

A SPECIMEN OF A NEWFOUNDLAND EDITOR.

There is an island beyond the Gulf of St. Lawrence. It is Newfoundland. Away to the North of this island is a ragged village made up of about sixty houses, each one storey. The village is called Carbonear. The village, is built on the sea coast, and its trade is cod fish and cod oil, caplin and herring—and that is all. The people catch fish, and get in return flour, pork, molasses and tweed. The scenery is made up of stunted fir bushes, which the natives call "var"; great high cliffs where one might see

"The mountain goat bleating aloft," and a few tufts of spray-burnt heath. Just a year ago Mr. Rochfort, who was always said by the people he travelled among to be a little "siffy," started a newspaper in this village. The people thought of course it was one of his crazy fits, and that he would go off again lecturing to the natives further north on the "Federation of the Empire," the "Complexion of Aristotle," or the "Difference between Sheep and Goats." These had proved eloquent themes for Monsieur Rochfort during the time he edited two newspapers which lived each two years or so. But strange as it may seem, the "lucid interval" extended much longer than people first thought, and the *Herald*—for that is the name of this paper—is alive yet.

Some time ago some of the papers of St. John's, out of sport, copied something from the *Herald*; giving the precise motion of certain sea gulls that used to visit the waters of Carbonear. They did not credit the *Herald* with the items, and the result was that they brought down poor Rochfort's spleen on them, in sentences containing not less than one hundred words each. We noted the "tempest in the tea pot" next mail, and made a few comments. Out of curiosity we had been exchanging with Rochfort, and got his paper yesterday. It is about the size of a small pane of glass. We quote from it:

The Newfoundland papers have been stealing paragraphs from each other lately, and one would think to hear the plants of those stolen from that their brethren had been at their tills.—Fredericton Star, Oct. 3.

In giving insertion to the above from a late number of the erratic but brilliant *Inimitary* at present illuminating the horizon of the benighted Province of New Brunswick, we were certainly not a little amused at the cool audacity and assurance of our quarrelsome rather we should say—

We stop, Mr. Rochfort, just here.

The other end of the sentence is about ten times as long as the foregoing, and just twenty times as impertinent.

We quote again:
"With regard to his audacious, impertinent, ignorant, and malicious criticism of the Newfoundland press, we shall merely remind this worthy of a certain familiar proverb having reference to the injurious effects likely to be produced upon its nest, by—"

And the "greatest" of this too "is behind." The whole article is in two sentences, is nearly a column in length, and is quite bitter for John Rochfort.

And now we shall a "tale unfold whose slightest word" will so harrow the soul of Mr. Rochfort that he will regret when he impaled himself upon such a dangerous shoal as the *Fredericton Star*. We have a good memory, and it serves us very well to-day to tell our story. It is now about six or seven years since Mr. Rochfort, quite religious and quite green, began to edit a paper in St. John's. The name of that paper we don't remember just now, but it was published on Duckworth street, up a creaky old stairs. John became very poetical in the first of his editorial career, and it is said piled his trade so far as to parody new hymns with pleasing airs. Christmas came round, and John had the usual "Carols" written in the usual long sentences; but one carol among the rest was addressed to the Editor. He had found it on his desk. The opening lines ran thus:

"Round thy noble brow
Oft methinks I see a halo"
of intellect round the author's head. The poem stretched out to fifteen lines, and John declared it to be "a sonnet of exquisite sweetness, doing altogether too much honor to the Editor"—himself.

By common consent the meanest power in Europe holds Turkey; because it could not be divided to the satisfaction of the powers. England has taken the sick man under her wing with that far sighted policy that makes many a charitable person (?) take the old man in, and minister to his wants; that when he dies the little effects may be secure—to the benefactor. England has doctored Turkey when beset by tyranny and undermined by immorality. The time is coming when Turkey must die. Will it be that England will take possession of this household gods? She has the best right.

LORD BEACONSFIELD'S SPEECH.

The Lord Mayor's banquet has been held. Among other things Earl Beaconsfield said—
Doubtless there were portions of Ireland where there would be considerable suffering if a remedy was not offered. The Irish people should remember that they never appealed to England simply in vain. It would be the duty of Her Majesty's Ministers to watch the condition of Ireland with the anxiety required by the situation. The Irish people should condescend to remember that their harvest, though good, and though they were much more dependent upon it than are the English people on theirs, still was much better than the harvest of England.

Addressing the Lord Mayor, Lord Beaconsfield said—"When I addressed your predecessor I informed him that the Government was contemplating large military operations in Central Asia, the object being to strengthen and render secure the north-western boundary of the Indian Empire. These operations have been signally successful, and British influence is fully established in Central Asia. (Loud cheers.)

There is no forecasting of the future policy of the Government as was expected.

TURKEY.

TURKEY'S *dies irae* seems to be fast approaching. The Sultan promised reform, but his corrupt Empire is going from bad to worse. England's attitude towards the Mussulman has now reached that point where patience ceases to be a virtue. But the castigation has been put off again, and Salisbury promises the Sultan "one chance more." When this chance has gone, it is hard to tell what the next will be. It looks, indeed, as if the day is coming, when this abandoned Empire is to be blotted forever off the map of Europe. Who knows but ere long the British flag will float from the battlements of Constantinople, and the Golden Horn see above it the Union Jack instead of the Crescent!

Turkey seems to be the very cream of Europe. Fifteen centuries ago the first Christian Emperor sailed along the Mediterranean looking for a place where he might build a city that would rival Imperial Rome. On the Golden Horn stood the ancient city of Stamboul, and Constantine declared it to be the garden of the world. He increased it in magnificence, called it Constantinople and transferred his senate thither. Centuries after it fell into the hands of the "unbelieving Turk," and is yet degraded by Moslem rites. It is the most precious jewel in Europe, and has been the coveted of the "great powers" for this many a year. Russia sees it in her dreams, and her wily statesmen never give up the hope of it. Who knows but Bismarck indulges in the fond dream, that it will once be Germania's; England, proverbial for her keen relish for good things would glory in adding it to her possessions.

By common consent the meanest power in Europe holds Turkey; because it could not be divided to the satisfaction of the powers. England has taken the sick man under her wing with that far sighted policy that makes many a charitable person (?) take the old man in, and minister to his wants; that when he dies the little effects may be secure—to the benefactor. England has doctored Turkey when beset by tyranny and undermined by immorality. The time is coming when Turkey must die. Will it be that England will take possession of this household gods? She has the best right.

Telegraphic News.

A telegram from Valparaiso announces the capture of Pisagua, Peru, by the Chileans.

It is rumored in London there is a difference of opinion in the Cabinet regarding affairs in Afghanistan.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Steps are proposed to be taken by the officers and past officers of the 24th Regiment to raise a monument in memory of their comrades in arms who lost their lives in action with the Zulus on January 22nd, during the attack on the British camp at Isandula.

A number of Glasgow gentlemen, who have a taste for pigeon rearing, have been experimenting with their birds for the purpose of making them do service as carrier pigeons. Great success rewarded their labors. A pair of pigeons enclosed in a box was taken from Arracah to Whistfield, and liberated about midway between Garlochhead and Paulin-Caple, Loch Long. Both were in their coats in forty-five minutes after, having traversed the distance with remarkable speed.

The steamship Arizona from New York for Liverpool with freight and 109 cabin passengers had a narrow escape on Tuesday evening on the Great Bank. A thick fog suddenly came on, the ship was sailing at about 6 knots, the passengers sleeping—when there was a terrific crash, and a quiver all through the ship. The alarm and confusion were wide spread, the vessels deck was strewn with ice. The steam whistles crashed as if they were reefs. The vessel put into St. John's, N. F., where to repairs were made.

Secretary Exarts is preparing a note to the British Government on the fishery question, founded on the reports of the Collector of Gloucester and of Mr. Fisher.

A horrible murder occurred near Bangor Friday night. The man, named Sheehy, was shot by a quiver all through the mill; the report is as follows:— Norris left his office near the mill at 9 o'clock on Friday night for his home, a quarter of a mile distant. When about half way home he was attacked from behind by a man who struck him on the back of the head with an axe and crushed in his skull. The murderer then cut the throat of his victim from ear to ear with an axe. A French man named Baldoche is suspected.

The ship Lady Octavia, from Delaware Breakwater, for New York, collided with the steamer Champion, from New York, for Charleston, at 4 o'clock on Friday morning, striking the steamer amidships, and sinking her in five minutes. The ship was badly damaged and was towed to Philadelphia by a tug. Thirty persons of the crew and passengers of the steamer were lost and twenty-four saved and placed on other vessels. There were three or four female passengers on the Champion, and all were lost. Catherine Cross, the stewardess, was the only woman saved.

Earl Beaconsfield, in speaking of the troubles in Ireland, said: "The rise in the value of silver will in all probability release the Indian statesmen from one of their greatest perplexities. During the past few years the value of silver has risen to such an extent that it has become impossible to express discontent with the national institutions." He wished our brilliant brethren in Ireland would be a little more cautious of this example. He was at a loss to comprehend how the poor Irish people had brought themselves to believe that the best remedy for economical distress was political agitation and social confusion.
