Do you want to avoid that tired feeling that's due long about this time. Do you want to feel as if you could house-clean the world, instead of shrinking before the thought of six or eight or ten rooms to clean?

Do you want to feel as if you wished the working day wouldn't end so soon, instead of watching the clock all the afternoon?

If you do, I can give you a spring-time recipe that's better than sulphur and molasses, and much nicer to take.

And this is the way my prescription reads:

Fresh air.—Take twenty lungfuls at an open door or window every hour or so. Also take several thousand lungfuls at least once, and preferably two or three times, a day, on a walk.

Professor Sargent, the physical director of the greatest university in the country, has recently made the statement that women are in a fair way to overtake men in the attainment of perfect physical development.

And the chief thing to which the professor ascribes this state of affairs is the fact that women are out in the fresh air much more than they used to be.

The other day mother and I took one of her friends to drive, and when we brought her back, as she climbed out of the carriage, she said "You don't know how I have enjoyed this. Why, except to stand on my back steps and shake my table cloth, this is the first time I've been outside my door for three weeks next Tuesday. I wish there could be a law making it a legal offense for any woman, unless she is confined to the house by illness, to stay indoors for a whole week.

Any home-keeping woman ought to be out in the air at least an hour, morning and afternoon.

"Such a bother to get all dressed twice," I know some women are answering.

Well, then, why not bundle up and take your work or your morning paper out on the sunny spot on the back porch in the morning, and then take a walk in the afternoon?

And then another thing: How much are you inviting out of doors indoors?

I know one very healthy woman who goes about her housework the year round with windows flung wide open.

In the winter time, of course, that would be pretty harsh treatment, but I don't think it would be a bad plan to put into practice just now.

If you are afraid of so much air, at least try the milder plan of opening the window and airing out every hour or two.

And suppose, also, you be sure to take those occasional lungfuls of fresh air at the open window or door.

Ask your children to teach you the breathing exercises they do at school, and administer them to yourself occasionally.

Do you think all this bother too big a price to pay for feeling better?

Then listen to the other boon the professor promises, and I'm sure you'll be won over.

Household Hints.

A kitchen churn that holds but one quart is useful for turning cream into butter and also as a cake mixer and for beating eggs for angel cake.

Cold water should be poured on grease as soon as it is spilled on the floor, as it will harden the grease and prevent it soaking into the wood.

To destroy fleas in the house, wipe the furniture wherever possible with spirits of naphtha, but do not let the children go near it until it is dry.

Dishtowls should always be well washed in hot water after being used, or they will soon become not only sadly discolored, but full of bacteria.

To keep a parasol looking well, have a bag for it hung inside the closet door, where the dust will not get at it. Brushing a silk parasol soon wears it out.

A common horseshoe magnet, that costs but a few cents, should always be kept in the sewing machine, as it is useful to pick out needles from the machine drawers.

Camels hair and red sable brushes that have gotten out of shape or curled can be restored to their proper form by dipping first into hot and then into cold water.

To make individual chicken pies, line gem pans with pastry, leaving crust enough to fold over a tablespoonful of rich chicken hash, and bake it in a quick oven.

Overshoes that get muddy inside can be turned inside out and washed with then turned right side out. This will not rot them as washing them without turning does.

Fancy work laid away for the winter should be rinsed in a very blue water and dried, but not ironed. If he pieces are placed in black or blue wrapping paper they will not turn yellow.

It is very easy to make a new parasol of an old one by carefully ripping off the old cloth and using it as a pattern to cut a new one, which may be

Botany Rambles Round St. John's.

Mr. John Garriock, M.A., A.C.P., Principal of Presbyterian College, delivered a most instructive lecture on Botany, in the Presbyterian Hall last evening before a fair and representative gathering of citizens.

The lecturer was introduced by Mr. R. A. Templeton, and, for over an hour delighted his audience with a graphic description of the various forms of plant life found in his rambles round the suburbs during the past two years. Contrasting the specimens found here with similar types in other lands, particularly the "Land of the Heather."

Mr. Garriock illustrated the lecture with beautifully mounted specimens exhibited on stands which filled up the platform space at his disposal, the said specimens having been collected in nearby fields, woods, or marshes, as well as in lands beyond the seas, and they ranged from grasses up to the birch (tree of knowledge in scholastic life, as Mr. G. termed it) and the lordly oak.

The lecturer also touched on the plant life of the ocean, describing in a lucid manner the cause and effect of different shades or colorings in those found on the shore, from those found in the deeper depths, and in this connection Mr. G. ventured to remark that if there was an industry of wealth attached to the pebbles of the sea shore what must there be connected with the unexplored botanical features of the sea itself.

At the close of the lecture Mr. Garriock was loudly applauded by an appreciative audience, and the chairman, with the lecturer's consent, invited a closer inspection of the magnificent collection of specimens on the platform, which was gladly availed of by quite a large number of those present, who also thanked Mr. Garriock personally for his Botanical Treat.

As last night's proceeds are to be devoted to the founding of a school library, we feel safe in saying that for such a laudable purpose, a repetition of last night's lecture, or continuation along the same lines by the talented Principal of the Presbyterian College, who made his debut as a lecturer to the public of this city, would considerably augment the library fund as well as create fresh desire to explore the beauties of nature's carpet, in the breast of the average.

Of the five steamers which fished in the Gulf, three, the Viking, the Southern Cross and the Harlaw struck "ice" and though the other two were not so lucky as the three former, there is plenty of time since they were reported for them to pick up a trip. It is a pleasing feature of the situation that the schooners from Channel are in the "fat" and have good chances of doing well. Such pleasing news has a buoyant effect on the whole community, and gives zest and spirit to the summer fishing voyage now soon to be prepared and supplied for. We congratulate Capt. Wm. Bartlett, Capt. Clarke and Capt. Farquhar on the success of their enterprise.

Smallpox on Harlaw.
When the Harlaw arrived at Codroy at 2.30 p.m. yesterday one of the crew, who was suffering from small pox, was landed and placed in a temporary hospital. Some 60 men of her crew were then landed there and went to their homes. She left for Channel and landed several men, natives of that place. The Government being made cognizant of this despatched Dr. Brehm by special train last night to look after the men. Dr. Grant and Dr. Paterson are at present at Codroy as well as Magistrate McDonnell. They have been given carte blanche by the Government and will do all possible to prevent the disease spreading both at Channel and Codroy. The Magistrate was wired by the Colonial Secretary's Department last night to collect the men landed at both places and have them vaccinated and their homes and clothing fumigated and disinfected.

PUTNEY, Eng., March 23.
Oxford defeated Cambridge in the annual scullers' race over the championship course from Putney to Mortlake in hollow fashion to-day by three lengths. The time was 20 minutes, 14 seconds. Last year Oxford won by three and a half lengths in 19 minutes and 50 seconds. For the first time the light blues put up a good fight and flattered their adherents for a few minutes, but thereafter the race was a procession. The only question was how far ahead the favorites would be at the winning post. The Inter-Varsity race was never rowed under more favorable weather conditions. It was a perfect day, the sun shined brilliantly, while there was hardly a ripple on the Thames. There was practically no choice in the matter. At the starting hour of the start, and the fact that the contest was made on Wednesday instead of on Saturday, as has been usual, the crowd in the boat was quite up to the usual standard. All places along the river from which even a glimpse of the passing boats could be obtained were lined with spectators, while as always a fleet of launches and pleasure craft followed in the wake of the shells.

PHILADELPHIA, March 23.
With the decision of the state labor organizations not to declare a sympathetic strike and the return to work of many of these, the sympathetic strike in this city has settled down to a question of endurance between the striking carmen and the Rapid Transit Company. The company has now all its lines in operation. The subway surface cars and a few other lines which are paralleled by cars in operation. Officials claim that one of the state labor unions are in operation. The Secretary of the Street Carmen's Union, however, insisted to-night that the greatest number of cars in operation in a single day since the beginning of the strike was six hundred and sixty. He says that there are only seven hundred members of the Kerston Union, the members of which remained loyal to the company, and that even with the imported strike breakers the company still needs four thousand four hundred men.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., March 23.
Dr. Axtell, a personal friend of Dr. Fredrick A. Cook, dated Valparaiso, Chile, in which he says the explorer is in broken health, without funds, and unable to continue his fight to establish his claim that he discovered the North Pole. Dr. Axtell said to-day: Mrs. Cook tells me in her letter that Cook made considerable money out of his trip when he arrived in New York, but he spent it in defending himself against bitter attacks of his enemies before the Copenhagen decision was made public.

The hull of the ill-fated battleship Maine, in the harbor of Havana, will be raised so that the remains of any of the sailors that may be within the wreck may be recovered, and so that an examination may be made to determine if possible the manner in which the vessel was destroyed if the Senate approves a bill which was passed by the house to-day.

They extricated him but he was so far gone that he had to be rolled and vomited a good deal of water.

A Close Call.

While the banker Cayuga of Rose Blanche was out fishing a couple of days ago one of the crew after shooting some birds threw his gun with seven fingers of powder in it in his hand in the cabin. Later another man took it and putting a cap on the nipple, not knowing it was loaded and pointing the weapon up the companionway pulled the trigger. The shot cut through the clothing of some of the men standing on deck and tore the mainmast badly. Some were hurt but all were badly frightened.

An Exciting Race.

Yesterday a rather exciting race took place between the two coastal steamers Portia and Gloucester from Berlin to Placentia, the former ship outrunning the latter about one mile. The Gloucester left Berlin about the same time the Portia left Marystown, and when the latter ship shaped her course for Placentia from Crony Island, the Gloucester was bearing S. by E. distant three miles, running on a bee line for Point Verde. Arriving in Placentia Roads the Gloucester was leading by about 100 yards.

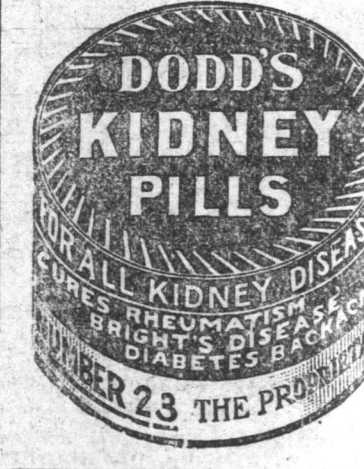
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Latest Sealing News.

She left the ice on Tuesday but encountering a high sea had to run back to await more moderate conditions. Mr. Munn of Bowring's had a message from Capt. Farquhar of the Harlaw at 10 a.m. to-day saying that he had not seen the Kite or Labrador since the 15th inst. The Viking should arrive ere it wind and weather serves late tomorrow night. Mr. W. B. Grievae had a similar message to the Anglo's regards the Southern Cross. Several of Daine Johnston's laborers and seamen etc. in the Southern Cross, the Postal Telegraph received the following at 11.34 to-day: "Southern Cross passed Port aux Basques at 11.15 a.m. flags flying from three masts, apparently loaded." The Harlaw is now quarantined at Channel pending the decision of Magistrate McDonnell and the doctors up there. Both the Viking and Southern Cross arrival will be quarantined until the doctor of the Health Department visits them and satisfies himself that no contagious disease exists on board. There was a report about the city at 1 p.m. to-day to the effect that a steamer had passed Cape Bonavista coming south, but there was no truth in it.

R. C. CATHEDRAL.

The solemn Office of Tenebrae was sung at the Cathedral last night, His Grace the Archbishop being present. The church was filled to the doors, even the ambulatories being crowded. Rev. Fr. Ashley sang the first Lamentation from Jeremiah the Prophet; Mr. C. Hutton, in the choir, the second, and the college boys in the Sanctuary, the third which was rendered in beautiful harmony by trebles, basses, tenor and alto. The Benedictus (Canticle of Zachary) was rendered alternately by the choir and Sanctuary. The singing of the Miserere Me in almost total darkness of the Church, representing the desolation that overshadowed the earth at the death of Our Divine Lord, was most solemn and suggestive.

After the Tenebrae service was over hundreds remained in the Church to approach the Tribunal of Penance. This morning upwards of a thousand people attended the Church as early as seven o'clock to receive Holy Communion, and between the hours of 7 and 9 o'clock a regular stream of people might be seen going in and out of the Cathedral.

At 9 a.m. High Mass was celebrated and the Procession to the Altar of Repose took place. The church bells which rang out at the "Gloria in Excelsis" in honor and thanksgiving to Our Divine Lord for the institution of the Blessed Eucharist, will not be heard any more till during the Mass on Holy Saturday, the silence in the interval being expressive of the mourning of the Church for the death of her Spouse.

This evening at 7.30 the Office of Tenebrae will be sung again, after which Rev. Father Pippy will preach the sermon on the Blessed Eucharist.

GOOD FRIDAY.

To-morrow morning at 10 Mass of the Presanctified will be celebrated. The Church will be open three hours before to allow the hundreds that generally attend thus early to make the devotions of the Way of the Cross. The Church bells will not ring for Mass.

At 3 p.m. public Stations of the Cross will be conducted by one of the priests.

At 7.30 p.m. there will again be held the service of Tenebrae and a sermon on the Passion of Our Divine Lord will be preached by Rev. Fr. Gough.

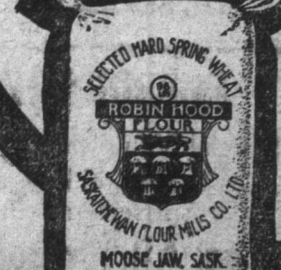
