The reaction accompanying the establishment of suppuration is, as might be expected, marked by a slight rise of temperature compared with the corresponding hours of yesterday. THE RIVERS AND STREAMS LAW. The judgment given yesterday in the court of appeal in the case of McLaren v. Caldwell is a very important one in several Chancellor Proudfoot, and it destroys the interpretation given to the statute in the case of Boale v. Dickson.

All streams, as the chief justice pithily put it vesterday, means all streams and not some streams. In the opinion of the court of appeal a man cannot call a stream his own by throwing a dam across it or building a slide upon it. It still remains a public stream, and open for public use.

Such, the court holds, was the meaning of the statute passed thirty years ago, and it follows that Mr. Pardee's bill of last session was a correct declaration of the law, and had not the quality of being ex post facto legis-





THE RIVERS AND STREAMS BILL. The Ontario Government's View Sustained by

the Court of Appeal in the Case of McLaren
The court of appeal yesterday gave judgment in
the above case, reversing the decision of Vice
Chancellor Proudloot, and silirning the right of the
Ontario legislature to pass the rivers and streams act.
The judgment was delivered by Chief Justice
Sprange, who, after reviewing the facts of the case,
observed that he could not agree with the learned
vice-chancellor in his interpretation of the decision
in the case of Boale v. Dickson. He thought no such
qualification could be put upon the statute as the
vice-chancellor contended. It gave liberty to all persons an useall streams. He believed that "all
streams" meaut all streams in the popular
and grimmatical significance of the phrase,
and not merely "some streams," and he asked
whether taking the opposite ground they would
not be legislating instead of interpreting the law
He also pointed out that the legislature he
passed the law with a desire to foster the

Justices Paterson and Morrison concurred in the
judgment of the chief justice. Mr. Justice Burton
