THREE CONSERVATIVES FROM CAPE BRETON

Halifax, June 24—Election returns from Cape Breton county yesterday show the return of three Conservatives and one Liberal—J. C. Douglas, his colleague in the late house and Neil Ferguson, (Con.) and D. A. Cameron, (Lib.), making the total Conservative candidates elected thirteen. In the Federal riding in South Cape Breton and Richmond the popular Conservative majority in this election exceeds 1800, and in the whole of Cape Breton island there is a popular Conservative majority of over 700 as compared with a popular Liberal majority of over 2000 in the Federal elections of 1911.

The majority of Premier Murray in Victoria in the provincial election of 1911 was 551 and that of his colleague 423, whereas in the recent election the premier's majority is 138, and that of his colleague, 103.

The thirteen Conservative candidates elected in Nova Scotia show an increase of two over the results of 1911. In Lunenburg where one Liberal and one Conservative were elected, the figures show that Kinley (Liberal) has only six over Zwicker, (Con.) and a recount will be demanded which may change the result.

DUKE OF DEVONSHIRE TO BE NEXT GOVERNOR GENERAL.

London, June 27—Official announcement was made today that the Duke of Connaught will be succeeded as governor-general of Canada by the Duke of Devonshire.

Ottawa, June 27—The announcement of the Duke of Devonshire's appointment comes as a surprise here. It is thought that either Lord Curzon or the Earl of Derby would be appointed. It was rumored here early today that Earl Derby had been selected, but officials refused to say anything definite. The Duke of Connaught and his staff left on their western tour last night.

The announcement that the Duke of Devonshire will succeed H. R. H. The Duke of Connaught as governor general of Canada was received in Ottawa with great interest, Ottawa society being specially concerned in the name and estate of the king's representative at Rideau Hall. This interest manifested itself chiefly in a rush for Burke's Peerage, where were found the facts that his Grace of Devonshire is under fifty, is a family man and is lord of many broad acres in various parts of the United Kingdom.

The new governor-general will arrive in Canada under the usual arrangement in October, passing the outgoing governor at sea. He is described as a man of unusually pleasing personality and he comes of a house which has given to British history many important figures.

The Dominion government has not been notified officially of the Duke of Devonshire's appointment, but it is understood that the identity of the new governor has been known in official circles and that the formal notice is on the way.

Great Drive of Czar's Army Goes on Successfully

Petrograd, June 25—via London—Occupation of the entire Austrian Crown Land of Bukovina was announced today by the war office. Possession of the Province was completed by the capture of the town of Kimopol in the southern part of Bukovina at the foot of the Carpathians. More than 2,000 prisoners were captured.

Petrograd, via London, June 24—The capture by the Russians of the town of Kudi, in Galicia, across the Bukovina border at the foot of the Carpathian mountains, was announced today by the war office.

The text of the Russian statement says:
"In Bukovina, west of Skiatyn, our troops are fighting their way and advancing. Last night they occupied the heights of the banks of the Rybnitza."
"The town of Kudi has been captured by us. The Don Cossacks made 150 men prisoners and captured four machine guns near there."

Commission of Three Experts.

Ottawa, June 25—Sir Robert Borden and Hon. Frank Cochrane, Minister of Railways, left this evening for New York. The railway situation in Canada is crucial, and it has been decided to appoint a commission of three experts, not Canadians, to examine railway affairs in Canada and advise as to what action the Government should take. It is generally believed here that next session of parliament will see the steam railways of the Dominion nationalized.

THE AUTOMOBILE IN WAR

England Leads in Number of Automobiles Of All Sizes

Mr. Howard C. Felton contributes some interesting particulars about the automobile in the present war. In August, 1914, there were more motor-cars of all sizes in use in England than in all the other warring nations combined. Germany and Austria together showed a census of about 115,000 cars of all kinds. France had in the neighborhood of 90,000, and Russia about 10,000. Great Britain had 250,000 in daily use. In 1913 France paid out nearly 750,000 dollars in subsidies to the owners of motor-trucks, and Austria about 500,000 dollars. Germany's output in that direction is not known. Like other military information, the figures were closely guarded. But to the owner of every car in Germany there was given a registrar number, together with instructions to bring his vehicle to a certain point at the instant required.

Australia has adopted a system of compulsory military training for every young man between the ages of twelve and twenty-six years. From the ages of twelve to eighteen, drills, athletic exercises and shooting are a part of the regular school work. The junior cadets have not less than fifteen minutes daily for one hundred and twenty days a year, and the senior cadets considerably more. At the age of 18 years the young man becomes a citizen soldier, and for the next eight years from sixteen to twenty-five days a year to training, a part of the time in camp.

WAR IS HELL

The following is a letter received by Mrs. George H. Franklyn, of Canard: "Somewhere in France," June 7, '16.

Dear Mother:
Just a few lines to let you know I am still living after what we Canadian boys have passed through I suppose you have been reading in the papers about that great battle we Canadians were in. Mother it was dreadful, we went into the trenches with 1000 men and came out with only 75 of them, they were all killed or wounded, the Germans came over on us and took us unawares and they had ten men to one of us. But I tell you Mother the Canadians are brave boys, every one of them stood at their post and did their duty till at last there was so many killed and what was wounded the Germans killed as we drove them back very few came out of it. I never want to see anything like it again, the poor fellows on the ground would beg and pray to be killed to put them out of their misery they were wounded so bad and suffering such pain, Mother, God only knows how we few came out of it alive just think of it only 75 out of 1000 getting out of it. I think we were very lucky but I tell you Mother I am all in; my mind is all upset. All one could see was dead and dying one lying on top of the other. It is a terrible sight, I do hope this war will soon end and we will be able to return home again. Poor Arthur Hutchinson was killed, he was blown up with a big shell, I feel bad for his parents, one boy killed and the other in the hospital I tell you Mother it is a little Hell by itself and if I ever get out of it I never want anyone to speak of war to me I have been eight months at the front and it seems like a long time for a fellow to fight but now the weather is fine and the mud is all dried up and we can get our big guns around. You will know there will be something doing. We are bound to give the Huns all that is coming to them. Mother I am going on pass to England soon and will get my picture taken for you so you will have it. And now I think I will close.

MORE THAN 30,000 MEN EXPECTED AT VALCARTIER CAMP

Valcartier Camp, June 24—The 140th Battalion arrived in camp at 5 p. m. on Friday. As they passed through the lines of the 5th New Brunswick Brigade they were heartily cheered by the of the 115th and 132nd Battalion. They are now settled in in camp.

The 115th Battalion have now settled down to hard training most of the day was spent in platoon drill and bayonet exercise. Capt. Ingleton is on leave in Montreal for a few days.

Lieut.-Col. Mersereau is laid up with an injured arm, but it is expected that he will soon be around again.

New battalions are arriving every day and the Cartier valley is gradually becoming a veritable sea of tents. At present the infantry lines occupy an area of two square miles. It is rumored that before long there will be more than 30,000 troops concentrated in this war camp.

The Army Service Corps and Ordnance Corps are doing excellent work in supplying the troops requirements. The men are being well fed, seem very contented, and the percentage of sick is very low.

Great competition exists among the battalions as regards the care, cleanliness and appearance of their camp lines, and several battalions are going to a great deal of trouble to outshine the others. One battalion has constructed a white birchwood lattice fence around its area, with large lattice pillars at the various entrances. The result is that the camp grounds look especially attractive.

All the camp roads are being macadamised and all are now lighted by electricity. The main road, which is more than two miles long, is brilliantly lighted by Tungsten lamps and by night is a very busy thoroughfare.

CROPS THREATENED BY ARMY WORMS

(Sackville Tribune)

The hay crop over the great Tantram marsh, are in serious danger of becoming greatly lessened if not entirely destroyed by a scourge of the Army Worm. Across the very best of the dyked land, from Upper Sackville to Jollicure two to three thousand acres are infested with the pest, whose depredations form a belt through the most modern productive and fertile marsh land in the country.

The Army Worm is a dangerous pest and one that spreads rapidly. Its presence may seriously affect hay crop on the dyked lands unless something occurs to check its ravages. On one lot already, covering an extent of about thirty acres, there is reported to be hardly a blade of grass left. It is not difficult to see what this threatens. The Army Worm visited the marshes some 30 or 31 years ago, and it is feared this year will see a recurrence of the plague.

Militia Dept. Puts the Ban on Kilts.

Ottawa, June 23—The militia department has decided that no more kilts will be issued to Scottish regiments of the Canadian overseas forces. Units who have the kilts now will have to wear "trews" when their present clothing has been worn out. The pipers are to be the only exception in the order just issued by the militia council. However Scottish corps will be allowed to wear the balmoral, instead of the regulation staff pattern caps, as a distinguishing mark. It has been found that the kilt is not suitable for trench work in rainy and cold weather and has caused considerable inconvenience. Active militia regiments will not be affected by the order.

Many Changes in the 26th

Private Fred Woodbery, St. George, writing from a war hospital at Bangourin, near Edinburgh, Scotland, says that there are only about two hundred of the old 26th Battalion left in the unit, as so many drafts and changes have taken place. Only fourteen men who left St. John are now in his platoon. "I do not think the citizens will see the old 26th march through the streets, as we are another personnel now."
