

Care of House Plants.

In caring for house plants it should be borne in mind that they are of two classes and that such plants as ferns, palms and the rubber plant will do better in those parts of the room where the light is limited, while flowering plants, such as geraniums, fuchsias, and cyclamen, should have as much light as possible. Plants are more like human beings than like mere things, and if given to brighten the home during dull winter months they must not be left in the cold.

There are not a large number of essential house plants and those which experience has shown are best suited for the purpose demand certain definite conditions. The fundamental condition relates to the atmosphere of the room. If this is suitable and the soil in a secondary importance.



Editorial Brevities.

As will be seen by the usual notice in another column the assessors have finished their labors and the roll is now on file at the office of the Town Clerk for the inspection of ratepayers.

The demand for Canada's animal products during the re-construction period of Europe will be as great as, or greater than the demand during the war, according to those in touch with the situation.

Canada will have a net war debt of \$1,300,000,000 for war expenditures since March 1st 1914. Her exports of animal products increased during the war from \$53,400,000 in 1913-14 to \$172,700,000 last year.

During the past year the editor of this paper has found it necessary in the public interest to criticize the work of the town assessors, and as a result we find that by the new assessment our property valuation has been increased. We expected this as a citizen informed us a year ago that he had been threatened that such treatment would be meted out to him if he had the temerity so to do.

Assessment.

To the Editor of THE ACADIAN: It is highly amusing to those who have peered into the assessors' holy of holies, to note the peculiar methods used in determining the amount each ratepayer must contribute to the public expense.

But the practice that it usually obtains is something like the following: The assessor decides that the property or income of the ratepayer is worth, from 0 per cent to 100 per cent (according to whose property or income it is of course) of what they actually and avowedly think it is worth, e.g. if an income were large and uncertain and no one but the assessor knew just what it was, it is of course proper to omit it, or if the income belong to a doctor, no matter how large, then that should be omitted as well but if the subject for dissection be a college professor, such a sum is not omitted.

If a ratepayer thinks his neighbour's assessment is too low and threatens to appeal from it, he is told that if he does his own will be raised. This method of determining values is only used in certain cases.

Then again it is highly important to have the total amount of the assessment come out just fifty times as large as the amount to be raised for town expenses, for it appears that the town clerk only knows "two times," and is wholly unfamiliar with fractions. Perhaps it would be better to have it come out just twenty-five times as large as the tax; then since the clerk knows "two times" he would only have to apply the operation the second time and the result would be the same.




