

Guilty of Murder

Annapolis, N. S., Oct. 3.—The verdict of the jury in the Graves murder case was reached shortly before six to-night. They were found guilty of murdering Kenneth Lea. His Lordship Chief Justice Townshend sentenced them to hang on January 15th, if he told the prisoners that in setting the date so far ahead it was his intention to give them time to prepare for death. The prisoners received the sentence very calmly. Two of the brothers maintained their innocence. They broke down, however, when placed in the cells.

The Graves' will be taken to Kentville by the Bluenose October 4th, Friday.

The murder for which the three brothers, Alfred, Fred and Harry Graves have been sentenced, was committed at Town Plot, Kings County, on June 23rd last.

In his charge to the Jury the Chief Justice said that although Lea actually killed himself, if the accused were the cause of his death, and bore malice and ill-will towards the deceased, it was murder. If there was no malice, no ill-feeling, then it was manslaughter. The evidence was contradictory. The Jury must decide which to believe. If there was any reasonable doubt, the prisoners must be given the benefit of it.

The Jury deliberated six hours. After the Judge had received the verdict of the jury, he addressed the prisoners in a few words, asking them if they had anything to say why they should not be sentenced in accordance with the verdict found against them by a jury of their countrymen. His Lordship then proceeded to pronounce the sentence.

Government Advertising.

As usual, the Chronicle does not deal with facts as they are. It misrepresents them. It is absolutely untrue that we raised any objection to Mr. Dooley soliciting advertising from the Government for any newspaper or publication he may issue or wish to issue. We are not concerned with that aspect of the case. That we leave to the Government itself. What we asked was why the Government was apparently the chief advertising patron of the Sunday Express. Mr. Dooley says he solicited and obtained from the departments concerned the advertisements which appeared, and that after the issue was printed, the Government cancelled them. The Government contend that the advertisements were unauthorized. That conflict of evidence is also a matter for the parties to the dispute to settle between them. Yesterday we pointed out that two days elapsed before any repudiation was made public in the government organs, and that it was only after we had directed attention to it, that the Government and the Government organs made any reference to this phase of the matter. The charge of meanness, based on a misrepresentation of our attitude, falls to the ground. The Chronicle was singularly ill-advised in its reference to the taking away from us of the publication of the letter last. Up to now we have refrained from setting forth the reason why this Post Office ad, which with up to a short interval of the last Post Office ad had remained, with us since the Evening Telegram was started thirty years ago, was taken from us last winter. It is illuminating. It will be remembered that the Fishermen's Advocate was sued for libel by the members of the Executive Council and Mr. Coaker apologized. Pressure was attempted to be brought to bear on us by a member of the Executive to publish Mr. Coaker's apology and we were reminded that the Government was giving us the letter last, to publish.

and we were left to figure out the consequence in case of a refusal to publish it. We, however, declined to publish it, and soon after our refusal, received a letter from the Post Master General stating that he had been instructed by the Government to order us to discontinue publication of the letter last. The letter was then handed over to the Daily News for publication. We made no complaint of this action of the Government, and should have maintained silence about it, had not the Evening Chronicle referred to the matter in charging us with meanness in connection with our query about the Government ads, which appeared on Sunday last in the Sunday Express. We preferred to sacrifice the profits of the ad, rather than comply with the wishes of the Government.

New Governor Appointed.

Mr. Walter Edward Davidson, C.M.G. We are informed by the Prime Minister, the Rt. Hon. Sir Edward Morris, that a successor to the Governor, Sir Ralph C. Williams, has been appointed. The new Governor is Walter Edward Davidson, C.M.G. He has been Governor of the Seychelles Island since 1904. He was born in 1859 at Killybegs, Co. Down. In 1880 he entered the Ceylon Civil Service and in 1902 was Colonial Secretary in the Transvaal. He has been married twice, the first time in 1883, and a second time in 1907. His present wife is Margaret, Agnes, youngest daughter of the late General Hon. Sir Percy Fielding. General Williams leaves next February. We presume the new Governor will arrive here in time to open the Legislature.

A vessel was about the size of Downey's schooner which was to call at the island for men and the belief is now expressed that she is safe.

Meet It Rough.

Towed in by S. S. Stephano. The schooner Beatrice entered port this morning in a damaged condition. She left Trepassy yesterday fish laden for St. John's and after being a few hours at sea met it rough. A strong south east gale, accompanied by a snow storm, raged with great violence. The Beatrice was "hove" to, with canvas gone and of course making no progress. The crew did not think she would survive the gale. The little craft labored heavily and was badly pitched, having all her canvas torn to pieces. This morning when the Stephano was coming down the shore the schooner was taken in tow and brought to port.

New City Lights.

The committee of the Municipal Council having charge of the city lighting had decided to put new arc lights in the following places:— Browning's Bridge, upper South Side, George Street, near the church, corner Cabot St., and Barter's Hill, Cookstown and LeMarchant Roads, Duckworth Street opposite Savings Bank, Nunery Lane, Prospect Street, Stewart Avenue, Haggerty's Lane and George's Street near Lane. This is a popular move on the part of the Council as the places where the lights will be placed were very dark.

Marine Notes.

The Fogata sheltered out of the storm at Cat Harbour last night and left at daylight this morning. The schr. Jean, Kennedy, sailed to-day for Brazil, fish laden by the Smith Co., Ltd. The S. S. Wasis arrived here from North Sydney at 6 p.m. yesterday with a cargo of coal for J. J. Mullaly and Co. The Portia left Bay of Islands this morning, coming south. The Prospero left Catalina at daylight this morning, going north.

Buffalo, Sept. 12. — Latest reports show that there have been a total of 220 cases since the epidemic started a few months ago. Twenty-six deaths have resulted, and 60 per cent. of the survivors are permanently crippled. Four new cases were reported to the Health Department. In the August number of the Public Health Report, printed by the United States Government, it is shown that other cities have been troubled more or less by this disease, but Buffalo and Los Angeles, Cal., lead all in number of cases and fatal results. From June 8 to August 17, 226 cases of the disease were reported in Los Angeles and 43 deaths resulted. In Los Angeles day and night guards have been established to enforce the quarantine.

Model Yachts in Bowring Park.

In 1904 an organization was formed by some twenty or thirty young men in this city, under the title of "The Terra Nova Miniature Yacht Club." The officers who directed affairs for several years, comprised:— James A. Ledingham—President. S. Robertson—Vice-President. Stanley Lumsden—Treasurer. L. C. Murphy—Secretary.

The Club, with the assistance of Capt. Treble, an expert designer and builder of small craft, which were accurate in proportion and detail, held annual regattas on ponds near the city and as a result nearly 150 miniature yachts are now equipped following the Club's activity. Although the young men who then directed the affairs of the organization have outgrown this pastime, others have stepped into the vacancies, and it is hoped that provision will have been made for the admirer of model Yachting, and that he will be permitted to use the miniature lakes planned for the purpose of sailing them.

The matter has already been suggested in the Press and is worthy of consideration.

Special Evening Telegram. BOSTON, To-day
The Boston Red Sox, pennant winners of the League, are world's champions for 1912, defeating the New York Nationals yesterday by a score of 3 to 2 in ten innings of a bitterly fought struggle. The Red Sox captured their fourth victory and carried off the Premier honours of baseball. The Giants won three games of the series that was played before more than a quarter of a million people. One contest was a tie. The total receipts of the eight games were \$490,832. The Red Sox players received \$4,024, while the Giant players in each game are in for \$2,566.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day.
The Balkan fighting remains limited to the Montenegrins border, and although relations of Turkey with the allied states is virtually broken, there is a curious indisposition on the part of Bulgaria and Serbia to take the final plunge into hostilities. This hesitation is regarded in diplomatic quarters as a good omen, pointing to the possibility that the Powers, although unable to prevent war, may succeed in lessening its duration. It is understood that most of the Powers have accepted the principle of the suggestion of the French Premier for a European Conference, but nothing has been decided on as to when the Conference will meet or what its programme will be. The fact that Italy is now free to enter the Conference will greatly strengthen the European concert, and is calculated to make the Balkan States more amenable to the European pressure. The status of Crete under the new conditions which it is reported will be virtually annexation to Greece is now engaging the attention of the Powers. That Bulgaria has declined war has not been confirmed.

Policeman's Terrible Plight.

While Watching the "Wilhelmina," are Compelled to leave Her Owing to Storm, Scaling 420 Foot Cliff in Midst of a Terrible Thunder and Lightning Storm. Spend Awful Night on Narrow Strip of Beach.

Constables Thos. Lynch of Renewes and Edward Quinlan of Trepassay, were in charge of the S. S. Wilhelmina from a few days after she stranded until the 23rd July past, and on the night of the 12th, of that month, they had an adventure the terrible details of which will be printed on their memory until the day they die. The officers boarded the ship at Gull Island, St. Mary's Bay.

Where She Stranded, and found her to be hoove out to starboard at an angle of 45 degrees, though she would partly recover her equilibrium at high tide. Early on the 12th, the wind blew stiffly from the S. E., continuing all day and towards evening it increased to a hurricane with the rain falling in torrents. This wind being off shore, there was not much sea running but just at dusk the officers saw that a terrible night was in store for them. Then began a thunder and lightning storm the like of which they never before witnessed and which continued without intermission all the night through. There was a possibility that the wind might chop in from the W. at any moment in which case a heavy sea would run quickly on the shore, and would draw the ship and those on board her to destruction. In such an emergency the men

Could Not Hope to Land in the little dory which swung alongside and even if they succeeded in doing so there was the certainty of being washed off the little narrow strip of beach which lay at the foot of a cliff 420 feet high in the only accessible place, Sculpin Cove, which lay about a quarter of a mile from their ship. On the ship with the officers was Joseph Fagan, a watchman, and with him Lynch and Quinlan consulted as to how they should act. The result of their conference was that all three deemed it best to quit the vessel and that quickly as the wind showed signs of veering westward and already the sea began to run higher than usual. Hastily putting some luggage and effects in the dory, they left the steamer at 7.30 p.m. in company with Patrick Poner, who had been employed on board tallying the deals which were being discharged the day before. After a perilous row shoreward they landed safely on the beach, but were no longer there when they saw that their position would be untenable had they remained for any length of time and they now had no other alternative but to try and scale the precipice or at least should the wind veer due west to try and get a foothold in some of the numerous clefts in its steep face, above the reach of the waves, there to remain until the storm abated. The rain poured incessantly from the heavens and flash after flash of lightning lit up with moon day brilliancy the gloomy surroundings while the crashing of the thunder deafened the hapless men.

The Perilous Ascent. At 8.30, just as a more than ordinary vivid flash of lightning illumined the precipitous sides of the cove and an awful peal of thunder reverberated through the surrounding heights and gulches, the men essayed to scale the height. Fagan and Power being acquainted with the place, led the way in the order named followed by Lynch and Quinlan and the first named three after a desperate struggle, reached the top of the cliff and lay down for a while utterly exhausted and worn out and drenched to the skin from the heavy rainfall. So steep was the cliff in some places that when the lightning flashed, to look down meant death as to peer into the chasm below would unnerve the strongest man and would cause him to fall to his death on the rocks at the base of the declivity. Only when they recovered themselves somewhat after their terrible climb did they realize that Quinlan was not with them and they feared that he had missed his footing in the ascent and been hurled below to a horrible death. Const. Lynch went out to the brink of the cliff on his hands and knees and peered into the black gulf beneath him and when once again the lightning flashed, he caught a glimpse of his brother officer reclining on the beach which they had left on their desperate enterprise a half an hour before. It was afterwards ascertained that he had scaled the cliff to the height of about 60 feet, but lost sight of the others and then took a false and dangerous lead which it was utterly impossible for him to climb, and was compelled to descend to the

beach there to take his chance of life or death. Being a heavy, corpulent man Quinlan in going back to the beach had several narrow escapes from falling. How he got down safely he cannot tell. Fortunately the wind veered back to the original point and not so much sea ran on the beach and for the time being at least, the man was safe.


Lynch's Bravery and Unselfishness. Noting Quinlan's perilous position Lynch said to his companions that he would not see his comrade die alone or lose his reason possibly, if death did not overtake him before it occurred, he shouted through the storm that he would descend at all hazards and if again a sea hove in to get him up in the cliff above the reach of the waves or falling, that to die with him. Brave fellows that they were Fagan and Power now volunteered to go down with Lynch, but this he would not hear of, saying that it was enough for two to be sacrificed if such was the will of Providence. Down the cliff then the brave officer started, the frequent and vivid lightning flashes guiding him on his way and holding on to jutting rocks, slipping and struggling often, he after awful risk to himself reached his brother officer's side and was greeted with the remark that he was a foolish man to risk his life in coming down, but Lynch assured him he was not the man to desert a friend and comrade under such conditions. The consideration that those above would summon help to extricate the men cheered both very much but as they had a long distance to go to reach the habitations of the livers or the "cook" rooms of the fishermen, both men prepared to make the best of an all night stay on the beach and hoping that the wind would not veer west and send in a sea, which if they could not get up in a crevice in the cliff would drown them both. At the base of the cliff was a large rock which afforded them the means of temporarily sheltering themselves from the elements and from a far greater danger to which we will advert shortly. Taking two of their lory oars and the mast they placed them by the side of the boulder and covering them with a dory sail they crouched under this shelter all night, but suffered terribly as it was intensely cold, they had no means of making a fire and with their clothing saturated they were in a pitiable plight indeed.

Rocks Fall From Cliff. The din of the elements was fearful and was intensified by the falling of heavy rocks all night long from the face of the cliff as they were dislodged by the torrents of water which poured down its face. Under the boulder as they were the men were comparatively free from being hit by them. Their shelter was only 10 feet distant from the waves which rolled in on the strand and a man to be alone there all night with the rain beating on him and listening to the noise created by the roaring elements

must have assuredly lost his reason and this coming home to Lynch was one of the considerations which induced him at such great risk to rejoin his comrade and if necessary share his fate whatever it might be. At daylight on the 13th, they found that their dory which had been hauled up under the cliff had been covered with the rocks and sand which had come down after the night. All day on the 13th, the storm instead of abating increased and even if the dory were intact and they launched her to board the vessel there was every likelihood of their being blown to sea and lost. At 10 a.m. that day they saw a man carefully coming down the cliff with the end of a rope in one hand. This was Peter Bonia, and his cousin Edward stood on the top of the cliff watching his progress downwards. He told the officers on reaching them that they should get up over the cliff at all hazards as there

was no redemption for them if the wind came in from the westward and this he expected, now a any moment. Next made the rope fast on the top of the cliff to a large boulder embedded in the ground and the men slowly and coming hand over hand climbed to the top where they fell to the earth exhausted from their terrible ordeal of such a climb. Water poured in floods over the face of the cliff, came in showers over their clothes and several times almost smothered them so that it was little less than miraculous that they ascended without mishap. Without the hope they could never have climbed the cliff as the crevices where sand had lodged and afforded a foothold when first Lynch and the others had scaled the night before were now swept bare by the action of the water in going to the residents of the fishermen and residences of the country they had to cross a river which was in flood by reason of the heavy rain. The Bonia Brothers got a rope across this river, making it fast to a tree on either bank and hauling it taut all crossed safely on it hand over hand to the other side. If any one of the party had been unfortunate enough to lose his grasp and fall into the stream he would have been swept by the stiff current out over the cliff to the cove and would have been either killed on the rocks or drowned. Bonia Brothers and the other men provided dry clothing for the worn out officers and all the people of the place vied with each other in making the men happy and comfortable. The best food possible was obtained for them and they sorely needed it, and the policemen will never forget the goodness of these kindhearted fishermen. The storm did not abate until Sunday forenoon the 14th, when Bonia Brothers rowed them from Gull Island Cove around the head and they again boarded the Wilhelmina only to find that some person or persons had been there ahead of them and had appropriated all the provisions on board after breaking into the galley. As it happened that forenoon Hon. M. P. Cashin's boat "Mary" arrived at the wreck for deals and the officers got from her crew all the food they required. The boat had a hard time in the storm of the night before and lost her deck cargo. But for this the men would have been in a bad predicament for want of food as they had no boat to get back to the Bonia people, their dory having been rendered useless by the rocks which fell from the cliff on her. The beach where Lynch and Quinlan spent such an awful night



The Oyster.

The oyster is a species of fruit which is used to decorate church suppers. On a large, elastic oyster, which has had hot water poured over it, can deceive a whole roomful of expectant guests by the subtle flavor which it imparts to the soup. Sometimes this flavor is so subtle that critical guests go away and utter disparaging remarks about the supper for several days afterward.

Oysters grow in family groups, and are taken alive by men who steal up behind them when they are not looking. They are then disrobed and bound out to the Ladies' Aid Society for a term of years. The church oyster bears a look of fixed melancholy, which it transfers to those of the guests who mingle with it when it has grown gray in the service.

The raw oyster is a habit which attacks people at the beginning of a meal and sometimes accompanies them home with a gloomy sensation in the vicinity of the stomach. It is customary, before eating, to chloroform the raw oyster with horse radish and spear it several times with a small harpoon, which curbs its proud spirit and puts it on the defensive. A few drops of tobacco sauce, sprinkled on the forehead of a robust oyster, will lower its vitality to such an extent that it can be safely attacked from its blind side.

The oyster cocktail is a temperance drink which is served to abstemious guests who have a prejudice against the intoxicating cup. It consists of one erect oyster smothered in catsup and which has been suspended over the fumes from the cork of a brandy bottle. Members of the church can partake of this beverage with a light conscience.

Oysters can be eaten only eight months in the year, which gives people four months in which to rest up and get their second wind. The canned oyster is a hand-picked variety which can not be told from the standard makes, except by the taste. The greatest delicacy of all is the fried oyster, which is disguised in cracker crumbs and leaf lard and eaten by the gross.

Work of Whalers

Messages received here yesterday from Capt. Bull of the whaler Cabot, which is fishing at Snook's Arm, say that she had 15 fish up to Saturday last. Fog and bad weather has retarded her work and her total to date is 40 fish.

The Cachetot at Hawke's Hr. has 41 fish to date, one being a sperm. If the weather keeps fine the ship will fish till the middle of November.

Merely Coincidence?

CURIOUS EXAMPLES OF THINGS THAT CAME TRUE.

Flemstead was an Astronomer, But His Astrology Worked Out All Right—Mr. Williams' Dream of the Murder of Mr. Perceval in British Commons was Fulfilled—Story of Lord Lytton's Ghost.

Most of us have had more or less striking coincidences happen within our own personal experience. Some of the most memorable instances published are to be found in these remarkable series of circumstances which form chains of evidence, on the strength of which many innocent men have been convicted.

Humor is to be found in coincidence, too. In the days of Flemstead, a former Astronomer-Royal, astrologers were much in request by the public, who looked upon the Astronomer-Royal as the most potent of them all, and often consulted him in time of trouble. One day an old lady called on Flemstead and asked him to exercise his art by discovering the whereabouts of a basket of linen she had lost. Flemstead pretended to consult the stars, and then told his visitor that if she went to a certain field she would find her belongings. The wo-

man went to the place indicated, and much to the astronomer's astonishment found her basket of linen intact.

One of the most remarkable instances of this kind—a vision prior to or simultaneous with an historical occurrence represented in the vision—was Mr. Williams' dream of the murder of Mr. Perceval in the lobby of the House of Commons on May 11th, 1812. Mr. Williams was a native of Redruth in Cornwall. On the night of the 2nd or 3rd of May he dreamt that he saw a little man whom he afterwards learned was Mr. Perceval, the Prime Minister, shot by another man whose dress he described, and who took a pistol from under his coat. The tragedy took place in the lobby of the House of Commons, and the murderer was laid hold of by several gentlemen present. Such in brief was Mr. Williams' dream, and he dreamt it no fewer than three times that same night. This made such an impression on him that he wished to journey up to London to warn Mr. Perceval. But his friends dissuaded him, pointing out that he would probably be laughed at for his pains. Williams yielded, but watched the newspapers. He wrote afterwards:

"On the evening of the 13th of May . . . my second son, returning from Truro, came in a hurried way into the room where I was sitting and exclaimed, 'Oh, father, your dream has come true! Mr. Perceval has been shot in the lobby of the House of Commons; there is an account come from London to Truro written after the newspapers were printed.' Mr. Perceval, as we know, was assassinated on the 11th. Another very curious circumstance in connection with this affair was that a rumor or report of the assassination of Mr. Perceval reached Bude Kirk, a village near Annan, in Scotland, on the night of Sunday, May 10th, the day before the crime was committed. This was mentioned in The Times of May 25th, 1812, and was confirmed by Rev. Mr. Ward's Unlabeled Cures Burns, Etc.

Yorston, of Hoddam, who visited Bude Kirk a short time afterwards. A somewhat similar affair which was generally known as Lord Lytton's ghost—although nobody knew what the ghost was for or whether there was any spectre at all—was said by Dr. Johnson to have been "the most extraordinary thing that has happened in my day." Thomas Lord Lytton was born in 1774. As a young man he played the prodigal at home and abroad, until at the age of 30 he took his seat in the House of Lords. In November, 1804, his party went into opposition. On Thursday, November 25, he denounced the Government in a notable speech. Referring to a sinecure which he held, he said: "Perhaps I shall not keep it long!"

On the previous night Lytton had seen the ghost, or apparition, or whatever it was, and had been told that he would die in three days. He mentioned it to Rowan Hamilton on the 26th, and also to Captain Ascoug, through whom it reached Mrs. Thrale, who chronicled it. On the same day he went to Epsom with some friends and mentioned the visitation to them. About midnight on the 28th November Lord Lytton died suddenly in bed, his valet having left him for a moment. The cause of death was not stated and there was no inquest. Most of the narrators, including Mrs. Thrale, who recorded the warning before news of his lordship's death reached her, called the affair a dream; but the coincidence of its fulfillment is the mysterious and significant part of it.

Still another example of the long arm of coincidence is given by Dr. Ebera, the head of a great lunatic asylum. He had been waiting at the station for a friend who had not arrived when an old Scotchwoman rushed up to him, "Oh, sir!" she cried, "Thank God you've come. Now take me to him!"

The doctor was naturally astonished, and the woman explained that she had not heard of her sailor son for months. She had been warned in a dream to go to London and wait at the station, where an old gentleman would meet her and take her to where her son was. "And you are the old gentleman," she concluded.

Still Dr. Ebera was no wiser. He took her story to his wife. Suddenly he recollected that some months previously a man was sent to the asylum. He had fallen from aloft, cracked his skull, and was then only recovering from an operation. Next day a meeting was arranged, and sure enough the injured man was the old lady's sailor son. In a very short time they both returned to Scotland, both convinced that their reunion was a special dispensation of Providence.

Mystery Of Glamis.

What is the True Story of the Castle's Secret Room?

Grim old Glamis Castle stands in Forfarshire, Scotland, and is, and has been, for centuries, the principal seat of the Earls of Strathmore.

It is one of the most perfect specimens extant of a typical fortress-residence of the Middle Ages, with walls fifteen feet thick.

But its chief claim to interest lies in the fact that it holds, somewhere within its gloomy precincts, a secret of so terrible a nature that it is never permitted to be divulged to more than three people at one time. These are the Earl of Strathmore for the time being, his eldest son, and the factor, or steward, of the estate.

The heir is initiated into the mystery on the night of his twenty-first birthday, never before. Accompanied by his father, the earl, and preceded by the factor, carrying a crowbar and keys, the young man is taken through a succession of corridors to a concealed recess. A portion of masonry is removed, and the secret revealed to him.

The wall is then built up again, after which the factor invariably leaves the castle and rides for home, no matter how stormy the night or late the hour.

Of course there have not been wanting scoffers who have made light of the Glamis mystery. He has even asserted that none such exists; but the fact remains that the people most nearly concerned in it, do not by any means regard it with indifference.

Indeed, it is on record that the late earl, who died only so recently as 1906, and who was one of the most level-headed men once said—sadly and solemnly to a pressing inquirer: "Sir, if you could guess the nature of the secret, you would go down on your knees and thank God it were not yours."

Innumerable attempts have been made by unauthorized persons to fathom the mystery, but they have never succeeded. Once a former Countess of Strathmore, during the temporary absence of her husband, assembled a party of guests as curious as herself, and together they searched every nook, corner and cranny of the ancient castle for a whole week, trying to discover the locality of the secret room. Their efforts proved unavailing, so

Schooner Missing.

MUCH ANXIETY FELT.

Yesterday afternoon Colonial Secretary Watson received the following message from Mr. E. J. Samson, J. P. of Winterton, T. B. formerly Seilly Cove:—

"Schr. George May, of this place, John Downey, master, left St. John's, Saturday morning in company with other schooners. Has not arrived here yet, nor is there any report of her. Sehr, Ethie did not see or hear anything of her. Will you please make enquiries from all telegraph offices. All other schooners that left St. John's at the same time are here since Monday morning."

Immediately on receipt of the message the Colonial Secretary wired to Mr. Samson thus:—

"Sub-Collector at Catalina wires me that schr. Rosie, Capt. Alfred Paul, reports seeing wreck 10 miles N. E. of Baccalieu, spars and canvas only to be seen; schooner about 40 tons; main boom painted pink; canvas patched. Please wire me whether this description corresponds with that of the missing schooner."

Mr. H. W. LeMessurier, Assistant Collector of Customs, received a similar message from the Rosie.

Later last night the Colonial Secretary had a message from the operator at Catalina, reading:—

"Schr. George May, not here. Vessel arriving yesterday evening reports seeing a wreck about 10 miles N. E. of Baccalieu, apparently schr. of about 40 tons; tried to take in tow but wreck seemed to be tangled underneath; could not see any name, but sails were patched and main boom painted pink."

There was no further news of the vessel last night. Messrs. Bowring Bros. say that the description of the wreck seems to tally with that of the George May. Saturday night and Sunday morning a S. W. gale prevailed and she may have met some accident in this. Schooners which arrived here the past few days from Northern ports report the storm of Saturday night and Sunday morning to have been a severe one and a fleet of vessels had to shelter in Catalina. Any schooner caught out in this would have a hard time of it especially if heavily laden, as a big sea ran. Montenegrins the Victors

Special Evening Telegram.

PODGORITZA, To-day.

The Montenegrins captured Berana after ten days fighting. Seven hundred Turkish soldiers were taken together with large quantities of ammunition and provisions. In the attack the Montenegrins had ten men killed and thirty one wounded. The Serbians, many of whom resided in the town of Berana, hailed General Vokitch and his victorious troops as their deliverers. General Martinovich after a short engagement occupied the fortified sections of Mount Moutitch, opposite Taraboz. It is reported there will be a pause of operations around Tushl. Undoubtedly this is due to the Montenegrins realizing they have paid too dearly for their success in heavy loss of life. King Nicholas accordingly has issued a proclamation urging his soldiers to restrain their impetuosity and adopt themselves to modern conditions of warfare, which demand artillery preparations before attempts are made to storm fortified positions. The Montenegrin Prince Danilo and Peter have been busy in engagements, personally leading their forces. Prince Peter has been promoted to Major for gallantry. General Martinovich's division has worked its way closer to Scutari. It is stated that an Austrian vessel has been ordered up the Byrona River to bring the Austrian Consul and colony from Scutari. More than a hundred battalions of Turkish troops are concentrated ready at ports in Asia Minor, only awaiting the conclusion of peace with Italy to be shipped to reinforce the Turkish forces in the Balkans.


