Lyon, and why Mary Lyon was the founder of Mt. Holyoke College, which was one of the rst two colleges for women in the country, and I am telling you about her to-day because to-day is the an-niversary of her birth.

There are many of these obscurely great folks in our history, who had almost as powerful an influence upon the conditions of our life to-day as some of the names that are household words, and whose lives are quite as inspiring to read about. To any woman who is interested in the wo-man movement, I recommend the bioraphy of one of its greatest ancestors

Mary Lyon was born Feb. 28, 1797. She was the child of very poor parents, and had to earn most of her own education. She became a country schoolmarm, receiving as her first pay, seventy-five cents a week and board. In all her life the highest salry she ever received was \$200 a year, and out of that she gave much towards her beloved project.

At that time higher education for vomen was as bitterly opposed, as voman suffrage now is. That a wo-nan should study algebra was conidered as unnatural and unfeminine, s it is now that she should vote. loreover, money for philanthropic bjects was a great deal more diffiuit to get then than it is in these lays of multi-millionaires, who can ound a college by signing a check.

I have never passed a single week since attending the seminary without probability. Holyoke and became its first president.

One of the most wonderful things about her life was that she had time for little kindnesses, for personal influence, and contact, as well as for her great work.

The tribute her pupil paid her fifty years afterwards, shows the depth of her personal influence. An example of the little kindness is this incident related by her biographer— "With all the care of the seminary resting on her shoulders, she yet made time during her last season at Ipswich, to teach a woman who worked in the kitchen to read. The woman was about forty years old and had been ashamed to let anyone know of her inability. Mary Lyon found it out and straightway began to teach



The London, G.B., Weekly Mail of ne 17th ult., says: The jury at the Old Bailey, on Saturday, found Ernest Terah Hooley, who is now fifty-two years of age, ed him with obtaining six cheques for

the payment of £2,000 from George Leech Tweedale—a young mechanical engineer of Rochdale, who had inherited a fortune of £45,000-by means of false pretences and with intent to defraud.

The false pretence was in stating that a particular estate which he was selling was not encumbered. Mr. Justice Phillmore ordered Mr. Hooley to be imprisoned for twelve months in the second division.

Mr. Hooley turned sharply round and, murmuring "A fine finish," left the dock. He was removed in a

In quick succession came the daring flotation of several huge companies like Dunlop, Humber, Bovril, Schweppes, and Tafford Park Estates, and Hooley was the company promoter of the age.
