Meets Death in a Peculiar Manner--He Mistook a Window for an Entry Door.

HALIFAX, N.S., Feb 25 .- Ven.) Archdeacon J. A. Kaulbach, of Truro one of the best-known clergymen in Nova Scotia, was killed this evening in Truro. After dinner he left his residence to see a man at the Central engine house, about 100 yards' distant. He intended entering that building by the door at the side but walked past this door in the darkness about 20 feet to the hose tower in the rear. In this tower some two feet above the ground is a window swinging on hinges. This he opened and stepping in, fell ten feet to the concrete floor

Two hours later the janitor went the hose tower, the janitor found the a draft of air and went to examine the cause. Reaching the bottom of the hose tower, the aniotr found the dead body of the archdeacon. No inquest will be held."

Rev. Mr. Kaulbach was about years old. A son, formerly in the British army, is now at Kingston Ont. Archdeason Kaulbach's wife, who came from Quebec, died a few months ago. Rev. Mr. Kaulbach had been a minister of the Church of England at Truro for 35 years.
