Thus it is the task of the Duke of Norfork, as Hereditary Lord Chief Butler, to see that the wine is properly decanted. He has no fewer than thirteen assistants for this, consisting of the Lord Mayor and twelve citizens of London, who have also the right to approach the King after the second course, and offer wine in a gold cup. Further these thirteen assistants have nine sub-assistants in the persons of the Mayor of Oxford and eight burgesses of that city. Height of the New Style

The number of persons who have the right to offer wine to the King during a banquet is an interesting reminder of the hard-drinking' days. The Duke of Argyll, the Earl of Verulam, and Lord de Ros each have separate duties conne ted with the pouring out and offering of wine

The average man is sometimes apt to regard these rights and duties as rather childish, but it must not be forgotten that they are all rooted in some serious purpose. Most of them date from a time when the power of the noble was becoming a menace to the peace and safety of country. The King would then pick out a particular baron who hads recently manifested signs of "uppishness" to the crown, and, in presence of a large assembly, confer on him the "privilege" of performing this

or that task. To-day many of these strange duties have been dropped; for example, the present Primate has not as yet been called upon by King George to display his c u l i n a r y powers. Nor have the Earls of Abingdon and Verulam, with the Marquess of Breadalbane. observed carving hot joints.



About midnight on the 28th November Lord Lyttelton died suddenly in bed, his valet having left him for a moment. The cause of death was not stated and there was no inquest. Most of the narrators, including Mrs. Thrale, who ecorded the warning before news of his lordship's death reached her, called the affair a dream; but the coincidence of its fulfilment is the mys-

terious and significant part of it. Still another example of the long arm of coincidence is given by Dr Ebera, the head of a great lunatic asylum. 

### Montenegrins the Victors

The Montenegrins captured Berana

Special Evening Telegram. PODGORITZA, To-day

after ten days fighting. Seven hundred Turkish soldiers were made prisoners, fourteen guns were taken ogether with large quantities of ammunition and provisions. In the attack the Montenegrins had ten men killed and thirty one wounded. The Servians, many of whom resided in the town of Berana, hailed General Vokititch and his victorious troops as their deliverers. General Martinovitch after a short engagement occupied the fortified sections of Mount Mouritch, opposite Taraboxe. It is reported there will be a pause of operations around Jushi. Undoubtedly this is due to the Montenegrins realizing they have paid too dearly for their success in heavy loss of life. King Nicholas accordingly has issued proclamation urging his soldiers to restrain their impetuosity and adopt themselves to modern conditions of warfare, which demand artillery preparations before attempts are made to storm fotified positions. The Montenegin Princes Danilo and Peter have been busy in engagements, per sonally leading their forces. Prince Peter has been promoted to Major for gallantry. General Martinovitch's division has worked its way closer to Scutari. It is stated that an Austrian vessel has been ordered up the Boyana River to bring the Austrian Consul and colony from Scutari. More than a hundred battalions of Turkish troops are concentrated ready at ports in Asia Minor, only awaiting the conclusion of peace with Italy to be shipped to reinforce the Turkish forces in
