The most comprehensive and highly developed production in English Lexicography has recently been published by Funk & Wagnall, New York, under the title of the "Standard Dictionary of the English Language."

The work embracing 2,580 pages is arranged under two volumes bound in full "Russia." While spelling and pronunciation are treated with great care it is in definitions that the "Standard" particularly excels.

In the appendix an explanation of the "Scientific Alphabet" comes first. Then follows a full explanation, with pronunciation, of the various notable and recent names in bibliography, biography, fiction, geography, history and mythology.

Such a Dictionary as the "Standard" will be hard to improve upon, and it will probably be the leading authority for some time to come.

Town Improvements.

For the Atlantic Provinces holds its tenth session at Parrboro from July 9 to July 24, 1896. At the opening Educationists will deliver addresses. On the 10th, excursions to Partridge Island; on the 14th to Blomidon; on the 18th, to the Wolfville Insitutions and Historical Grand Pre.

The course of study will be Astronomy, Botany, Chemistry, Civics, Education, English Literature, Kindergarten, Meteorology, Mineralogy, Music, Physics, Physiology, Zoology and Entomology, etc. There will be field excursions as may be deemed suitable. The fees are: Registration and one subject, ordinary classes, \$1.

Registration and all subjects, \$2. Advanced classes, each \$2 per week. Expenses—Class fees for ordinary classes, from \$2 to \$2.50 for the course. Advanced classes, \$2 per week. Board, from \$3 to \$5 per week. It is proposed to make the vicinity the permanent Home of the Summer School of Science, the surroundings are so congenial to the pursuit of the various studies.
