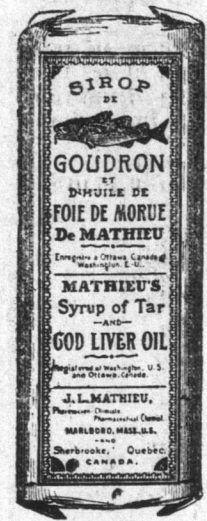

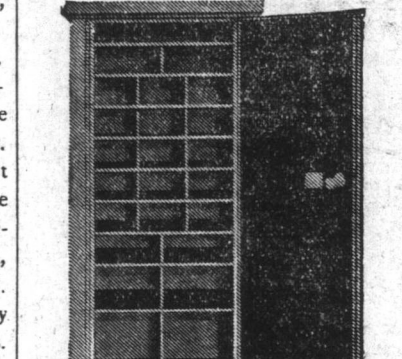

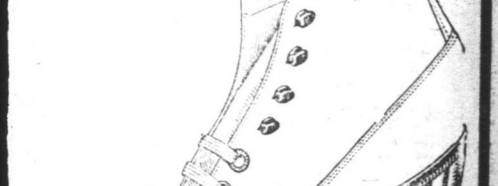

Teachers' Convention.

(Continued.)

SUPT. HANRAHAN.

Mr. Hanrahan, Supt. schools in the Grace District, expressed the pleasure that it afforded him to be called upon to speak at such a meeting and to be on a platform with such eminent gentlemen as His Honor the Administrator, His Lordship the Bishop, and Mr. Morrison, Acting Premier. The Teachers' Convention of 1911 bids fair to be the greatest of all, not alone from a social but from an educational standpoint. The teachers have made great progress in improving their conditions and should convince them of the power of union. Although much has been done, more will be done. It is a favorable circumstance and one that augurs for success that we have on the platform with us to-day the Administrator, Sir William Horwood, and the Acting Premier, who has promised to what he can on behalf of the teachers. The status of the profession is acknowledged everywhere and education has never had a more helpful outlook. The R. N. Co., Bowring Bros. and Crosbie & Co. have all readily given special rates of transportation to the teachers. All this is the work of the Teachers' Association and the respect that the public has accorded it. We should now be practical in our deliberations. The two subjects that should be given special attention are: (1) The pension for old teachers and (2) payment of teachers' salaries by cheque monthly (sharp on time) instead of quarterly. (Great applause.) Mr. Hanrahan's experience in waiting for his cheque when a teacher was true to life and was greeted with laughter and applause.

SUPT. BLACKALL.

Mr. W. W. Blackall, Supt. of C. of E. schools, said in part: "It afforded him great pleasure to be present and to have an opportunity of addressing the teachers, all of whom, he hoped, would be given a chance to express their opinions on the problems connected with education needing reform. He then spoke of the early history of the formation of the Teachers' Association in 1898, and what Mr. A. B. Morine had done in their cause, giving a grant from the

public funds of \$1,000 to pay the expenses of a Convention. The Association died a lingering death after a few years, but about six years ago was revived again with a promise of a long life. The revival was due chiefly to the Anti-Consumption movement started by Hon. Jno. Harvey three years ago. It was now in its third year, and like a young tree was flourishing. Self preservation should be the first law of the Association. The teachers should keep before their minds the need of an agitation for better salaries. After that there may come the nobler feeling of the good that we are doing for the cause of the community in general. In the Convention we should consider what is the best that can be done to improve the cause of education and to train up the young generations to be strong, upright and honorable men and women. We should endeavor to make the profession a noble one and have it recognized as such, so that every teacher would be able to take his place as an equal, social and intellectually, with any man in the community in which he resides. He should be second to no man in purely educational matters. An important question to be considered is the preparation of teachers for the work. A great deal of the educational grant is wasted when teachers are sent out poorly equipped for the work. Efficiency and success in the schools depend almost entirely on the training of the teachers. The next question is that of solving "When a man or woman (a teacher) reaches 25 years of age, they have to ask themselves the question, how will they stand financially when they reach 50 years?" No wonder when they put this question to themselves so many leave the profession.

SUPT. BURKE.

Mr. V. P. Burke, Supt. of R. C. Schools for the Diocese of St. John's, said, in part, that he was proud to meet the teachers. This is an historic occasion and unique in the history of the Teachers' Association, for it is not the first time that they have been addressed by the Acting Governor of the Colony. The presence of Sir William Horwood here with us on the platform to-day, a representative of His Majesty the King, is an incentive to every boy in Newfoundland to make the best use of the educational advantages offered him. All the teachers feel grateful to him for the honour he has conferred on them in coming to this meeting. Their sentiments will be no doubt expressed in saying that when next the authorities

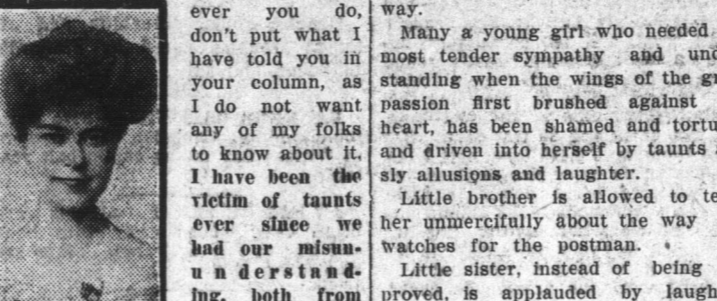

Perhaps my mother would have understood, but I have none, and I can't bear to be misunderstood."

So a little girl ended the letter in which she had laid bare her heart and told her pathetic little love secret to me. "I have been the victim of taunts ever since our misunderstanding from both my sister and my aunt"—doesn't that make your blood boil? It does mine?

It makes me wild to go to that aunt and sister and tell them what I think of the cruelty that drives an unhappy little girl to confide in and ask advice of a total stranger, and beg that stranger to keep her secrets from her own family.

Of course, I realize that the taunts weren't meant to be cruel. They were probably supposed to be merely funny. You see, the little girl's misunderstanding with her first lover, his failure to respond to her overtures and her hurt pride, appealed to these old people as constituting an exquisitely humorous situation, and they were just trying to make the most of it.

Nor is that attitude such an uncommon one. That's the saddest part of it all, and that's why I'm writing about it. It seems to be almost impossible for grown-up-ness, especially married grown-up-ness, not to look at the

young peoples' first love affairs in this way. Many a young girl who needed the most tender sympathy and understanding when the wings of the great passion first brushed against her heart, has been shamed and tortured and driven into herself by taunts and sly allusions and laughter.

Little brother is allowed to tease her unmercifully about the way she was loved by the postman. Little sister, instead of being reproved, is applauded by laughter, when she pipes up at the family dinner table with: "I know what made Jean late for dinner. She was waiting around, hoping Bob would come home with her."

And even the presence of a guest does not deter married sister from saying with the self-righteousness of the safely married woman: "I should think Jean, that you'd let Bob do the waiting."

Poor little Jean. She had not acknowledged even to her own heart that the reason she stopped this particular noon to consult the teacher about her college examinations, was that she knew Bob had to stay after school and couldn't walk home with her, as usual, unless she did.

Does she see a flower that someone had left open instead of waiting for it to unfold in its natural time? You know how it looks. Well, that's the way Jean's heart felt.

The little girl of my letters says: "Perhaps my mother would have understood."

Perhaps she would have. And yet I have known others who didn't scruple to laugh at these "cub" love affairs, as they called them. We do not laugh at a case of diphtheria or scarlet fever, merely because it is a light one, do we?

But we might better do so than laugh at the young girl's first experience with the great, relentless, incurable disease of the ages.

Foreign Fishing Notes. In New York State cold storage foods must be marked, in some conspicuous place, with the day, month and year, when received in cold storage. When once taken out for sale it is illegal to put it back in cold storage.

Capt. James McDonald's "treaty coast" trip with the fishing schooner Miranda along the south shore of Newfoundland, and discharged 240,000 lbs. of salt cod at Gloucester—a very successful experiment. The fare was obtained in accordance with the recent American Treasury Department relations as to what constitutes an American fishery, the crew of the craft which went from St. John's on her being assisted on the trip by men shipped in the colony. All the fish were landed, dressed and salted on the Miranda.

U. S. Consul General John E. Jones, writing from Winnipeg, estimates there are 2,000 people directly employed in the fishery of Manitoba and that over 5,000 get their living more or less directly by the fishing industry. The following is the variety of the product of Lake Winnipeg: Whitefish, pickerel, pike, sturgeon, perch, tullibee, catfish, gold-eyes, catar, and about 800,000 pounds mixed and coarse fish.

Whalers have had great luck this season in the Pacific waters. Eleven sperm whales have been taken at the Kuyquot whaling station at Sechart, the catch totaling 250 whales to date. The most recent reports of the Billingsgate and Londenhall markets, as summarized by the "Fish Trades Gazette," shows the total tonnage of fish delivered at Billingsgate during 1910 was 198,934 tons.

An Albino trout was recently caught near Allentown, Pa. It was 11½ inches long and had pink eyes. An Albino trout is said to be the greatest rarity in nature, not one occurring in 10,000,000, and this is said to be only the second ever hooked in Pennsylvania. The fish, which was pure white, with brilliant cardinal spots, put upon an unusual fight.

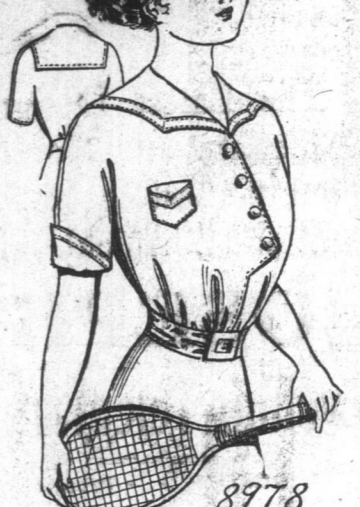
Cleveland, June 27.—The run of herring set in well to the westward this week and the entire fleet of gill netters are now fishing. Catches varied from 500 pounds to three tons. Vermillion O. boats making large lifts. Prices dropped 1½ cents per pound on Thursday. Large catches at Fairport, O. In pound and trap nets, give a plentiful supply for local uses, smoking, salting and freezing taking care of the overplus.

How Consumers Waste Gas. 1. By using heavy iron utensils suitable for contact with flame and smoke. Instead of those made of lighter metal, through which the heat can more easily penetrate. 2. By neglecting to turn off the gas-burners the instant the cooking is done, or to lower them when it is possible to reduce the heat. 3. By want of method and forethought in managing the cooking—i.e. instead of steaming potatoes over the saucepan in which a pudding is being boiled, a careless cook will boil both, thus using two gas burners instead of one. 4. By using soot-coated utensils such as a non-conductor of the heat, the consumption of gas will be increased. Also an unpleasant smell will be caused.

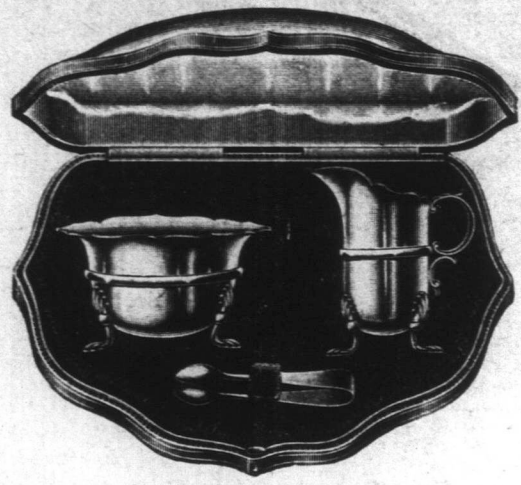

Unity of Action.

The public at large are having three object lessons on Conference, Counsel and Unity of Action. The lessons have been inculcated by the Methodist Conference the Teachers' Convention and Labor Day. On Monday the Methodist Conference expressed approval of a basis of union with some other churches, the desire for unity being prompted by an assurance of greater effectiveness in the Mission Field of the World. On Tuesday a great body of teachers gathered together in St. Bonaventure's College Hall to open a convention, where they might take counsel with one another to fit themselves better for the upbringing of the young in the schools of the country. School methods, examination systems, curriculums, the standing of teachers and handicrafts have been discussed as means towards that end. Yesterday a public holiday was held, styled Labor Day, yet a Festival of Unionism. The value of unity of action in the Labor World is thus set out in the Workman.

"Now are the days of organized labor movements all over the world. In St. John's the workmen have taken advantage of the movement, and nearly all the trades and handicrafts have Unions. There can be no room for doubt as to the good that these organizations have done in improving the condition of the laboring men and their families. Less than twenty years ago men had to work for thirty cents a day; at the present time, owing to Labor Unions, the wages have advanced 100 per cent. The cost of living has gone up, and the workmen cannot now live on smaller pay. The improvement in the working man's condition will go on. It only needs level-headed men to direct affairs and act on reasonable principles."

Carlyle is reported to have said: "A man, be the heavens praised, is sufficient for himself; yet were ten men, united in love, capable of being and doing what ten thousand singly would fail to do."

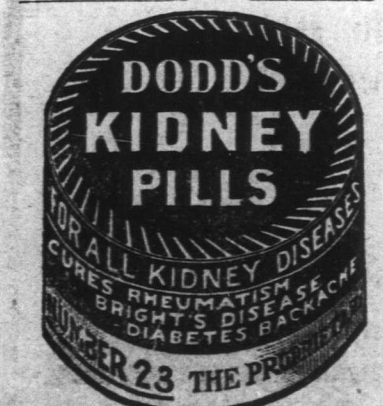
Portia's Fishery News.

By the Portia we learn that reports in Bonne Bay from the Straits show that little if any fish is being caught there at present. There are 20 Bonne Bay schooners fishing down there. From Cape Ray down to Burnt Point are so scarce that none can be had to eat, and what has not been known before in 40 years is the scarcity of scallops at Grand Bank and down the coast below St. Lawrence, places that were the early headquarters for these fish. From Little Placentia down to Cape Broyle, excepting St. Shott's and Trepassy Bay, they are doing remarkably well with cod on hook and trawls. All the bankers are on the Banks with a caplin baiting and there is no news of them.

Marine Notes.

The Clementine, Capt. Tucker, sailed this morning for Barbados taking a load of codfish and herring for A. Goodridge & Sons.

The Grace, Capt. Fitzgerald, arrived from Cadiz yesterday afternoon 25 days on the voyage. Capt. F. reports a summer passage.



The Stephano Here.

A MAGNIFICENT SHIP.
The new Red Cross liner Stephano, Capt. Clarke, arrived here this morning, and coming down here easily made 14 1/2 knots and can do 15. She left New York on July 1st, at 11:30 a.m. and landed some passengers in Bonaventure Bay, below New York, which caused some delay. She arrived at Halifax at 4 a.m. Monday and left again at 3 p.m. Tuesday, and had the weather all the way. She brought a full cargo and 147 passengers, saloon and second cabin, mostly round trippers. The one word "magnificent" must in part suffice in describing this beautiful ship. She is 326 feet long, 46.5 feet beam and 28 feet deep. Her gross tonnage is 2,449 tons, nett 2,144. She has triple expansion engines and is fitted with 10,000 horse power. She can accommodate 192 saloon and 58 second class passengers. She has telephones to every stateroom, is fitted with patent alarms, submarine bells, spacious promenade decks, patent davits to get the boats out quickly and to bring them in, and saloons are fitted in a most sumptuous manner. Prof. Orlando's orchestra will be permanent on board the ship and on the voyage performed daily.

Men Who Were Shot.

Philip Parsons, 19, and Fred Sams, 21, of Codroy, were brought in by train to-day and taken to the Hospital. They are the two men who were fired upon by old Mr. Sams of Codroy, last Saturday. Parsons is lame but able to hop about; the other man had to lie in bed all the way along and to be lifted to the ambulance on a stretcher; he is very weak. They were charged by Constable Goodland. Parsons says that he and Sams and four others were passing by the house of the old man Sams and threw some stones. Quickly after they heard a gun explosion and he and his companions Sams felt that they had been shot. Suspicion pointed to old Mr. Sams and he is now under arrest charged with the crime of shootings.

Revolt in Lisbon.

DUBLIN, To-day.
Special Evening Telegram.
Dispatches to a London News Agency from Lisbon say that a great fight has taken place between the populace and seamen quartered in the barracks in the city. The seamen incited by monarchist agitators attempted to raise an armed revolt. Revolvers and knives were used with deadly effect. The government called out all available troops. After severe fighting they managed to quell the revolt and restore order. The city is in a state of panic. Elaborate precautions are being taken by the authorities to suppress any further revolt.

Strange Actio.

DUBLIN, To-day.
The Nationalist City Councillors sent a telegram to the King, asking him not to receive the Lord Mayor of Dublin, when the latter attempts to present an address. The councillors also ordered the insignia of office to be placed in the hands of the City Treasurer.

The Big C. B. Excursion

The people of Collier's and Conception Harbor are now organizing a garden party which will take place at the latter town during the month of August. Excursions from the city have been projected for the occasion by those who are making the preparations. People will be able to go there on very low rates both by train and steamer. This is the first time that the people of this parish have undertaken an event of this kind. The scenery at this part of the Bay is very beautiful and no doubt many will take advantage of the occasion to go there. The people are leaving no stone unturned to make the event a success. The date will be given in this paper later.

May Die of Burns.

By the Portia we learn that the fire at Mr. John Farrell's house, Marystown, completely destroyed it with all its contents. Mr. Farrell was away and at 11 o'clock on the night of the accident, Mrs. Farrell without undressing went to her room adjoining that where her 3 daughters slept and without undressing threw herself on the bed and fell fast asleep. Before doing so she put the lighted lamp on a stand near the wall, it fired the paper and she awoke to find the house and her own clothing in flames. She rushed out and down the stairs and succeeded in quenching the fire burning on the bed and fell before all the hair on her head was burned off, and her face and arms were terribly scorched. Her children awoke after their mother had left the house, and the eldest daughter believing she was still in her room went in to search for her. Not finding her she ran out and joined her other sisters who had made their way down stairs. Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram, LONDON, July 4.
A well informed Englishman, recently returned from Spain, throws light upon Germany's move in Morocco. After asserting that it had been prompted by the Spanish Government, which wants help from Berlin in bringing about the partition of Morocco, he says that formerly the Spanish Government was financed from Paris, and forced to put up with French diplomacy. Spain has been financing herself, however, since losing Cuba and the Philippine Islands, and is no longer governed from Paris. Her ministers, officers and military staff favored co-operation with Germany as the most practical method for obtaining the partition of Morocco among the European Powers. There were no protests from Germany when Spain invaded Morocco in defiance of the Algeiras Agreement. There will be no hostility at Madrid to the German Emperor's coup in Agadir. Spain hopes to draw England into its scheme of partition by proposing the British occupation of Tangier.

LONDON, July 5.
Lord Lansdowne yesterday moved the official amendments to the Veto Bill. These provide for the exclusion from the operation of the Bill of legislation relating to Home Rule, for a joint sitting in cases of disagreement between the two Houses, and for the referendum in other cases. The Marquis argued that without such safeguards the Crown, the Church and the Liberty of every institution in the country would be at the mercy of a majority in the Commons, which might represent only a minority of the electors. Lord Morley, speaking for the Government, announced that the Government could not possibly accept the amendments. The evening was spent in the discussion. Lansdowne contended that the Referendum was the only reasonable method for discovering whether the country desired Home Rule for Ireland. Morley replied that Home Rule was before the country last election. The division will be taken to-day. It is understood that the Government will not declare its policy until the Committee stage has been concluded. It is believed that the Commons will reject the Lords' amendments "en bloc" and that the Lords will finally accept the Bill.

LONDON, July 4.
The Daily Telegraph revives the report that Kitchener will be offered the appointment of British agent in Egypt and the Sudan. Sir Eldon Gorst, the present agent, is seriously ill which precludes the possibility of his return to the post.

MANCHESTER, July 4.
A strike of carters developed to-day. Twelve thousand strikers forcibly prevented the movement of produce from the docks. The soldiers were called out. Women joined the strikers, stopping the traffic and destroying the produce in the streets.

LONDON, July 5.
The romantic marriage of Janet Fisher, sister of Premier Fisher, of Australia, to Constable Gail, of the London Police, yesterday, attracted a large crowd. Premier Fisher gave his sister away.

PORT OF SPAIN, July 4.
The British warship Aeolus, stationed here, has been ordered to proceed to Jamaica immediately. It is reported her sudden departure is due to the possible arrival of ex-President Castro in the West Indies.

KIEL, Germany, July 4.
The departure of Emperor William for his Norwegian trip has not been set for any definite time. The delay is much commented upon, and is attributed generally to the Moroccan complications.

LONDON, July 4.
King George to-day reviewed 35,000 Boy Scouts from all parts of the Kingdom.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 4.
Wolgast won the fight with Moran in the 12th round.

A Boy Drowned.

The body being found floating on the water near his father's stage. President, officers and members of the Coopers' Union, with the older members in carriages. Carriage with flag of the Labourers' Union. President, officers and members of the Labourers' Union. Methodist Guards Band. L. S. P. U. Division were re-Mount Cashel Orphanage Fire and Drum Corps. L. S. P. U. 2nd Division. Carriage with banner of Tinsmiths' Union. President and officers of the Tinsmiths' Union. Band of the Salvation Army. Carriage with flag of the Firemen's Protective Union. President, officers and members of the Firemen's Union. With the bands discoursing some excellent music the procession wended its way from New Gower to Hamilton down Patrick Street to Water Street, at the main entrance they were received by His Excellency Sir Wm. Horwood, who was attended by Messrs. A. Goodridge, A.D.C., and H. Carter, P.S. President James McGrath, of the L. S. P. U., proposed, and vociferous cheers were given for His Majesty King George and Queen Mary, and for His Excellency Sir Wm. and Lady Horwood, who dismissed bands rendering the National Anthem. Chairman Ruby now stepped forward and read the following address to the different portions of the Empire, the members joined in celebrating the Coronation of His Majesty King George V. and trust that his reign may be a long and peaceful one, and productive of much good to the greatest number of subjects, namely those who toil. His Majesty's respect for the conscientious convictions of the millions of His subjects show him to be possessed of a broad and liberal mind and imbued with that spirit of toleration so characteristic of His Majesty's father, Edward the Peace-maker. I am pleased to inform Your Excellency that the most cordial relations exist between employer and employee. It should always be the aim of labor organizations in this country to maintain those relations, so long as in doing so no principle of unionism is sacrificed. The members recognize that the success of capital and labor industrially depends upon their cooperation so characteristic of His Majesty's father, Edward the Peace-maker. Never before in the history of the country was employment so abundant as it is to-day, with the result that the purchasing power of the masses is increasing and the country in consequence is enjoying an unexampled measure of prosperity. It is a pleasure for the members to meet Your Excellency for the reason that we recognize in your career an inspiration to the sons of the workers, because in this age of Democracy the prizes cannot be won by reason of the mere accident of birth but go rather to him, no matter what his station in life may be, whose character and abilities fit him for the position. Sir William, in replying, spoke of the great pleasure it afforded him to welcome the representatives of united labor to Government House. He was sure that if His Excellency the Governor were present his greeting also would be a cordial one, and it was most gratifying to him (Sir Wm.) to hear the warm expressions of loyalty which he had just listened to from such a representative body of workmen, and to note the ring of sincerity contained in them. Sir William in elegant language thanked His Majesty the King, only as a Sovereign but as a man; referred to his presence twice in this country, the active interest he always has in the affairs of His Oldest Colony, and adverted to the contentment and

happiness of the people of the Empire owing in a great measure to the just and equitable laws which prevail, and thoughts that could serve the Empire as well in one place as another, and that Imperialism, like what had been said of charity, might begin at home provided that it did not end there. Sir William held that we could show our appreciation of the laws under which we live and demonstrate our love of Empire by making our city more worthy of its place as one of the two Capitals of British North America. He spoke as a citizen to fellow citizens and appealed to the patriotism of his hearers in asking them to take their share in making St. John's the ideal city which nature intended it to be, improving it and beautifying it and taking a forward policy in all that tends for the betterment of city and people. At C. E. Orphanage.

The Church of England teachers attended an "All Home" at the Church of England Orphanage yesterday afternoon. The invitation had been extended to them by the Lord Bishop and the managers of that institution. Among those present were Mr. W. W. Richards, Supt. of Education; Mr. Richards, President N. T. A., and Mr. Butler, Secretary N. T. A. The guests were shown through the institution and took tea, and were addressed by the Bishop and the Secretary, Rev. J. Bell. His Lordship emphasized the powerful influence they had at their disposal in their several localities, and he appreciated the influence they had already exerted for the orphans. He could think of no more important lesson to be inculcated in their pupils than to care and pray for the fatherless, which was the aim of the Sunday School Orphanage League founded by Mr. Bell. The latter then spoke and thanked the teachers for the assistance given to the League. Some 8,222 teachers and scholars had been enrolled and 138 schools associated with this work since its inception two years ago. The Secretary of the N.T.A. said the teachers desired to present a football to the boys and skipping ropes to the girls to mark their visit. Messrs. W. G. Brindley, of Hart's Content, M. H. Colley of Carbonara, James Norman of Coley's Point, and J. G. Hodder of Heart's Delight expressed their appreciation of their visit, of the work of the Orphanages and of their regard for their Bishop. The National Anthem brought the pleasant visit to a close.

Teachers' Convention

(Continued from page 3.) At the afternoon session Mr. V. P. Burke, Supt. of Schools, read a paper on "The Course of Study for Elementary Schools." In which he advocated "Nature Study, Physical Training and Hygiene."

Mr. A. W. Bray, B.Sc., followed with a most interesting address on "Science and Education." At the night session Mr. G. C. Fearn, the Secretary of the Board of Schools in Relation to Our Industries. He made a very strong plea for technical education which is now an absolute necessity in this country. If our people wish to hold their own place in the race of life they must have technical education. The handy man must give place to the skilled laborer. At the present time education in Newfoundland is only a vehicle. The time is come when it should be made to accomplish as well as carry. The pupils should have impressed on their minds the necessity for cultivating the powers of observation, for after all what is science, according to Mr. Fearn, but keen medical observation.

At the conclusion of Mr. Fearn's speech an interesting discussion on Technical Education and on the C. H. E. Examination system took place in which many of the teachers took part. Yesterday forenoon a business meeting was held. In the afternoon the teachers attended the picnic at the C. of E. Orphanage, Smithville and Rostellan. His Grace Archbishop Howley had kindly presented all the R. C. teachers with tickets that admitted them to the field and the tables, a favour which they all highly appreciated. At night the teachers attended an "At Home" in the British Hall which also proved an enjoyable event. To-night the addresses will be on "Health and Physical Exercises in the Schools." Mr. O'Brien, the Physical Drill Master, will present with a class of his junior pupils and will with their assistance give an exhibition of what it is possible to accomplish in this way in every school in the country.

Methodist Conference.

On Tuesday morning the Sunday School Committee reported and announced the officers for the year, viz: Rev. T. B. Darby, B.A., Chairman; Rev. C. Hackett, Secretary; Rev. W. Moore, Treasurer. The committee recommended that Sunday School unite with the Epworth Leagues in supplying a missionary addition to Dr. Sheridan, viz. Rev. S. H. Soper, who is going to China next year; and also urging teachers in day and Sunday schools to abstain from the use of tobacco as an example to boys.

The Missionary Committee also reported, recommending the appointment of a Superintendent of Missions for the Conference. After much debate, the original resolution was carried. A deputation from the Lord's Day Alliance was introduced, viz. Revs. Canon White, J. Thackeray, J. Sutcliffe, and Mr. C. S. P. Sinsant. Their addresses were well received. A resolution of sympathy was passed and an address given by Rev. Dr. Moore.

In the afternoon the Rev. Dr. Curtis was elected the beneficiary to take the trip to the Holy Land under the MacPherson bequest. Rev. C. Hackett was representative for the annual meeting of the Temperance and Moral Reform Committee. At night the Rev. Dr. Curtis addressed the Epworth League Meeting. On Wednesday, other committee reports were considered. In the words of the Daily News, "A resolution was approved to the effect that in the opinion of the Conference, the right of precedence among Brigades, based upon seniority, is not satisfactory, or calculated to produce the inter-brigade harmony so essential to their welfare, and they recommended that such action be taken by the Government as will settle the matter of precedence upon principles of absolute equality and fair play. A deputation was appointed to convey this resolution to the Government." It was decided to hold next year's Conference at Gower St. Church again.



Fitzpatrick never had it so thick. She left here on the 24th ult., and owing to fog was at Cape Broyle until 1 a.m. Sunday the 25th. It cleared at 8 a.m. that day and was fine until the following Tuesday evening when the ship left Hermitage Bay and again dense fog was the experience until after leaving Port aux Basques. In turning Cape Ray she ran out of the fog zone and had it very fine until she reached Bonne Bay at noon Friday. She left at 6 p.m. that day and Saturday at 11 a.m. again turned Cape Ray and once again encountered the same fog bank and this continued to 1 p.m. yesterday. The ship brought a lot of whale oil, cod oil and lobsters and had a lot of passengers in transit to and from the various ports. Her passengers for here were:

PASSED MANY WHALES.—The S. S. Solway passed several schools of whales about 500 miles off the coast last Monday.
TRAP BADLY DAMAGED.—One of Job Bros. & Co.'s traps, set outside this port, was found to be badly damaged by the surf on Tuesday and had to be taken in for repair.
TRAP FISHING.—Fishing with traps at Torbay, Pouch Cove and Outer Cove the past three days has been very good.

Ocean Liners' Narrow Escape.
By the Portia we learn that on Friday last in the dense fog which prevailed in that section no less than three large ocean liners narrowly escaped going ashore in Trepassy Bay. Two of them were less than thrice the length of themselves from the land, and another, a very large boat, loaded with passengers was almost ashore in the Brook. Had she struck the cliff not a soul on board would have been saved as she would be dashed to pieces against a "straight up and down cliff." In fact she would have gone ashore where the S. S. George Washington some 30 years was lost with all on board. A fleet of local schooners and vessels off the Banks got in there also, and but for a momentary lift in the fog there would have been awful loss of life. Had there been a horror of this kind the cause, our informants say, could be directly traced to negligence on the part of the powers that be. For two months past a fog alarm under the supervision of the Canadian Government has been going at Cape Freels. This has received very little notice as far as can be ascertained and few local or foreign seamen know of its existence. Consequently, after hearing the first whistle a steamer coming east would conclude the sound was Cape Race. Navigators were thus mystified, and one of the ocean boats came in as near as possible and rounded Cape Race when she was off that point asking for a solution of two fog alarms blowing to the westward of the Cape. If our Government had no information to give of this alarm they could have obtained it from the Canadian Marine authorities. It would be too late to do so when a number of valuable lives were destroyed.
The express arrived here from Port aux Basques at 12.30 p.m. to-day bringing 50 passengers including Sir R. Bond who detained at Whitbourne, Joseph Curran, A. Hickman and Mrs. Hickman.

SOLIGNUM.

A Remarkable Test! Locally made by Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.

To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.

Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.

Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by those interested in the preservation of Wharf Piles or any other wood work.

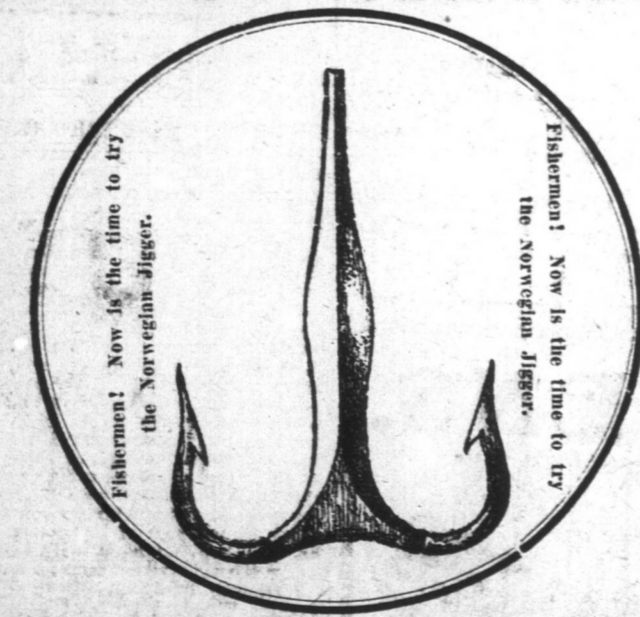

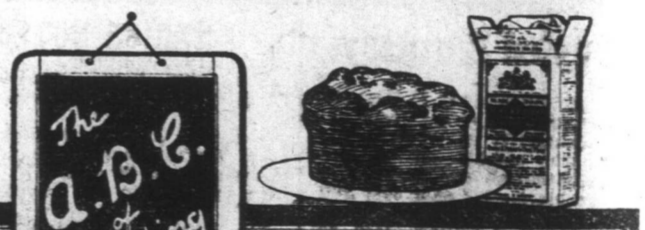
