of the strength and fervour of primitive godliness? Is it because Christians have become lukewarm, idle, selfish? Is it because the Churches have relaxed the bonds of discipline, or filed to realise their missionary, witness-bearing purpose? Is it on these accounts, or for any of these reasons, that the Lord's blessing, is so scantily bestowed?

In whatever manner these questions may be answered, the facts of the case ought to be very seriously pondered by us all. The Committee, therefore, deem it their duty to renew the recommendation of last year, respecting the observance of a Day of Humiliation and Prayer throughout the Churches of the Convention, that we may confess our sins before God, and implements the restoring influences of this grows.

plore the restoring influences of his grace.

And the Committee beg further to suggest that the management of denominational assemblies of all kinds might be greatly improved. They have become too dry and formal. Extraneous subjects sometimes occupy too much time and attention. There is not religion enough in our meetings. A larger infusion of the spiritual element is required; so that while business is conducted with due regularity and despatch, the gatherings of the Churches and of our Institutions may be truly times of refreshing from the presence of the Lord," and each place of meeting a scene of victory over sin and the world.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE.

The Committee on Obituaries presented the following Re-

port, which was adopted.

During the past year it has pleased the Almighty to remove from our ranks two of our ministerial brethren who had given good evidence of being faithful soldiers of Christ, and whose works of faith and labours of love will long be gratefully remembered by many who received from them the Word of life.

Brother James Bleakney was called to his rest on the 14th December, 1861: He had long been known as one of the most successful missionaries of our body. His labours were widely diffused, and in scarcely any instance without apparent results, over which all good men and angels must rejoice. The characteristics of Brother Bleakney's mind were rather of the useful order than the brilliant. Social in his views and judicious in his measures, his chief excellencies were his meek earnestness and affectionate zeal. He has gone to his reward, and having been, while on earth, by the grace of God, the honoured instrument of turning many to righteousness, will doubtless in heaven shine like the stars forever and ever.

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BROTHER JOHN MAGEE was taken home on the 23rd of December, 1861. He was a native of Cork, Ireland, and at an early age was removed with his parents to New Brunswick. Being brought up under the ministry of his father, the Rev. Thomas Magee, his mind from childhood was habituated to reflect upon the most important of all subjects. During a revival at St. Stephens, where his father was labouring he experienced a change of heart, and was baptized. He began his ministry as a licentiate with the church at St. George, and after studying for a time at the Fredericton Baptist Seminary, he was ordained pastor of the Church at Maugerville. Subsequently, after labouring a short time at Macknaquack, he was called to preside over the Church at Nashwaak, of which he continued pastor till failing health compelled him to resign his charge. The remaining two years of his life were spent chiefly in Missionary work. Brother Magee's labours in all these various fields were blessed to the conversion of many souls. But it was as paster that he was most highly esEE.

His conversation animated and cheering, his counsel judicious and prompt, his exhortations faithful and earnest, were valued by the people of his respective charges more than his pulpit labours, as the successful means, under God, of awakening sinners, leading sou's to Christ and uniting the Church.

Brother William Johnson, of Wolfville, has finished his course and taken his departure. Though not a preacher of the gospel, was one whose demise demands mention in this record. He was one of the founders of the Baptist Education Society of Nova Scotie. The cause of education ever lay near his heart, and received invaluable aid from his personal exertions and liberality. His life was made lovely by christian graces, and his death joyous by christian hopes.

The following resolutions were submitted by Dr. Cramp and unanimously adopted.

Whereas this year is the bi-centenary of the Act of Uniformity, which came into operation Aug. 24 1662, and in consequence of which two thousand ministers of the gospel were ejected from the Church of England, and exposed to severe suffering, losses, and punishment for their nonconformity;—

Therefore Resolved,

- 1. That inasmuch as the Lord Jesus Christ, the Head of the Church, has not given to any man, or body of men, the power of legislation in matters of religion, the usurpation of such power ought at all times to be met with uncompromising defiance.
- 2. That the attempt to enforce obedience to ecclesiastical law, or to impose religious opinions or practices by civil penalties, is altogether antichristian, and requires to be strenuously resisted by every loyal subject of the King of kings.
- 3. That the conduct of those christian worthies who refused to submit to the impositions of the Act of Uniformity, on conscientious grounds, and chose to obey God rather than menalthough by so doing they exposed themselves to poverty and penal inflictions, deserves to be held in admiration by all lovers of soul-freedom.

- 4. That the progress of civil and religious liberty in the British Empire since that period,—including the gradual enlightenment of men's minds, the defeat of sundry attempts to re-introduce persecution by law, the repeal of many obnoxious enactments, and the near approach to an equality of all sects, cannot but be regarded with gratitude, and joy, and hope.
- 5. That since, in these provinces, a greater amount of religious freedom is enjoyed than even in Great Britain itself, christians of all denominations having equal powers and privileges, and no sect being allowed to vex another, or tax the property of others, the servants of God should hold themselves bound to sympathise with those who are less favoured in this respect, and to aid them in acquiring their rights, and should show their thankfulness for superior advantages by unremitting activity in the cause of the Redeemer.

Resolved, That the Honbls. J. W. Johnston and W. B. Kinnear, and Rev. Dr. Tupper be a Committee to settle the respective claims of the Governors of Acadia College and the Nova Scotia Baptist Education Society, about the property of the College and that Society, and that the Committee take into consideration the Constitution and condition of the different bodies that constitute the Educational Institutions of the denomination, with a view to suggest any alterations that may have become necessary or desirable for the advancement of the interests of Education under the influence of the denomination, and report at the next meeting of this Convention.

Resolved, That the cordial and hearty thanks of this Convention are due and are hereby tendered to the Baptist Church and Congregation at Moncton, and to the friends belonging to other denominations, for the very generous hospitality and kindness shewn to the De'egates during our present session.

CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST CONVENTION

OF

NOVA SCOTIA, NEW BRUNSWICK, & P. E. ISLAND.

I. That the Convention be called "The Baptist Convention of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island," and shall consist of the Members and Delegates hereinafter specified.

II. That the objects of the Convention shall be to maintain the following Institutions, namely, Acadia College, and Foreign Missions; and to advance the interests of the Baptist denomination generally, by devising and carrying out, as far as possible, such means as may by the Divine blessing, tend to promote its walfare.

It is earnestly recommended that at the Annual meetings of the Associations, brethren be appointed to furnish reports to the Convention on the State of Religion and the progress of the cause of God, within the limits of those Associations, respectively.

III. That the business of the Convention shall be conducted by a President, one or more Vice Presidents, a Treasurer, two Secretaries, (one residing in Nova Scotia, and the other in New Brunswick), and a Board of Directors, consisting of twenty-five members, all of whom shall be members of Baptist Churches, in good standing, (in addition to Lite Directors) to be chosen annually by the Convention. The Board to have the power to fill up any vacancies that may occur previous to the next meeting of the Convention.

IV. That every member of a Baptist Church, in good standing who shall pay annually ten shillings or upwards, towards any of the objects embraced in the Union Societies, or into the funds of the Convention, and also every ordained Baptist minister in the three Provinces, in good standing, shall be a member of the Convention; any person paying five pounds, or upwards, shall be a life member; and the payment of twenty pounds, or upwards, at one time, shall constitute a Life Director. Every Church connected with an Association, and contributing ten shillings towards any of the objects embraced in the Union Societies, shall be a member of this Convention, and be at liberty to send one Delegate to represent such Church, and if five pounds are collected.

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good standing owards any of o the funds of ninister in the er of the Conrds, shall be a or upwards, at

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two Delegates. Every local Union Society collecting annually five pounds, or upwards, shall be a member of this Convention, and shall be at liberty to send two Delegates to represent them therein, and one Delegate for every additional five pounds collected; so as no Church or Union Society be at liberty to send more than five Delegates; and that each Association connected with the Convention be allowed to send five Delegates. The Missionary and Educational Board shall also be at liberty to send one Delegate each.

V. That all monies contributed by individuals for membership, or for the general purposes of the Convention, shall be appropriated, after the payment of incidental expenses, as the Convention shall direct, unless otherwise ordered by the donors.

VI. That the Board of Directors shall be empowered to meet quarterly or oftener for the despatch of business, at such place as the Convention shall from time to time appoint; nine members stall form a quorum. The Board shall also be empowered to wavene special meetings of the Convention, whenever the same my be judged necessary by a majority of its members.

VII. That the Convention shall meet on the first Saturday after the 18th day of August, annually, at such place as shall be agreed m by the Body; when, in addition to the appointment of the Office-bearers and Board of Directors, and the transaction of such disiness as may be brought before the meeting in accordance with Article 2 of this Constitution, a Missionary Board or Boards shall echosen, each consisting of fifteen members of the Convention, urer, two Secrated of whom shall be members of Baptist Churches, in regular sanding. These Boards shall hold their meetings at such places Bithe Convention shall annually appoint; at least one-third of Churches, in the members of each Board shall reside in the place of meeting, rinits vicinity; and five shall constitute a quorum.

> The Convention shall also appoint, once in three years, six overnors of Acadia College, in place of six who will then go It in rotation, in accordance with the resolution passed by this onvention at its annual meeting in September, 1850, and in wordance with the Act 14 Vic. of the Legislature of Nova votia: Chap. 37.

VIII. That this Constitution may be altered or amended at any Moual Meeting of the Convention, by two-thirds of the members resent.

RULES OF ORDER.

RULE 1.—At every sitting, business shall be opened and concluded with prayer.

RULE 2.—Ministers and members of Churches, not Delegates, invited to a seat with us, may speak on all subjects under debate, but vote on none.

RULE 3.—No member of the Convention shall absent himself without leave of the Moderator.

RULE 44—The names of Delegates leaving the Convention without permission of the body before the conclusion of the business shall be publicly reported in the Minutes.

RULE 5.-- No subject shall be discussed without a motion first made and seconded.

Rule 6.-No person shall speak oftener than twice on any motion unless by permission of the body.

RULE 7.—Motions made and lost shall not be recorded on the Minutes except so ordered at the time.

RULE 8.—The Moderator of the Convention shall nominate al Committees, unless otherwise ordered by the Convention.

RULE 9.—These Rules shall be distinctly read from the Chai immediately after the opening of the Convention.
