REPORT OF COUNCIL

OF THE

Dominion of Canada Rifle Association.

The Council of the Dominion Rifle Association has the honour to submit the annual report of the transactions of the Association during the past year:—

1. After providing for the expenses of the Wimbledon Team, the diminished government grant for 1877 was found to be insufficient for holding the usual competitions at Ottawa, and inasmuch as the members of the Team had been chosen and the choice approved by the general meeting of the Association before the amount of the grant was known, the Executive felt that they had no option but to expend the money placed at their disposal on that branch of the service.

2. Major the Hon. Henry Aylmer, M.P., having accepted the command of the Team, with Capt. Casey as second in command, the detachment embarked at its usual strength at Quebec for Liverpool on the 23rd June. Major Aylmer's report of the expedition will be found in the appendix.

3. The Team was again unsuccessful in the competition for the Kolapore Cup, but in other competitions they achieved as much success as could be reasonably expected, while the conduct of every member was unexceptionable. When the number of skilled marksmen against whom our representatives had to compete is considered, the number of prizes won and the scores made present a record of which we need not feel ashamed, however much we may regret our want of success in the competition for THE CUPS.

4. The Council sees no room to doubt that there are in the active force of Canada riflemen capable of holding their own in competitions, in which military arms are used, with the best marksmen to be found among the volunteers of the United Kingdom, and it is hoped that the change in the mode of selecting our Team, which has been inaugurated in the past year in accordance with the resolution of the last general meeting, will have the effect of bringing them to the front.

5. In accordance with the resolution above referred to the competitions for places in the Team for 1878 were held at the meetings of the several Provincial Associations. The conditions under which these competitions were held will be found in the appendix. The twenty highest scores made at the competitions represent:—

- 1 from Ontario;
- 5 " Quebec;
- 12 " New Brunswick;
- 2 " Nova Scotia.

The competitors in Prince Edward's Island, Manitoba and British Columbia not obtaining a place.

6. Representations have been made to the Executive Committee that in some cases the regulations for these competitions have not been complied with, and it is alleged that in one case the rules were overstrained in the direction of too much severity, while in others they were too much relaxed.

7. The parties who have made these representations have been requested to formulate them in a memorandum, a copy of which has been forwarded to the respective associations, for such observations as they may desire to offer.

8. The Council is of the opinion that a formal selection and notification of the Team should not be made until it is known whether the Government will grant sufficient funds in aid of the Association to enable it to meet the cost of sending the Team to Wimbledon next summer.

9. A nominal list of the names of competitors, submitted by the Provincial Associations with their several scores will be found in the appendix.

10. Major Aylmer's Report shows that the presentation of the Canadian Trophy to the National Rifle Association excited much interest among all classes who support the great annual gathering at Wimbledon. The correspondence between the two Associations, which with the letter from the President, Lt.-Col. Gzowski, in reference to the presentation, will be found in the Appendix, shows that the Trophy is highly appreciated by its recipients.

11. In the absence of definite knowledge what the intentions of the Government are as to the amount to be granted in aid of the Association in 1878, the Council can offer but few suggestions as to the future.

12 — Attention may be directed to the International Rifle Competition at Creedmore last autumn, and to the rapid spread of a taste for rifle shooting in the United States.

13. The signal defeat of the British team has everywhere, among riflemen, excited much comment, and many theories have been advanced to account for the rapidity with which our neighbours acquired the ability to ensure such unvarying success. This success and the discussions that have arisen thereon present valuable lessons for us, and it is to be hoped that Canadian riflemen will profit by them.

14. Although the international competitions were carried on with non-military arms, and in utter disregard of all conditions that must prevail in matches with military weapons, the prevailing opinion appears to be that the success of the winners was due neither to the individual superiority of the competitors nor to the weapons they used, but rather to superior organization, whereby the individual capacity of members of the team was combined and utilized in the most perfect manner. It is worthy of most careful consideration whether the shooting qualities of future Canadian teams, whether Dominion or Provincial, may not be improved and more fully developed than they have heretofore been, by selecting and working them under a more perfectly organized system.

15. To this end the Council has carefully considered the question of selecting marksmen to compose the Wimbledon

team and duly weighed the arguments advanced by advocates of the several modes of selection which have been tested by the logic of practical application. The conclusion arrived at after an impartial review of all the circumstances is that a more thoroughly practical and exhaustative method of selection than has heretofore been applied, as well as additional training of the team, as such are necessary for ensuring that it shall be composed of the best and most reliable marksmen in the Dominion.

16. It is believed that the selection should be made from a definite number of competitors nominated by the respective Provincial Associations, and whose necessary expenses to and from Ottawa should be paid by this Association, and from such other qualified competitors as may desire to enter the competition at their own expense.

17. The tests applied to such a selection should combine with shooting at the same ranges under identical conditions, an analysis of the history of each competitor's shooting, extending over at least one year previous to that in which the competition takes place, down to the day of the competition, and also a consideration of each competitor's normal state of health.

18. The competition at the ranges should extend over a greater number of days than has heretofore been attempted, so that the effects of changes in light and weather on each competitor may be fully known.

19. After the team has been selected there should be a further opportunity for training the members together for at least two weeks, and of bringing them under the necessary *shooting discipline*, to which end the captain who is to have charge of the practical work at Wimbledon, and who should be a thorough rifleman, should be named when the final selection of the team is made; this officer would then have time to become acquainted with the qualities and habits of each member of the team and with many circumstances which would assist him in the discharge of his functions.

20. It is desirable that as great a similarity as possible should exist in all the rifles issued to the team, to which end the

necessary number should be selected and brought to uniformity, or at least the difference should be ascertained and carefully noted by the captain.

21. Major Aylmer points out that the time allowed last year for practice after the team arrived in England was insufficient to enable the men to recover from the effects of the sea voyage, and the Council believes that there is force in the remark, and that certainly an additional week's practice under the training and coaching of an experienced rifleman would greatly add to the chances of success.

22. In order to comply with the regulations adopted on the 28th February, 1877, a design for a medal to be presented to each affiliated association has been adopted and the necessary number have been ordered. They will be distributed when received.

FINANCE.

The Treasurer's report of the Finances of the Association, duly audited, is submitted herewith, for the period from 19th February, 1877, to 21st January, 1878.

After paying all accounts which have been presented for payment there is a balance of \$965.45 to the credit of the Association, against which there are liabilities incurred amounting to \$543.00 as per memorandum accompanying the Treasurer's statements.

A detailed account of disbursements made by Major Aylmer, commanding the Wimbledon Team of 1877, will be found in the Appendix.

COMMUNICATION FROM THE PRESIDENT
REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

OF THE

DOMINION OF CANADA RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

It having been decided that it was impossible for want of funds to hold a Prize Meeting at Ottawa this year, the Secretary has only to report that he received from the officer in command of the Wimbledon Team for 1877, the Report of the proceedings of the Team in England which is published in the Appendix.

The scores and details of the competition held in the several Provinces this year with a view of selecting men to form a team for Wimbledon for 1878 were called for under instructions from the Executive Committee of the Council, dated 17th October last, and will be found in the Appendix.

By these returns it will appear that the competitions are certified to as having been carried out under the instructions issued under date of 26th July, and the result is shewn in the Report of the Council.

A schedule of the scores made by the twenty men making the highest number of points, with those of the "eight" next highest as waiting men, will also be found in the Appendix.

COMMUNICATION FROM THE PRESIDENT
LT.-COLONEL GZOWSKI.

TORONTO, 17th January, 1878.

DEAR SIR,—

Major The Hon'ble H. Aylmer, Captain of the Canadian Wimbledon Team for 1877, has submitted his Report to the Council and supplied all the information relating to the collective and individual successes of the Team under his command.

It may be desirable that I should send to you, as Chairman of the Executive Committee, a brief account of proceedings on the day of the presentation of the Canadian Challenge Shield to the National Rifle Association—a day which I venture to call a red letter day in the history of the Dominion Rifle Association.

Having been requested by the Council in my capacity of President of the Association to present the "Challenge Shield," and being advised of the decision arrived at by the Council of the National Rifle Association to give place to the Canadian Shield in the competition next in importance to the "Queen's Prize," I felt a desire to make the presentation in a manner somewhat different from that in which other Prizes offered for competition have been presented to the Council.

It affords me very great pleasure to acknowledge the friendly spirit in which the Executive of the National Rifle Association acceded to my request, that I should make a formal presentation of the Shield to His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge, President of the Association, and it is my pleasing duty, to express the obligation I am under to His Royal Highness, for receiving me most graciously and for the cordial manner in which he consented to accept the Shield from my hands. Tuesday, the 17th July, was the day named by His Royal Highness, to visit the Canadian camp and receive the Shield.

The Rt. Hon'ble the Secretary of State for the Colonies, the Earl of Carnarvon, accepted my invitation to be present and give his countenance to the proceedings.

It is only right that I should inform the Council of the many obligations our Association is under to this nobleman, for his marked

attention to the Canadians, by paying annual visits to their Camp at Wimbledon and always saying words of kindness and encouragement to the members of the Team.

I cannot do better perhaps than embody the following account of the proceedings on that day, as reported in the Wimbledon Volunteer Gazette.

THE WIMBLEDON MEETING, 1877.

(From the Wimbledon Volunteer Gazette, Wednesday, July 18, 1877.)

PRESENTATION OF CANADIAN PRIZE TROPHY.

"The following is an account of the interesting proceedings which took place in the Canadian Camp yesterday":—

"The occasion was the presentation of the "Challenge Shield," by Colonel Gzowski, in the name of the Dominion Rifle Association, to His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge, as President of our National Rifle Association. The Duke of Cambridge, Lord Carnarvon, Lord Wharnclyffe, Capt. Mildmay and many others arrived in the Canadian Camp, about 5 P.M., when a squad of twelve stalwart Volunteer Colour-Sergeants from the various regiments in camp, were drawn up under the command of Captain Urquhart, the Camp Adjutant, to take charge of the Shield."

"The Duke of Cambridge and the other guests having been welcomed to the Canadian Camp, Colonel Gzowski addressed His Royal Highness in a manly speech. He said: "I beg to thank your Royal Highness, for the honour you have conferred on our Camp, and also for the kind and encouraging words used by your Royal Highness, when you referred to the Canadians at the last spring meeting of the National Rifle Association."

"As President of the Dominion Rifle Association, I have been requested to present the National Rifle Association with a Trophy, but before doing so, I will ask your Royal Highness's permission to say a few words in connection with it. The first Canadian Team sent from Canada to compete at Wimbledon was in 1870. It was organized and sent by Ontario, representing that Province only; but since then a Team of twenty, selected by competition, from men serving in the active militia of Canada, has been sent annually, representing generally all the Provinces forming the Confederation. The uniform kindness and great consideration and liberality extended to Canadians, by allowing them to compete for almost all the prizes which

are competed for by Volunteers and the Army of the United Kingdom—thus recognizing them as an integral portion of the Army of the Empire, were incentives to the Council of the Dominion Rifle Association to mark in some appropriate manner the kind, the considerate, and liberal treatment extended to Canadians. A suggestion was made to present this challenge trophy; it was communicated to the Provincial Rifle Associations, which are affiliated with us and I am happy to say was most cordially received. The result is the Challenge Trophy which I have now the honour of presenting to your Royal Highness, as President of the National Rifle Association. In its design it is historical and allegorical. Historically it represents the triumphs of Rome, by the Seven Battles of Cæsar; and I venture to think, Sir, that it is not an inappropriate gift to place in your hands as Commander in Chief of an Army that does not know what it is to lose a battle. "He hoped the noble Lord, the Secretary for the Colonies, who had done them the honor to be present with them that day, would approve of the proceedings."

"The Duke of Cambridge replied—"Allow me to say that we are extremely gratified and pleased to accept this Trophy. I am quite sure that it is a very visible proof of the interest taken in this Association by the Canadians."

"I may also say that it is a proof that the reception they have met with here on every occasion, has been such, as to make them anxious to return again; and I assume also that you wish to express your anxious desire and hope to continue that close intimacy with the Mother Country for which you have been so conspicuous of late years, and of which as Englishmen we are justly proud. And I think my right hon. friend here, or any Secretary of State for the Colonies, must rejoice at finding the relations between so important a community and the Mother Country so cordially cemented. This may be relatively a trifling occasion; but it is one of those occasions that often show the real sentiment of nations, and I am sure that in this matter, I am expressing the sentiments not only of the Association, but the country at large."

"I am very proud to accept the gift on the part of the Association, and I beg to add my own acknowledgements and the full concurrence of the Secretary of State, in the remarks you have made in presenting it. I am gratified at having the opportunity of seeing your men who have come here with you, and I hope that we may have the pleasure of seeing them frequently, and shall have always the same interchange of cordial good feeling which has existed in previous years."

"The Earl of Carnarvon followed and said,—As you have been good enough to allude to me, I think I should express my hearty concurrence and my hearty approval of every single incident in the proceedings of to-day."

"During the last four years, it has been my good fortune never to miss on one single occasion the meeting at Wimbledon. There are good reasons why it should have pained me much to have been absent to-day; I should have been deeply grieved to have been absent when his Royal Highness came to receive this magnificent gift, and also on my own account, because I have heard a report, Colonel Gzowski, that you indicate making this the last occasion of attending here. I know I speak the feelings of every one who have been your neighbours here, and the deep interest you have taken in the meetings, when I say that it would be with the deepest possible regret we should feel that we saw you here for the last time. Lastly, I am rejoiced to bear my humble tribute of praise to the magnificent Shield, which you have now presented to His Royal Highness, and I will only say that I trust it may be gallantly contested year by year, and that it may be worthily held and may be one more of the many visible symbols of close union of Canada and this Country. This Shield is in fact a link in a chain that connects Canada with England."

"The Earl of Wharnccliffe then called for cheers for the Canadian Team, which were most enthusiastically given."

"The detachment of Volunteer Colour-Sergeants of the London Regiments, then hoisted the Trophy, and preceded by the band of the London Rifle Brigade playing "Auld Lang Syne," marched off to the Exhibition Tent."

The acceptance of the Canadian Shield, by his Royal Highness for the National Rifle Association, the very prominent place given to it by the Council of that Association in the competitions, and the very hearty manner in which the proceedings of the day were regarded by a large company of noble and distinguished personages who honoured the Canadian Camp with their presence, testified to their appreciation of what was done, and of the warm and friendly feeling that prevails with all classes towards Canadians.

The Shield was greatly admired and praised for the appropriateness of the design and the highly finished workmanship. Great credit is due to Messrs. Elkington & Co.—its manufacturers, for the skill and perfection of workmanship, with which they carried out the design.

There is no other Prize in our list offered on similar conditions, and the Council of the National Rifle Association hope that the manner in which they have availed themselves of the discretionary powers as to framing the conditions of the competition for the Trophy so kindly and liberally accorded to them by the terms of the Resolution, passed on the subject at a meeting of the Council of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, will meet with their approval and be received by them as a proof of the high value which the Council of the National Rifle Association set upon the record of the kindly feeling and token of friendship and good will from the Dominion Riflemen to their Brethren in the Mother Country.

REPORT OF BT.-MAJOR THE HON. HENRY AYLMER, M.P.

WIMBLEDON TEAM OF 1877.

MELBOURNE, Province of Quebec,
30th November, 1877.

SIR,—

The command of the Canadian Wimbledon Team for 1877 having been offered to me by Col. Gzowski, President of the Dominion Rifle Association, I felt that I could not decline the unexpected but much appreciated honor, and having arranged for so long an absence from home, proceeded to Quebec on the 21st June.

Captain Casey, M.P., second in command, and the twenty members comprising the Team reported to me on the 22nd June, according to orders, and with the kind assistance of the Militia Staff at Quebec, all our arrangements for departure being completed, we were on Saturday morning the 23rd, safely on board the Allan steamer "Sardinian" and on our way to England.

The berths appropriated to the members of the Team were all that could be desired, and in the saloon all were seated together, a very good arrangement for becoming well acquainted during the voyage.

We arrived at Liverpool on Monday morning, 2nd July, and proceeded without delay to Altcar, where the ranges were placed at our disposal in the same generous spirit as on former occasions. The Team began their practice in the afternoon, and continued it each day until Saturday the 7th July.

Two friendly matches were again shot with the Lancashire Battalions. Captain Casey and all the Team speak gratefully of the friendly attentions paid to them by the Liverpool Volunteers, and they were well satisfied with the care taken of them at Thomas' Hotel at Hightown.

By not losing any time at Altcar, four and a half days' practice was obtained before proceeding to Wimbledon,—the time is much too short for men to recover from a sea voyage, to accustom themselves to a change of climate and a new country and become so far free from excitement that they can do themselves and their country justice in a keen competition with the rifle.—It would be far better to send the Team over one week earlier, the expense would be only one week's additional board,

(not a heavy item at Altcar), and I am positive that the extra time for practice would lead to a better record for the Canadian Team at Wimbledon.

I left the men at Altcar in charge of Captain Casey on the evening of our arrival and returned to Liverpool where some matters required attention, thence to London, where I waited upon Colonel Gzowski, and went with him down to the camp. There I found that the arrangements were already completed, Colonel Gzowski having seen to them himself, and managed probably much better than I should have done. I made the entries for the matches, and on Saturday afternoon the Team arrived from Altcar by the Midland Railway without change to Putney. They were soon comfortably arranged in their tents. We had a large marquee, well floored and furnished for the general use of the Team, which enabled us to be comfortable in spite of constant rain. Many of the English papers find fault with the comforts displayed in camps at Wimbledon, forgetting that men do not go there to get experience of camp life. "Roughing it" would be fatal to exceptionally good shooting, while the encouragement of such shooting is the true aim and object of this great annual gathering.

The Public Mess arrangements are convenient as to price and quality—meals at any hour or charge in the different restaurants and by different caterers—I should not advise the establishment of a private Mess, the comfort would be less and the trouble and expense much greater.

The List of Prizes won by the Team is very creditable, although it was not our fortune to bring back that most coveted prize of all, the Kolapore Cups. I attach an extract from the *United Service Gazette*, from which you will perceive that the Team we competed with was differently selected and stronger than on former occasions. The scores will show you that we had nothing to be ashamed of:—

"THE KOLAPORE TEAM.—We are requested to announce that, at the request of the Captains of the International Twenties, it has been decided that the competitors for the Kolapore Cups shall be selected from the three Twenties, not according to their scores in the match, but according to the shooting for the Grand Aggregate, the limit as to the number of each nationality being also removed. Thus the team against the Colonials may be either all English, all Irish, or all Scotch. The Scotch have been asked to name twenty men from whom a selection may be made."

The score this year of the Canadian Team being 18 points a head of the winning score of last year.

I selected the Team for the Kalapore Cup by taking the highest aggregate scores made in the last three and a half days' practice at Altcar, and in those matches at Wimbledon to which the Canadian Shield is attached as a prize.

For the future I should recommend that the Kalapore Team be selected ONLY from the highest aggregate in the matches to which the Dominion Trophy is attached. They are as follows:—

The Queen's First Stage.

St. George's Vase.

Martin's Cup.

Alexandra.

Alfred.

Windmill.

It is in these matches that the Team settles down to work, and the best shots come to the front. The scores are also certified and indisputable. Three-entry matches ought certainly *not* to be taken for the test shooting.

Details of entries, prizes and such like papers, were all forwarded by me soon after my return to Canada.

I would here say a few words with regard to future entries, there are several objections to entering the men for three-entry matches.

Some of them, such as "Pigou and Wilkies," "Curtis and Harvey," "John Hall," "Burroughs and Watts," a man can be entered for on the Team, and he can enter himself twice again in his private capacity. If dishonest, he will then give in his lowest score as a return for the Team and will retain the highest for his own benefit. I am happy to say that I am quite certain no such irregularity happened in 1877, nevertheless I am of opinion that no opportunity for wrong-doing ought to be allowed. In other, three-entry matches, for example "Sect'y of State for War," "Pavilion," "Cottage" and "Arthur," one of our volunteers, accustomed only to the Snider rifle, is at a disadvantage beside men who are experienced in shooting with other, and better military breech-loaders.

Matches, where the prizes are in kind and go to individuals, such as 1st and 2nd Series, should not be entered for as a Team. The entry to these two costs £20, a large sum to expend without return. In these and the three-entry matches, individuals feeling confidence in themselves can easily enter, while on account of the objections named, the Association ought not to be at the expense of the entry-fees.

I subjoin a list of the matches to which I would advise entry in the future, and a comparative statement by which it will be seen that they are also more desirable from a pecuniary point of view.

There is no necessity for the Team to take Martini rifles with them, as they can be procured of the latest pattern on the ground. I presume they are provided because the English Volunteers require their temporary use.

A new assortment of flags will be required another year, the present ones being entirely worn out.

I am glad to be able to report that the men were well uniformed in the proper dress of their several corps, the officers particularly having attended to this point. I am sorry, I cannot agree with Colonel

Kirkpatrick, that a special uniform would be suitable to the occasion. 1st. I think the *esprit-de-corps* of a regiment would be interfered with thereby. 2nd. The English people can better realize the magnitude of our Volunteer Militia when they see, as on the present Team, Engineers, Artillerymen, Riflemen, Guardsmen and as high as the 62nd Battalion. Moreover the expense would be superfluous, for surely it is not too much to expect that a uniform can be provided in any corps to decently clothe its representative at Wimbledon. Officers should be given to understand that they must provide themselves with proper uniform if they accept positions on the Team.

With regard to the funds placed at the disposal of the Commanding Officer, I believe the expenditure for 1876 and 1877 to be as small as it would be advisable to make it. For the benefit of any junior rank Officer who may in the future be called to the honour of the command I would suggest that the officers in charge receive a fixed sum, not an allowance according to rank, the outlay is precisely the same whatever the rank.

A fair amount would probably be, Officer in Command, \$500, and 2nd in Command, \$300, and their fares to and from Quebec. Any officer going with the Team and accepting less than this, may be prepared to pay the difference out of his own pocket, or else find his visit to England rather awkward at times. A margin of credit ought also to be allowed in case of any unforeseen outlay being called for, and as it is to be supposed that the Officer in Command will endeavour honorably to fulfil his instructions with regard to economy, there need be no fear that such an arrangement would lead to unnecessary extravagance. The Railway fare for the Officer 2nd in Command was not allowed this time, on what principle I do not know, since it was paid on former occasions.

I believe I have fulfilled all my instructions, and have reported from time to time as directed.

The members of the Team as far as I am aware, were satisfied with the arrangements made for them, of their conduct I cannot speak too highly, and I would assure them that my duty was made a pleasure by the *entente cordiale* which existed from first to last. Special thanks are due to Captain Casey for his untiring exertions in attending to our wants and comforts.

If it could be arranged to send as one of the officers in Command, a man who had been connected with the Team before, his experience would be very valuable in the management and routine.

Having now fully entered into the business part of my report, I have much pleasure in noticing the particular event of Colonel

Gzowski's presence amongst us, which distinguished the present occasion and made it worthy of special record.

The admirable and tasteful arrangements of the Canadian Camp rendered it one of the chief points of attraction to the hosts of visitors at Wimbledon. Our honoured President did full credit to Canada by the manner in which he received H.R. Highness the Duke of Cambridge and presented to him before a gathering of England's best and highest people, our Dominion Challenge Trophy. The Team have to thank him for a few pleasant words from H.R. Highness to each individual member comprising it, and the Dominion has to thank him for the prominence given to Canada at the Wimbledon meeting, and for obtaining for our colony such expressions of interest as fell from the lips of the Duke of Cambridge and the Earl of Carnarvon on this occasion. Colonel Gzowski will no doubt inform the Association of the admirable spirit in which the Trophy was received and the praises accorded to it.

In conclusion, I would add my record to that of many others, in favor of continuing these friendly visits to the Mother Country, for the sake of the Volunteers themselves, whose devotion to their country deserves such high commendation, and from motives of policy in bringing Canada prominently to the notice of the British public, our best endeavours and interest as Canadians ought to be so used that these annual visits to Wimbledon shall never cease.

DOMINION OF CANADA RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

We, the undersigned, agree to the following Regulations:

1. The Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates selected by the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association from the Active Militia of the Dominion of Canada, to represent the said Dominion at the meeting of the National Rifle Association, to be held at Wimbledon in July-1877, are from the date of signing this agreement, until discharged from duty at Wimbledon, to be under the immediate command of Major the Honorable Henry Aylmer, M. P., of the 54th Battalion, Active Militia, Richmond, Quebec, Canada; and to be subject to such orders and regulations as he may, from time to time, issue for their guidance.

2. No Member of the Team to be absent from the Headquarters of the Team from the day of landing in England, and until released from duty after the conclusion of the matches at Wimbledon, on any pretence whatever, without the permission of the officer in command.

3. Any Member of the Team disobeying the order of the officer commanding, or contravening any of the orders made for the regulation of the force assembled at Wimbledon, or be under the influence of drink, shall forfeit his return tickets.

4. The Members of the Team shall have their steamship and railway fares paid, as well as their ordinary board on the steamship, and at such places after landing in England, and until the conclusion of the matches at Wimbledon, as the officer commanding may select. All such allowances to be stopped from any Member of the Team guilty of a breach of this agreement.

5. No Member of the Team shall send communications to the Press for publication with respect to the shooting, or any other matter connected with the Team.

6. The Officer Commanding will provide the necessary ammunition, pay entrance fees and sighting shots for the matches open to the Team as a Team, or as individuals; and all prizes in money won by the Team or by individuals in such matches, shall be divided equally among the Members of the Team.

7. Prizes in kind won by the Team as a Team, or by the aggregate shooting of the whole or any number of the Team, are not to be considered the property of the Team collectively or individually; but

such Prizes are to be handed over to the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, for such subsequent disposition as the Council of that Association may determine upon.

8. Prizes in kind won by any Member of the Team, individually, in matches open to individual competition, to become the property of the winner, if not inconsistent with the Wimbledon conditions, under which such competition is held.

9. At the conclusion of the matches at Wimbledon, and when relieved from duty by the officer in command, return tickets will be furnished to each Member of the Team, from Wimbledon to the port of embarkation, thence by the Allan Line of Steamships to Canada. Such Members, after being so discharged from duty, may suit their own convenience as to time of returning to Canada; but no expenses will be paid on account of any Member of the Team beyond the period necessary to complete the duty at Wimbledon, and the time of sailing of the first Steamer of the Allan Line from Liverpool to Quebec after discharge.

10. The officer commanding will make requisite arrangements for the transport of the Members of the team on their return from Quebec to their homes.

11. Should any Member of the Team from the Provinces of Nova Scotia or New Brunswick elect to return direct to Halifax, and in the event of any of the Allan Line of Steamships sailing from Liverpool to that port about the time, the officer commanding may authorize such arrangement, provided no further charge is made for the passage by the Steamship Company than that included in the return tickets to Quebec.

12. Each Member of the Team, on his being released from duty at Wimbledon, will sign an Acquittance Roll, to the effect that he has been properly settled with in accordance with these regulations.

13. The officer in command will, on the completion of the duty, forward a report to the President of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, on the manner in which the same has been carried out, accompanied by the Acquittance Roll and Statement of Accounts of all expenditure connected therewith, full details of shooting and conduct of the Members of the Team.

I certify that the Matches for the selection of the "Wimbledon Twenty" from New Brunswick were shot on Wednesday and Thursday, the 29th and 30th days of August, 1877, on the "Stockton Range," (so called) at Sussex, N.B.

I further certify that the morning of the 29th opened dark with a heavy land fog, which—passing away—left a bright sun at noon. During the afternoon the sky became over cast, showers fell at intervals, and continuous rain fell during the firing at 600 yards in the 2nd Match. Wind, very changeable as regards velocity, and from the right.

The morning of the 30th opened with a heavy thunder storm, clearing at 7 o'clock. At 9:30, showers set in continuing until 1 p.m. Bright sun at 2. During the 4th Match heavy showers fell, stopping the firing entirely for a time at the close of the 500 yard range. The firing at 600 yards was concluded after sun-down when the light had faded away. Wind from the right; gusty and very uncertain during the whole of the day.

CONSTITUTION

ADOPTED AT ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING,

1877.

- 1.—That this Association be denominated “THE DOMINION OF CANADA RIFLE ASSOCIATION.”
- 2.—Any person being a subscriber of \$2.00 per annum, and paying the same before the 1st day of September, or the second day of the Annual Prize Meeting, shall become a member of the Association for the current Association year.
- 3.—Donors of \$40.00 at one time to the funds of the Association, or of a Prize of not less value to be competed for at the Annual Prize Meeting, shall be entitled to be enrolled as Life Members of the Association, they having the full rights and privileges of ordinary members, and their names to be published in the Annual Reports.
- 4.—Any Provincial Rifle Association of the Dominion subscribing not less than \$40.00 annually, and any other Rifle Association of the Dominion not less than \$20.00 annually, to the funds of the Dominion Rifle Association, shall be considered as being in connection with it, and shall be entitled to a number of memberships, for competition only, in the proportion of one to every dollar thus subscribed. Each subscribing Association is to select from its members the persons to hold such memberships, and return their names and addresses, when selected, to the Secretary of the Dominion Rifle Association, to be registered by him previous to the Annual Prize Meeting. Each affiliating Association shall be entitled to receive a Silver Medal for competition by its *bona-fide* members. The winner of such medal being an efficient member of the Active Militia, or an Officer retired retaining rank, to be entitled to compete free of all entrance fees in the Dominion of Canada and Affiliated Association Matches, at the First prize Meeting of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association at which he is present after he wins the medal. Provided the name of the winner and details of the match at which it is won shall be communicated to the Secretary of the D. C. Rifle Association not later than the first day of such Prize meeting.
- 5.—There shall be a Patron and Vice-Patrons to be named by the Council.

The Governor-General of the Dominion of Canada for the time being shall be respectfully requested to become “Patron.”

- 6.—There shall be a President to be elected at the annual business meeting of the Association.
- 7.—There shall be a Vice-President for each Province, to be elected in the same manner as the President.
- 8.—There shall be a Council composed of Forty-eight Members of the Association, who shall be elected in the following proportions :

Ten,	(10)	“ Quebec,
Six,	(6)	“ New Brunswick,
Six,	(6)	“ Nova Scotia,
Four,	(4)	“ Manitoba,

one half in each case to be elected at the annual business meeting of the Dominion Association, the other half by the Provincial Associations of the respective Provinces at their annual meetings; the names of those elected by the Provincial Associations to be notified to the Secretary of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, on or before the day of the annual business meeting in each year. Six members of the Council shall form the quorum.

- 9.—The Council shall at its first meeting choose from its own members the Chairman of the Council.
- 10.—The Council shall annually elect at its first meeting an Executive Committee consisting of nine (9) of its members. Five (5) to be a quorum.
- 11.—The Presidents of the various Provincial Associations in connection with this Association, and the Deputy Adjutants General commanding Districts, being members of the Dominion Rifle Association, shall be *ex-officio* Vice-President, and all Vice-Presidents shall be members of the Council.
- 12.—There shall be a Treasurer and a Secretary at Ottawa, both to be appointed annually by the Council, and holding office during pleasure, who shall receive such compensation for their services as may be voted by the Council.
- 13.—The Council shall have the sole management of the income and funds of the Association, rendering an account to the yearly meeting, such account having been previously audited by a person or persons, not members of the Council, who shall be annually named by the Council for that purpose. The Council shall also have the entire management and superintendence of all the affairs and concerns of the Association, and shall or may

- do, all such acts and deeds as shall appear to them necessary or essential to be done for the purpose of carrying into effect the object and views of the Association.
- 14.—The Executive Committee shall give effect to such instructions as the Council may, from time to time, order respecting the management of the affairs of the Association.
 - 15.—The Council may, from time to time, make such rules for their guidance as they may deem necessary.
 - 16.—The Annual Prize Meetings shall be held at Ottawa at such time and under such regulations as may be determined on by the Executive Committee as to all points not previously decided upon by the Council.
 - 17.—An Annual Report, embracing an audited account of the Finances shall be drawn up by the Secretary under the direction of the Council, and shall be published and sent by mail to members of Council at least one month previous to the Annual Business Meeting.
 - 18.—The Annual Business Meeting of the members of the Association for the election of Officers and the Council, and the transaction of other business shall be held at Ottawa on the third Wednesday after the assembling of the general session of the Parliament of the Dominion. At the close of such Annual Meeting or any adjournment thereof the Association year shall terminate.
 - 19.—A General Meeting shall be held on the second day of the Annual Prize Meeting for the discussion of all matters that may be brought forward by any member or competitor attending the matches, but no changes in the constitution shall be made except at the Annual Business Meeting.
 - 20.—No alterations in the constitution shall be made except by a resolution duly passed at the Annual Business Meeting or some adjournment thereof, and no such resolution shall be proposed unless a notice in writing of the terms of such resolution signed by two members as proposer and seconder thereof, shall have been given to the Secretary one month at least previous to the Annual Business Meeting at which the same is to be proposed, and it shall be the duty of the Secretary to immediately notify all members of the Association of such proposed amendments.
 - 21.—The Council shall have power to fill any vacancy occasioned by death or resignation in their number, from among the numbers of the Association.
